Officials were on hand to explain the background of the malaria fight and the stamp campaign. Also, an exhibit of photographs illustrating the anti-malaria work of the WHO, as well as of proposed stamp designs, was on view. stamp designs, was on view.

On November 19th, a luncheon was tendered to guests at the hotel Ten Park Avenue, by the Inter-Governmental Philatelic Corporation, and its president, Mr. M. R. Lehmann. A number of foreign Diplomats, representatives of stamp publications and of the general press, as well as leading philatelists and dealers attended. Dr. R. Coigney of the WHO explained the background of the stamp campaign and announced Mr. Lehmann's appointment to lead the Philatelic Agency for this

CANADA Tagged Stamps

The Director of Financial Services in Ottawa has announced that during 1962, the Post Office Department plans to have in operation in Winnipeg on an experi Winnipeg on an experimental basis, a mail segregator, and a letter facing-up and cancelling machine. The operation of this machine depends on the use of regular postage stamps over-printed or "tagged" with special ink. The overprinting inks are visible only on careful examination.

The current regular issue one cent to five cent denominations of postage stamps will be overprinted with vertical lines, ones at each side of each stamp of the 1 cent, 2 cent, 3 cent and 5 cent denomina tions and single line in the middle of the 4 cent denomination. This pattern of overprinting will enable the machine to separate the local letter mail for Winnipeg addresses from the letter mail prepaid for out-of-town points. Also, the tagging will enable the machine to manipulate mechanically each piece of letter mail until the letter is in the proper position or "faced-up" for machine cancellation of the stamp. With the exception of the 3 cent, these stamps will be overprinted on sheets without the plate number inscription.

The tagged stamps will be sold only at post offices in Winnipeg and they will go on sale first in that city on the 13th January 1962. THE HISTORY OF THE WHO STAMP CAMPAIGN

THE HISTORY OF THE WHO STAMP CAMPAIGN Keeping in mind the increase in philatelic interest in the world, the WHO in October decided to initiate an international stamp campaign dedicated to the theme "The World United Against Malaria". An Advisory Committee selected the official emblem of the campaign and suggested stamp designs. The award went to the designs of Hans Hartmann of Switzerland. The official emblem shows the globe as a symbol of world-wide cooperation under the auspices of WHO, with the Anopheles vector of malaria attacked by the Aesculanian staff formed Anopheles vector of malaria attacked by the Aesculapian staff formed

WHO appealed to all its 109 member states to issue stamps based on this design and to make contributions, in the form of stamps— or in cash. The Universal Postal Union also transmitted this appeal to its members. The response was prompt and about 70 nations and territories have already indicated their participation in this programme. U.N. STAMP PROGRAMME FOR 1962 ANNOUNCED

The UN Postal Administration recently announced its tentative programme of stamp issues for 1962. This includes 5 commemoratives plus a re-design and re-issue of some of the existing definitives. Brief details are given below.

19 FEBRUARY - 4c and 7cl stamps honouring the UN program in Housing and Community De-velopment and its long range program of concerted action in these fields.

30 March—4c and 11c stamps commemorating the activities of the UN through WHO in its malaria eradication drive (see page 1). The theme of these stamps will be "The World United Against

28 May-Re-design and reof some of the existing DEFINI-TIVES. Denominations to be announced at a later date.

17 SEPTEMBER — Special memorial stamp. The approved design will consist of a blue representation of the UN Secretariat Building and the UN Flag at half-mast. A black border will be mast. A black border will be inscribed with "United Nations" in inscribed with "United Nations" in English, French, Spanish, Russian & Chinese. It will bear the date XVII-IX-MCMLXI (17 Sept. 1961) on which day the late Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjold and his party were killed in an aero-plane accident while engaged on a mission of peace in Africa. De-nomination will be announced at a later date.

24 October - Commemorative honouring United Nations stamp honouring United National Day. It is contemplated that this issue will consist of sheets of stamps depicting the flags of all the member Nations, showing the date of admission to the Organization. Denominations will be announced at a later date.

10 December - Commemorative stamp depicting the General Assembly Building at UN Headquarters in New York. Denominations to be announced at a later date.

UN FILM STRIP ON UN STAMPS

The United Nations prepared a 35 mm, film strip containing 35 frames showing the design and manufacture of the first international postage stamps While the strip illustrates a num ber of the more popular of the commemorative and regular issues, it also shows the operations of the UN Postal Administration, with adequate commentary for public information. The UN will make the strip available to Stamp Clubs, High Schools and Colleges, Organizations and various interested zations and various interested Associations on a loan basis without charge.

INDIAN OIL REFINERY

This item is also available as a complete 5-volume album in Binders, or as pages alone.

"First Day of Issue — Tagged Stamps". All covers will be cancelled "First Day of Issue" and returned by ordinary mail. Orders for first day cover service must not include orders for mint stamps.

The postage prepayment will be affixed on the address side of the covers and in proper relationship with the address. Covers will not be returned in bulk under an out-side cover.

Value, economics teaches us, depends upon supply and demand. Very old coinage you might expect to have all but vanished, but a coin proves all but indestructible; unless proves all but indestructible; unless melted down it will persist over the centuries. No one ever throws away money, so practically every home has a few odds and ends of old coins. Age need not imply rarity, so there are old coins which are common and recent strikings which prove remarkably scarce. A coin is more when relatively few coin is rare when relatively few specimens are in existence, so rarity relates to the supply side of supply and demand.

May Wait For Years

Strangely, a scarce piece may not command a high price. "Key" coins needed to complete popular series are assured of a ready market while other items may wait for years on a dealer's shelf,

Mintage of a few thousands o tens of thousands in issues such as the silver dollar results in high valuations, while a similar release of commemorative medals might glut the market. To some extent, different series may go "out of fashion," and demand slacken.

At the turn of the century most emphasis in Canada was on the tokens, while the current trend in Numismatic interest has extended to most series, including the Ancients, the decimal coinage is the most popular. Now thousands of Canadians are searching their pocket change for scarce varieties, searching the think pulses he had a search of the control of the responding to the high prices being paid for the more elusive types.

Only Part Of Story

Rarities make the headlines and get the attention at coin shows but are only one part of the story Collections which are interesting and instructive can be built without expensive rarities-which is the reason so many new collectors modest income can find fascination in numismatics today. Coins from circulation, or inexpensive tokens may be the start of a first-rate collection.

TOGO'S COLOURFUL UNICEF ISSUE

Togo issued 6 multi-coloured stamps on December 9th, in honor of the 15th Anniversary of UNICEF. These stamps measure 38 x 30 mm, and were designed by Claude Bottiau of France.

These stamps are unusual in their design, since the six stamps together form a pattern which can be discovered when the stamps are placed in this order: upper row: 1F, 25F, 20F, lower row: 10F, 85F, 30F, namely, 15 children representing all races, colours and countries, gaily dancing around a globe.—
Each stamp bears the official UNICEF emblem, and the text "15e Anniversaire de l'UNICEF"; the 1F value has enlarged white UNICEF emblem on blue back-

LIECHTENSTEIN AND ITS STAMPS

Collectors have prized the stamps of this 61 square mile country for their beauty and fine design while at the same time recognizing that not one tenth of the stamps issued since 1912 have really been necessary for postage.

Liechtenstein's history is an interesting one. It became a sovereign state on May 3, 1342, when Count esting one. Hartmann I became ruler of the Principality of Vaduz, the castle-crowned little town of 2,400 inhabi-tants that is now Liechtenstein's capital.

By 1434 the small province had been enlarged to contain the two separate counties of Schellenberg and Vaduz, both of which were held as immediate fiefs to the Holy Roman Empire. Nearly three hun dred years later the Emp Charles VI confirmed their pos Emperor sion by the House of Leichtenstein, which remains to this day.

In July, 1806, the then ruler of Liechtenstein, John I, seceded from the Empire and joined the Confederation of the Rhine under Napoleon.

After the battle of Waterloo, he joined the German Confederation, and when the Confederation died out in 1866, the Principality became politically independent. politically independent.

Liechtenstein has remained free ever since although there is a Customs union with Switzerland. Dur-ing the last war the little country successfully defied Hitler although it has had no army since 1868 and the last Liechtenstein soldier died

Permission was granted. However, the increasing volume of mail made it necessary to open four more offices and Austria appointed own clerks. CANADA'S MOST VALUABLE COIN

"Try to find, in your change, a cent of every date since 1920. . ." This challenge has been the start of many a Canadian collection, and it reflects a trend. While it is traditional, in most parts of the world, numismatist to be cerned with principal coinage types, not series of dates, the popular practice in Canada and the United States has been definitely to seek and complete such series.

There is widespread interest in studying the dates and varieties of familiar coin series, observing their relative availability, and searching for the best condition obtainable. Thousands do. A glance through mint statistics will explain the scarcity of such popular coins as the 1948 silver dollar, the 1890 and 1894 50 cents, and the 1946 Newfoundland five cents. Mint statistics do not always tell the whole story. Reported quantities struck sometimes are misleading. For example, such rarities as the 1921 five and 50 cents became scarce when large surpluses were melted unissued.

Prepare to Compromise

would envision Most collectors the ideal coin collection as one in which the specimens showed no trace of either tarnish or wear and, indeed, such a new and perfect coin is desirable and beautiful to behold. Yet, many earlier dates prove virtually unobtainable in such state of preservation, and collectors are prepared to compromise by accepting coins showing a fair degree of legitimate wear. The grading of circulated coins is a delicate art, and even experts may not be in full agreement, but a number of standards of "condition" have come to win general acceptance.



Catalog Value \$800 to \$4000

Uncirculated, Ex-Uncirculated, Very Fine, Very Fine, Fine, Very Good. The less desirable grades, Good, About Good, Fair Plus, Fair and Poor, normally are not included in collections, except, perhaps, as "space fillers" for want of a better coin. Such between grades as About Uncirculated, Extra Fine, Fine Plus and About Fine are employed by some dealers and collectors and are self-explanatory, but such extreme preciseness of grading invites dispute.

Not Included

Holed coins, and other mutilated pieces, normally are not included in a collection, though considerable interest is shown in "freaks" or interest is shown in "freaks" or "mint errors" resulting from mishaps in production. In this category are off-centre strikings, and double strikings on the same planchet, both of which types of errors are known on Canadian coins, but more commonly seen on recent issues of the United States.

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THE "JUNK PILE"

Treasure Trove

tion of old "junk" in the attic, cellar, closet, or barn—usually things people intend to get rid of someday when they get around to it. Probably you have too, but be careful when you dispose of it, for trash pile may actually be your' your treasure trove!

A stamp collector's dream came rue when Warren R. du Bois true bought a stamp collection from a private estate for \$300. While sorting through his purchase, he discovered an unusual stamp -#63 USA blue bearing a first day cancellation, August 17th, 1861, As far as can be learned it is the only one in existence and worth \$60,000.00!

Agragentum of Athens is the world's rarest coin -- the earliest silver dollar-and is valued at an estimated \$65,000. The rarest stamp in the world is the British Guiana 1856 1c black and magenta, also valued at around \$60,000. It is not likely that you will uncover one of these rarities. However, coins of a lesser rarity are fished out of change everyday. It is a known fact that dealers are prepared to buy in any quantity the Canada small cents from 1922-1931. Some of the prices paid are as follows: 1922, \$3.00; 1923, \$6.50; 1924, \$1.25; 1925, \$3.00; 1926, 70c; 1927, 25c; 1930, 65c; 1931, 15c.

There is a strong upswing by numerous scientifically calculating dealers "in the know" who have support and financial backing of influential and wealthy mercial industrialists with virtually millions of dollars to invest in Canadian coins. To support the trend, they have formed across Canada and the United States almost 25 different "cliques" each headed by a well informed dyed in the wool dealer who in turn buys large amounts of key dates that were struck in short mintings, and is able to turn them over and show a better return on his investors their money than jewellers dealing in rare gems or stock brokers in the Toronto stock-exchange or New York markets at this time.

There was a very interesting 2-page article entitled "Here's a hobby that can parlay a 1e into \$3,400". This article appeared in the "Financial Post" issue of 18 Nov-ember, 1961. It was compiled by Jack Schreiner, a staff writer. Many of the amazing prices listed in this article were actually paid at the last Canadian Numismatic Convention held in Hamilton in August, 1961. One collector was prepared to go as high as \$7,500 for the rare 1936 dot cent — so named because a tiny raised dot appears below the date, directly between the 9 & 3. This coin did bring \$3,400 and in future sales I will predict the very same item will bring at least \$5,000. All hobbies are in a growing stage, but none as fast as coins. Five years ago "Numismatics" rated a low of 27th as an indoor hobby on the 1955 census. Today it is in the second spot and rapidly moving into philately or stamp collecting which is No. 1.

Jim Charlton of the Canada Coin Exchange is responsible for the postwar boom in Numismatics. issued the first bonafide catalogue for Canadian Coins back in Now in its 10th year, it has improved in text, format, information and illustrations. There are several other Canadian coin catalogues currently selling through-out Canada and the United States. However, I am reasonably certain they are in fact "improved catalogues" with most of the informaon derived at from the Canada Coin Catalogue. Canada is one of a small number of nations still minting coins with a silver content-the dollar has almost 60c in silver. Over the past decade all Canadian coins have increased in value from 10% to 15%. If at any time a collector does run short of ready cash, his accumulated stock of Canadian coins selected from change are still worth at least 100% of the original cost.

The quick profits realized from the sale of coins due to supply and demand have induced the sharp attention of money lenders, speculators and numerous small working men who speculate, and have made even common coins scarce. Those who speculated as early as 1953 fortunate to find the shoulder strap type of 1c - these are bringing as high as \$14.00 each in brilliant condition. A roll of the 1954 cent wholesales at \$50.00 per roll. The 1956 cent is at \$7.50 a roll today, the issue being 78.6 million. The 1961 cent will, however, never be a scarce coin. The Ontario 3% sales tax created a demand and the mint responded with many more being minted that collectors will ever require.

The investor generally sells his coins to a dealer at half to two thirds of the catalogue value. NETHERLANDS ANTILLES COMMEMORATES FIRST SALUTE TO AMERICAN FLAG

A 20-cent stamp was issued by the Netherlands Antilles Postal authorities on 16th November, 1961, to commemorate the 185th anniversary of the first official salute given to the American Colours by a foreign State. This salute was in effect official Dutch recognition of American sovereignty.

It was on 16th November, 1776, when the American brigantine "Andrew Doria" sailed into St. Eustatius harbour, flying the Eustatius harbour, flying the Grand Union Ensign, the colours then borne by the American forces, that the gun salute was given.

In turn the United States has not forgotten this salute. In 1939, in commemoration of the event, President Franklin D. Roosevelt presented a bronze plaque, which is now affixed to the base of the flagpole at the old Fort Oranje in Statia.

The design of the stamp features the "Andrew Doria" entering the harbour with flying colours and a cannon firing the salute from Fort Oranje. PHILAE FEATURED ON UNESCO EGYPT STAMP OF U.A.R.

issued by the United Arab Republic-Egypt, in honor of UNESCO and the "Save the Nubian Monuments" program, features the Temple of Isis, on the island of Philae, which long has been one of Egypt's most interesting and popular sites, Located a few miles s outh and east of Shellal, and behind the Aswan Dam of the Nile, its name Egyptian hieroglyphs was "Palek", or Lek Island. The Copts called it Pilakh and early Arab writers referred to it as Bilak. Today, it is locally known as Anas al-wogud.

The earliest monument is an altar of Taharqa (690 B.C.) while the oldest building was erected under Nectanebo II (359 B.C.) the last of the native Egyptian kings. Herodotus visited Egypt during the Persian rule, in 450 B.C. (at about the time he wrote his famous, "neither sleet, nor rain . . .") but while he did get as far as Aswan, he made no mention of Philae's treasures of antiquity. Strabo visited it in 24 B.C., and did treasures the nesting habits of "bird", believed to have referred to a falcon, sacred to Horus, son of to Horus, son Isis and Osiris, chief deities of the

Its dominating structure is the Temple of Isis, illustrated above. Its columns show a variety of treatments, no two of which are alike. They are typical of the Ptolemaio period and were inspired by the purely Greek Corinthian style.

Also on the island is a temple of Imhotep, architect and physician (shown on the 5m Medical Congress stamp of Egypt's 1928 set) who designed and built the first Pyramids at Saqqara. The island was one of the world's first scientific stations, for it was here that the ancient Egyptians regularly measured the depths of the river (to forecast success of crops) with an ingenious Nileometer, which still operates just west of the Great Temple.

Until the Aswan dam was completed earlier in this century, it was an island. However, with the Nile waters backing up, it long has been submerged for ten months every year. There were scientists who wanted to protect it against innundation at the time the dam was built, but were unsuccessful. When one visits it during late August and early September, when it is high and dry, Philate's building walls show a measure of erosion up to the water level. But because this immersion washed destructive salts from the stone, its walls and stones



completely submerged so raising it is one of the UNESCO's major projects in the Saving of Nubian Monuments. It is for this reason that it takes a place with the Temples of Rameses and his wife, located at Abu Simbel, on the annual series of stamps issued for this immense undertaking to preserve monuments of tremendous historical and artistic history.

CHINA'S ATOMIC REACTOR & TELECOM COMMEMORATIVES

Two new commemorative issues were announced by the Postal

Two new commemorative issues were announced by the Postal Authorities in Taipei, Taiwan, during December, 1961.

The first, issued on 2nd December, celebrated the completion of the first Atomic Reactor on Taiwan. The set consists of 3 multi-coloured stamps in denominations of 0.80, 2.00 and 3.20. The 0.80 value, in vertical format, bears a panoramic view of the "swimming pool" typed Atomic Reactor as the central subject. Denomination, in Arabic figures, appears on the upper left corner, with inscriptions in Chinese characters reading "In Commemoration of Inauguration of Atomic Reactor". The 2.00 and 3.20 values will be released successively sometime during next spring, and details will be given in a later issue.

The second issue, released on 28th December, commemorated the 80th anniversary of Chinese telecommunications. This set comprises two multi-colour stamps in denominations of 0.80 and 3.20. ARIZONA STATEHOOD

COMMEMORATIVE

The central design of the 4-cent Arizona Commemorative stamp to be released at Phoenix, Arizona, on February 14th, 1962, is a flowering arm of the giant saguaro cactus, the bearer of the beautiful State flower. The main trunk of the plant towers above the flowering arm and the bleeding effect of the design has been used to accentu-

ate the vastness of the desert.

This is the first United States stamp on which the engraving has been extended into the normal gutter between the stamps to produce the desired bleeding. This was accomplished after extensive experiments at the Bureau of Engraving

and Printing.

A full grown saguaro is silhouetted in the foreground, with the moon behind a cloud bank reflecting on the valley below to create a typical desert night scene. The nocturnal theme was used since the saguaro flowers begin to open at night.

open at night.

The stamp was designed by J.

M. Chemi and J. E. Ihms of the
Phoenix Gazette. It was modelled
by Charles R. Chickering. The
vignette was engraved by Arthur
W. Dintaman and the lettering and
numerals by G. E. Payne.



It will measure 0.98 x 1.44 inches and will be issued in panes of 50. The bleeding of the design, left and right, accounts for the 0.98 inches. It will be printed on the Giori presses in deep blue (back-ground and part of the cactus), green (buds and trunk of the cac-tus) and red (centre of blossoms and lettering). All lettering is Gothic.

Swedish Mail Centenary

In 1962 one hundred years have elapsed since the local mail delivery service was introduced in the Swedish Post Office. In commem oration of this event two new postage stamps of the values 30 ore (violet) and 1 krona 70 ore (red) were issued on January 29, 1962, by the Swedish Postal authorities.

The design which is common to both stamps, was by the artist Pierre Olofsson and the text drawn by the artist Karl-Erik Forsberg. Engraving was by Czeslaw Slania. The picture size is 27, 25 x 20, 50 mm.

stamps were released in coils of 100 stamps (perforation on two sides), the 30 ore stamp also in booklets containing 20 stamps (perforation on three sides).

In November, 1861, the Swedish Government granted a reques made by the Post Office Board for the employment of postmen (letter carriers) in the big towns. The first postmen were employed 1862 and at the end of 1864 the delivery service had been introduced in 48 towns.

Before that time, mail delivery vas arranged in such a way tha information about letters arrived was given on lists outside the post offices. Everyone in the district could there find out if there were any letters for him at the office counter. In Stockholm, however, letters were delivered by postmen employed in the Post Office, also before 1862 but only on a reduced

The latest and best known of Canada's commemoratives, 1958 Totem Pole dollar, celebrates the centennial of the establishcommemoratives, therefore, are plentiful and numismatically acessible - which is fortunate, they form good conversation pieces about which to develop a topical collection.

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The six square miles principality of Monaco may be small in size but its stamps occupy considerable space in collector's albums. Since 968 AD the Genoese Grimaldi family have ruled the country which originally included Nice and at one time Mentone and Roccabrune. After a rather hectic history, Monaco in 1861 passed under French protection and in 1885 issued its first postage stamps.

Many of the subjects which appear on the stamps of Monaco have an interesting history behind them. Prince Honore III, shown on a 1939 semipostal stamp brought the first Shetland ponies to Monaco from England. In 1797, the Duke of York, brother of King George III, became suddenly ill while at sea and was brought ashore at Monaco. Prince Honore ordered every possible care taken of his royal guest but the Duke died. Later, when the Prince visited England, he was presented with the Shetland ponies for his hospitality.

During the French Revolution

Honore III was imprisoned in Paris. Later released he lost his right to rule Monaco. His eldest son Honore IV featured on a 1942 semipostal issue regained the throne by the Treaty of Paris in 1814, but was ousted by the Monegasques. He decided to return to Monaco. On his way his coach drawn by four fresh horses was stopped by a small armed band. A man in a general's uni-form demanded two of the horses as a "loan." Honore refused. An-other officer, short and slightly fat, came forward and asked the Prince where he was going.

"I am the Prince Honore of Mon-aco," Honore answered," And I am on my way to retake possession of my throne."
"Ah!" exclaimed the other, "A

coincidence! I am Napoleon Bonaparte enroute to Paris from Elba to retake possession of my throne."

The Emperor was given the two horses and made his way to Paris—and to Waterloo and the island of St. Helena. Prince Honore never did retain his throne either—he was forced to allow his brother Joseph to rule.



less than fifteen of his country's stamps. He ruled in the mid nine teenth-century and was the first to conceive the idea of establishing a gambling casino to draw tourists. Until that time the Prince had been the sole power. A council of twenty-one members was established to advise the ruler. Albert also built the Oceanographic Museum on a cliff overlooking the sea. This museum vas the subject of stamps in 1922 1947 and 1949.

Prince Louis II ruled from 1922 until he died in 1949. His portrait is featured on sixty five Monaco stamps. He was succeeded by Prince Rainer III, the popular present ruler. Prince Rainer's princess, the former Grace Kelly, was first featured on the royal wedding stamps of 1956. She also appears on the stamp released two years Charles III, one of Monaco's most later with her daughter, Princess popular monarchs is featured on no Caroline.

These principles include: absolute equality between nations regardless of size, population or value of possessions; non-interference in internal affairs; respect of individual sovereignty and the inalienable right to exist-ence and personality of develop-ment; condemnation of outside subversive activity; periodic ex-change of viewer change of views; cooperation throughout the Continent based on throughout the Continent based on tolerance, solidarity and good neighbor relations; and achieve-ment of unity and aspiration and action from viewpoint of African ocial solidarity and political iden-

U.S. SALES FIGURES

The Post Office at Washington, D.C. has released some interesting figures on sales during 1961.

When the 4-cent Nursing stamp was first placed on sale at Wash-ington, D.C. on 28th December, 1961, there were 964,005 first day covers cancelled. In all a total of were sold 1,102,162 stamps were sold in Washington on that day, with a value of \$44,086.48.

A total of 8,401,538 first covers were cancelled during 1961, representing 19 different issues.

The Philatelic Agency in Wash ington, D.C., had a total sales of \$2,757,670 for the calendar year ending December 31st, 1961, a remarkable figure in that only 18 postal varieties were sold there during that year. The 11-cent aerogramme was not handled by the

Of the nineteen issues during 1961 only 14 were special stamps, conforming to the statement of conforming to the statement of Postmaster J. Edward Day that he rostmaster J. Edward Day that he would not authorize more than fifteen such stamps a year. The other 5 issues comprised the re-engraved 15-cent airmail (Jan. 13); the 11cent regular issue (June 15); an 11-cent aerogramme (June 16); a 13-cent airmail stamp (June 28) and the 8-cent Pershing regular postage issue to replace the "Statue of Liberty" design which was causing confusion among postal clerks because of similarity in design and colour to the 11-cent regular value.

The 1925 5c nickle in the year 1961 opened 5c nickle in the year 1901 opened at \$4.00 retail and was bought up by dealers at \$12.00 to \$14.00 as recent as August of 1961. This proves that speculation on many of the key coins will make the roll speculators wealthy in a very short time to come.

The biggest and best buyers are naturally the speculators in the United States who realize the short mintings of Canada are on the increase in value, and have been constantly buying up hundreds of thousands of dollars of the better dates. With almost 100 members each month joining the C.N.A. alone, regardless of hundreds of new coin clubs forming in other cities, towns and villages in Can-ada and the United States, even the most common Canadian coin will be saleable in 5 years.

This year rampant speculation took place on the cents of 1922 to 1927, 1930 and 1931, (the most of these doubled or tripled in value); the nickels of 1925, 1926 near 6, the 1926 far 6 and the 1942 and 1943 tombacs; and the 10c and 50c of 1948. REPUBLIC OF CHINA STAMP PROGRAMME FOR 1962

On January 15, 1962 the Republic of China issued 3 new stamps in its popular Ancient Chinese Art Treasures Series, according to the WORLD WIDE PHILATELIC AGENCY.

This new set of beautiful multicolored stamps printed in Photo-gravure, depicts the superb art treasures which the Republic of China transferred to Taiwan. highlights masterpieces in the col-lection which was acclaimed during exhibition at the leading museums in the United States.

The new group, fifth in the Series, shows a Squat Pouring Vase with Phoenix-shaped neck of bronze from the period of the Warring States (B.C. 770-221), In 1.00 de-nomination this stamp will be issued in a quantity of 1,000,000.

A porcelain Vase decorated in Under-Glaze Red from the Ming Dynasty (A.D. 1368-1661) is seen the 2.40 value.

The Han Dynasty (B.C. 206-A.D. 8) is represented with a jade per-forated disc on the 3.60 value. This stamp and the 2.40 value will each have a total issue of 600,000

JAMAICA TEMPORARY RUBBER DATE MARKS

By E. F. Aguilar Box 406, Kingston, Jamaica

Jamaica Postal History is one of the most interesting fields, as it covers the pre-stamp material and from 1860 to 1910 the obliterator numbers. These obliterator num-bers are numbers used in the different towns, such as A O1 which was allotted to Kingston General Post Office, and certainly well known, and seen often enough by collectors. Another easy number is A 73 St. Anns Bay, A 75 Savannahla-mar. These numbers form of the most interesting specialized collections for Jamaica.

Much has been written on the different numbers. From 1870 up to the present day all the new Post which were ebing opened, were allotted a Temporary Rubber stamp better known to the collector as TRD's. When a Post Office is opened a rubber stamp is issued to this Post Office, as a steel die or a numeral number was not usually available and these were ordered from London, England.

The early Temporary Rubber and very difficult to locate. A comin the Philatelic Handbook of Ja-The modern Temporary Rubber Date marks which range from 1939 onwards form a new group with a completely different present Jamaica has over 600 Post Offices and Pos-Agencies, while there are also at least 50 sub-Postal Agencies These only collect and distribute material and are not allowed to do any postmarking.

From 1870 onwards letters used to be postmarked with a single ring or squared circle These went out of existence pretty well after 1905. The Single Ring for Jamaica form one of the hardest and most difficult items to locate while the Squared circles on the whole can be found without too much difficulty mostly on the CA stamps and the Key Plate. From 1900 onwards the Double Ring postmarks came into their own, and one can strikes. In the more modern steel marks, Birminghams, which can be found with and without the word Jamaica, and the semi-ovals which have had a rather chequered career, as well as these dies arrived in Jamaica with the word "Registered" along with the name of the Post Office.

Unfortunately each Post Office has tried to obliterate the word "Registered" with the result that there is now a dark blotch across the top of the die. Since 1954 all the old Double Ring Post marks have been slowly withdrawn and in place the new Single Ring have been brought into use. There are now well over 250 of these new Postmarks in use. What is so fas-cinating on postal history is that a Post Office will be opened today and in a few years time closed. the name changed and re-opened at some other place.

A few examples such as Beledere, which can be found in the early squared circles changed to Red Hills, Bybrook to Skibo, Cold Springs new New Castle, Dallas Castle to Discovery Bay. Hope to Liguanea. Kings to White House, and even more recent Bermaddy to Threadways

One could continue for at lea another 25-30 Post Offices, All these early postmarks are extremely rare, and difficult to locate. Not forgetting that during the last forgetting that during the last war, the American base in Jamaica was known as Fort Simonds, which had its own Post Office-known to collectors as Sandy Gully in a Temporary Rubber date and steel stamp. The ACC Inter-Agency Working Party gave careful consideration to the serious housing problems facing practically every country in the world and recommended specific international action for the extension of low-cost housing particularly for those countries in the less-developed areas. The issuance of such a cial stamp will stimulate considerable interest in housing activities

The stamp will be printed by photogravure process in denominations of 4c (blue, red, yellow, purple, orange, green and black) and 7c (brown, red, yellow, purole, orange, green and black) Harrison and Sons, Limited, London, England. The stamps will measure 40 mm. X 30 mm. perfor ation to perforation.

The two denominations will be printed in the following quantities: 4c—2,750,000, 7c—2,500,000.

Four marginal inscriptions will appear on each sheet. The inscription will appear in the margin opposite the second vertical row of stamps at upper right and left and lower right and left of each sheet The marginal inscription will consist of the UN seal with the date '1962" beneath the seal on the 4c sheets with the text "Housing and Community Facilities" in a semi-circle round the top of the seal; the text "Services Collectifs" in a similar position with similar date beneath on the 7c sheets. The colof the marginal inscription be the colour of the background of the stamp in each de-nomination. Seal and inscription will be in blue for the 4c sheet and yellow-brown for the 7c sheet.

U.N. First Day Covers

The UN Postal Administration has announced that the United Nations will issue its second commemorative stamps of 1962 in honor of the World Health Organization (WHO) and its drive to eradicate malaria in countries of the world where it still affects adversely human existence.

The theme of the new stamp will be "The World Against Malaria" developed by (WHO) a specialized agency of the United Nations.

More than 1,000 million human heings live under the threat of malaria. In 1955, the World Health Assembly, meeting that year in Mexico, resolved to eliminate this scourge from the face of the earth as rapidly as possible. Each afflicted country, under the overall international coordination of WHO ,and often with additional international help, is massing its to eradicate the disease once and for all. Seventy-six countries are joined in this campaign.

International action ministration will issue the first must accordingly help to carry the commemorative stamp of 1962 on program forward smoothly and 28 February. This stamp issue will honour United Nations acmost inconceivable, yet there can be no doubt that malaria eradication is essential to mass prospering on earth."

The stamp which will be printed by photogravure process in six colours is in denominations of 4 cents and 11 cents by Harrison and Sons, Limited, London, England. It will measure 30 mm. hori-

zontal x 40 mm. vertical, perforation to perforation.

The two denominations will be printed in the following quantities:

11c — 2,500,000 4c — 2,750,000

The stamp was designed by Rashid-ud Din of Pakistan, a member of the UN Presentation Unit.

Further details about the stamp regarding instructions purchase of first-day covers will be released approximately six weeks before the day of issue. This stamp will be issued 30

March 1962.

Detailed instructions as to the procedure to be followed for obtaining first-day covers of the new stamps are:

- First day service is given only at UN Headquarters, New York, against payment in US dollars.
- Persons desiring first day cancellations of the stamps may send in a reasonable number of addressed unstamped envelopes to the UN Postal Administra-tion, Room 1B-1, United Na-tions, New York 17, New York, First day cover requests must be postmarked before midnight 22 February 1962.
- The outside envelope must be clearly marked "First Day Covers — Housing and Related Community Facilities".
- Remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed must be enclosed in either money order or certified cheque. Postage stamps will not be accepted, and will be returned to the sender. Customers are urged not to send cash through the mail.
- The number and denomination of stamps to be affixed should be caellry marked in pencil the upper right-hand corner of
- the upper right-hand corner of each envelope.

 A filler of medium weight should be placed in each envelope with the flap turned in. poor cover ma yresult if no filler is provided. Do not use thick filler.
- Requests for marginal inscrip-tions will be filled only as far as possible, depending on the number of marginal inscriptions available.
- No mixed orders for both first day covers and mint stamps will be processed but will be returned to sender. Customers are therefore, urged to send in orders separately, with separate remittances.
- When ordering blocks of 4 stamps (marginal inscription blocks or plain blocks), cus-tomers should address the envelopes in the extreme left-hand corner, otherwise the address is obliterated by the stamps.

The 10d features the Nassau Public Library and is in purple. Both designs include the Annigoni portrait of H.M. Queen Elizabeth with the St. Edwards Crown.



The City of Nassau was officially established when Queen issued Letters Patent in 1861. Nas-sau is famous as the first landfall in the New World made by Columbus on his voyage of 1492. It is situated on the island of New Providence in the centre of the Baha-mas Archipelago, of which it is the Capital city.

During the 17th century the islands were a rendezvous of pirates and buccaneers and their frequent raids on Spanish Ships in that area brought down the vengeance of Spain on many occasions. Charles Town, as Nassau was then called. was twice sacked by the Spaniards during the year 1684. By the year 1717, the Spaniards had attacked the settlement no less than 34 times a brief period of their attempt to dislodge the pirstill continued to Nassau Harbour as their rendez-

With the development of tourism in the present era, Nassau has emerged not only as one of the emerged not only as one of the leading tourist resorts of the Western World, but also as a vital centre of international finance.

Christchurch Cathedral, depicted on the 8d stamp, was on two occa-sions destroyed by the Spaniards. The foundation stone of the present building was laid in 1837 by Sir Francis Cockburn, then Governor of the Island, and the Church was opened in April, 1840.

The Public Library depicted on the 10d stamp is an octagonal pic-turesque building with an interesting history, having once served as the Nassau Prison. In 1878 it was converted into a library and the cells were transformed into alcoves for the thousands of books which form the library's present collection.

As reported in earlier issues the purpose of this campaign is to pub-licize the problem of Malaria which is the world's No. 1 disease affecting over 1 billion people or almost half of mankind. It also affects soldiers, travelers etc. visiting large areas of the world. Income from the sale of stamps donated to the WHO will go to a Malaria Eradication Fund. to a special

Additional Postal Administra tions have declared their participa-tion in the Malaria Eradication stamp campaign, sponsored by the World Health Organization, a specialized agency of the United Nations. Among these is particu-larly noted the Holy See (Vatican), which has announced the planned release of 2 values. Participating administrations now total 88.

RELEASE DATES

The bulk of these releases will take place on World Health Day, April 7th, and continuing throughout 1962 thematic antimalaria stamps will be issued by the participating nations. (The only official issues which will appear before April 7th are those of the U.N., the U.S.A., Switzerland and Liechtenstein which will appear in the latter part of March).

FIRST ISSUES

The United Nations Postal Administration will issue its anti-Malaria stamps on 30th March.

These new stamps will be printed by photogravure process in denominatioons of 4c and 11c. The 4c stamp will be in orange and yellow and the 11c will be light green and yellow printed by Harrison and Sons Limited, London, England. The stamps will measure approximately 30 mm x 40 mm perforation to perforation.



SEYCHELLES NEW DEFINITIVES



CENTS SEYCHELLES

The colourful new definitive set of the Seychelles which was re-leased on 21st February, 1962, leased on comprises 15 stamps produced in multi-colour photogravure by Har-rison and Sons Ltd. With the exception of the 10 Rupees value, which is 1 x 1.65 inches, all denominations are in size 1.32 x 1.07 inches. The designs include a portrait of H.M. Queen Elizabeth II.

Values and Subjects are as follows:

5 CENTS—Black Parrot (Coracopsis barkleyi). The Seychelles black parrot is one of the rarest birds in the world, being found only on Praslin Island. Although so-called, it is not actually black, but of a dusky brown colour.

10 CENTS - Vanilla Vine (Vanilla fragrans). The vanilla industry is the third in importance of the agricultural industry in the Seychelles. Generations of growers of this plant have developed methods of growing and curing the fruits of what may be described as the only practically useful or-chid to the stage where it is difficult to say whether they are practising a craft or an art.

15 CENTS-Fisherman, Inshore fishing meets local needs and the primitive means of transporting the catch depicted on the stamp is still extensively used to carry fish from boat to market.

20 CENTS-Denis Island Lighthouse. This island was named after Denis de Trobriant, captain of a French ship, who chartered it in 1773. A wide area of shallows surrounds the island and is a danger to navigation in a much frequent ed maritime pathway.

25 CENTS-Clock Tower, Standand in the centre of Victoria, the capital, the clock tower, which is a copy of "Big Ben", was erected by public subscription in memory of Queen Victoria and unveiled in 1903. 

50 CENTS - Cascade Church. This is one of fifteen Roman Catholic churches scattered over the islands of Mahe, Praslin and La Digue. Cascade lies four miles south of Victoria south of Victoria.

70 CENTS-Sail Fish (Histiophorus gladius). The sail fish is a big game fish commonly found in Seychelles waters. In colour it is deep blue above and silver below and the huge dorsal fin is spotted. It is a swift and fierce hunter and often grows up to twenty feet in length.

1 RUPEE-Cinnamon. The cinnamon is the second most impor-tant agricultural industry. It grows semi-wild on four of the largest islands of the group, especially on the largest island, Mahe, where it is cropped for its leaf and bark. An essential oil is distilled from its leaf which is used for the manufacture of synthetic vanilla, while the bark goes to the spice industry, mostly being ground to make cinnamon powders.

1.50 Rs-Copra, This is the main industry of the Seychelles, produc ing the larger part of the Colony's revenue. It is produced by drying the kernel of coconuts partly in the and partly in hot air driers which are called Caloriferes. The Seychelles copra has a very good reputation for oil content and quality and is very much appreciated on the Indian Market.

2.25 Rs - Map. The map shows the northern part of the Indian Ocean with the position of the Sey-Ocean with the position of the Seychelles marked by a star. Of the 99 islands which make up the Seychelles, 45 are granite and the rest are coral. The largest, Mahe, with an area of 55 square miles, contains nearly nine-tenths of the population. It lies four degrees south of the equator and is approximately a south of the equator and is approx-imately 970 miles east of the African coast and 1,400 miles south of Aden on the Arabian Peninsula.

10 RUPEES-Badge. The newly approved design of Badge is reproduced on this stamp in full colour. The badge is base on a silver buckle designed by General Gordon for his sister on the occasion of his visit to the Seychelles four years before his death at Khartoum. It consists of a Coco-de-mer palm, thought by General Gordon to be the "Tree of Knowledge" Knowledge" of Genesis 2:9, and a giant land tortoise. The Colony

Age-Rarity-Value

Coins are fascinating - but like other things which require specialized knowledge for full appreciation, coins are grossly misunderstood, "It is old: therefore, it must be valuable"—this you hear so of-ten, and the reasoning is wholly wrong. Roman coppers, older than the Christian calendar, are being sold for fifty cents, while thou-sands of dollars may be paid for a coin issued in the last forty years! Value. economics teaches depends upon supply and demand. Very old coinage you might expect to have all but vanished, but a coin proves all but indestructible; unless melted down it will persist over the centuries. No one ever throws away money, so practically every home has a few odds and ends of old coins. Age need not imply rarity, so there are old coins which are common and recent strikings which prove remarkably scarce. coin is rare when relatively few specimens are in existence, so rarity relates to the supply side of

supply and demand.

Strangely, a scarce piece may not command a high price. "Key" coins needed to complete popular series are assured of a ready market while other items may wait for years on a dealer's shelf. Mintage of a few thousands or tens of thousands in issues such as the silver dollar results in high valuation, while a similar release of commemorative medals might

(Continued from page 3) mismatic interest has extended to most series, but especially to fa-miliar "decimal coinage," where thousands of Canadians are searching their pocket change for scarce varieties, responding to the high prices being paid for the more elusive types.

Rarities make the headlines and get the attention at coin shows, but are only one part of the story. Collections which are interesting and instructive can be built without expensive rarities - which is the reason so many new collectors of modest income can find fascinain dollars and cents.

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NEW AUSTRALIAN COMMEMORATIVES

The Australian News Bureau, New York, has announced the forthcoming release of 2 new Australian Stamps.

A 5d. postage stamp will be issued later this year to commem-orate the World Conference of the Associated Country Women of the World to be held in Melbourne in October, 1962. In stating this, the Postmaster General (Mr. son) said that the organisation was an affiliation of country women's societies and associations throughout the world and each national group maintained their separate characteristics within it. In Australia, Country Women's Associa-tions participated in a wide range of activities beneficial to the community and played a very import ant part in maintaining the struc-ture of the Australian way of life in areas beyond the cities. Further particulars of the new stamp, and the date of issue, will be announced as soon as production is sufficient

A 5d. postage stamp will be issued later this year to commemorate the centenary of the first crossing of Australia from south to north by John McDouall Stuart in 1862. In stating this, the Post-master General said that Stuart's achievement was of great significance and enabled the construction of the Overland Telegraph Line a few years later. Its completion in 1872 linked Australia by telegraph with the outside world for the first time. Further particulars of the new stamp, and the date of issue, will be announced as soon as production is sufficiently advanced.

The news bureau has also announced the release on 7th April, 1962, of three anti-malaria stamps for PAPUA and NEW GUINEA. Details of these stamps are given under "W.H.O. MALARIA STAMPS" on page 1.

SECURITY

It is assumed that all displays will be adequately insured by their owners. However, the Convention Committee will provide measures of security as are within their means, including a security room and armed vigilance.

PAKISTAN 1st JET-FLIGHT ISSUE

Pakistan International Airlines' brand new green-and-white Boeing jetliner turbo-fan 720-B scheduled to make its first flight between Karachi and Dacca on February 6, 1962. On this occasion, Pakistan Posts & Telegraphs Department issued a 13-Paisa overprint on the 21/2-anna (Paper Mill) Postage Stamp issued on August 14, 1955. The overprint is in red. It shows a Boeing 720-B Jetliner in flight along with the inscription "Karachi - Dacca First Jet Flight".

Placed among the leading air-nes of the world, Pakistan Inlines ternational Airlines rose to the present position from rather humble beginnings. At the time of Independence, air services within Pakistan were provided by Orient Airways, an organisation formed in 1946. Orient Airways generally laid the foundation of a modern air transport system in Pakistan. With a view to coping with the ever-increasing demands of internal air travel, Pakistan Internal air travel, Pakistan International Airlines was organ-ised in 1951 as a Government De-partment with three Super-Con-stellations. In June, 1954, the first direct non-stop service between Karachi and Dacca had begun and a year later P.I.A. became a Corporation. The Karachi-London international service commenced in February, 1955.

The turning point in the history of the airline occurred with the advent of the new regime, P.I.A. is now a vast organisation. It has linked arms with the major air-lines in international competition and 90 per cent of its services, throughout its intricate network are reported to depart on time. P.I.A., was the first Asian carrier to enter the pure-jet field in that in March, 1960, it brought into service Boeing 707 on its interna-tional route. The Karachi-London-New York service commenced on June 16, 1961.

P.I.A.'s fleet consists of the ure-jet Boeing 707 Intercontinental, the new Boeing 720-B, the radar-equipped four-engine turboprop jet Viscount-815, the radarequipped twin engine turbo--prop Fokker F-27, the four-engine Super Constellation and the dependable work-horse the DC-3.

BOOK REVIEW CHARLTON'S "COIN GUIDE"

erse group of general and specialized publications, varying considerably in their importance and in their claim to a permanent niche on the shelf of the numismatic student. Previously unlisted tokens, minor varieties in the dated decimal sequences and, indeed, the lore that provides the true fascination of such material, these have received due attention. This Coin Guide, essentially a buying list, has perhaps less claim to lasting interest as a numismatic document, for its facts are known to all serious students, but its influence on the hobby is likely to be great, and its appearance on the scene should be ap-plauded by many. The Coin Guide, it will be found, presents what it claims to present, fair buying prices for numismatic material in the average condition which a dealor other buyer is likely to encounter. In so doing, it brings Mr. Charlton's experience and judgment to that phase of the buying-and-selling relationship which his wholly praiseworthy Standard Catalogue invariably has seen fit to neglect.

The author records a belief that the booklet (off-set printed, 8½ x 5½ in.) should prove useful both as a premium guide and as a "low-

Canada's "coming of age" in priced prospectus on coin collect-popular numismatics has been her-alded by the appearance of a div-jority of coinage types and paper money varieties likely to be en-countered in a Canadian accumulation. Decimal sequences -- still very much the backbone of Canadian collecting - are listed with mint statistics and, for each item a single suggested valuation, applicable to the condition normally encountered by a dealer purchasing from the man in the street. Government paper currency, Province of Canada through Bank of Canada releases, receives treatment, and reference is made to Newfoundland issues, chartered bank sequences, and the market for United States currency. Decimal coinage of the Provinces, including Newfoundland, listed, along with analogous United States material, in dated sequences, including gold.

A great wealth of elementary numismatic information the reader finds packed in a few pages, and the generally sane buying prices should do much to set the newcomer's thinking along realistic lines. Premium lists have been all too frequent in numismatics, for those which capitalize on avarice sell especially well: Mr. Charlton's Coin Guide should be welcomed as a reliable document and a sound addition to this important field.

PHOTOGRAPHY COUNTERFEITING

Photography has been used as one reliable and practical method among others for spotting counterfeit coins. All coins handled by the gold trade during a day are photo-graphed and enlarged to ten times the original size, and twenty times respect of smaller coins. photographs are taken through a sheet of plate glass placed at a right angle to the camera axis. The lighting is done from the side to give direct incident light and this entails a loss of about 10% in intensity. In contrast to ground objects, direct lighting is not suitable for coins and it is best to use a soft neon source. The photographs are taken on process film. strict adherence to the scale of reproduction is necessary. The 10-20-times enlargement is made on B film. An emulsion on a polystyrol base is indispensable so as to avoid distortion.

The gold coin to be examined is placed in a profile projector. image thrown on the ground glass for testing should be magnified either 10 or 20 times. The film the genuine coin, enlarged according to the scale required, is then compared over the other image of the doubtful coin. The contours are checked in this way.

It would indeed be imprudent to determine whether a coin is genuine or counterfeit by relying on this method alone, but, in conjunction with the customary methods, it serves to increase the degree of accuracy in spotting counterfeit relativities. gold coins.

A Jeweller's scale to compare weights when base metals are used, will show a difference in grams; a jeweller's weight for gold is an ac-curate measure. The fineness of and weight combination modern restrikes of Austria, Hungary, Switzerland, Germany and many foreign gold pieces will show up clearly if put to the counterfeit photography test.

It is common knowledge that the counterfeit decimal coinage of Canada manufactured in cellar basements, or in old printing plants cellar or small foundries in the past 50 years, were poor facsimiles of lead or babbit turned out in most instances by the single plaster of paris mould type. These are grey in color and greasy to the touch Distortion and grotesque examples can be readily spotted by the amateur. Many were too thick, had a strong lack of detail or were without milling, or had a milling hand done with the use of a fine file. In every instance, however, there is to be seen with the use of a strong magnifying glass a "Porous" look in the field of the coin.

The weight is incorrect, the color grey and the sound, if dropped very flat, not like the silver. The next advance over this was to cop-per plate or "Flash" the lead per plate or "Flash" the lead forgery then silver plate it, as silver has a tendency to stick better to copper. Thus many of the first dollar forgeries are silver plated.

partment stores and shops of fash-ion catering to the elite. When the first of these forgeries were covered, it was not uncommon to walk along a stasse' and see shop keepers placing the ducats on the cement walk and striking them with a hammer, every once in a while you could hear a moan or wail as the coin disappeared with the first blow.

It was possible to obtain a rare "Electrotype" of the obverse of say the "Britannicus", a rare sestertia, from the British Museum to add to your collection because it is certainly a rarity most collectors could never afford, or be able to secure in a life time. However, there was nothing to stop Mr. A. from ordering the obverse from Toronto, Ont., and Mr. B. from ordering the reverse from Buffalo N.Y. and then the two sweated together they met. Thus we have having when they met. Thus we have many coins sitting in collections that are no more than electrotypes, unbeknown to the proud owner, who smiled every time he handles or turns his \$600.00 gem in his cabinet.

Many numismatists have a small collection of lead, babbit copper or even brass forgeries they have ac cumulated from junk boxes, or through the purchase of old ac-cumulations. Very few ever display, exhibit or discuss this in-teresting field, for several good reasons. It has been established that a bonafide collector may collect them, but never advertise or sell them. Many collectors were self them, many conectors were interested in the outcome of my own experience in "having and advertising for sale" counterfeit coins in 1961. There has been no precedent set. You cannot sell them or advertise them, and I believe if you exhibit them they can be seized by the Government. It cost us well over \$1000.00 for legal fees, loss of time, defamation of character; loss of business could not be estimated. However, we were found not guilty, but all the coins specimens

This closes the door for many on an interesting study. As for re-search many will never know how or why these fascinating specimens were made or distributed. Ceylon Scouts African Stamp News Jubilee

As reported in our last edition, special 35 cent stamp was issued Government of Ceylon on the 26th February, 1962, to commemorate the Golden Jubilee of the Ceylon Scouts Association.

stamp was produced The stamp was produced by Helio Courvoisier S.A. of Switzerland from a design by W. A. Ariyasena and features the Ceylon Boy Scout Badge in buff on a blue background. Printed by the photogravure process on unwatermarked paper, in horizontal format, size 36 x 26 mm.

The occasion of the Golden Jubilee was marked by a National Jamboree in Ceylon.

The Boy Scout Movement first introduced in Ceylon in 1912 by Mr. F. G. Stevens who was at that time a British Engineer at-tached to the Public Works Department in Ceylon, and who was later appointed first Colonial Commissioner. In 1917 Mr. Stevens also introduced the Scout paper entitled "The Ceylon Scout", which designation has now bee changed to "The Outdoor-Life". been

The first Scout Troop was format Christ Church College Matale, and the Movement quickly spread to other parts of Ceylon. The first All-Ceylon Scout Rally was held at Colombo in 1917. This ear also saw the formation of the first Sea Scout Troop at Trinco-

1921 was a great year for the Ceylon Scouting when the late Lord Baden-Powell, Founder of the when the late Scout Movement, paid his first official visit to Ceylon. Mr. C visit Brooke Elliot, K.C., who was appointed Chief Commissioner in 1921, obtained a great measure of public and Government support for the Movement. He was also instrumental in introducing Scouting to prisons in Cevlon.

In 1924 Ceylon Scouts had the first opportunity of representing their country at an overseas Scout Gathering. This was in Wembley, Gathering. This was in Wembley London, and Copenhagen in Denmark. In 1929 fifty Cevlon Scouts attended the Coming-of-Age Jam-Birkenhead, boree at England. Between 1931 and 1961, Ceylon Scouts attended 21 different Overeas Scouts Gatherings, in various parts of the world.

In 1944 Ceylon's development fund for Scouting was launched by then Chief Scout, Sir Andrew Caldecott, Governor of Ceylon. and one and a half lakhs of Rupees (150,000) was raised for the Move-In 1953 the Ceylon Boy Scouts Association was granted International Status as a self-governing Scout Association, By Act of Parliament was INCORPORATED in 1957.

There are 29 Branch As tions in various districts of Cevlon and the total number of Scouts of all ranks in 1961 was 19,865.

In an area that was previously a virtual wilderness, a community is being created together with first class housing and other modern facilities that will serve a planned population of 250,000 per

The harbor itself is one of the most impressive in the entire world, and provides a long sea outfall which juts more than a mile out to sea, To commemorate this project a special issue of 3 stamp were released on February 1962. Printed in sheets of 30 with marginal inscriptions and control numbers, in four-color photo-gravure. The 3d (size 49 x 33 mm) depicts the basic blueprint of the harbor. The 1/3d and 2/6d (size 33 mm) depict views of the harbor with Jet planes and ships.

The 1/3d and 2/6d values are esignated "Air-mail". Collectors ill note that these are the first designated will commemorative airmails ever issued by Ghana.

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U.S. STAMP **Honours Jurist**



40 U.S.POSTAGE

Charles Evans Hughes, jurist and statesman, will be portrayed on a 4-cent commemorative stamp, which will be released on April 11, 1962, at Washington, D.C.

Postmaster General J. Edward Day unveiled the Hughes stamp design last February on the eve of the banquet of the Chicago Bar Association, in the presence of William T. Gossett, Vice-President of the Ford Motor Company and son-in-law of the late Chief Jus-

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Hughes was born April 11, 1862, at Glens Falls, New York. While teaching Latin and Greek at Delaware Academy in Delhi, New York, he studied law and later went to New York City to continue his studies.

In 1906 he defeated William R. Hearst for the Governorship of New York and was re-elected two years later. In 1910 he was ap-pointed an Associate Justice of the U.S. Supreme Court resigning in 1916 when he was nominated for the Presidency by the Republican Party. Hughes, however, lost in his quest for this high office, trailing Woodrow Wilson by only 23 electoral votes.

Thereafter, he served as Secre-tary of State under President Harding, as a member of the Court of Arbitration at the Hague, as a Judge on the Court of Internaa Judge on the Court of Interna-tional Justice and in 1930 was ap-pointed Chief Justice of the United States by President Herbert Hoover, and served until 1941. He died August 27, 1948, at Oster-ville Massachusetts. ville, Massachusetts.

The forthcoming stamp is sim ple in design, emphasizing a likeness of the distinguished Jurist, after a photograph taken by Harris & Ewing of Washington, D.C.

This stamp will be printed in black on buff-coloured paper on the Cottrell presses and will be issued in panes of 50. It will measure 0.84 x 1.44 inches, electric-eye per-forated. A total of 115,000,000 copies have been ordered.

Collectors desiring first day cancellation of this commemorative stamp may send addressed envelopes, together with a remittance to cover the cost of the stamps to be affixed, to the Postmaster, Washington 13, D.C. Each envelope must be mash. be marked, in pencil, in the upper right hand corner, indicating the number of stamps to be affixed (singles, pairs, blocks, etc.)

Albania & Bulgaria

A handsomely designed new album for the stamps of Albania and Bulgaria has just been released in the Minkus Publications line of Regional "World-Series" Albums.

This attractive new album features the Coat of Arms of Albania in the upper half of the jacket design with the country title in a shaded red effect. Bulgaria, in white, green and red appears with this nation's heraldic motif at the lower half of the new album. A predominantly green background serves to highlight the interesting artwork, which is based on authorities. thentic native insignia.

The Minkus Album for Albania and Bulgaria is profusely illustrated, and contains spaces with numcatalog. The background and history of Albania and Bulgaria are presented in their separate sections of this volume, offering wider knowledge and enjoyment to collectors. All pages for stamps are printed on one side only.

CURACAO **Culture Stamps**

A special issue of four stamps are due for release by the Nether-lands Antilles Postal Administra-tion on March 14th, which will de-pict various aspects of life in that country.

Denominations will be 6c, 10c, 20c and 25c. Printing in four-colour photogravure by Enschede & Zonen of Holland, on unwatermarked paper, in sheets of 100, perforation 12½ x 13½, all in vertical format. A miniature sheet bearing one of each of the stamps will also be released. The sheet

will be in six-colour photogravure.

The stamps were designed by
Oscar Ravelo, a Netherlands Antilles artist, who also designed the 20c stamp issued on November 16th, 1961, to commemorate the

first salute to the American flag. The 6c value depicts a "corn masher" which consists of a tree trunk, hollowed out by burning and scraping, and a rounded piece of wood called a "pilon". The so-called Indian corn has always been a stalwart crop in Curacao, and its importance is stressed in the harvesting ceremonies which every year take place throughout the country.

The 10c value depicts a "Benta Player". This is a one-stringed musical instrument, the string being attached to a pliable woo The human mouth is used as soundboard. The resulting volume is very limited, but the tone-quali-

is very limited, but the tone-quality is intriguing and highly unusual. The 20c value depicts a "Petjikerchief". In Curacao three different kerchiefs are worn. The Sunday kerchief, the common kerchief for daily use and the kerchief that is worn on very special recessions, such as depicted on the occasions, such as depicted on the stamp. These are made of fine linen. The edges are bell-shaped and festooned, while the centre is beautifully laced and embroidered.

The 25c value features a "Jaja" with child. In the early days of Curacao the homestead at the centre of the plantation was its economic heart. The plantation owner, usually a wealthy man, had numerous servants of whom perhaps the most important was the "Jaja", who was often the wet-nurse of the plantation owner's children. She would devote her whole life to the children, often with greater severity than did the parents themselves. The grown-up child looked upon his Jaja as a second mother. In the relationship between Jaja and child, sociologists find an explanation for the excellent understanding that has developed between the different population groups in the Netherlands Antilles and in other countries where the custom prevailed.

Red River Settlement Commemorative Stamp

Canadian Postmaster General, Walter Hamilton, has granted spe-cial and sole authority to the Winnipeg Philatelic Society to prepare a special cachet cover and postal cancellation die for use in Winnipeg on May 3, 1962, the date on which Canada will release its new Sc stamp commemorating the es-tablishment of the original Red River Settlement in the Red River Valley at the present site of Winnipeg, Manitoba. This special post-al cancellation die will be used only in Winnipeg and will be sup-plementary to the regular First Day of Issue Cancellation reserved use at Ottawa.

The Red River stamp commemo-rates the 150th anniversary of the establishment of the first Canaestablishment of the first Canadian agricultural settlement west of the Great Lakes. It was established by a Scotchman, Thomas Douglas, Earl of Douglas, who saw the need of land for Scotch and Irish crofters and small farmers who were being displaced by the enclosure movement which was enclosure movement which was turning large parts of the British turning large parts of the British Isles into vast sheep farms. Thomas Douglas, better known as Lord Selkirk, purchased 116,000 square miles of land from the Hudson's Bay Company—an area covering the southern part of what is now Manitoba and the northern part of Minnesota and North Dakota. From 1812 to 1816, Lord Selkirk brought more than 250 settlers over the sea to Hudson's Bay and down to the forks of the Red and Assiniboine Rivers where the first settlement was established in 1812 assimonia Rivers where the first settlement was established in 1812 at the present site of the capital of Manitoba, Winnipeg, a city whose population is now well over 400,000.

The 4-cent Battle of Shiloh commemorative stamp, the second in the series of five marking the Civil War Centennial, was designed by Noel Sickles, a prominent

crouching behind a tree stump. The drawing style suggests a rapid battlefield sketch, rather than a toned completed drawing. The major theme will be printed in black on light peach blossom paper, symbolizing the fact that an important phase of the Shiloh battle was fought in a peach orchard. The lettering, by Jerry Mullen, was adopted from a Civil War recruting poster—the style now called Barnum.

U. S. COMMEMORATIVE STAMP

A 15-page booklet entitled "Guide for the Selection of United States Commemorative Postage Stamps" is now available from the Comment of the C U.S. Post Office Department.

This pamphlet sets forth the procedure to be followed in requesting the issuance of commemorative stamps and outliness. the standards adopted by the 11.
member Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee governing their issu-ance. The seven criteria listed be low serve as the basis for recom-mendations made by the Commit-tee to the Postmaster General:

- 1. No living person shall be honored by portrayal on any United States postage stamp. (Title 31, USC 413).
- 2. Commemorative postage stamps honoring individuals preferably will be issued on the anniversaries of hirths
- 3. Commemorative postage stamps will be issued on even date anniversaries, preferably starting on the 50th year and continuing at 50-year inter-
- 4. Events of widespread na-tional appeal and significance may receive considera-tion for issuance of commemorative postage stamps.
- 5. Commemorative postage stamps shall not be issued to honor fraternal, political or religious organizations, a commercial enterprise, or a specific product.
- 6. Commemorative postage stamps will not be considered appropriate for charitable organizations whose funds are supplied in whole or part by voluntary contributions. (Poster stamps sold by philanthropic organizations to raise funds, as well as postal slogan cancellations, are more useful in arousing public interest.)
- 7. Commemorative stamps shall be issued for cities, towns, municipalities, or counties, since so many are reaching significant anniversaries. Due to the restrictions that must be restricted to the restrictions that must be restricted. saries. Due to the restricbe placed on the stamp program, it would be most difficult to single out one anniversary for commemoration to the exclusion of the many others which would have justification for postal recogni-

SAUDI ARABIA, 3 stamps in denominations of 2, 6 and 8 plas. denominations of 2, 6 and 8 plass tres. SURINAM, two values, &c and 10c. UAR (Egypt) and PALESTINE, two values of 10 millieme and 35 millieme. We understand from the Egyptian Post Office that this issue has been postponed until 20th June. The SWISS UN Office will issue a 50c. value in blue (overprint of the 1960 WHO service stamp). Most issues will be released on the 7th April.

Great publicity is being given to this important and humane programme. President Kennedy was scheduled to release a message on the importance of this programme on 30th March (release date of the U.S. anti-malaria stamp). Over 3200 Radio and 650 TV stations in the United States will record messages and films in support. Warren G. Magnuson M. Jackson of Wash-Senators and Henry M. Jackson of Washington supported by the Century 21 officials, requested that the Postmaster General authorize the issuance of this stamp, which features the "Space Needle," towering 550 feet above the ground, and built at a cost of 2½ million dol-lars. From its restaurant and observation deck the Space Needle will afford a panoramic view of Puget Sound, Mount Rainier and the Cascade and Olympic mountain ranges.

Century 21, the first interna tional exposition to be held in the U.S. for 23 years and represent-ing America's first space-age fair, will open in Seattle, Washington on April 21 and continue through October 21, 1962. Postmaster General J. Edward Day will dedicate the new Century 21 commemorative postage stamp at the fair on April 25th.

Science, commerce and industry, art and entertainment will be rep resented in pavilions on the fair grounds, and there will be what are described as exotic avenues joining together the five wondrous worlds of the fair. Also featured will be the spectacular monorail system which will whisk visitors from downtown Seattle to the fairgrounds in 96 seconds.

The stamp design was tributed by John Maass of Philadelphia, based on a presentation approved by the Seattle World's Fair group and representing the artwork of Bob Matthiesen. William K. Schrage modeled the stamp design, with Charles A. Brooks responsible for the engraving of the vignette and George A. Payne for the lettering and numeral.

Printing of this Seattle World's Fair stamp will be accomplished on the Giori presses, in white (Space Needle); blue (background) and red (lettering) in panes of fifty, L-type perforated. The stamps, due to the bleed at the top and at the monorail extension the right, will be officially reported as measuring 0.85 by 1.49 inches as measuring 0.55 by 1.45 lines, arranged vertically. Actually they will be the same size as other commemoratives, overall. A total of 135,000,000 of these stamps has been ordered, with 25,000,000 to be specifically scheduled for Seat-

honoring the 150th anniversary of Louisiana Statchood is an old riverboat belching fire and smoke churning up the Mississippi River seen at dusk through riverbank trees which drip Spanish moss.

This stamp, measuring .84 1.44 inches, arranged horizontally will be issued in panes of 50, with an initial printing order of 115, 000,000. It will be printed on the Giori press in three colors. The wording "LOUISIANA," the bottom of the stamp, the fire spitting from the smokestacks, and the setting sun are vermillion red; the riverboat and riverbank elements are deep moss green; lettering "1812-1962," to the of the design, and "U.S. Postage 4c," to the right, are cobalt blue. The lettering, by Jerry Mullen of New York, is appropriately old fashioned.

BRITISH STAMP **POLICY**

"At the Post Office we are very proud of the British postage stamp tradition. We are proud that originated postage stamps, and of the two features of British stamps -the dominance of the Monarch's head and the omission of the name of the country."

So said the Assistant Post-master General, Miss Mervyn Pike, M.P., when she opened Stampex, the National Stamp Exhibition, at the Central Hall, London, England, on 16th March.

"I appreciate," said Miss Pike, "that sometimes the Post Office and certain sections of those people interested in stamps may have reasons for disagreeing. We at the Post Office regard stamps essentially as a means of paying post-age. Postage stamps came first; age. Postage stamps came stamp collecting developed later."

Miss Pike explained that if the Monarch's head were not dominant on British stamps, we should have to include the name of the country. "I think it right to treasure these features of British stamp design, and I am sure that the majority of people in Britain share my views."

Miss Pike also explained that if stamps were issued containing "the scenic beauties of Britain or illustrations from its history and so on," it would be necessary to change their design very frequently to do justice to "the country's wonderful heritage."

WORKING BANKS

By AL ROSEN

Recently while making a deposit they have reached today. "Not the bank of Nova Scotia, inconsiderable" is the time, money in the bank of Nova Scotia, Church & Queen Street branch in Toronto, I was surprised to find on display a collection of working banks many of them manufactured in the late 1800's to the 1900 period. Many numismatists also have side line collections of this treasure cove recovered from old foundries, or from men who worked there, or at one time owned the place. These items generally fall under the heading of: broken parts and castings, broken or imperfect banks were thrown aside and are usually unpainted or unfinished. Pattern banks, trial castings and experimental banks which were changed around and often altered to a startling degree to remedy some real or fancied objection or defect before being placed in circulation. I have seen the repaired specimen of the elephant and the three clowns bank that has faces looking in the opposite direction from the conventional speci-The bank mentioned is a master pattern, one retrieved some time ago from a foundry, but even that fact would not explain the reversal of the two clown's faces. Patterns and banks are not in reverse to each other, but are to all intents and purposes identical in design. Patterns are, however, made of bronze or some other composition of metal whereas practically all banks are of cast iron with a few of brass (also some small parts of iron banks such as the arm of the small monkey, the lion, and two monkeys bank) were made of brass for some practical foundryman's reason, giving rise to the early opinion among pseudo experts that all monkeys were replacements, since replacements are nearly always made of brass instead of iron, being easier to recast and file into shape where recast and file into shape where recast and file into shape where timperfect. Often the rarest banks are sold and the history which would great-ly add to the value is known to very few. A member of a prominent family—all collectors and real lovers of the gentle art of pursuing the rare antique to its native lair—was in the habit of buying rare pieces of some particular kind of antiques from an old Toronto collector dealer, an old charlatan, who was himself quite a character. When this haughty lady likes anything—after asking the price she invariably said, "and what is its history my good man, I must have the history of the piece if I am to buy it." And always obediently he furnished her with a satisfactory history.

But finally he rebelled and the following conversation ensued: "Seventy-five dollars you say—yes, it is very nice and I will take itbut first, you know how particular I am—I simply must have its history." It had been a trying day for the dealer - he himself had just lost out on a piece he wanted very much and his temper was "worn to "By gosh, so he blurted out, lady! it's seventy-five dollars and it's worth every cent of it, but if you want the history it's gonna not going to make up any more blankety blank lies for less than twenty-five dollars-so if you want a history with it, it's a hundred even and not a cent less." It is a historical fact the piece changed hands just "as is" or "was" at seventy-five dollars.

Too Many Commemoratives?

The old cry of too many commemoratives has been heard around the philatelic world often with few Is the average collector mindful of the fact that there have been too many commemoratives is sued-or is it merely the voice of the once-in-awhile collector who has an iron clamp on his purse

This question is uppermost in the mind of a Chicago physician, whose life is mixed up with medicine and philately. But he is one of a dozen men who help choose and create the commemorative postage stamps issued by the U.S. government.

He is Dr. James J. Matejka, Jr. of 614 North Elmwood Avenue, Oak Park, and house physician for Hotel La Salle, according to a copyrighted story in the Chicago Sunday Tribune (Aug/6/61).

This 44 year doctor has to select the theme, design, color and issuance date of the last five 1961 4c postage stamps celebrating the anniversaries of famous persons and

He says, "Our job is to cull the hundreds of proposed ideas for commemoratives and to recommend which ones will be issued by the post office department. Then we make our suggestions to the postmaster general. At our last meeting in Washington, D.C. we went through some 300 proposals".

He has to cut out commercialism in stamps, like the one issued in 1948 for the American Chicken, to increase the poultry industry, or another that honored a railroad company.

Dr. Matejka, says he eats, sleeps with stamps and has been a philatelist for 33 years, having started when his mother, Mrs. Helen Matejka, a retired piano teacher, encouraged his collecting stamps when he was stamp-conciously 12. Dr. Matejka's own collection, which he keeps in a loop bank vault, has 70 volumes of stamp but he does not divulge the full value of it.

In 1956, he is wont to remember. he outbid at a New York stamp auction, the agent for England's Queen Elizabeth to acquire a block of four Newfoundland air mail stamps worth \$16,000, the only such block in existence. He owns 800 stamps from the celebrated collections of Egypt's ex-King Farouk,

He has presided over the million dollar philatelic exhibit for the last four years in the Hotel La Salle. 20 cents — The Chelmon Rostratus: The Butterfly fish, abounds in Malayan coral reefs and on the east coast of Africa, China, Philip-pines, East Indies and Australia. It uses its long snout to probe into small holes and crevices in search of minute organisms on which it feeds. See illustration above.

25 cents-The Trichegaster Trichopterus: Also known as "Two-spot Geramy", this freshwater fish is found all over the Malayan Archipelago. It is sometimes kept as an aquarium fish, but it is more valuable as a feed fish in Malaya. In Malaya rice-growing areas they are introduced into the padi sawas at the time of planting to breed and are caught when the padi fields are drained for harvest.



U.A.R. (EGYPT) STAMP NEWS

To mark the first anniversary of the establishment of the African Postal Union, the Egyptian Postal Authorities issued a special set of two stamps on 23rd April, 1962, in denominations of 10 mills (yellow ochre and red) and 50 Mills (yelochre and blue), both in vertical format.

The design, common to both values, features a Posthorn on a map of Africa within a circle, with the inscription UPAF and its Arabic counterpart. The design was by Mr. Abbass F. Sheikh. Printed by the photogravure process at the Survey Dept. of Egypt, on paper watermarked multiple UAR, 2 million copies of the 10 mills and 600,000 of the 50 mills value were released. values, features a Posthorn on a value were released.

A number of stamps are sched-uled for release by the Egyptian Post Office, during the coming months.

The 10 mill commemorative stamp which was scheduled to be released in April, 1962, to celebrate the 150 anniversary of the Military Academy was postponed to the 3rd week of next June.

The Mukhtar Museum commem orative will be released on May 1 1962. Also during May 1962, Patrice Lumumba's commemorative will be released, however, the exact date has not yet been fixed.

The past month has been a very active one for coin collectors, and as will be noticed by the prices on as will be noticed by the prices on this page, increases have been not-ed for the 1858 large cent; 1923, 1933, 1943, 1947 dot, 1948 and 1951 1933, 1946, 1947 dot, 1948 and 1951 commemorative nickels; 1948 dime; 1858 20 cent piece; 1931, 1932 and 1947 ML straight 7 halves and the 1947 long 7 silver dollar.

While the higher prices are due partly to the increased buying by collectors, an important fac-



tor is the large investment and speculative buying by those who are not really collectors. Coins have now become so pop-ular, that they are being bought

and sold like any other commodity. Numismatists are not too happy about this situation as it results in higher prices, particularly for the key coins and makes it more difficult for the junior collectors and those of modest means to as-

semble complete collections.

However, Canadian coins in general are still reasonably priced compared to those of the United States and this fact is recognized by collectors south of the border who are heavy buyers of Canadian coins. Some are even switching from United States to Canadian and American dealers who at one time despised Canadian coins find it profitable to handle them. Another noticeable development is the increasing space given to Canadian numismatic material in U.S. publications.

U.S. STAMP NEWS



The U.S. 4-cent Homestead Act commemorative stamp designed by Charles Chickering of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, shows a sod hut, typical of the early homestead dwellings, with brightly lighted doorway, against the background of a bleak and wintry sky. A settler with his shovel, the combination that produced the hut, is featured in the design, with his wife—who made the hut a home—standing beside the open doorway with her dishpan in her hands. The design realistic in its treatment, symbolizes the forerunners of the prosperous farms and cities of the Great Plains today, and honors the courageous men and women who built them. A bluish gray color has been selected for the stamp representing a late even stamp, representing a late eve ning scene and emphasizing the bleakness of the plains.

The stamp, measuring 0.84 by 1.44 inches in dimension, will be printed on the Cottrell presses, electric-eye perforated and issued in panes of 50. The vignette was raved by Matthew D. Fenton and the lettering and numerals by Kenneth C. Wiram. An initial printing of 120 million has been authorized

The new stamp will be first placed on sale in Beatrice, Ne-braska, on May 20, 1962, one hundred years after the Homestead Act was signed by President Abraham Lincoln. The Act, which be-came effective on January 1, 1863 provided that any person who was the head of a family or had reached the age of 21; a citizen of the United States or one who filed declaration of intent to come a citizen, could enter a claim for 160 acres of public land. A nominal filing fee of a few dollars was the only cash outlay required. After five years residence on the land and meeting certain condiregarding cultivation, the settler became owner of the land.

Beatrice, Nebraska, was chosen for the first day sale because it is the site of the Homestead National Monument, authorized by Congress in 1936. The Monument is maina natural museum of tained as the primitive American prairie and midwestern woodland and as a

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museum of artifacts and documents pertaining to homesteading

A modern Visitors' Center, with A motern visitors center, wan a display shed to house historic examples of agricultural machinery, has been provided by "Mission 66", a program of the National Park Construction of the National Park Constructio tional Park Service intended to develop the possessions of the American people under its care for the wisest possible use as well as maximum enjoyment and protection of the scenic, scientific, wilderness, and historic resources.

The new Visitors' Center will be dedicated on June 10, 1962.

Postmaster General J. Edward Day, speaking at the 50th Anniversary Luncheon of the Girl Scouts of America, announced that the Post Office Department will issue a commemorative stamp honoring the Girl Scouts on their 50th birthday.

The preliminary sketch of the stamp design was shown to Scouting leaders and their guests, including the Vice President and Mrs. Johnson, at the luncheon held in the Senate Office Building on March 12, 1962. The design is by Ward Brackett, a member of the Westport Artists, and shows a Senior Girl Scout in uniform, with an American Flag in the ground.

In announcing the stamp, Mr. Day said, Day said, "It will serve to re awake and re-inforce in the mil lions of Americans who will use and see it an appreciation great service American Girl Scouts have given to their community, their country, and the world.

The stamp, printed in red, will be issued on July 24, 1962, during the Girl Scout Roundup, to be held July 19-29 at Button Bay, Vermont, twenty-five miles southwest of Burlington

The U.S. Post Office Department has announced a commemorative stamp to mark the 25th anniversary of the National Apprenticeship Act and to honor the Na-tional Apprenticeship Training Program as the Craftsmanship." The "Nucleus The stamp will also pay tribute to the Departof Labor, since 1962 marks ment the 25th anniversary of the establishment of its Bureau of Apprenticeship and Training.

The Department said the time and place of issue of the multicolored commemorative stamp will be announced later. The stamp was approved and recommended to the Postmaster General by the Citizens' Stamp Advisory Commitits recent Chicago meeting. Six lighted candles symbolize the six million who perished. The .12 agorot value shows a symbolic flame, composed of the Hebrew words "Shema Yisrael" (Hear Ye Israel). The .12 agorot "Heroes and Martyrs" stamp was printed by photogravure at the Governent Printers, Hakirya, Tel Aviv The .55 issue was printed by photolithography at Messrs. Lew-in-Epstein Ltd., Bat Yam, both on unwatermarket. unwatermarked paper.

Thoroughly disgruntled with every day monotony of punching a clock and like an automation, I decided there and then to at least en joy my working day, and decided to become a coin and stamp dealer. It was then, for the very first time that I experienced absolute poverty. My first shop was in a deso-late impoverished cheap rental area, located in the heart of the "Cabbage Town" belt, just 3 blocks from the poor house, and one block from three thriving beverage ho-My initial cash outlay \$300.00 was soon spent on the months rent, paint, paper and book to fill empty shelves.

It was fully 4 months before made \$5.00 wages per week, and this was one time in my life I was lean and quick. Our area consisted completely of second hand, third and broken biscuit dealers

With only Charlton, Carmichael, Ritter and Lowe dealing in To-ronto, I was almost one of the local pioneers, with a lot more nerve than brains, collectors were few material was cheap, and customers scarce. The best material was a problem to place. We started a mail order to stay alive, rather than to sell overstocked material. I actually needed buyers acro Canada and the States as loc trade would not pay cigarette e

A few of the more hardy customers, braved the rough district and visited our store, visitors who had bought and sold through the were shocked to find any thing from bear traps to fur coats snow shoes to kegs of old used nails in stock. If it didn't have class is certainly reeked of atmos phere. The coins were in a small department at the front of the shop. After two years, I was draw ing a reasonable wage, when had our first night burglary, 50% of the stock was stolen and never recovered. It was a crying shame, we could never afford insurance, let alone a safe or strong box. With hours of overtime, we managed to get back on our feet, to augment the interest we induced John Shepherd and Ken Forbes to go into business. International Coin was pulled into the Coin business this year, and I submitted their first sale to the "Numismatic consisting of Indian cents of the U.S.

We had another night robbery, almost complete loss of stock. So I took a partner to be able to remain in business. Again, no insurance or any form of protection. We moved to our present location, and started all over again.

Several C.N.A. Conventions later, with numerous coin clubs springing up and mushrooming everywhere, thousands of new and avid collectors brought new interest to the hobby, and almost over-night it spread like gold fever all through the United States and coast to coast in Canada. Lehmann of the Philatelic Agency for Malaria Eradication Postage Stamps, members of the Citizens Stamp Advisory Committee and other dignitaries.

"For centuries, malaria has outranked warfare as a source of human suffering. Over the past generation it has killed millions human beings, and sapped human beings, and sapped the strength of hundreds of millions more. It continues to be a heavy drag on man's efforts to advance his agriculture and industry.

I am proud of the part which the laria in our own country. through the Agency for International Development, we are devot-ing our technical skills and finansources to this greater effort. Worldwide technical co-operation on this scale is very new in man's history. It holds great promise for the future.

In response to the invitation of ne World Health Organization, the United States and some eighty other countries this year are honoring our shared fight against malaria with commemorative postage stamps.

Mercator, who lived in the 16th century, was a devoted student of Mathematics and Astronomy. A work on "cursive" (a style of writing) and a globe (1541) were followed nap of the Heavens with the constellations. Mercator also undertook making of a collection of maps of the whole world in book form, and when he died in 1594, the collection consisted of 107 completed maps. The name "Atlas", legendary king of Mauretania, is still associated with this collection of maps.

Sale of "PROJECT MERCURY" Covers Terminated

The U.S. Post Office Department has announced the termination date on the unusual stamp sale which began on February 20 with the successful completion of the orbital flight of Colonel John Glenn.

The 4-cent Project Mercury first day "covers"—stamped envelopes bearing the 3:30 p.m., February 20, Cape Canaveral, Florida postmark will be withdrawn from sale the Philatelic Sales Agency at the close of business June 9, 1962.

In less than four months approximately 3 million of the covers bearing the Project Mercury stamp will have been sold, breaking all ecords. A total of 310 million of the stamps have been printed to meet the unprecedented public demand throughout the country. Normal orders for commemorative stamps average 120 million. Seldom are more than 500 thousand of the covers sold.

In summarizing the stamp proin summarizing the stamp project, the Department reported that 11 million of the stamps were sold on February 20 in the 300 post offices which had the stamp available immediately following the orbital flight. On February 21 the initial printing order of 120 million was increased to 220 million as a result of public demand which saw sales of the stamp top 50 million by the end of the first week.

Within three weeks, a third order for an additional 90 million had to be placed in response to orders from post offices around the country.

The United States Information Agency has distributed over 200 thousand of the covers bearing the Project Mercury stamp in countries overseas in answer to requests made to American embassies and USIS offices.

COINS ON STAMPS

cies have been an exemplary model of conservatism, exceptional design and attractiveness, has turned to the field of historical numismatics for its 1962 "Pro Patria" set, issued on June 1. They are the first of a new series of stamps to be annually issued under the title of "Fine and useful arts.'

The stamps, printed in multicolor by Courvoisier-Helio, S.A., represent the most interesting coins used by the three cantons which comprised the original Swiss Confederation, created on Aug. 1291. They w Celestino Piatti. were designed



The first, a 10+10 centime, green, blue and gray, depicts a silver half-thaler, struck in 1732, and used in Obwalden, a division of Unterwalden. Its reverse (not shown on the stamp) has the in-scription, "1731-Moneta Reip(ublic) Subglyvania" along with an oval shield of the canton. The obverse has "Nicolaus de Flue-Helv(etia)/ Cath. Cayer" surrounding a kneeling figure of the patriot saint.

St. Nicholas, who was beatified in 1669, and declared a saint by Pope Pius XII, in 1947, was born as Niklaus Loewenbrugger. Though he was happily married for twenty-five years, he left his family to live the rugged life of a hermit following what he describ-ed as "divine inspiration". Retreating to a ravine in the Alpine Valley of Melcha, he devoted his remaining years to prayer and meditation. Dignitaries from all neutation. Dignitaries from an over Europe, having heard of his gifts of prophecy and wisdom, flocked to him for advice, counsel and inspiration. The Swiss Confederation was small, weak and subjected to invasions from abroad, and aviil triffs at heave In 180 and civil strife at home. In 1480, when war seemed imminent, he resolved those difficulties which threatened bloodshed, and suggestwhich threatened bloodshed, and suggested ways whereby civil war could be
averted. Heeding his admonition,
the Swiss settled internal differences, unified against their
common foreign foes and solidified
their union to form what today is
the world's oldest republic. Niklaus has appeared on several Swiss stamps ever since 1929.



The 20 + 10c, red, yellow and gray, shows the obverse of a gold ducat of Schwyz. The design shows St. Martin of Tours, who was revered throughout central Europe. The maternal uncle of St. Patrick, he was a cavalryman of the Roman Legion when he was baptized to Christianity and began a life of brotherly love. On one occasion, while riding through the Gallic countryside, he encountered a group of naked beggars. Without hesitation, he cut his garments to clothe these unfortunates. It is this act that is shown on the coin,

Switzerland, whose stamp poli-es have been an exemplary nations that have honored him. The reverse of this undated gold-piece portrays the Madonna with standing on a half-moon, as the Virgin of the Immaculate Con-ception. While the coin has no date is it known to have been used before 1653.



The 30+10c, orange, bronze and gray, depicts a "Steer Head" batzen, struck by Uri, in 1659. It features a steer head—the emblem of the canton—surrounded by the Latin, "Urantensis Moneta Deo." The "batzen" is a coin of small denomination, introduced in 1499 (and equivalent to 10 centimes or rappen) and widely used through-out the Swiss confederation of the time, as well as through southern Germany. The reverse of this coin features a double eagle surrounded by "Soli Deo Gloria 69."



50+10c, blue, lilac and gray, which reproduces the "key" emblem of reproduces the key chlores the canton as shown on the obverse of another batzen of the period, surrounded by "Undervaldens surrounded by "Undervaldens Moneta Deo." The arms of the two sections of original Unterwalden both have a key: Nidwalden having a double keyward; Obwalden, a single one facing left. Actually the coin shown is a pat-tern or trial strike.

In addition to these heliogravure roins" stamps, the set, whose premium will be given to a fund for the care and welfare of the old and infirm (and other charitant). ties), includes a 5+5c, ultramarine value which was recess-engraved by Karl Bickel. It portrays Jean Jacques Rousseau, in an Armenian cap after a portrait by Allan Ram-say and captures the character of the Geneva philosopher-novelist-orator, the 250th birth of which the stamp commemorates

The stamp was printed by the Postal Printing Office in Bern under the supervision of Hans E. Gaudard.

Unlike many European countries, which seize almost any opportunity to produce semi-postal stamps for a variety of funds (including the purchase of cigarettes for "indigent intellectuals") Switzerland has maintained a policy of the absolute minimum. In 1913, it introduced the extremely popular "Pro Juventute" series for sale at the Christmas season for the benefit of mas season for the benefit of child-caring institutions. On June 15, 1938, Switzerland began is-suing "Bundesfeier" stamps to mark the August First day on which the nation was formed through the "Rutli Schwur" as depicted on the 3-franc stamp of 1938, and the 50c, of 1941. This annual "Bundesfeiertag" series continued to raise funds for charitable funds, but with the 1952 set, its name was changed to "Pro

NEW AUSTRALIAN COMMEMORATIVE

The Postmaster-General, Mr. C. W. Davidson, has announced that a 5d. postage stamp commemorating the centenary of the crossing of 5d. postage south to centenary of the crossing of the centenary of the crossing of Australia from south to north by John McDouall Stuart will be issued at all post offices on Wednesday, 25th July, 1962, and will remain on sale for approximately three weeks. The new stamp, cinculake in color, will be of the son-lake in color, will be of the son-take in coor, will be of the same size as those of the current flora series and will portray the explorer. The design was the work Mr. Walter Jardine of Killara N.S.W.

Mr. Davidson added that 25th July was chosen as the date of issue of the stamp because on that date, exactly 100 years earlier, Stuart celebrated his successful crossing of the continent by hoist. ing a Union Jack on the shore of the Indian Ocean.

NORFOLK ISLANDS

The Department of Territories has advised that two new stamps of 6d. and 1/- denominations will be issued by the Norfolk Island Post Office this year. Both portray fish of Norfolk Island waters, and are being printed in three-colour photogravure by Harrison and Sons, Ltd., London.

The 6d. stamp will be issued on 16th July, 1962. It will show the fish known locally as "Tweed Trousers"; however, the name appearing on the stamp is the scientific classification "Atypichthys Latus". The 1/- stamps will feature a fish known to Norfolk fishermen as "Po'ov", and will be issued on 17th September, 1982. The stamps will become part of the definitive series, replacing similar denominations in the 1947 Ball Bay design. In Australia, the stamps will be available in mint condition only at philatelic sales sections of the Postmaster-General's Department.

A first day cover service will be provided for each stamp by the Norfolk Island Post Office. Cost of first day covers will be 1/- in the case of the 6d. stamp and 1/6d. for the 1/- issue. Collectors who provide their own covers will be charged a service fee of 3d. in addition to the cost of the stamp. All orders for first day covers, accompanied by remittances, should be addressed to the Postmaster, Norfolk Island.

NEW ZEALAND

To commemorate the centenary of the first New Zealand telegraph circuit, a special set of stamps was due for release during the end of

May, 1962.
Denominations were 3d (feature against 3 ing an early Morse Key against a background of Port Hills, Lyttleton) and 8d (featuring a modern teleprinter).

The 3d denominations shows the Morse Key and operator's hand in brown and the background in green. In the 8d denomination, the teleprinter is grey with the background and tapes in red.

They were printed in photogravure by Messrs. Harrison and Sons Limited, London, in sheets of 120, size 21 and 27 a

120, size 21 x 37 mm.

They will be withdrawn from sale on 29th September, 1962, unless supplies are exhausted earlier (G.P.O. Wellington).

A reminder of the disastrous in-A reminder of the disastrous in-flation in Germany following World War I is the world's largest denomination coin, the Billion Mark. This silver coin was issued in 1923 along with many other coins of various denominations and metals. Most of the paper money had become worthless and issues were then made in velvet, silk and

linen. The inflation resulted from an over issue of paper money compared to the amount of gold held in reserve. At the outbreak of World War I,

quate. However, during the war much of the gold was used in buy-ing supplies from abroad, and at the same time the issue of paper money was increased many times. This left very little gold backing for the notes.

The issuing of paper money was greatly accelerated following the war and this excess expressed itself in the form of the inflation and prices rose rapidly. A planned inflation was intended to help meet war reparation payments but once inflation begins, it is difficult to stop and little did the planners realize what the outcome would be. Newfoundland joined the federation in 1949; however, they issued private tokens and have issued private tokens and nave issued decimal coinage for ninety-seven years. In 1865 they issued a cent, 5 cent silver, 10 cent and 20 cent silver. The first 50 cent silver was not issued until 1870.

The combined mint issue of 1865 totalled 500,000 coins, or roughly a little better than a third of our small cent issue for 1961. The face value for the first year totalled \$9,200.00.

The next issue appeared in 1870. That year 5 cent, 10 cent, 20 cent and for the first time, 50 cent pieces were issued. Total issue was 170,000 coins, or \$2,800.00 in cash. Cents were not issued that year; it was apparent the issue of 1865 was sufficient.

In the years to follow most of the issues were intermittent, with every issue, by today's standard, very small, as far as the numismatist is concerned. If one were to study with patience the Mint Reports of Nev vfoundland decimal coinage, it will become apparent that fewer than 2,041 numismatists will ever complete the decimals of Newfoundland. Less than 16,000 collectors can ever hope to complete the 5 cent silver collection. The dime collection will never be complete for more than 7 to 8 thousand collectors, and from every aspect this applies to the entire decimal issue.

The ultimate in a complete series

is naturally the gold \$2.00 coin. Less than 2,500 can ever hope to complete the set of 8 listed varieties. There are patterns to complete and add to this set, which are beyond the reach of the average collector. If by chance an uncirculated set were offered for sale, it would realise between \$1,150.00 - \$1,250.00. This sounds very high in view of the fact that the entire gold set represents \$16.00 in face value and perhaps \$36.00 in scrap gold.

When you take into consideration the number of collectors of Newfoundland decimal coins, will realise that prices quoted in standard Canadian catalogues are within reach and very reasonable. However, in a few years even the w selling common date, or so-called common date 5 cent silvers, that can be purchased for cents or a dollar, will be sidered scarce coins.

Newfoundland was established silver, you will notice that overall Newfoundland was established silver, you will notice that overall mintings from 1938 to 1947 as a country, and noted in the average out to 250,000 pieces per year. Compare this to the 201,921 minting of the 1925 Canada 5 cent nickel. The Newfoundland 5 cent can be bought for 50¢ and 1925 Canada nickel averages \$20.00 in very good condition at this time.

Many of these common dated Newfoundland 5 cent pieces are in very fine or better condition. Most dealers have not begun to grade them and you will likely wind up with a far better than average grade at a low price.

The Newfoundland decimals are a challenge to any numismatist because of their low minting. It is surprising to notice the number of scarce pieces that are in excellent state of preservation.

The two Newfoundland Banks failed in 1894, with losses to de-positors and note holders. This created a certain amount of dis trust and for many years silver in all denominations has been accumulated and hoarded away all through the east coast. From time to time choice specimens come to light, and all choice material is in exceptional demand.

As an active dealer, I find that there has been very little demand on Newfoundland for the past 5 years. However, the year 1961 created a mild speculation on the small cents and the better early dates. I would hazard a guess that the mint reports for the coinage of Newfoundland is in error. The 5 cent of 1942 is scarcer than the 1947C mint. The 1880 oval "O" is a very rare and most desirable item, worth double current catalogue figures. The 1873H Nfld 5 cent is as scarce as the 1893 round top "3" 10 cent piece of Canada. The 1946C 5 cent is today a modern rarity destined to reach fabulous figures in a few years.

I can well remember the time I bought 10 brilliant uncirculated specimens in the east coast in 1958. One firm refused them because the price was \$35.00 wholesale and \$50.00 retail. I sold 8 to two other dealers and mailed the remaining two coins to col-lectors who did not have the foresight to see the rarity that these two dealers understood. Today these speciments will bring \$200.00 each.

I would strongly advise the collector to begin his collection of this beautiful coinage while there is still a chance at reasonable figures. It is only a matter of time, until the speculator will corner a holding on some of these dates and you will be paying much more than present values. There is hardly a coin that compares with the design and beauty of the early Nfld. Victorian half dollars in very George VI series of the 5 cent writing on the wall.

postmark, or even the sloganized There are many postmarks for metered mail!

The continual appearance of these cancellations is proof enough that they draw attention. They'd have been discarded long, long ago if they did not put across messages.

This columnist has two amples, the first a postmark from the state of Maryland, U.S.A., which reads in three lines: "Keep Maryland Beautiful." It was mailed this year.

My other example is from New York City's Yeshiva University, a metered mail slogan, in two parts. There is the inscription, in three lines: "Serving the Nation and the Jewish Community." And beside it, a circular marking, "75th Anniversary" in the circle, the university's name around the outside and the dates, "1886-1961."

In other words, the philatelist today cannot afford to overlook the postmark, or neglect the metered mail markings! They show many events not marked by our stamps, and can enhance an album, making it more of a storytelling book!

Thus it is not necessarily so example, that are historical and valuable; and many times a postal marking will add to the value of a stamp. Thus this columnist an advocate of the "used stamp" as telling an additional story, showing that the stamp has done a service, and, often, proving of greater value.

While many collectors "cut square" the postmarks (really oblongs), it is best to preserve a full envelope when it comes to metered mail, especially if the owner or business name is im-printed on the upper left as often

While the postmark of course is utilized by the government, the metered mail is not essentially so; and thus with private markings, we have many events and dates chronicled. Adding these to our albums, and then making brief notations where essential to point out highlights or explain the slogans, makes for an attractive album that becomes a history text of value. So, again, I say: don't under-estimate the value or the power of a slogan postmark or a sloganized metered mail marking!

the first released by the United States to coincide with a significant event, without previous notice.

The Project Mercury stamp was produced and distributed secretly in anticipation of the Glenn flight through the cooperation of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the Post Office Department.

The original order for one million of the souvenir covers was tripled in response to requests received by the Philatelic Agency from all parts of the world. The unusual procedure of the Department producing and servicing such covers was carried out as a result of the Department's policy of avoiding, as far as pos sible, the creation of artificial philatelic value which undoubtedly would have occurred, in the opin-ion of experts, if this precaution had not been taken.

COIN COLLECTING FOR THE BEGINNERS

Coin collecting is the fastest growing hobby in the world. The reason for this is the publicity of certain rare coins found, forma-tion of so many coin clubs and the general good times the world is in. Even in some of the countries, where money is still scarce for a hobby, coin collecting has still in-creased. I cannot think of any where the rewards are great. Very little money is required to assemble a very nice collection of coins.

With so many different coins in circulation today both in the U.S. and Canada it is often hard to decide what to collect. But the bedecide what to collect. But the be-ginner usually starts out with cents and before he knows it he starts nickels and then dimes and sooner than later he is collecting all of the current series of coins

How to start a collection? Very simple. Look in the change you have in your pocket or purse and you have started. Albums can be obtained for all the current series of coins from any dealer of coins.

A book of coins should be obtained such as the Standard catalogue of Canadian coins tokens and paer money or guide book of Canadian coin paper money and tokens.

As your collection grows you ill want more books on coins of which there are many on the mar-ket today. The more knowledge you have about coins the more you will enjoy the hobby. Try to find a coin club to join. This will much to your enjoyment of the hobby.

No doubt you have noticed many abbreviations used in describing coins such as Unc, EF, F, VG, G and others too numerous to mention. The ones stated are grading of coins and in order are uncir culated, extra fine, fine, very good, and good. Of course the uncirculated coin is the perfect coin and good is the least desirable. Quite often you will see a coin described as G to VG. Then the coin is not quite VG but better than G. Only time and much reading will you be-come familiar with all the terms used in the hobby.

Many collectors in the U.S. are

now collecting Canadian which has increased the prices for the harder to find coins. Until the past couple of years a set of small cents could be bought for as little as \$3.00 now this is less than the price of a 1922 cent. But it is still possible to find a complete set of any series of coins in a short time little patience and sorting through lots of coins.

Many collectors only collect one coin of each design for a type set. Still others collect variety coins, such as the coins with a maple leaf or with dots. On the 1947 half dol-lar there are 4 varieties alone. This makes for a very interesting collec-Still others collect proof like coins issued by the mint for collectors or U.S. proof sets which are made for collectors. There is so many different types of collections that all could never be mentioned. You are only stopped by your own

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U.S. STAMP HONOURS SENATOR

H. W. Brawley, Acting Post-master General, has announced that the U.S. Post Office Department will issue a commemorative stamp honoring the late Senator Brien McMahon on July 28, 1962, to be placed on first day sale in Norwalk, Connecticut, Senator McMahon's birthplace.

In announcing the stamp Acting Postmaster General Brawley said "Senator McMahon's recognition of the need for civilian development of the many aspects of atomic energy after World War II atomic energy after world war led him to draft and secure passage through the Congress of the Atomic Energy Act, which in fifteen years has required only minor changes. He was the first Chair-man of the Joint Congressional Committee on Atomic Energy, and can, with justification, be called the father of our national nuclear policy."

James O'Brien McMahon was born in Norwalk, Connecticut on October 6, 1903. He graduated from Fordham University in 1924, and from the law school of Yale University in 1927. He served as Special Assistant to the Attorney General of the United States from General of the United States from 1933 to 1935, and as Assistant Attorney General of the United States in charge of the Department of Justice Criminal Division from 1935 to 1939. He was elected to the Senate from Caracteristic in 1944 and realected Connecticut in 1944 and re-elected 1950, serving from January 3, in 1945 until his death in Washington, D.C., July 28, 1952.

These gifts by the Intendant form the subject of the new stamp An excerpt from the writings of a young officer of Talon's time reads: "... the governor-general bestowed upon the married couple a bull, a cow, a hog, a sow, a coc a hen, two barrels of salt meat and eleven crowns" and each is represented in the design of the stamp.

Talon accomplished a great deal in establishing a sound economy.
In order to increase the resources of the country, he imported horses and sheep from France and and sheep from France and divided these among farmers. He encouraged animal husbandry and established small industries and a ship building yard on the St. Charles River. He literally re-created the colony on a semi-economic basis before returning to France in 1668.

It was during Talon's tenure that the new country went through an extraordinary expansion. In the north, Father Albane claimed James Bay; in the west Saint-Lusson gathered at Sault Ste-Marie the representatives fourteen Indian nations bringing them under the jurisdiction of France. Medals and Medallions go back into history as far as coinage itself, into history as far as confage itself, in fact in some instances even further, however, although the ancient Greeks and Romans used them, it was not until the 15th Century that they evolved into the works of art that so many of them were.

The great Italian Master, Antonio Pisano, may be granted the title of the Father of the Medal Craftsman, and it was he above any other, whose magnificent artistry influenced those who fol-lowed him. Specimens of his work still exist today in many national museums, some of his most notable reasures being in the British

The earliest Medals served to record qualities and achievements both real and imaginary, of various occasions, and was seized upon by the ruling powers of the times, as a means of reward, propaganda, or even a means to rid themselves of enemies or encumbrances; for example, one of the greatest families of schemers and plunderers of the period, the Medicis, used them, as well as the Borgias, who employed them as a pleasant means of dispatching their enemies, by means of poison in the links suspended the medal around the neck, which after a while seeped into the pores of the skin and pro-ceeded to kill the unfortunate to kill the unfortunate recipient.

and sculptors of the day, including names like Cellini, Michelangelo, and even the great Di Vinchi had at one time or other been commissioned to make a medallion or nedal for some great lord or favoured personage.

It was not long then before men began to use the medal for other purposes than purely ornamental as this was the start of the period when men were beginning to shed their Armour, and at the time, when in battle, a soldier would know friend from foe by means of the Crest, or other distinguishing marks painted, or emblazoned on the equipment of the other people around him. around him, and so with the removal of the Armour, the recognition marks went too, but was replaced by a badge or Medal which was worn in a prominent position; in the early days the right arm seemed to be the most popular.

These badges were, of course required in considerable quantities, were quite crudely made in a base metal. It naturally followed that the leaders and captains would not be satisfied with so common a device, and so they would wear one of far greater finish and made in a precious metal, and were quite often mounted with ewels. From these then has descended the Present day medal, while from the one has come the Regiental badge of today.

I think that a moment could be devoted at this point to try and differentiate between Medals and Medallions. It appears to be most generally accepted that when one talks of a Medal he refers to a Military or Civil award that is followed by the Peninsular Gold attached by means of a suspender Cross; once again the common

Another point to note is the mention of Bars and Clasps, I think that once again you will find that a Bar is a metal plate either sewn or otherwise fastened to the Medal ribbon, while a clasp is attached to the medal proper. Actually they are both accepted as is in most

To return to our story, it did not take long for the War Lords of Europe to realise that in the granting of medals they had discovered a novel and much cheaper way of encouraging their men to greater effort. After all, previously to the appearance of the Medal the only way to reward notable deeds was with money, or deeds of land. Which, if you were on the winning side, was not too much of a problem, as all you did was to take it from the people you had just beaten, but was a totally different thing when you were on the losing side, and so, as I have said, it did ont take too long for these gentry to get into the Medal granting theme, and soon all the local heroes were strutting about in medals of all shapes and sizes, and worn in Dignitaries of the period, as well all manner of ways, on a chain, as to record notable events and about the neck, sewn to a doublet, or in the cap. In this short resume I shall try to stick pretty closely to the Medal story as it affected the British Empire, naturally, I shall be unable to give a complete medal by medal story, but will attempt to give just the highlights.

England in those for back days, like today, was very cautious in regard to the granting of medals, and it was not until the defeat of the Spanish Armada that the first actual medal was given, and then of course, to Admirals and Gentlemen of Note. There were three types of this medal issued, all differing, except in shape. James the 1st issued many fine pieces when he ascended throne, once again oval in be. The first really known shape. The first really known Medal that I have been able to find, awarded for military valour, was presented to Sir Robert Welch, who was awarded it in 1642 from Charles I, for saving a standard at the battle of Edgehill. These were followed by similar medals struck by Kings, and Parliament, more or less in the manner and shape, until the times of the Peninsular Wars.

It must be stated that the Honorable East India Company possibly did more to influence the British Government in granting of medals than any other force; they themselves, issued medals to the Native soldiers under their command freely, from 1778-1825, and in fact, from 1825 to 1849 they paid for the Indian Medals granted by Queen Victoria's Government, and so for the First of the British medals proper, we must start with the Peninsular Circular Medal. This was a medal to be awarded to Officers who actually faced the enemy; these medals were circular and in two sizes, the larger one was for General officers and about 2" across, while the smaller ones were issued to commanding officers of Corps, not below the rank of Lieutenant Colonel. The large medal

It was about this time that a great unrest started to manifest itself in the newspapers and in Parliament, regarding the granting of medals to the common soldier and the more junior officers, and many a gallant field officer did his utmost to get recognition for the troops under his command, while an equally strong force was striving its utmost to prevent it; strangely enough this group was by none other than the noble Duke of Wellington, who it appears, after all the fighting was done, had nothing but contempt and almost hatred for the men who had served him so well. This situation existed for quite a while until the Duke of Richmond obtained the sympathies of the Queen, who entered the fray, and the battle was won, although the Duke of Wellington surrendered most unwillingly, and so in 1848 the Military General Service Medal was struck, and was issued for service between 1795-1814. The medal itself was struck in silver, having on the Obverse side the Wyon head of the young Queen, on the reverse is the Queen crowning a kneeling Wellington with laurel leaves and having in the exergue "1793-1814" and having 29 bars, commemorating bygone battles.

The next medal of consequence to be struck (as far as the common soldier was concerned) was the Waterloo medal, which was issued on the order of the Prince Regent, this being the first medal that was issued to all ranks of the Victorious army, and being of the same type of metal. It was received very well by all, except the noble Iron Duke, who once again bitterly objected to having to wear the same medal as a common soldier.

It seems a tragic thing, that after waiting so long for recogni-tion, and the final granting of the M.G.M., that a greater number of the people to whom it was awarded never lived to receive it, having died in wars, or of old age by the time it was finally issued.

In 1948 a companion medal to the Military General Service Medal was struck. This was the Naval General Service Medal, and was issued to honour the sailors for the fighting between 1793-1840. This medal was issued with the amazing amount of 230 Bars for engage-ments fought in the periods covered by the medal. Once again, by the time the Medal was issued, a great number of the intended recipients were dead, and so, from this time on, the issuance of medals was firmly set in its ways. War followed war, skirmish after skirmish, and each recognised on its own, by the issuing of a Medal or bar, until the present time.

Of course, this is just the barest glimpse of the story of Medals, but sufficient, I hope, to allow you just a quick look at the Reverse side of the Numismatic Coin, and who knows, perhaps you, like many others, may be carried away with the magnificent records of what has been, and what has yet to be, and become one of that ever growing number of Medal Collectors.

The previously issued two stamps were released. issued two stamps were released on March 23 in cooperation with a resolution passed by the World Meteorological Organization (a United Nations Affiliate). China's third stamp of the series will be issued to coincide with "Pre-cautions Against Typhoon Week," which will be held in Taiwan which will be held in Taiwan.

The central design of the new commemorative shows a route map of Typhoon Pamela which swept over Taiwan in September, 1961. The purpose of this issue is to make the public aware of the precautions it can take against an unleashed typhoon. In the right foreground of the stamp a weather observatory is shown; above it is the symbol of the World Meteorological Organization, a variation of the United Nations emblem.

The new 1.00 denomination stamp, printed by Intaglio process, will complete this year's series which consists of 0.80 and 2.00

DENMARK

To mark the 50th anniversary of the maiden voyage of the SELAN-DIA, the first ocean-going motor vessel in the world, the Danish Post Office will issue a special 60 ore stamp, in blue, on 14th June, 1962.

The design, by R. Nelleman, engraved by Czeslaw Slania, shows a view of the ship and a cross-section through the engine.

The first troop of 12 girls was established by Juliette Gordon Low in Savannah Ga., March 12, 1912. Today the movement totals more than three

In announcing the commemora In announcing the commentara-tive stamp last Spring, Postmaster General Day said: "It will serve to re-awaken and re-inforce in the millions of Americans who will use millions of Americans who will take and see it an appreciation of the great service American Girl Scouts have given to their community, their country, and the world."

The Girl Scout stamp will be

first placed on sale July 24 at Burlington, Vt., 25 miles northeast of Button Bay. The circular portion of the first day cancellations will read "BURLINGTON, VERMONT 9:00 A.M., JULY 24, 1962," with "BUTTON BAY STATION FIRST DAY OF ISSUE" in the bars.

Each envelope must be marked, in pencil, in the upper right corner indicating the number of stamps to affixed (singles, pairs, blocks, etc.). Requests for first day covers affixed blocks. should not be sent to the Philatelic Sales Agency, Washington, D.C.

An enclosure of medium weight should be placed in each envelope and the flap either turned in or sealed. The outside envelope to the Postmaster should be clearly mark-ed "First Day Covers Girl Scout

Collectors are reminded that orders for first day covers must not include requests for uncanceled Cover requests must stamps. postmarked not later than July 24,

SALES FIGURES

There were 436,681 first day covers cancelled when the 4-cent Louisiana Statehood commemorative was placed on sale at New Orleans, Louisiana, on April 30, 1962. There were 701,432 stamps sold that day with a value of \$28,057.28.

When the 4-cent Homestead Act commemorative stamp was placed on sale at Beatrice, Nebraska, on May 20, 1962, a total of 487,450 first day covers were cancelled. In all, 770,792 stamps were sold that day, with a value of \$30,831.68.

FIRST DAY COVERS

The U.S. Post Office Department has announced that while it is desirable for collectors to submit first day cover requests at least 3

weeks in advance of the date of release of a new stamp, there are in-stances when the notice does not reach collectors in sufficient time for them to comply with the fiveday-in-advance regulation because of the lapse of time between Post Office Department releases and the time the information appears in the philatelic press.

Therefore, the policy of requiring all first day cover requests to be postmarked five days in advance of the first day sale of a new stamp has been modified to permit collectors to send orders to the first day office up to the date of release of the new issue.

FIRST UNITED STATES REVENUE COMMEMORATIVE

The first commemorative documentary revenue stamp ever issued by the U.S. government went on sale the first of July when the Internal Persons Samis worked.

The first commemorative documents have been been been been documentary revenue stamps were first used in 1862.

During the U.S. Civil War period, revenue stamps blossomed Internal Revenue Service marked its one hundredth birthday.

This commemorative documentary stamp is in a 10c denomination and replaces the previous 10c issue used on bonds, deeds, debentures and other legal documents. It cannot be used for mailing purposes.

Pictured on the commemorative stamp is a steel engraving of the Internal Revenue headquarters building in Washington, D.C. This building, completed in 1930, was the first in what is now known as the Federal Triangle between Con-stitution and Pennsylvania Ave-

The commemorative stamp is 0.84 by 1.44 inches in dimension, arranged horizontally, and was printed on the Giori presses in blue and green on white paper. It was designed by Charles R. Chickering and Victor S. McCloskey, Jr. of the Bureau of Printing and Engraving.

Stamp taxes as a revenue measure began in 1797. A common form of these early stamps was an embossed design which was applied in a manner similar to the notary public seal today. Ad-

period, revenue stamps blossomed out in a rainbow of color and design effects. Besides stamps for various denominations and values. there were also special stamps for specific documents and products which came under the stamp tax

Contributing to the variety of revenue stamps was the discount offered to manufacturers who made up their own dies for revenue stamps to be printed by In-ternal Revenue. This practice put advertising along with government

information on revenue stamps.

The peak in revenue stamp use was probably reached in 1939 when over 20 billion stamps were used on cigarette packages. That year, however, Congress passed a law which eliminated the stamp system on tobacco and some alcohol products. A semimonthly resystem similar to that used turn to collect most excise taxes replaced the stamps.

Last year, bottle stamps on alcoholic beverages took 1.6 billion of the total 1.7 billion revenue stams printed by the U.S. government.

The largest coin Convention held The largest coin Convention held in Canada for this year was that of the Quebec Numismatic Association, at the Queen Elizabeth Hotel in Montreal, May 25th, 26th and 27th. Close to 500 registered and an additional 1,000 or more visitors helped to make this first annual convention a very successful one.

from Newfoundland, British Columbia, California and many other provinces and states. There is no doubt that Canadian coins have reached international importance.

Contributing J. E. Charlton factors to the success of this convention were J. E. Charlton success of this convention were radio, television and newspaper publicity and the excellent facilities at the hotel. Separate rooms of adequate size were provided for displays, bourse and the auction. Displays included rare decimal coinage of Canada, Indian Wampun, early Canadian paper money, odd and unusual money, ancient coins, medals, etc.

Close to 50 dealers had bourse tables and a wide variety of numismatic material was available. The auction sale which I conducted, consisted of 52 lots and the feature was a Molson's Bank \$6 bill of 1871 which sold for \$1200.00.

We never discussed the variety, but purchas ed them on the quiet. A year later Charlton listed them, and they be came very popular. However there are 5 varieties not two as the catalogue suggests. You will find the o 9's in the same height as the '1' and '8' this being the rare var iety, and the small 9's being the common. However, there are three other varieties, one with a large and small 9, and another of interest 9 higher than the first and some-what smaller in size. This has nothing whatsoever to do with large cents, it is simply to suggest that there is plenty of room for study of this type with large Cents. There are numerous varieties yet unknown to the average collector, but constant research by a spe-cialist on this series will certainly be rewarding. Believe it or a dealer cannot know everything, and many a sharp eyed collector has it over the dealer like a tent, especially when he knows percenton the sleeper

About 80% of this series could be purchased with very little cost, and varieties could be purchased for as little as 25c to \$1.00 each to make an outstanding collection and study. This large Cent has become uninteresting to many who are blinded with the brilliant recent issues of 1937 to date. However it is only a matter of time, when the trend moves again to the right and reach the speculative stage, that you, the collector, will pay 10 times what you can buy them for now. My suggestion is to complete this collection while prices are low. Be a numismatist, not a pape

The stamps were issued on June 21st to coincide with the opening of the Accra Assembly, consisting of about 100 private citizens from various countries in Africa, Asia and Latin America, who met to discuss nuclear arms and disarmament. The meeting was opened by Ghana's President Nkrumah, and lasted for eight days.

"SILENT THIEF"

A booklet published by the Royal Canadian Mounted Police under title "Bad Paper" states that "e counterfeit bill is a silent thief".

The booklet is profusely illustrated and gives many useful hints on the detection of counterfeit notes and fraudulent cheques.

Illustrations reproduce portions of a genuine ten dollar bill and that of a counterfeit note of the same denomination, which show that the background of the genuine note is sharper and more distinct than that of the counterfeit note.

Another illustration is that of the Queen's portrait on a genuine bill and that found on a counterfeit bill. The booklet describes the lines composing the portraits and shows that on a genuine bill, the portrait is composed of a screen of fine lines which are clear, distinct and unbroken, so giving the portrait a lifelike quality, as against that of a counterfeit note which is usually blurred and indistinct.

SPINKS ROBBED OF \$60,000

the news report received from Lon-don, England, that the first break in at the famous SPINK AND SON LTD. \$60,000 rare coin robbery has been made.

Geoffrey Edward Hearn, 38, described as one of England's leading numismatists was arrested and committed for trail from Bow Street, on charges of receiving 213 gold and silver coins which had been stolen from the St. James Street Spinks firm.

Hearn pleaded not guilty and has reserved his defence. He was allowed bail on his own recognizance of 1000 pounds.

Scotland Yard has been investi-gating this famous rare coin theft since January 26th. The coins were taken from inside the Spinks building, but detectives were unable to find evidence of forced entry. A reward of \$5000 was offered by

The design consists of an identical outer frame, featuring various central motiffs symbolizing the principles and aims of the revolution. These are: Birth of the Revolution These are: Birth of the Revolution (brown and red); Proclamation of the Republic (blue and brown); Agrarian Reform Law (brown and blue); Bandung Conference (green and blue); Birth of the U.A.R. (green and red); Industrialization (brick red and brown); The Aswan High Dam (brick red and whyn). High Dam (brick red and plum); The Social Revolution (orange and dark brown). One million copies of each were prepared.

The 100-bill souvenir sheet features the emblems of the Republic, the Arab League, the Afro-Asian countries, the African countries and the United Nations. Colour is green and rose red. 100,000 perforated sheets, with a similar number of imperforated, were prepared.

A special 10-mill stamp was issued August 15th, 1962, to com-memorate Algerian Independence.

The design, by Ibrahim Tahtawi, features a map of Africa with the Algerian flag flying over the new-ly independent State. Printing was in photogravure by the Postal Authority Press, in sheets of 50, vertical format, size 25½ x 42 mm. Two million copies were released (Philatelic Office, Cairo).

Israel 1962 Festival Stamps



Israel will issue its annual Festival stamps on September 5, 1962 The three commemoratives, in celebration of the Jewish New Year 5723, convey Israel's hope for a peaceful future.

The theme of the stamps was taken from the book of the prophet Isaiah, who envisioned a Golden Age of Mankind—a time when universal justice, happiness and prosperity would flourish.

The 1962 Festival series was designed by Mrs. Cyla Menussy and Mrs. Chava Ornan, the winners of Israel's International Competition for the Heroes and Martyrs Commemoratives. They were printed on unwatermarked paper, in sheets of twenty, with five descriptive take adiacent to the bottom row, by the Government Printers' in Hakiva

adjacent to the bottom row, by the Government Printers' in Hakira, Tel Aviv. The stamps are comb perforate 14:13. (Ministry of Post, Jerusalem. World Wide Philatelic Agency).

CHINA--UNESCO

On August 28 the Republic of China issued three commemoratives to mark the 15th anniversary of the Chinese National Commission for UNESCO, according to information received from the World Wide Philatelic Agency. The Chinese Commission was formed in August 1947 for the purpose of assisting UNESCO with the execution of its educational, scientific tion of its educational, scientific and cultural programs in China.

The stamps consist of 0.80, 2.00 and 3.20 denominations. The 0.80 stamp, of vertical design, depicts an artist's palette, a laboratory flask, an industrial gear, a pair of compasses and a book, analysis of the compasses and a book an liask, an industrial gear, a pair of compasses and a book—symbols of UNESCO'S activities. The UNESCO emblem appears in the upper left portion of the design. The subject of the horizontal 2.00 stamp is an open book, with the UNESCO emblem centered above it. Two hemispheres, with the it. Two hemispheres, with the UNESCO emblem superimposed, form the subject of the 3.20 horizontal stamp. Printing was by the Intaglio Process.

ETHIOPIA

To commemorate the 10th anniversary of the federation of Eritrea with Ethiopia, a set of 5 stamps is due for release September 11th. This date is also New Years' Day in Ethiopia.

Denominations are 3c (Assab Hospital — voilet), 15c (School at Assab — blue), 20c (Church at Massawa — green), 50c (Mosque at Massawa — brown) and 60c (Assab Port — red). All the designs include a portrait of Emperor Haile Sellassie.

The stamps were engraved by Bradbury, Wilkinson and Co. Ltd. of England, in sheets of 100, horizontal format, in size 42 x 27 mm.

Nearly \$55 million have been spent during the past ten years on the construction of yearly a signerate schools have of roads, airports, schools, hes pitals, clinics, churches, mosques and other development projects. The climax was, of course, the The climax was, or course, the joint Canadian Numismatic and American Numismatic Associations' convention in Detroit, August 15th-18th. Over 2,700 regisgust 15th-18th. Over 2,700 registered for the four-day affair and there were representatives from all parts of Canada and the United States, plus a few from overseas. This was probably the world's largest numismatic gathering and everything was on a large scale, including displays, bourse, auction, etc. Rare and choice material brought good prices at the bourse tables and in the auction session. However, some resistance was experienced with speculative roll coins, such as the 1948 5¢ and 10¢ and the Tombac 5¢ pieces of 1942 and the Tombac 5¢ pieces of 1942 and 1943. It should be kept in mind that these coins have had sharp advances in price in recent months and this could be a time of con-solidation at slightly reduced prices. This is much more desir-able than a runaway market and sharp recession.

The coins most in demand at present are the Newfoundland small cents. These have risen in price and the Canadian proof-like mint sets are also in demand.



1837. The isolated post had to be self supporting and the arable land surrounding the new port provided

excellent crops.

Sparked by the Fraser River Gold Rush of 1858, the trading post exploded almost overnight into a lively frontier town. Since it was the only seaport in British Columbia, it became the outfitting center for wivers and adventurers seeking bia, it became the outfitting center for miners and adventurers seeking the goldfields. No sooner had the excitement of the first gold rush subsided than the Cariboo Rush broke, followed by the Klondike gold stampede of 1898. With such impetus, its growth was rapid and the community was incorporated as the City of Victoria in 1862, just 100 years ago. 100 years ago.
Today, Victoria has the largest

Today, Victoria has the largest drydock in Canada, the largest astrophysical telescope in the nation, the largest per capita tourist trade in Canada and the mildest winter climate of any Canadian city.

Of great interest in Victoria is the solid background of British customs and institutions which have survived more vigorously than in any other Canadian city. Victoria has kept as its basic charm the beauty and dignity of ivied walls, picturesque gardens and imposing

The finders were relatives of the man who was postmaster of the town in the late 1860's and 1870's. They were clearing out the books, ledgers and other contents of his old home, which was being sold. Someone opened a book carelessly and stamps fluttered out. From then on a careful search was made. but some stamps may have been

burned before the discovery.

A dealer from Indiana made a \$1000 purchase here, and decided to return home that day since he had return home that day since he had reached his purchasing limit. Around 11 p.m. the bourse tables were closed and dealers, hungry and tired after many hours of spirited bargaining, ate a meal and retired in anticipation of spothers. retired in anticipation of another day of dickering.

Thursday morning was quieter

than the opening day, but by noon the collectors and visitors started gathering and once again the tables were inundated with 'key coin' hunters, and once again the 'Part Time' dealers started their

vigil.
Friday at 7 p.m. started the Canadian Session of the auction. (Continued from page 1)

which was conducted by J. E. Charlton of Toronto, and who described it as being the most successful he had undertaken. Almost 1000 attended this session held at the English Room of the hotel. 3 p.m. saw the end of this auction where prices reached ceiling high, thus rendering recent coin cata-logues out of date. Some of the highlights of this auction are published in this issue.

It is estimated that over one million dollars' worth of coins, medals and bills were on display at Detroit, this consisted of many old and most interesting foreign coins and bills, gold coins and most fascinating the Cardinal Spellman Exhibit which won an award. The Spellman medals and decorations ere commented upon by Sister Mary Andrew, curator of the collection.

Saturday the closing day of the convention was more interesting than the previous three days. For on this day I observed that the 'Part Time' dealers were at their wits end, those who had not made a sale, were frantically offering coins and bills at ridiculous prices. Sets of Cdn. small cents were going for as low as \$15.00. Maple Leaf halves went for as low as \$8.00 a piece. By 2.30 p.m. the bourse tables were empty and most dealers were on their way home. Many registrants lingered at the bar where business cards were ex-changing hands and future transactions were being arranged.

By Sunday the hotel was empty of collectors and dealers, there were no medals in sight, for these had been returned to their boxes and were on their way home. I made my way towards Windsor and in 5 hours was home relating to my family the most enjoyable and most interesting convention I had ever attended.





The Second World War emphasized the necessity of a dependable highway link between east and west and it was obvious that Federal aid would be required to coordinate the route among the provinces, and to help meet the cost in those sections plate No. 1. BRITISH STAMP AUCTIONS

Bailey collection of Ceylon, dispersed by H. R. Harmer, Ltd.,

STAMP SALES

The Philatelic Sales Agency in Vashington, D.C., had total sales of \$2,424,035.00 for the fiscal year ading June 30, 1962. There were 305,705 orders filled, which included 185,000 for Project Mercury

When the 4-cent Girl Scouts commemorative stamp was placed on sale at Burlington, Vermont, on July 24, 1962, a total of 634,347 first day covers was canceled. In al, 1,009,097 stamps were sold that day with a value of \$40,363,88.

FAO announced it would sell stamps to the general public stamps to the general public through a nonprofit association set up under the auspices of the UN under the auspices. In order to gain the confidence of philatelicity, on July 28, 1962, when was first placed on sale. Memorial Stamp

As reported in our July 1962, issue, the United Nations Postal Administration will issue a commemorative stamp on September 17th, 1962, in a tribute to all those 17th, 1962, in a tribute to all those members of the World Organization who have lost their lives in the course of their official duties. The Memorial stamp is being issued on the first anniversary of the death of the late Secretary. the death of the late Secretary-General, Dag Hammerskjold, who was killed so tragically when a UN chartered plane crashed near Ndola Airport in Southern Rhodesia.

The price of upholding the purposes and principles of the UN Charter has proved to be costly in terms of human lives, and with the Memorial issue, the UNPA pays its respects to all those who have dedicated themselves to main taining international ecurity and lost their lives in doing so.

The new United Nations stamp will be printed by photogravure process in denomination of 5c and 15c. The 5c stamp will be dark blue on a light blue background and the 15c stamp will be dark blue on a grey-green background, printed by Courvoisier S.A., La Chaux-de-Fonds, Switzerland. The stamps will measure approximately mm. x 29 mm., perforation to perforation.



The United Nations Postal Ad-The United Nations Postal Administration have announced that a commemorative stamp will be issued on United Nations Day, 24 October, to honor the UN Opera-October, to honor the UN Opera-tion in the Congo. A stamp is issued each year on United Nations Day by the UN Postal Administration and this year's stamp will be in two denomina-stamp teents and 11 cents stamp will be in two der tions, 4 cents and 11 cents.

Acting Secretary - General Thant, speaking recently in London, said that it was hard to think don, said that it was hard to think of "a working alternative to the United Nations Operation in the Congo" and he listed some of the schievements which the Governschievements which the Govern-ment of the Congo and the United Nations have together made in the past two years.

The stamp, which was designed by George Hamori (Australia), depicts a map of the world show-ing, in particular, the outline of the Congo against the background of the African continent.

The new stamps will be printed The new stamps will be printed by photogravure process by Cour-voisier S.A., La Chaux-de-Fonds, Switzerland, and will measure ap-stable 29 mm, horizontal X Switzerland, and will measure approximately 29 mm, horizontal X 24 mm, vertical, perforation to perforation. The 4c stamp will be elive green, orange and black. The 11c stamp will be aqua, orange and black.

Four marginal inscriptions will Four marginal inscriptions with appear on each sheet. The inscription will appear in the margin opposite the second horizontal row of stamps at the upper right and left and the lower right and left of the sheet. The marinscription will consist of UN seal with the text the UN seal with the text
"UNITED NATIONS OPERATION IN THE CONGO" in two concentric semi-circles around the top of the seal, with the date "1962" beneath the seal on the 4c sheets; the text "OPERATION DES NATIONS UNIES AU CON-60" will appear in a similar position with similar date beneath on the 11c sheets. 

Among them are the so-called 'Pro Juventute' sets, re-leased each Christmas season for the benefit of child-caring institu-tions, and the 'Publicity Sets' prepared to commemorate various important Swiss historical events.

Also included are the distinctive issues prepared for various inter-national organizations associated with the United Nations whose headquarters are in Geneva. These stamps, with their remarkable designs may be used only by officials of these UN groups, so are seldom en on regular mail.

The display also includes a number of original pictures from which the stamp designs were adapted. It is the first time that such a display has been sent to Canada by a Swiss Government.

The display will consist of stamps issued in Egypt since the Revolution and the establishment of the Republic. Among the most important issues, which are no longer available and which since have become philatelic treasures are the various stamps prepared for the Suez Canal incidents, the Boy Scout Jamboree, the fiftieth anniversary of the Rotary Clubs and the Gaza campaigns.
Also included is the famous one

pound stamp which reproduces in natural colour the Nefertiti Statue, now in the German National Mu-seum in Berlin. This stamp is universally regarded as the most beautiful one ever printed by the rotogravure method.

For present, it would appear to be a buyer's market.

An exception to this is found in the silver dollars. Those of 1962 are in short supply and it's a somewhat similar situation to that of a year ago. The 1950 Arnprior and 1955 Armprior dollars are be-coming increasingly difficult to find and have gone up in value. Due to the difficulty experienced in obtaining silver dollars of any

COINS OR STAMPS

By J. E. Charlton, F.R.N.S.

For many years coin collecting was one of the world's leading hobbies. Then stamp collecting took over the leadership, which it has now relinquished in many respects to coin collecting. While some may argue this contention, there is no denying the following facts:

(1) Circulation of numismatic publications exceeds that of philatelic publications.

(2) Sales of the numismatic sections of the Minimum and the sections of the publications.

(2) Sales of the numismatic section of the Mint exceeds that of the Philatelic section of the Post Office, and are increasing rapidly while the latter are steadily declining.

15 cents—portrays Ezana who seeded the throne around 325 AD.

20 cents portrays Kaleb, a powerful king (6th century) who is considered a saint in many

60 cents-portrays Yekuno Amlak who ascended to the throne in 1270. He brought Christian priests to bring Christianity and education to his people.

75 cents-portrays Zara Yacob (1434-1468) a great ruler and administrator.

1.00—portrays Lebna Dengel who ruled around 1508, and was the first Ethiopian ruler to receive diplomatic missions from Europe.

All the stamps are in horizontal format, measuring 1.66 x 1 inch, and were printed in sheets of 60. (Ethiopian Philatelic Agency.

Four sets with specimen overprint realized prices equal to ap-proximately full catalog for the regular stamps.

Among the part-perf. varieties, a block of four embodying two horizontal pairs imperf. between of the 1938 10-lire airmail (No. C8), s sold for \$167.50. The Council Trent 2-lire in block of four containing two vertical pairs imperf. between realized \$52.50.

The 1949 Holy Year set (Nos. 32-139) in vertical gutter pairs sold for \$77.50.

First day covers generally brought excellent prices. The 1938 Catacombs set (Nos. 55-60) tied to FDC, realized \$60 (singles off cover catalog \$23.60).

WEST GERMANY

A special 20 Pf stamp (red and black) is due for release November 23rd, 1962, for the benefit of the Protestant Advent Collection 1962 under the motto "Brot fur die Welt" (Bread for the World).

Courbet" by Courbet, 0.65 NF featuring "Madame Monet on a blue Couch" by Monet and finally 1.00 NF featuring "Cavalry Guards Officer" by Gericault. All were printed in multi-colour by the recess process at the Paris State Printing Office.

The three 50c stamps honouring the Besancon Watchmaking School, Gobelin Tapestry Works and the death of Pascal, will be withdrawn November 17th. Greece



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

OLD CANADIAN BILLS COLLECTOR'S ITEMS

By J. E. CHARLTON, FRNS

Some of the most attractive, interesting and inexpensive paper money of Canada consist of the old large size Dominion of Canada Department of Finance notes issued from 1870 to 1934. These notes have illustrated many innotes have illustrated many in-dividuals who have a place in the country's history, while the vig-nettes in many cases deal with various aspects of the country's agricultural and industrial life. While these bills have long since disappeared from circulation, surprising number are still available to collectors.

The \$1 denomination consisted of seven issues, dated 1870, 1878, 1897, 1898, 1911, 1917 and 1923, and sub varieties exist in all but the 1897. Illustrated is the most attractive of these notes, the issue with portrait of HRH Princess Patricia of Connaught (now Lady Patricia Ramsey), daughter of TRH the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, and granddaughter of Queen Victoria.

On the outbreak of war in 1914, the saili A. Hamilton Gault, of Montreal, England.



offered the government \$100,000 for the purpose of raising a regi-ment of light infantry.
