The National Collection

A long-standing dream of Canadian Numismatists is expected to become a reality in 1978 when the national numismatic collection is placed on public display.

The Bank of Canada in Ottawa initiated a project in 1968 to illustrate the development of Canadian currency and the history of banking in Canada. It will come to fruition when the bank's projected building program is completed, including a currency museum for all Canadians and visitors to enjoy.

First steps toward establishing a national show place actually took place in 1880 when the Dominion government purchased a Montreal numis-matist's collection.

For many years the Parliamentary Library and the Public Archives of Canada were repositories for numismatic items accumulated from gifts to the Crown and other sources. A full-time curator was appointed in 1963.

Experts say the Bank of Canada now has the largest and most complete collection of C anadian coins, tokens and paper money in existance.

A sizable addition was the acquisition of the bulk of the collection of Canadian coins, tokens and paper money formed by J. Douglas Ferguson of Rock Island, Quebec. This is considered the outstanding private collection of Canadian numismatic material in the world.

The Dominion's currency history spans approximately three centuries, broken down by authorities into the French Colonial, the English Colonial, and the post-Confederation periods. Coins and currency from each era are featured in the Bank of Canada's Numismatic Collection.

The first coins were struck for Canada in 1670 and the first paper money issued in 1675. A colorful paper money chapter was written in the late 1600's when playing cards became the first form of paper money in the Western Hemisphere. A shortage of metallic currency for French Canada forced its leaders to make popular money out of playing cards.

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A Numismatic Chronology

The purpose of this chronology is to present in a simple and easy-to-scan

form the bare outlines of Canadian numismatics.

We hope this chronology will serve collectors by giving the bare bones outline; therefore a mass of detail has been necessarily omitted. The facts presented are all of general interest and illustrative of each coin-issuing authority's history. We welcome any suggestions or corrections to the listing presented.

(Official types, major "national" tokens)

1670 First regal French silver 15 five-sols "Gloriam regni tui dicenti" coinage of Louis XIV, copper two-deniers.

1717 Copper 12. six-deniers, Louis XV.

1721-22 Copper nine-deniers colonial coinage.

1728 Billon marque, half marque enter circulation.

1813 "Holey dollar," cut and counterstamped Spanish dollars issued by the governor of Prince Edward Island.

1815 Magdalen Island token penny of Sir Isaac Coffin.

1823 Nova Scotia copper half-penny token introduces types issued through 1840.

1837-52 Bank and bouquet copper token coinages, Upper Canada, Quebec.

1843 New Brunswick tokens.

1856 Arbus copper Nova Scotia tokens of Victoria.

1858 Silver 20, 10, five-cents, bronze cent, Canada, young head of Victoria.

1861 Decimal bronze cent half cent, New Brunswick.

1862 Silver 20, 10, five-cents, New Brunswick; gold 20, 10-dollars. British Columbia.

1865 Bronze cent. silver five, 10, 20-cents, gold two-dollars, Newfoundland.

1870 New Confederation silver coinage of Canada.

1871 Prince Edward Island bronze cent, English inscription obverse.

1876 Large bronze cent introduced of Canadian Confederation.

1911 Pattern dollar for Canada, George V, "Dei gratia" omitted on first coins of this reign.

1912 Normal inscriptions resumed, new gold five and ten-dollar Canadian coins join sovereigns of British type, minted 1908-1919-C.

1920 Small bronze cent replaces older large cent.

1922 Pure nickel round five-cents replaces small silver five-cents.

1935 Silver Jubilee of the reign of King George V sees silver dollar finally introduced and begins ongoing series of commemorative coins for Canada.

1937 New Coins of George VI, first wholly redesigned reverses.

1938 Small bronze cent introduces in Newfoundland.

1942 Tombac brass replaces nickel in Canadian five-cents, coin struck on a 12-sided planchet.

1943 Canada first in coinage: Morse code reverse dots and dashes. "We win when we work willingly" around edge of tombac "Victory" five-cents.

1947 Last Newfoundland coins.

1951 Sole commemorative in five-cent denomination marks anniversary of the isolation of nickel as a recognized element.

1967 Centenary of Confederation completely redesigned coinage, bronze one-cent through gold 20-dollars.

1968 Pure nickel replaces silver in Canadian coinage, 50-cents and the one-dollar coins are reduced in size as well.

1971 British Columbia centenary sees re-introduction of large-size silver dollar,

along with regular issue small pure nickel dollar.

Montreal Mayor Drapeau and the Canadian government egin the issue of the first silver \$5 and \$10 Olympic coins. to be followed by six more four-coin sets for worldwide distribution, to aid in financing the XXI Olympiad held in 1976 in this city.

1976 Joining the 28 silver \$5 and \$10 Olympic coins are two new gold \$100 pieces, struck in .5833 fine for sale as Unc.; .9166 fine in Proof. Measuring 27 and 25 mm respectively, the gold coins are offered at a premium over face.

The President's Message

The successful operation of any organization particularly that of ours, is by and large dependent on its members sustained contribution of three dollars per annum, still a bargain at today's prices. In order that this standard be successfully maintained, it is imperative that each members's contribution be received promptly and without solicitation. Annual membership fees for 1977 are now due. Cheques or money orders in the amount of three dollars Canadian currency should be made payable to the Atlantic Provinces Numismatic Association, 1635 Edward Street, Halifax, N. S. Members wishing to pay by personal cheque on United States or overseas banks are required to remit \$3.50 which allows for the bank service charge.

I am pleased to report that a second Numismatic Hobby Protection Act (bill C-256) has been introduced to the House of Commons in Ottawa. Robert Kaplan, Liberal MP for York Centre and Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister of Finance, presented the bill following committee meetings with representatives of the Canadian Numismatic Association, the Canadian Paper Money Society the Canadian Association of Numismatic

Dealers and the Royal Canadian Mint.

The bill, an amendment to the Criminal Code. seeks to have labelled as counterfeit any coin, token, medal or paper currency which resembles any such piece that is, if

genuine, or numismatic interest, unless clearly marked "copy".

Serving on the committee with Mr. Kaplan were William Cross, CAND President; Alex Munro, CNA President; Robert Willey, CNA Historian; Al Bliman, CAND Executive Secretary and CPMS Ontario Regional Directors; Michelle Menard, Royal Canadian Mint; and the legal counsul for the mint.

On February 11, 1977 Mr. Kaplan moved that Bill C-256, to amend the Criminal Code (counterfeit of rare coins and notes), be read the second time and referred to the Standing Committee on Justice and Legal Affairs. Motion was agreed to and

referred to the above named committee.

Of recent weeks I have had the opportunity to visit many coin clubs in Atlantic Canada having appeared as guest speaker. These include the Prince Edward Island Numismatic Association the newly formed St. Croix International Coin Club at St. Stephen, N. B., the Fredericton Numismatic Society. Saint John Coin Collectors Club and the Halifax Coin Club meeting scheduled on April 4th. Members of all these clubs were a most gracious audience. I wish to thank the members of the Prince Edward Island Numis atic Association for providing the opportunity for me to appear on the CBC Television show "Afternoon Delight" with Mary Pat Mackenzie discussing Banks and Banking in Prince Edward Island. It was a most enjoyable experience and one that will be long remembered in my numismatic career.

I am happy to announce that while in Saint John the Saint John Coin Collectors Club have made a bid for the 1977 Fall Rally. There are a goodly number of keen students and organizers in this club of long standing, so I am of the opinion this show has to be a must for our APNA members to attend. Full details pertaining to

The three coins to be written about in this section of the article are the 1949 Silver Dollar and Canada's Ten cent piece as well as the Voyageur Dollar designed by Emmanual Hahn and issued in 1935 (see the first section of this article for information on this coin)

The 1949 Silver Dollar commemorates Newfoundland's entry into Confederation. The design was created by Thomas Shingles who created the Matrix for the coin by hand cutting it. This is considered by many to be one of

the most beautiful coins in the world.

The reverse of this coin shows John Cabot's ship the Matthew on which he made his discoveries of the New World A map is perhaps the best method

of showing the voyages of the various discoveries of the New World.

The second coin which shows a ship is the ten cent piece (1937 to date). Many people believe the ship to be the Bluenose. It obviously did inspire the design. The obverse was from a portrait model by T. H. Paget. The reverse was designed by Emmanual Hahn. The January 1967 issue of the Canadian Numismatic Journal has an article on Canada's Ten Cent coin and the 'Bluenose' by Nelson Boltz.

Further information as it is received will be incorporated into this article and it will be soon expanded to include information on the banknote

portion of the article.

There are those who will say that tokens have been omitted. These have been spelled out in detail in several books already. i.e. Charlton Coin Guide and the "Coins of Canada" by Robert C. Willey and James Haxby and other books.

The Bluenose

"Her passing is a National Sorrow; The ignominy of her death a National Shame.".

Her conscience stung and ashamed of her betrayal, Canada "mourned" her golry and her loss. They had sold her to be used as a lowly freighter, now they mourned their loss.

In early 1960 a replica of another famous ship was begun - The Bounty -from the building yards of the famous Smith and Rhuland Co., Lunenburg came the Bounty in late August. Many of the crowd of 10,000 weren't thinking necessarily of the Bounty but of a re-preation of....you guessed it.... The Bluenose.

In 1920 The International Fishermen's Trophy was offered for competition amongst working schooners. A Yankee Schooner Esperants won the first race

against the Lunenburger Delewana.

The creation of a vessel to be both racer and a worker was commissioned.
A 143 foot schooner came off the blocks at Smith and Rhuland's yard on
March 26 1921. Its name was . The Bluenose ..

Angus Walters was to be her skipper, a small, scrappy but commanding

figure with a quick tongue.

The Bluenose "trimmed them all" ... The Elsie, The Henry Ford, Columbia and a spritely schooner from Glouscester - The Gertrude L. Thebaud. A 1938 medal depicts and commemorates the races between these beautiful schooners. It is possibly the original Bluenose medal. In 1930 the Thibaud beat the Bluenose off Glouscester - the only ship to ever do so.

There are several other ships medals which are in my collection. One of which is the bronze shield of Cape Breton issued in 1967. This seal was authorized in 1765 and used until annexation to Nova Scotia in 1820. A silver medal was issued also. The quantity of each is unknown to me at this time.

The final two medals of my collection are the SS Beaver medals commemorating the Hudson Bay Co.'s ship the SS Beaver which sank at Vancouver in 1892. Both medals are made of metal from the wreck. They are bronze.

I hope these articles will open new interest in "Ships and Numismatics"

Plans for the future of the association should include the development of new ideas of interest and help individual collectors enjoy their own hobby more. The newsletter should include new articles and services of a greater interest to all AFNA members. We should continue to encourage club and member participation in the APNA and should hold Spring and Fall Rallies in new cities and towns across Atlantic Provinces.

I am of the opinion that if these guidelines are followed our association can only continue to prosper in the years that lie ahead.

Saint John Coin Collectors Club WOODEN Nickels

by Alton Bisner APNA 93

In my search on the Saint John Coin Collectors Club wooden nickels, 1966 was the first year the club produced wooden nickels which are 42mm x 25mm x 5mm thick. The obverse has a loyalist man with Loyalist City Saint John, N. B. Wooden Nickel with a large 5¢in center. Reverse has coat of arms in center, coin show 1966. Mintage 200.

1967 has the same obverse as 1966 and is the same size. Reverse shows a maple leaf emblem (1867-1968). Mintage 200.

1969 - the wooden nickel was made same size and same obverse as 1966. Reverse same, only date changed to 1969. Mintage 300.

1973, the club has a round nickel 31mm across and 5mm thick. Obverse Loyalist man with Loyalist City. Reverse has Saint John Coin Collectors Club around outside edge with big 5¢ in center and 1973 at the bottom. Mintage 350.

In 1974 the club planned to have a wooden nickel made the same size as the Canadian silver dollar, but when the blanks were received they were 39mm and 3mm thick. The obverse has Loyalist man with Loyalist City. Reverse has Saint John Coin Collectors Club around outside edge with big 5¢ in center and 1974 at bottom. They were dipped in oil. Mintage 250.

In 1975 the wooden nickel was round, the same size as 1974, in fact everything is the same except the date. Mintage 250. They were also dipped in oil.

The 1976 wooden nickel is round - 39mm by 3mm thick. Obverse has Loyalist man with Loyalist City stamped in blue ink on natural wood. Reverse has Saint John Coin Collectors Club around outside edge with big 5¢ in center and 1976 at bottom; also stamped with blue ink on natural wood. Mintage 150.

The President's Message

For the benefit of new collectors in our association, we list below general grading terms and descriptions currently used by collectors and dealers.

The following are accepted definitions of condition classifications of

coins, tokens and medals:

PROOF - Specially struck from polished dies for collectors or for presentation purposes. These specimens have a mirror-like surface.

PROOF-LIKE - Select choice specimens of regular strikings, expecially handled

and free of abrasions nicks and scratches.

- B. U. Brilliant Uncirculated. In new condition with full original mint lustre. May have minor bag abrasions.
- A. U. About uncirculated. Where a coin or token is tetween B. U. and E. F.
- E. F. Extremely Fine. Slightly circulated with only faint evidence of wear.
- v. F. Very Fine. Shows only slight wear on higher parts of design, such as circlet of cornet on Victoria issues, and of crown on George V issues; leaves are sharp on wreathed Victoria head.

FINE - More wear on higher parts than in Very Fine. Lower left rim of circlet (Victoria) and circlet of George V crown worn almost through. Leaves

on wreathed head all show, but are not sharp.

- V. G. Very Good. Much wear but main features of design and legend clear. Little detail in circlet (Victoria), and only part of leaves showing on wreathed head.
- GOOD Good. Inscriptions and date considerably worn but legible.

The following are the accepted and familiar terms of grading of paper money as published in the Canadian Paper Money Society's official grading guide. UNCIRCULATED - a perfect note, crisp and clean as when new and without any

creases or blemishes. Colours have original brightness. (The grade C U is now used to indicate that a note in question is crisp uncirculated)

EXTREMELY FINE - Crisp and clean as when new but with minor creases or blemishes. Colours have original brightness.

VERY FINE - Fairly crisp and clean, but with some creases and other signs of having been in circulation.

FINE - A well circulated note, but still firm and little soiling or fading of colours.

VERY GOOD - A whole note, with some signs of edge fraying, damaged corners and perhaps some soiling and fading of colours. Some wear evident at creases.

GOOD - POOR - Unless very scarce, notes in these conditions are not usually collectable. They are very worn, dirty, faded and generally unattractive, often with tears or pieces missing.

It is hoped the information contained above will be of some practical use to you the newcomer in our association!

Portraits on Canadian Coinage

Since Canada became a country in 1867, there have been a number of British monarchs portrayed on the obverse of the coins. This is due to the fact that Canada is a British Commonwealth nation. Canadian coinage struck prior to 1908 was produced at the Tower Mint in London, England until completion of the Royal Canadian Mint in Ottawa. Canada first adopted decimal currency, a dollar of one hundred cents in 1858 and included four denominations.

Queen Victoria was the first obverse portrait (1858-1901). The designer was Leonard C. Wyon chief engraver of the Royal Mint at the time. For the silver five cent and ten cent pieces, he continued the design of 1858. For the twenty five cent and fifty cent pieces, he introduced a crowned head copied from a bust by William Theed. The twenty cent piece was issued only in 1858 with the portrait of Queen Victoria on the obverse. The main difference between the twenty and twenty five cent coins is that the queen wears a crown on the twenty five cent piece. She wears a ribbon in her hair on the twenty cent coin. This coin measures 22.99 mm in diameter compared to 23.62 mm for the twenty five cent piece. For the large cent Wyon used the crowned head within a circle and the words "Victoria Dei Gratia Regina Canada" along the outside. All denominations but the twenty cent piece had the same obverse design. Various modifications of the obverse were undertaken after 1891.

The coinage of Edward VII (1902-1910) was designed and engraved by George William De Saulles. For the obverse he used a crowned bust of the king that of the cent being a beaded circle. The legend reads "Edwardvs Dei Gratia Rex Imperator".

The composition of the one cent is .950 copper, .040 tin and .010 zinc. The other four denominations were composed of .925 silver and .075 copper. Canadian silver coins from 1908 to date have upright reverses. Those dated before 1908 have upset reverses.

The next obverse type was that of George V (1911-1936) and designed by Sir Bertram MacKennal, except for the silver dollar of 1935. For these denominations, a crowned bust of the king, designed and modelled by MacKennal was used. The words around the bust read Georgivs V Dei Gratia; Rex Et Ind. Imp." The silver dollar of 1935 illustrates an older bust of the king. It was designed and modelled by Percy Metcalfe, an eminent English artist, with a special inscription commemorating the king's silver jubilee. The bust is not truncated as on the other coins, but comes down to the border. In 1920 the small cent was introduced and during the same year the large cent was discontinued. Similarly, the five cent silver coin ceased minting in 1921 to be replaced by the larger nickel of 1922. The silver dollar of 1935 was the first of its kind issued in Canada and measured 36 mm in diameter.

The obverse design of the George VI coinage (1937-1952) was done by a London medallist and sculptor, T. Humphrey Paget. On all six denominations is the uncrowned portrait of the king surrounded by the words "Georgivs VI Dei Gratia Rex". Paget's initials appear at the base of the neck on the obverse. The wording "Et Ind: Imp" was removed from the inscription on the obverse owing to India being granted independence in 1948. The reign of George VI is known for various special coinages for commemorative purposes and by reason of metal shortages caused by the second World War. In 1939 a commemorative silver dollar was struck for the Royal Visit of that year. Due to nickel being required for war needs, part of the 1942 and all of the 1943 five cent pieces were made of tombac. This medal consists of .88 copper and .12 zinc.

Chromium plated steel was used in 1944, 1945, 1951 and 1952. No silver

dollars were issued between 1940 to 1944.

Mary Gillick executed the laureated figure of Queen Elizabeth II which was used on the coin obverse from 1953 to 1964. This design was selected by the queen herself from drawings submitted by seventeen artists. It is a graceful portrait showing the head and shoulders. A light wreath of laurel binds her softly waved hair. The ribbon tied to the wreath flutters gently behind. Mrs. Gillick's initials 'MG' can be seen at the base of the portrait. The inscription reads "Elizabeth II Dei Gratia Regina". A small imperfection in the first dies had to be corrected to include the Queen's shoulder strap. As a result of this, the only obverse dollar variant came into existance. In 1964 on the commemorative silver dollar, Myron Cook altered the original Gillick design and modified Thomas Shingles' alteration.

A new portrait was introduced in 1965. This was engraved by Arnold Machin. Mr. Machin was born in Stoke-on-Trent in 1911 and held many posts in connection with art teaching and sculpturing. This portrait shows a more mature queen and she is seen wearing a diamond tiara of festoons, scrolls and collet-spikes, which was given to Her Majesty as a wedding present from Queen Mary. The inscription changed on this new obverse design by shortening the words "Dei Gratia" to the initials "DG" The coin was first struck on a flat field but this shortened the life of the die so a more concave coin was struck. The year 1963 saw the return of the round nickel and this has continued to the present date. In 1968 silver coins were replaced by nickel due to the rapid rise in the price of silver bullion. The sizes of the fifty cent piece and dollar coins were reduced, and the reductions of the designs were done by Myron Cook. In 1973 the queen's portrait was reduced in size. It has a much sharper portrait and the hair is more visible, as it formerly had a worn appearance. Patrick Brindley, chief engraver at the mint, was responsible for re-engraving the portrait on these coins. This is the way Canada's coinage appears today. Queen Elizabeth II has been shown on the coin's obverse for twenty five years. The 1977 silver dollar commemorates her Jubilee year with a special design on the reverse and obverse. The Queen's portrait is is reduced in size and is surrounded by the wording "Silver Jubilee * Elizabeth II * Jubilé D'Argent * 1952-1977.

The coinage of Canada is very interesting to study and I would encourage the reader to learn more about the country and its decimal coinage system throughout the past one hundred and ten years.

The President's Message

What's in a name? The capital of the Province of Nova Scotia. Halifax, acquired its name on July 18 1749. The Indian name was "Chebookt" meaning, "Chief Harbour", or "Great Long Harbour". Halifax was known as Chebucto up to the year 1749 when it was changed to "Halifax" in honour of Lord Halifax, then President of the English Board of Trade. Halifax was declared a free port in 1817 and was incorporated in the year 1841.

Old Halifax still contains the rechest evidence of British heritage in North America. In 1749, Col. Edward Cornwallis arrived with 2576 settlers to found the first British settlement in Canada. As you stand on the water's edge, you can imagine the days of sailing ships. Schooners, sloops and clipper ships plied the harbour, and a forest of masts, bowsprits and jib booms bobbed by the wharves along the waterfront. Later, great steamships joined the traffic in the harbour, bringing wealth to an enterprising Haligonian, Samuel Cunard.

For the collector of Canadian Paper Money, the City of Halifax provides an interesting challenge. This area falls within my greatest numismatic interest, and indeed fortunate is he who owns one example of each of the currency issuing institutions. Almost all the issues are in the very rare category, particularly

those of the Halifax Banking Company and the Union Bank of Halifax.

The Halifax Banking Company or Collins Bank was a private bank incorporated in 1872 and operated from 1825 to 1903 when it was absorbed by the Canadian Bank of Commerce. Built in 1823, this is the oldest bank structure in Canada. Although the bank was reputed to be impregnable, two robberies occured, one in 1829 and one in 1849. The bank was established by Capt. Enos Collins, who had become wealthy from the proceeds of his privateer, the "Liverpool Packet", a converted slaver and pirate ship, which was legendary along the New England coast. With only \$4,597.18 in notes outstanding it is obvious that very few remain in the hands of collectors.

The Union Bank of Halifax was established in 1856 and operated successfully until 1910 when it was absorbed by the Royal Bank of Canada. Not much is known of the bank's history, although we do know that the note issues are very rare. My personal records indicate only three known issued notes are in private hands.

although a few proof notes are available from time to time.

Other Halifax banking institutions include the Peoples Bank of Halifax founded in 1864 and absorbed by the Bank of Montreal in 1905; The Merchants Bank of Halifax established in 1869 which became the Royal Bank of Canada in 1901; the Mercantile Banking Corporation of which little information is available and the Bank of Nova Scotia.

The Bank of Nova Scotia opened it's doors to the public in August 29, 1832 in rooms in John Roman's building at the corner of Granville and Duke Streets, Halifax This served as the bank's headquarters until its own head office building was erected on Hollis Street in 1837. The bank's first issue of notes in August of 1832 are extremely rare and were issued in five denominations; £1/10, £2, £2/10, £5 and £10. The £10 notes are of particular interest for the head and shoulders portrait appearing theron is thought to be that of William Lawson, the bank's first president. It is also interesting to note that about 1820 William Lawson issued his own currency under the heading of merchants and miscellaneous notes, scrip and bons, as did John Albro & Co. John A. Barry, H. H. Cogswell, A. Curard and Son,

Adam Esson and quite possibly others. I am of the personal opinion that all of this currency is extremely rare and bears searching for.

It is also interesting to note that the Dominion of Canada government issues of 1870 and 1878 in the \$1 and \$2 denominations issued notes made payable at

Halifax, all of which are rare.

As mentioned earlier, Halifax was incorporated as a city in 1841. As a result of annexation carried out in 1969, the city increased its population by a third and quadrupled its size, making it the largest city in the Maritimes. With a population of over 120,000 Halifax is the centre of an area whose immediate population is rapidly approaching the population "plateau" of 250,000 people. Already the effects of this significant "plateau" are being realized as the market demands of the population are beginning to produce a self-regenerative economy.

In closing I might add that Nova Scotia is the only province of Canada to possess, through Royal Charter, a flag of its own. The flag of Nova Scotia traces its origin to the Charter of New Scotland granted in 1621 to Sir William Alexander

by King James VI of Scotland and England.
