The Society is one of the oldest in North America, having been founded in 1862. Aside from the A.N.S. there were only two or three small numismatic societies formed before the Montreal one and only the A.N.S. was more actively publishing than the latter.

This coin was the subject of a great deal of controversy during the 1880 's. In an article in the Magazine of American History, a gentleman by the name of Richardson ascribed this coin to Newfoundland, claiming it to have been issued by' Lord Baltimore for his colony around 1626. The specimen that he described had been dug up in Waterville, Maine. Avalon is a large peninsula forming the south-east part of $N$ fld. Due to the inscription, (Avalonia) and the coincidence of the location of the find, he felt that this justified his attribution. Appleton and McLachlan (in A.J.N., Oct. 1883, July, 1884) discounted his story as being absurd, but were on the wrong track themselves when they suggested that the piece was an admission ticket to a music society of Roman Catholic origin in Nfld. around the first quarter of the 18th century. McLachlan later located the coin listed in Batty's "Catalogue of the Copper Coinage of G.B. ..." as from Glastonbury. (Batty 364). In further research (A.J.N., Jan, 1885) he states, "Glastonbury is a town of about thirty-seven hundred inhabitants, built on a peninsula formed by the windings of the River Blue. It is nearly in the centre of Somersetshire. This peninsula was called by the ancient Britons Ynys yr Avallon, that is, the Island of Apples. In Latin it was written Avalonia'" Mclachlan further emphasized his previous article in a four page at tack. as, curiously, Richardson would not be convinced that he had erred, and continued writing even more glorious articles on his "Baltimore Penny."

## DEVINS \& BOLTON



Scarcer countermark type
The firm of Devins \& Bolton is probably one of the most well known to collectors of Canadian colonial coins, having been responsible for the famous worm pastille token ( Br .569 ) and for the issuance of what must undoubtedly be the most extensively countermarked coin in America.

Richard John Devins was born in Montreal on the 24th of June, 1837, the son of Peter Devins, a native of Ireland who emigrated to Canada about 1820. R.J. Devins studied medicine at McGill University to become a physician, but found himself incapable of following through with this profession. He therefore gave his attention exclusively to chemistry and medicine. His first apprenticeship was with a Mr. Burke, who, until 1894 was still in business on McGill Street in Montreal. He then went to New York, working with Lanman \& Kemp, returning to Montreal in 1857 on the death of his mother. He began business for himself in 1862, occupying the building next to the old Court House. This building had been erected by his father for the chemist, Alfred Savage.

In November, 1862, he took on as his partner, Richard Bolton and they retained the same address opposite the Court House. The Canadian drug trade, it was claimed, was shortly unsurpassed by the success of the newly formed firm, who were the first to introduce a number of medicines to the Canadian trade. After the dissolution of the firm around 1880, Devins continued the business on his own until his death in February, 1892. Nevertheless, there are listings of the firm of R.J. Devins until 1928, being exclusive agents for such patent medicines and products as Devin's Cough Specific, Devin's Worm Pastilles, (until 1900), and Luby's Hair Renewer.

Richard Devins was a master of the art of advertising as can be seen by the numerous advertisements placed by the firm in various publications of the time, in addition to the extensive countermarking operation performed by the company. Another of Devins interests was music, being able to play many musical instruments by ear. Of Richard Bolton, less is known. There are no directory listings for him prior to his association with Devins, but he later became director and president of several manufacturing institutions, the most important of

which was his presidency of the Montreal Loan and Mortgage Company. His son took over this position on the death of his father.

The firm may well have been the Canadian innovators of the Canadian merchant location countermark on copper coins. Findlay \& McWilliam, Montreal; T.H. Robinson, Orillia; Robinson’s Carriage Works, Kingston were all later.

Possibly the idea originated while Devins was in New York (ca. 1854-1858) as this was a popular form of advertising in the United States during that period. Most of these location countermarks are on silver coins, particularly twenty-five cent pieces. There are no Devins and Bolton countermarks known on silver coins, however. At least two punches were prepared for their countermarking. They differ in the size of the letters and the ampersand, which, in the case of the scarcer variety has a rather awkward appearance. The letters are slightly larger in this second type. I have only two specimens of this variety, both of which are on blank planchets. Both countermarks show up occasionally with some of the letters partially cut off, the reason a new punch was required.

The importance of these countermarks cannot be overemphasized as they give an insight into the coin circulation after the introduction of the decimal system. Coins dated as early as the 1750 's, but none later than 1857 have been recorded as bearing these countermarks. Such rarities as the Bout de L'Isle tokens also bear the firm's name. One of these was in the Ferguson Collection and another is owned by myself. The Bank of Canada Collection in Ottawa has in excess of 150 of these countermarks on different undertypes. Interestingly enough, the vast majority have been marked on the obverse side of the coin. The countermarks of course could not have been issued before 1863, the first year of the company, but it is difficult to determine the termination date, for, although all copper coins but for those of the chartered banks were deemed illegal after 1870, it is very obvious that this law was quite ineffective and that other coins circulated for some time after that date. The fact that lightweight countermarked blank planchets circulated at this late date may come as a surprise to some.

The worm pastille card is the only Canadian Confederate coin. Struck in Birmingham, they were seized by customs officials due to the New Currency Act which forbade the manufacture or importation of coins or tokens without government permission. The added close resemblance to the newly introduced Canadian cents of 1858 and 1859 may also have influenced the authorities to hinder their circulation. Nevertheless, a small quantity of the approximate issue of 8000 pieces were released to collectors two or three years later. Devins told Breton, who interviewed him shortly before his (Devins) death that he had never ordered the coins but that he had merely made enquiries in England with regard to the cost of procuring such cards. It seems to me very unlikely that a Birmingham manufacturer would proceed to strike off a quantity of a storecard for a
foreign merchant in the hope that the order would be accepted.
The era of patent medicines is well commemorated by the worm pastille card of Devins \& Bolton, and it is interesting that confederation should be numismatically so represented.

Canadian Numismatics was originally published in the American Journal of Numismatics from 1879 to 1886. McLachlan then had it privately published in Montreal, with a few minor changes, in an edition limited to 100 numbered copies. The book is considered to be the finest individual work on Canadian numismatics, and much of the information has never appeared elsewhere. Due to the rarity of the book, and the poor paper that it was originally printed on, the publishers felt that a reprint would be desirable.
