this machine depends on the use this machine depends on the use printed or "tagged" with speci ink. The overprinting inks are vis
bie only on careful examination. The curent recular iswe one ent to five cent denominations o postage stamps will be overprinted with vertical lines, ones at eac side of each stamp of the 1 cent tions and single line in the middle of the 4 cent denomination. This pattern of overprinting will enable the machine to separate the local from the letter mail prepaid for out-of-town points. Also, the tag ging will enable the machine manipulate mechanically each pie of letter mail until the letter is in the proper position or "faced-up" for machine cancellation of $t$ h stamp. With the exception of th 3 cent, these stamps will be over printed on sheets without the plate number inscription.

During November, two functions took place in New York to launch publicity for the Malaria Eradication Stamp Campaign of the WORLD HEALTH ORGANISATION, an Agency of the United Nations. On November 17th, a Press Conference and Reception were held UN Headquarters for correspondents, stamp editors and press altaches. Coigney of the WHO explained the background of the stamp campaign and announced

THE PROBLEM OF MALARIA
Over 1,000.000 people die yearly of malaria. It is the most serious insect-carried disease and over one billion people the world over are still exposed to it today. In at least 140 countries and territories malaria is seciously setting back economic and social development due he deaths and incapacitations it causes
Today, under the leadership of the WHO, a battle is being fought all parts of the world against malaria. This is a long, expensive which requires preparation, skill and patience.
THE HISTORY OF THE WHO STAMP CAMPAIGN
kceping in mind the increase in philatelic interest in the world, baign dedicated to the theme "The World United Against Malaria". All Advisory Committee selected the official emblem of the campaign and suggested stamp designs. The award went to the designs of Hans Hartmann of Switzerland. The official emblem shows the globe as a ymbol of world-wide cooperation under the auspices of WHO, with the Anopheles vector of malaria attacked by the Aesculapian staff formed a spearhead.
The WHO appealed to all its 109 member states to issue stamps ,ased on this design and to make contributions, in the form of stamps$r$ in cash. The Universal Postal Union also transmitted this appeal 0 its members. The response was prompt and about 70 nations and erritories have already indicated their participation in this programme.

## U.N. STAMP PROGRAMMME FOR 1962 ANNOUNCED

The UN Postal Administration recently announced $i$ tentative programme of stamp issues for 1962. This includes 5 commemoratives plus a re-design and re-issue of some the existing definitives. Brief details are given below.

19 FEbRUARY stamps honouring the UN progran in Housing and Community De velopment and its long range program of concerted action in thes fields.
30 March-4c and 11c stamps commemorating the activities of
the UN through WHO in its malaria eradication drive (see page 1). The theme of these stamps will be "The World United Against Malaria".
28 May-Re-design and re-jssue of some of the existing DEFINITTVES. Denominations

Liechtenstein's history is an inter esting one. It became a sovereig7 state on May 3, I342, when Coun Hartmann I became ruler of the Principality of Vaduz, the castle crowned little town of 2,400 inhabi capital.
By 1434 the small province had been enlarged to contain the tw and Vaduz, both of which and Vaduz, both of which were held
as immediate fief's to the Holy as immediate fiefs to the Holy
Roman Empire. Nearly three humRoman Empire. Nearly three hun
dred years later the Emperou Charles VI confirmed their posse sion by the House of Leichtenstein which remains to this day.

In July, 1806, the then ruler of Liechtenstein, John I, seceded from the Empire and joined the Confederation of the Rhine under Napoleon. After the battle of Waterloo, he joined the German Confederation,
and when the Confederation died out in 1866, the Principality became politically independent.
Liechtenstein has remained free ever since although there is a Cus. toms union with Switzerland. During the last war the little country successfully defied Hitler although it has had no army since 1868 and the last Liechtenstein suldid in 1943 at the age of 91
Liechtenstein has a litile cotton weaving and spiming, some manufacture of leather goods and pottery, but agriculture supports the

"Try to find, in your change, cent of every date since 1920. This challenge has been the start of many a Canadian collection, and it reflects a trend. While it is traditional, in most parts of the world, for the numismatist to be concerned with principal coinage types, not series of dates, the popular States has been definitely to seek and complete such series.

There is widespread interest in studying the dates and varieties of familiar coin series, observing their relative availability, and searching for the best condition obtainable. Thousands do. A glance through mint statistics will explain the scarcity of such popular coms a the 1948 silver dollar, the 1890 and 189450 cents, and the 1946 New-
foundland five cents. Mint statisdell the who story. Reported quantities struc sometimes are misleading. For example, such rarities as the 1921 when large surpluses were melted when large
unissued.

Prepare to Compromise
Most collectors would envision the ideal coin collcction as one in which the specimens showed no indeed such a new and werfect and indeed, such a new and perfect coin Yet, many earlier dates prove virtually unobtainable in such state of prepared to compromise by accept ing coins showing a tair degree of
legitimate wear. The grading of circulated coins is a delicate art, and everi experts may not be in full agreement, but a number of standards of "condition" have come to win general acceptance.

The less desirable grades, Good, About Good, Fair Plus, Fair and Poor, normally are oot included in collections, except, perhaps, as "space fillers" for want $f$ beiter coin. Such between grades as About Uncirculated, Extra Fine, Fine Plus and About Fine are employed by some dealers and collectors and are self-explanatory, but such extreme preciseness of grading invites dispute.

Not Included
Holed coins, and other mutilated pieces, normally are not included in a collection, though considerable interest is shown in "freaks" or
"mint errors" resulting from mishaps in production. In this category are off-centre strikings, and double strikings on the same planchet, both of which types of errors are nown on Canadian coins, but more commonly seen on recent issues of the United States.
In addition to the pleasure of collecting coins and completing different series there is always the possibility of "striking it rich" by finding a rarity, such as the Winnipeg bank teller who recently found a Canadian 1921 half-dollar. This is Canada's most valuable coin

## SEYCHELLES POST OFFICE CENTENARY ISSUE



To commemorate the centenary of the first post office in the Seychelles, opened at Victoria, the capital, on 11th December, 1861, a special set of three stamps was issued on 11th December, 1961.
The Seychelles consist of an archipelago of 99 islands situated in the Indian Ocean. The islands are believed to have been discovered by the Portuguese in 1505 , ered by the Portuguese in 1505 ,
although there is evidence to sugalthough there is evidence to sug-
gest that prior to this they had gest that prior to this they had
been visited by Arab sailors. They remained uninhabited until occupied by the French in 1768, who named them Seychelles, in honour of Vicomte Moreau de Sechelles. On 17th May, 1794, during the war of the French Revolution, the islands were surrendered to a British Naval Force and were assigned to Gt. Britain under the Treaty of Paris in 1814. Under British rule, the islands were adBritish rule, the islands were ad-
ministered from Mauritius unti
they were constituted a separate Colony by Letters Patent of September, 1903.
A Mauritian official was appointed as resident Mail Agent during the 1850 s , but it was not until 11th December, 1861, that the first Post Office, a branch of the Mauritius Postal Service, was established at Victoria, on the island of Mahé.
These new stamps were printed in 3 colours by two recess and one letter press printing by Bradbury, Wilkinson \& Co., Ltd., on CA (Block Capitals) watermarked paper, all in horizontal format, size $38 \times 25 \mathrm{~mm}$.
The design, common to all three values, includes a portrait of H.M. Queen Elizabeth II with the St. Edward's Crown, and features the 6d. blue Mauritius stamp with the B. 64 cancellation originally used in the Seychelles. Denominations are 10 cents (reddish purple, blue and black), 35 cents (green, blue and black) and Rs. 2.25 (orange brown, blue and black).
The stamps will remain on sale until 31st May, 1962, or until tocks are exhausted, whichever arlier. (From the Crown Agent

## RUANDA - URUNDI CATHEDRAL ISSUE

A special issue of 6 surtaxed stamps were issued on the 18 th December, 1961, by the Ruanda-Urundi Postal Authorities. The proceeds of the surtax will be set aside for the completion and upkeep of the Cathedral at Usumbura in Ruanda-Urundi.

Denominations are $50 \mathrm{c}+25 \mathrm{c}, 1 \mathrm{fr}+50 \mathrm{c}, 1.50 \mathrm{fr}+75 \mathrm{c}, 3.50 \mathrm{fr}$ $1.50 \mathrm{fr}, 5 \mathrm{fr}+2 \mathrm{fr}$ and $6.50 \mathrm{fr}+3 \mathrm{fr}$.
The principal facade (front elevation) of the Cathedral is depicted on the $50 \mathrm{c}+25 \mathrm{c}$ and $3.50 \mathrm{fr}+1.50 \mathrm{fr}$ values.
A lateral view of the Cathedral building is depicted on the $1 \mathrm{fr}+$ 5 c and $5 \mathrm{fr}+2 \mathrm{fr}$ values.

The $1.50 \mathrm{fr}+75 \mathrm{c}$ and $6.50 \mathrm{fr}+3 \mathrm{fr}$ values feature the three stained glass windows situated on the main facade of the Cathedral. The glass of the centre window shows a picture of "Our Lady, Queen of the World" to whom the monument is dedicated.

Printing by S. A. Helio Courvoisier, La Chaux-de-Fonds. The tamps will remain on sale until 28th February, 1962.

## TO AMERICAN FLAG

A 20 -cent stamp was issued by he Netherlands Antilles Postal 1961, to commemorate the 185th mniversary of the first official salute given to the American Cole ours by a foreign State. This salute
was in effect official Dutch recognition of American sovereignty.
It was on 16 th November, 1776, when the American brigantine "Andrew Doria" sailed into St. Eustatius harbour, flying the Grand Union Ensign, the colours then borme by the American force
that the gun salute was given.
In turn the United States has not forgoten this salute. In 1939, in commemoration of the event,
President Franklin D. Roosevelt presented a bronze plague, which is now affixed to the base of the flagpole at the old Fort Oranje in Statia.
The design of the stamp features the "Andrew Doria" entering the harbour with flying colours and a cannon firing the salute from Fort Oranje. The stamps were released in coils of 100 stamps (perforation on two sides), the 30 ore stamp also in booklets containing 20 stamps (perforation on three sides).
In November, 1861, the Swedish Government granted a request made by the Post Office Board for the employment of postmen (letter carriers) in the big towns. The
first postmen were employed in 1862 and at the end of 1864 the delivery service had been introduced in 48 towns.
Before that time, mail delivery was arranged in such a way that information about letters arrived was given on lists outside the post offices. Everyone in the district
could there find out if there were any letters for him at the office counter. In Stockholm, however, letters were delivered by postmen, before 1862 but only on a reduced scale.

The occasion of the Golden Jubilee was marked by a National Jamboree in Ceylon.
The Boy Scout Movement was first introduced in Ceylon in 1912 that time a British Engineer at-
tached to the Public Works Detached to the Public Works De-
partment in Ceylon, and who was later appointed first Colonial Com-
missioner. In 1917 Mr . Stevens missioner. In 1917 Mr . Stevens
also introduced the Scout paper also introduced the Scout papel
entitled "The Ceylon Scout", which, designation has now been
changed to "The Outdoor-Life".
The first Scout Troop was formed at Christ Church College at

5 c stamp commemorating the establishment of the original Red River Settlement in the Red Rive Valley at the present site of Winnipeg, Manitoba. This special postal cancellation die will be used nly in Wimipeg and will be supDay of Issue Cancellation reserved dor use at Ottawa.
The Red River stamp commemo rates the 150th anniversary of the establishment of the first Canadian agricultural settlement west of the Great Lakes. It was established by a Scotchman, Thomas Douglas, Earl of Douglas, who saw the need of land for Scoteh and Trish crofters and small farmers who were being displaced by the enclosure movement which was turning large parts of the British Isles into vast sheep farms. Thomas Douglas, better known as Lord Selkink, purchased 116,000 square miles of land from the Hudson's
Bay Company - an area covering the southern part of what is now Manitoba and the northern part of Minnesota and North Dakota brought more than 250 settlers brought more than 250 settlers
over the sea to Hudson's Bay and down to the forks of the Bay and down to the forks of the Red and Assiniboine Rivers where the first settlement was established in 1812 at the present site of the capital

The 4 -cent Battle of Shiloh commemorative stamp, the second in the series of five marking the Civil War Centennial, was designed by Noel Sickles, a prominent artist of Westport, Connecticut. The stamp will be first placed on sale April 7, 1962, at Shiloh (formerly Pittsburg Landing), Tennessee.

"At the Post Office we are very proud of the British postage stamp tradition. We are proud that we originated postage stamps, and of the two features of British stamps -the dominance of the Monarch's head and the omission of the name of the country."
So said the Assistant Post master General, Miss Mervyn Pike, M.P., when she opened Stampex, the National Stamp Exhibition, at the Central Hall, London, England, on 16th March.
"I appreciate," said Miss Pike "that sometimes the Post Office and certain sections of those peo ple interested in stamps may have reasons for disagreeing. We at the Post Office regard stamps essen tially as a means of paying post age. Postage stamps came first; stamp collecting developed later."
Miss Pike explained that if the Monarch head were not dommant on British stamps, we should have "I think it right to treasure these features it right to treasure these features of British stamp design,
and I am sure that the majority of people in Britain share my views.

## No Pictures

Explaining that low value stamps must be of a size which is convenient to those who use the majority of them, the Assistant Postmaster General added, "It is impractical to include pictures on these stamps without reducing the dominance of the Monarch's head." She appreciated that this presents problems of design both for the smaller permonent series stamp and for the larger size special issues.

## WORKING BANKS

Recently while making a deposit they have reached today. "Not in the bank of Nova Scotia, inconsiderable" is the time, moncy

Toronto, I was surprised to find on display a collection of working banks many of them manufactured in the late 1800's to the 1900
period. Many numismatists also have side line collections of this treasure cove recovered from old foundries, or from men who worked there, or at one time owned the place. These items generally fall under the heading of: broken parts and castings, broken or imperfect anks were thrown aside and ar sually unpainted or unfinished Pattern banks, trial castings and experimental banks which were
changed around and often altered o a starting degree to remedy some real or fancied objection or defect before being placed in circulation. I have seen the repaired three clowns bank that has both faces looking in the opposite direction from the conventional speci men. The bank mentioned is time ago from a foundry, but even that fact would not explain the reversal of the two clown's faces.
Patterns and banks are not in everse to each other, but are to all intents and purposes identical made of bronze or some other composition of metal whereas prac tically all banks are of cast iron small parts of iron banks such as the arm of the small monkey, the lion, and two monkeys bank) wer made of brass for some practical to the early opinion among pseudo experts that all monkeys are nearly always made of brass instead of iron, being easi imperfect. # Too Many Commemoratives? 

The old cry of too many commemoratives has been heard around the philatelic world often with few mindful of the fact that there have been too many commemoratives is-sued-or is it merely the voice of the once-in-awhile collector who has an iron clamp on his purse trings
This question is uppermost in the mind of a Chicago physician whose life is mixed up with medicine and philately. But he is one of a dozen men who help choose and create the commemoratis government.
He is Dr. James J. Matejka, Jr., 614 North Elmwood Avenue, Dak Park, and house physician for Hotel La Salle, according to a copy ighted story in the Chicago Sumlay Tribune (Aug/6/61).
This 44 year doctor has to select

## CANADA HONOURS JEAN TALON

## "INTENDANT OF NEW FRANCE'

new 5 cent commemorative is to be issued on June 13th, 1962, to honour JEAN TALON. Designed by Phillip Weiss of Ottawa, it is printed in blue in sheets of 100 plate \#1. 32 million copies have been ordered.


Many men contributed early development and advancement of Canada. Soldiers, explorers, and missionaries, each played a vital role and each played a part in building the nation that is Canada today. Less spectacular, but nonetheless just as important, were the achievements of the
administrators and, among these men, the greatest was probably Jean Talon.

Talon was born in 1625 at Châlons sur Marne, France. He joined the civil service and in 1655 became intendant of the province of Hainaut. He managed his new duties with such energy and vigour that Louis XIV, on the recommendation of Colbert, then Minister of Finance, named Talon to
His ancy of New France.
Harch 23,1665 , and on effective March 23, 1665, and on May 24 of the same year, he embarked for
New France on the SaintNew France on the Saint-
Sébastien, with the Governor of Courcelles and eight companies of the Regiment of Carignan. In three years, Talon did more for the development of the new country than had been done since the arrival of the first colonists. He conducted the first census in Canada and when figures indicated need for a larger population, he asked for more people to be sent
from France. This resulted in the immigration of some 1,000 wome who were to become the wives of
the men already in the colony the men already in the colony.

## Sale of "PROJECT MERCURY" Covers Terminated

The U.S. Post Office Department bas announced the termination date on the unusual stamp sale which began on February 20 with the successful completion of the orbital flight of Colonel John Glemn.
The 4 -cent Project Mercury first day "covers"-stamped envelopés bearing the $3: 30$ p.m., February 20 Cape Canaveral, Florida postmark the Philatelic Sales Agency at the close of business June 9, 1962.

In less than four months ap proximately 3 million of the covers bearing the Project Mercury stamp will have been sold, breaking all records. A total of 310 million of the stamps have been printed to meet the unprecedented public demand throughout the country. Normal orders for commemorative
stamps average 120 million. Seldom are more than 500 thousand f the covers sold.

## COINS ON STAMPS

By Ernest Kehr, New York, N.Y.

Switzerland, whose stamp policies have been an exemplary model of conservatism, exceptional design and attractiveness, has design and attractiveness, has
turned to the field of historical turned to the field of historical numismatics for its 1962 . They

der the title of "Fine and useful arts."

The stamps, printed in multiThe stamps, prisier-Helio, S.A., represent the most interesting coins used by the three cantons which comprised the original Swiss Confederation, created on Aug. 1,
1291. They were designed by 1291. They we
Celestino Piatti.


The first, a $10+10$ centime green, blue and gray, depicts a silver half-thaler, struck in 1732 and used in Obwalden, a division of Unterwalden. Its reverse (not shown on the stamp) has the inscription, "1731-MLoneta Reip (ublic) Subglyvania" along with an oval has "Nicolaus de Flue-Helv(etia)/ Cath. Cayer" surrounding a kneeling figure of the patriot saint

St. Nicholas, who was beatified in 1669, and declared a saint by
Pope Pius XII, in 1947, was born as Niklaus Loewenbrugger. Though he was happily married for
twenty-five years, he left his family to live the rugged life of a hermit following what he describ-
ed as "divine inspiration". Retreating to a ravine in the Alpine Valley of Melcha, he devoted his remaining years to prayer and over Eurone, having heard of his over Europe, having heard of his
gifts of prophecy and wisdom, flocked to him for advice, counsel and inspiration. The Swiss Confederation was small, weak and subjected to invasions from abroad,
and civil strife at home. In 1480 , when war seemed imminent, he resolved those difficulties which threatened bloodshed, and suggested ways whereby civil war could be averted. Heeding his admonition, the Swiss settled internal differences, unified against their common foreign foes and solidified their union to form what today is the world's oldest republic. Niklaus has appeared on several Swiss stamps ever since 1929.


The $20+10 \mathrm{c}$, red, yellow and gray, shows the obverse of a gold ducat of Schwyz. The design shows St. Martin of Tours, who was revered throughout central Europe. The maternal uncle of St Patrick, he was a cavalryman of the Roman Legion when he was baptized to Christianity and began a life of brotherly love. On one occasion, while riding through the Gallic countryside, he encountered a group of naked beggars. Withto clothe these he cut his garments to clothe these unfortunates. It is
this act that is shown on the coin,
and on stamps of many other nations that have honored him The reverse of this undated goldpiece portrays the Madonna with Child, standing on a half-moon, as the Virgin of the Immaculate Conception. While the coin has no date is it know
before 1653


The $30+10 \mathrm{c}$, orange, bronze and gray, depicts a "Steer Head" batzen, struck by Uri, in 1659. It features a steer head-the emblem of the canton-surrounded by the Latin, "Urantensis Moneta Deo." The "batzen" is a coin of small
denomination, introduced in 1499 (and equivalent to 10 centimes or rappen) and widely used throughout the Swiss confederation of the time, as well as through southern Germany. The reverse of this coin features a double eagle surrounded by "Soli Deo Gloria 69."


The last of the coin set is the $50+10 \mathrm{c}$, blue, ilac and gray, which the canton as shown on the obverse of another batzen of the period, surrounded by "Undervaldens Moneta Deo." The arms of the walden both have a key: Nidwalden having a double keyward; Obwalden, a single one facing left.
Actually the coin shown is a patIn addition to these heliogravure "coins" stamps, the set, whose premium will be given to a fund for the care and welfare of the old and infirm (and other charities), includes a $5+5$ c, ultramarine by Karl Bickel. recess-engraved Jacques Rousseau, in an Armenian cap after a portrait by Allan Ramsay and captures the character of the Geneva philosopher-novelistorator, the 250 th birth of which the stamp commemorates.

The stamp was printed by the Postal Printing Office in Bern under the supervision of Hans E Gaudard.

## Unlike many European countries,

 which seize almost any opportunity to produce semi-postal stamps for a variety of funds (including the purchase of cigarettes for "indigent intellectuals") Switzerland has maintained a policy of the absolute minimum. The Department of Territo has advised that two new stamis of 6 d . and $1 /$ - denominations be issued by the Norfolk Island Post Office this year. Both portra fish of Norfolk Island waters, are being printed in three-colow photogravure by Harrison Sons, Ltd., London.
The 6d. stamp will be issued 16th July, 1962. It will show the fish known locally as "Twee Trousers"; however, the name appearing on the stamp is the scientific classification "Atypich thys Latus". The $1 /-$ stamps wil feature a fish known to Norfol fishermen as "Po' $o$ ", and will be issued on 17th September, 1962. The stamps will become part of the definitive series, replacing similar denominations in the 1947 Ball Bay design. In Australia, the stamps will be available in mint condition only at philatelic sales sections of the Postmaster-General's Department.

A first day cover service will be provided for each stamp by the Norfolk Island Post Offiee. ## FIRST UNITED STATES REVENUE COMMEMORATIVE

The first commemorative documentary revenue stamp ever is-
sued by the U.S. government went on sale the first of July when the Internal Revenue Service marked its one hundredth birthday.
This commemorative documentary stamp is in a 10c denominaition and replaces the previous 10 c ssue used on bonds, deeds, de ments. It cannot be used for mail ing purposes.
Pictured on the commemorative stamp is a steel engraving of the Intemal Revenue headquarters building, completed in 1930, wa the first in what is now known as the Federal Triangle between Constitution and Pemnsylvania Ave-
$\qquad$ 0.84 by 1.44 inches in stimension, arranged horizontally, and was printed on the Giori presses in blue and green on white paper. It was designed by Charles R. Chickring and Victor S. McCloskey Jo of the Bureau of Printing and Enraving.
Stamp taxes as a revenue meas-
ure began in 1797. A common
form of these early stamps was an embossed design which was applied in a mamer similar to the rotary public seal today.

## Reorganization of its Philatelic services has been announced by

 the U.S. Post Office Department. Designed to provide more effective services to stamp collectorsand the public, the revamped system establishes clearer lines of demareation than had existed formerly
All philatelic services now are placed under the general direction of the Office of the Special Assistant to the Postmaster General for Public Relations.
"We believe that philatelists will approve of our reorganization," the Department said. "It is intended to break some of the bottlenecks that have occurred from time to time in the past. If philatelists and the public know where to make their specific requests for services or information; we can comply with greater',
feciency."
Holding the newly-created position of Chief of Philatelic Staff is Stanley J. Hodziewich, who will serve as deputy to the Special Assistant to all philatelic matters. Mr. Hodziewich's major responsibilities will be maintaining the Philatelic Exhibition Room in the Post Office

Department, the setting up of
philatelic exhibits throughout the country and overall arrangements for first day covers. Miss Virginia Wiman will serve as his administrative assistant in the exhibition room.
Arrangements for first day ceremonies will be made by Mrs. Lee Frances Bowler, who will coordinate with the sponsoring organizations. Supervision of first day sales is under George R. King. Mrs. Virginia Brizendine, an administrative assistant to the Special Assistant, will continue to keep the minutes as secretary to the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee, will assist in plamning the production of new stamps, serve as Office Department's Bureau of Facilities which procures stamps from the Bureau of Engraving and
Printing, and will be in charge of philatelic correspondence
Philatelic news will be developed and serviced by Herbert Harris. Stamp editors and writers should direct their requests for special feature material to him

The first United Nations memorial stamp, honoring all those who have lost their lives in the service of the world organization, will be ounced today by the UN Posta Administration.

## COINS OR STAMPS

## By J. E. Charlton, F.R.N

For many years coin collecting was one of the world's leading hobbies. Then stamp collecting took over the leadership, which it has now relinquished in many respects to coin collecting. While some may argue this contention, there is no denying the following facts:
(1) Circulation of numismatic publications exceeds that of philatelic publications.
(2) Sales of the numismatic section of the Mint exceeds that of the Philatelic section of the Post Office, and are increasing rapidly while the latter are steadily declining.

## OLD CANADIAN BILLS COLLECTOR'S ITEMS

## by J. E. Charlton, fras

Some of the most attractive, interesting and inexpensive paper money of Canada consist of the old large size Dominion of Canada, Department of Finance notes issued from 1870 to 1934. These notes have illustrated many individuals who have a place in the country's history, while the vigvarious aspects of the country' agricultural and industrial life While these bills have long since disappeared from circulation, surprising number are still avail able to collectors.
The $\$ 1$ denomination consisted of seven issues, dated 1870,1878 , 1897, 1808, 19t, the 1897. Illustrated is the the 1897. Illustrated is the most attractive of these notes, the 1917
issue with portrait of HRH issue with portrait of HRH
Princess Patricia of Connaught (now Lady Patricia Ramsey), daughter of TRH the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, and granddaughter of Queen Victoria.

On the outbreak of war in 1914

Princess Patricia permitted the regiment to be designated "Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry," herself worked the first regimental colors, and became colonel-in-chief.
