

Also, the introductory paragraph on the verso of the map states: "Many American farmers are finding here new homes and new opportunities for their industry and enterprise and are prospering in an amazing manner. Their favorable accounts of the country are inducing nany former neighbours and friends to follow them."

Also 19 other eagles from right, with names of Dr. J. J. Hayes and the other companions of Kane." This example differs with the example from the Vattemare collection described by Storer in that the scroll with BRIG ADVANCE has been incorporated into the obverse on our specimen. Storer also refers to "an obverse shell in Boston Collection", perhaps this, or a similar piece. Benezit lists an engraver by the name of W. Coutts (English School), known for a portrait of Byron, ca. 1830.

FUNDS SOUGHT FOR THE DERANGED AND ABANDONED CHILDREN, 1820

The commissioners were seeking a sum of money (1107 pounds, 19 shillings, eleven pence) which had been promised to the communities and individuals who had been charged with the management of these unfortunate individuals, in accordance with the act of 1811 which had been upheld several times and even improved upon in 1818. The death of the Duke of Richmond in 1819 created an interim government, with James Monk as its president. No doubt a slowdown in the workings of government had occurred due to the death of the Duke, and this address by the commissioners to Monk reflects that, 2 1/2 p, manuscript draft with pencil insertions and deletions. Eight questions are raised concerning the cost and necessity of such a hospital. The letter is dated 18th January, 1845 and bears the manuscript signature of A.W. Cochran (D.C.B., Vol. VII), "for the Committee", and has been addressed to Dr. Morrin. Folio. CHOLERA EPIDEMIC

35. [MEDICAL]. MCGRATH, THOMAS. M.D. [? -1872] Medical Assistant at Grosse Isle. Autograph document, signed, Grosse Isle, 10th Sept., 1849, to the Quebec Board of Health. A detailed document concerning the beginning of the cholera epidemic in Quebec. Attributes the Asiatic Cholera to the arrival of the Sir Charles Napier from Dublin which arrived on the 19th of August. Several of the passengers were ill, but none with the cholera. Five days later one of the passengers, a child, aged 12, was stricken with the disease, dying the following day. Fifty-seven deaths occurred the following day of which fifty-three were passengers from the Circassian, a ship that had arrived shortly after the Sir Charles Napier. From the 26th to the 30th, four more deaths were reported. He continues his description of the

epidemic to the 30th of August, after which date (till Sept. 10th) no more cases appeared. Though the Sir Charles Napier appeared to have imported the disease, most of the victims were of the Circassian. 2 ½ p. Folio. Approx. 820 words. \$1250.00

A very positive report on the state of Canada's economy and affairs of the Merchants Bank of Canada in 1881. Bank profits were ahead of the previous year, farmers yielded a good crop, lumber and timber fetched high prices, and manufacturers were busy meeting demands for their products. The only areas of some concern to the bank were a drop in sales of certain imported goods as well as an unhealthy land speculation.

"The development of the business of Manitoba and the North West, has proceeded at an unexampled rate, and is still going on."

Holton and Galt, on behalf of the railroad, express their desire to be given the same consideration for the granting of a charter as that being considered by the committee for the Grand Trunk Railway who have applied for construction from Toronto to Kingston, with a right to extend to Montreal. The company had been incorporated in 1846, but had evidently allowed the charter to lapse. This new appeal does not appear to have met with success.

43. MONTREAL AND NEW YORK RAILROAD COMPANY. Report Of Proceedings, at the first Annual Meeting of the Stockholders of the Montreal & New York Railroad Company, on Tuesday, February 17, 1852.

"THE GREAT RESPONSE OF CANADA"

This may be the original submitted by Vernon March of Farnborough, Kent, England, sometime in 1925, to the world-wide competition seeking a design for Canada's commemorative war monument. No inscriptions or markings identifying the artist can be found on the piece though the name of a possible previous owner, Major E. G___ (unable to identify name), Dept. of Nat. Def., is written in red coloured pencil on the bottom of the base. The artists conception of the War Memorial evidently needed little or no tinkering as the model includes the base which is accessed by three steps, five more steps towards the centre of the monument leading up from the base to the pedestal, the pedestal which passes through a tall archway that is crowned by two statues representing peace and freedom, and finally the uniformed figures posing atop the pedestal representing all branches of the military that served in the Great War. The only significant difference is that this model contains fourteen figures mounted on the pedestal while the War Monument contains twentytwo. The model is fabricated from pine, painted white and measures, at the base, 241/4" x 157/8" and stands 173/4" tall (from the lowest step of the base to the top of the "Peace and Freedom" statues). The artillery cannon placed at the rear of the surging group of figures is not made of pine, but of plastic. A separate wooden part that slides over the barrel of the gun has been repaired with tape. A section of the wood which rests beneath the figures and on top of the pedestal and is used to simulate a plot of earth has been repaired with plaster. The repair is situated near the cannon. The hand carved military figures, as well as "Peace and Freedom" are somewhat crude, but this does not detract from the simple elegance which the piece possesses and, in any case, the aim of the to render craftsman was а thorough and comprehensive work in a reasonable length of time. Illustrated on inside back cover. \$1500.00

In 1925 the Canadian government held a competition to choose a design for a national commemorative war monument to be erected in Ottawa. It was open to architects, sculptors and artists who were British subjects and those of allied nations. One hundred and twenty seven entries were received, seven of which were chosen as finalists and asked to submit scale models. The winning entry titled "the Great Response of Canada" by Vernon March was selected in January 1926. March's work was carried on by his seven siblings after his death in 1930 and the full sized bronze figures were completed in July of 1932, exhibited in London's Hyde Park for six months in 1933, and finally shipped to Ottawa in 1937. Directed by Sydney March who was later joined by his two brothers Percy and Walter, construction of the monument was completed on October 19, 1938. The surrounding walks and terraces were finished in time for the Royal visit of 1939. In 1982 the monument was rededicated to commemorate all Canadians who served their country in time of war and the bronze dates of 1939-1945 and 1950-1953 were added.

I have, perhaps arbitrarily, selected to enter this title under the name of the original owner of the collection as it would appear that Laggatt did nothing to improve or add to it. McLachlan talked of Bronsdon with great affection, as an early mentor to the seventeen year old collector when they first met. He encouraged young McLachlan to pursue the Canadian series and, prior to the disposition of his collection to Laggatt, had allowed McLachlan the selection of any Canadian pieces from his collection. Joshua L. Bronsdon was a Montreal bookeeper by occupation. Due to financial reverses he was obliged to sell his collection, shortly after moving to Toronto where his fortune seems to have improved. He became a dealer in paints, oils and German and English plate, first associated with J. W. Paton and later, by 1877, with Andrew Muirhead. Bronsdon appears to have continued collecting coins till about 1882 when he passed the collection along to his son who kept it up until at least 1885. Henry Laggatt was a jeweler in the city (Montreal) from 1844 to 1875, and afterwards, to 1888 was listed as a goldsmith. The Canadian section of the catalogue (lots 46-58), is highlighted by a Roy sou, the Rebellion Token - "now scarce, and when in good condition commands a high price"; British Militia (flattened button), and the Magdalen Island penny in fine.

The auctioneers, Andrews & Sons were situated next door to him at 109 Yonge Street. By 1871 he was no longer at the same address. Eves may well be the first coin dealer in Toronto. The offering consists mostly of world coins, with a reasonable representation of U.S. colonials. In describing the so-called 1767 Louisiana copper with cmk., the cataloguer has interpreted the "R. Of note in the offering are: Lion and Wolf medal at \$150.00, Oswego at \$5.00, Montreal Taken in silver at \$20.00, Sunbury Grammar School in bronze, Powell in bronze. Gravel's main collection was sold by Raymond in 1935. The Canadian portion of the collection consisted mostly of colonial coins (few medals) so well known for its uncirculated Ropery, uncirculated bent leaf bouquet-sou, uncirculated sheaf, M'Ausland card, and many others. Doug Ferguson acquired Gravel's collection of Canadian medals from his son, Pierre. A granddaughter published (in French) a rather biased, and in some cases inaccurate biography of Ludger Gravel in 1983.

There were also 9 lots of maritime coins offered. Hall was, according to McLachlan, "a regular dealing collector, who did not scruple to outwit an untried

collector in a deal." Sandham, who had acquired many pieces at the Boucher sale in 1866, sold his collection to Hall so it can be seen that in a period of one year many of the same coins and medals had been turned over three times. McLachlan claimed that he left the city shortly after his sale, never to return, but this is not so. He is listed in city directories from about 1864 to 1895. He operated a fruit, shellfish and news depot on McGill Street from 1864 to 1867 and in 1869 was with the Allen Freeman oyster and chophouse. By about 1877 he had succeeded in acquiring the Freeman business on St. James Street which he removed to St. Catherine Street near McGill College Avenue several years later. From 1888 to 1890 he operated a saloon on St. Paul Street but by 1892 Hall is back to being a fruit dealer on McGill Street where he also advertises for coins and stamps. He disappears sometime after 1895. Sold

The town of Rossland, British Columbia was formed in 1894 and was named for Ross Thompson. He had erected the first home, and one of the first cabins in the area and in January of 1892, had preempted 160 acres of land for a townsite.

The publisher of this volume, the Rossland Miner, was a daily morning newspaper in the early 1900's published by William Kemble Esling (1868-1948). Esling was born in Philadelphia and arrived in British Columbia in 1896 during the mining boom. He also published the Trail News, the Rossland Record, and a paper he began in Brooklyn, B.C., "a landing place for supplies in the construction of the Columbia and Western Railway". With the completion of the railroad to the coast this community became a "ghost town". Esling later entered politics and represented Kootenay West from 1925 until his retirement, a year or two before his death. Esling devoted a great deal of time to recording the history of the town of Rossland and nearly half of this volume is derived from his work.

ORIGINAL SCULPTED MODEL OF A 19[™] CENTURY CHURCH ALTAR

90. STE. ROSALIE. Scale model of the altar in the Roman Catholic church at St. Rosalie, Quebec, near St. Hyacinthe, approximately 38 kilometres east of Montreal. The information provided with the model indicates that the model was constructed by a Mr. F.X. Gilbert (1860-1936). A search through the Quebec Directory for 1890 under Ste. Rosalie reveals only twelve listings, but among those is the name Xavier Guilbert, a manufacturer of doors and sashes. In the history of Ste. Rosalie written by J.B.O. Archambault and titled Monographie de la paroisse de Sainte-Rosalie, a reference is found to an F.X. Guilbert, a carpenter, who operated a shop in the town towards the end of the 19th century. It seems likely that the three names above mentioned are the same person and that a spelling error occurred in the information provided with the piece. Unfortunately no date was given as to the creation of this work and no inscription can be found on the model that would indicate this, but it seems evident that it was made around the turn of the 20th century.

The model itself is quite elaborate and must have taken its creator quite some time to finish. Fashioned from pine, it appears to have been put together from dozens of individually crafted pieces, many of them hand carved. It was painted white with gold trimming and some sections, such as the pillars, appear to have been carved with uneven lines to create a marbleized effect after they were painted. The model measures $23\frac{1}{2} \times 21 \times 10\frac{1}{4}$ inches. In addition to the main piece. twenty-three separate (miniature) pieces that would be found at an altar were replicated. All of these are painted with the colours of the main piece and all but three are hand carved from pine. These are as follow: 6 candle holders, a metallic bell mounted on stand, 2 ewers for wine and water with separate tray, a chalice for the host, a communion cup, a metallic dish, a bible stand, a holy bible, a candle snuffer (wooden handle with metallic tip), 5 candlesticks with candles, a metallic crucifix, a tabernacle. The parish of Ste. Rosalie was named for the wife of the seignior of St. Hyacinthe, Jean Dessaulles. Rosalie Papineau, sister of L.J. Papineau, managed the seigniory after the death of her husband in 1835 until her three children reached majority age. Ste. Rosalie was granted its parochial status by bishop Bernard Claude Panet on June 3, 1832, and was recognized legally on July 10, 1835. After many years of debate over the choice of location for the their new church and presbyter, the people began construction in December of 1832. The works were completed sometime in late September-October of 1833. Twentyfive years later it was decided that the church, a wooden edifice, was dilapidated and beyond repair, and was, in any case, too small for the burgeoning community, and that a larger and more durable building was required. By 1871 a stone church was erected and ready for its parishioners, though works persisted until their completion in 1882. The altar, choir benches, and balustrade were transferred from the old church for use in the new one.

The Crispins, said to be brothers from a noble Roman

family, were the patron saints of shoemakers. On their journey to Soissons they made many converts and supported themselves by making shoes. The Roman emperor Maximianus condemned them to death and they were later beheaded (ca. A.D. 286) and their remains were buried at Soissons. The festival of St. Crispin celebrated in France for many centuries featured solemn processions and celebrations in which gilds of shoemakers were the principals.

93. SMITHURST, JOHN. (1807-1867). Church of England clergyman. John Smithurst applied to the Church Missionary Society of England on September 10, 1836 and was accepted shortly thereafter as a probationary candidate and entered their college at Islington (now part of London). He received deacon's orders on December 23, 1838 and was appointed to the Society's North West America mission. Before arriving in Rupert's Land in September of 1839, he was ordained priest (May 26) and by February of 1840 was permanently located at the Indian Settlement at the confluence of Netley Creek and the Red River. From the time of his arrival in Rupert's Land until June 1840, Smithurst was employed by the Hudson Bay Company, at a salary of £100 per annum, as their chaplain at Red River. The Company was concerned over an influx of Indians into that region and had intended to send him to Cumberland House to establish a settlement and school, but those plans were later changed due to a dispute regarding a bequest by former chief factor at Cumberland, James Leith, for the propagation of the Protestant religion among the Indians of Rupert's Land. The first Anglican missionary in Rupert's Land to endeavour to learn an Indian language was John Smithurst. Using the Roman alphabet instead of the syllabic system used by the Rev. James Evans, he finished the translation of the service of Evening Prayer by March 1842 and turned his efforts to the marriage service and later a Cree-English dictionary.

He was involved in two controversies in his time at Red River. The first concerned Rupert's Land recorder Adam Thom and his stance on the authority of the Anglican bishop of Montreal in Rupert's Land. The second regarded Smithurst's involvement in the freedom in the fur trade dispute and his assistance to the Governor of Assiniboia, William Bletterman Caldwell, angering the Métis and alienating a large portion of his Indian parishioners. Smithurst's final two vears in Red River were unhappy ones and he retired in 1851 and returned to England. A year later he returned to North America and settled in the town of Elora, Canada West and preached at St. John's Church. He later took up a bush farm in the township of Minto, naming it Lea Hurst after his birth place, Lea in Derbyshire. He never married but there were rumours of his romantic involvement with his cousin Florence Nightingale. Smithurst was an able clergyman, though lacking in education, and in his twelve years at Red River he baptized 323 Indians including the Saulteaux Chief, Pequis. D.C.B. Vol. IX

Collection of two hundred and thirty-five unpublished letters, financial records and documents relating to the Reverend Smithurst and the Red River Settlement, spanning a thirty-one year period, from 1835-1866. Twelve of those years, from 1839-1851, he spent as a missionary to the Indians for the most part and as chaplain to the Hudson Bay Company to a lesser extent. Most, if not all, of the accounting records which consist of accounts, invoices, receipts and bills of lading are dated from this period and represent approximately sixty percent of the collection. In size and detail these range from small notes scribbled with a few names and numbers to folio sized sheets containing one or more pages of detailed bookkeeping. Approximately half of the letters, which constitute slightly less than forty percent of the collection, are dated from Smithurst's missionary years in the Red River district. A few pre-date his arrival in Rupert's Land while he studied at the Church Missionary Society's college at Islington and the rest, from 1852 until his death in 1866, are from his days in Elora and the county of Minto, Canada West, where he settled after retiring from missionary work. Approximately half of the letters received by Smithurst while at Red River were penned by some of his colleagues including William Cockran (1796-1865) and James Hunter (1817-1882). These, more or less, concern matters of temporal existence in the rugged countryside of the Canadian west and of dealings with the Indians whom these men were sent to civilize, though other topics such as Indian languages and their translation are

discussed. Those written by the Rev. James Hunter stand out due to their interesting subject matter, length and detail. The other letters from this period come from a melange of friends, associates, various authorities including the C.M.S., the H.B.C., members of the Assiniboia government, etc. After immigrating to Canada West, Smithurst kept in touch with friends and colleagues from Red River and among the post-Red River letters a number of these are found. This brings the total of letters originating from Red River to about sixty percent of the collection. The post-Red River letters also include a few written by bishops David Anderson, John Strachan, and Alexander Neil Bethune. The items in this collection referred to as documents are few but no less important and interesting than the above described. These include a complete inventory of the John Smithurst's belongings taken prior to his departure to missionary college, his will written in 1835, a church attendance notebook for the years 1843 and 1844, a notice announcing a competition to be held by the Red River Agricultural Association, and a small document in Smithurst's hand containing the beginnings of a translation of the Ojibway language, undated and titled, Indian Orthography. A complete inventory with descriptions of these papers (20 pp.) as well as an index of most of the names found within (11 pp.), with short biographies, can be had upon request. YUKON MATERIAL FROM THE ARCHIVES OF THE BANK OF BRITISH NORTH AMERICA

Most of the letters are from the archives of the bank. They had been dumped by the bank and later rescued from a fire as can be attested by the singed appearance of many of the items. They are all entirely legible and in the worst cases a couple of letters or words were affected.



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

He (the brother) originally got them for circulation in Canada, and sent either a surplus or a fresh issue to Mr. Duncan here, but he (Mr. D.) knows nothing about the circumstances." It seems clear from this letter that the Duncan halfpennies have dual citizenship.

These famous bridge tokens have the distinction of being the earliest of all North American transportation tokens. Breton gives the most complete history of the tokens, including in his magnum opus a sketch of the original bridge from Ile Bourdon to the Bout de L'Isle (end of the island), faithfully executed by his father from an original model yet surviving in 1892. The island (Ile Bourdon) is still privately owned, and I've been tempted to seek out its owner to visit it in the hope of finding a vestige of the old bridge, or perhaps a trace of the original model itself.

From a Thomas Porteous letter, Terrebonne, 28th June, 1807, to Hugh Munro at St. Rose: You will probably have heard that I have altered my plan of building the bridges, and if the weather is good this & next week I will have the bridge from the island to Lachenaye completed & another from the island to Deschamps. They are laid upon larger scows which I buy in Montreal for a trifle. Each scow carries 60 to 100 feet of bridge and in the fall of the year can be floated into the harbour with their bridge upon them & taken out again in the spring. I have already got a number of them moved & have great confidence they will answer my fullest expectation...

This card, with that of T.S. Brown has an interesting association with the Hard Times tokens issued by Green and Wetmore of New York and H. E. Thomas of Louisville, though their tokens are in w.m. and may have been struck slightly earlier. All four were struck by the same Birmingham manufacturer and bear a common reverse typifying the trade. Specimens of the Brown and Shaw storecards are occasionally met with plated in white metal. McLachlan claimed that the Shaw token was still occasionally seen in circulation (c1886).

This die state was first described in the Earl Hidden Sale, Oct., 1914: "The W in HARDWARE entirely struck up. The first we have seen in which this was the case. Fine; brown; very rare." It realized \$1.25. This specimen weighs slightly over a gram more than the preceding in which the W is not struck up.

This, and its relatives (C361, 361a), the H and anchor, and its unique associate, the Black imitation, are likely the first home-made Canadian storecards. Earl Hidden brought fame to the token in his article in the Numismatist Oct. 1913, titled "In re the rare J.B." Wayte Raymond also illustrated in his three editions (1937-52) which may be considered the precursors of Jim Charlton's famous work, first issued in 1952.

169. Another, in v.f., with full date, all letters visible though EDWARD'S is weak. A nice clean piece. \$975.00

The dies for Milner's sheaf were, according to correspondents in letters dated 1886 and again in 1890, imported from the United States. The two accounts regarding the cost of the dies vary considerably, the first suggesting it to have been 700 dollars, the latter claiming it to have been 750 pounds. The earlier account would appear to be more realistic. The copper was coined for "old Mr. Milner and his son James, on Pownall street, at the east end of gaol Square... Not many pieces were struck when the machinery was cast aside, and some years later sold for old metal." Only a small quantity of the coins were struck, probably due to the dies cracking early on, and the poor quality of the copper used. No one seems to know what happened to James Milner. His brother George, a tinsmith, had never seen the coin according to J. Metcalf, the numismatic correspondent, although George appears to have been still living in 1886.

Writing in 1874, Robert May, resident of а Charlottetown remarked: Although some few remember Dennis McCarthy's P.E.I. pennies, they seem to have entirely disappeared. He himself died many years ago, before my time & I have been here eleven years. Metcalf, in the Canadian Antiguarian & Numismatic Journal, Jan., 1890, observed, after describing the Holey Dollar: "The next coin in order of time is THE PETER MCCAUSLAND PENNY, - a round piece of copper, cut out of a sheet, furred up round the edges with the letters P.E.I., indented across. Mr. McCausland resided on and Owned Rustico Island, and farmed, fished and sold goods to the French people of that locality for a long period."

180. Huntingdon - United Presbyterian Synod. This token is simply indented with a T (token) on one side, and the date, 1847, indented on the other side. 11x23mm., rounded edges. Bowman 11. v.f. scarce. \$100.00

The Secession Church was located on St. George, near Lagauchetiere St.

The literature on the subject is extensive. McLachlan first published a separate work in 1891 (Canadian communion tokens), which was followed by the Rev. MacLennan's monograph in 1922 (The story of the old time communion service...). The cited reference, Bowman, Communion tokens of the Presbyterian Church in Canada was published in 1965. The Charlton Press published an illustrated priced catalogue in 1992 (still in print) which includes a few pieces unknown to Bowman, and a recent ambitious publication by Lester Burzinski entitled Communion tokens of the world lists and illustrates 328 Canadian pieces.

COUNTERMARKED CANADIAN COINS

184. L.C. Barbeau, Courtier, (Broker), Montreal, Canada, cmkd. on obv. of an 1859 Can. cent. cmk. fine, coin fine, but a few surface dents. very scarce. \$200.00

Barbeau is listed in Montreal directories as a dry goods merchant on St. Paul Street (1853-59).

185. Devins & Bolton, Montreal, cmkd. on rev. of anAustrian one kreuzer, 1816. coin and cmk. fine. veryscarce and important.\$100.00

The druggist firm struck these off between 1862 and 1867. They are the most prolific of the entire North American countermark series, and the variety of coins so marked is historically important in determining the hodgepodge circulating even at such a late date. The provincial cents which had been introduced in 1858 and 1859, being even lighter than some of the discredited "lightweights" such as the Tiffins and Harps, were obviously being accepted with some reluctance - old habits dying hard. McLachlan makes mention of three foreign coins still circulating in the 1850's and 60's. They were the one skilling of Denmark, 1771, the above described kreuzer of 1816, and the skilling of Norway of 1820.

IMPORTANT COLLECTION OF ONTARIO TRADE TOKENS AND ADVERTISING CARDS

193. Collection of 1856 different die-struck merchant tokens in aluminum, copper, brass, german silver, and white metal. The trades represented include those of bakers, tailors, hotel and saloon operators (bar checks), undertakers, canners, photographers, jewelers, tobacconists, bicycle manufacturers, dry goods, die sinkers and medalists, grocers, barbers, hatters, wine, tea, beer, and those demonstrating virtually every imaginable trade and profession, and include as well several of the numismatist advertising cards. Three hundred and thirty-two villages, towns and cities are represented from all fifty-four counties. The pieces date from the 1890's till about the 1930's, but the vast majority of the collection is pre-World War I. Well over 300 different McColl numbers are present, and considerably more when different denominations are included. No milk tokens or incused checks have been incorporated in this collection. Mostly e.f. or better. Illustrated on back cover. \$27,500.00

Tokens listed in McColl may be considered to pre-date March, 1903 when McColl decided to sell his collection: "My wife has got me to consent to part with my collection of coins and I sent away the first shipment of \$140.00 on approval today." (March 18, 1903). On April 15th he was offering the whole collection including duplicates, cabinets, books, and paper money for \$1500.00. By the 22nd of June McColl's entire collection (likely the balance of what he had not sold) was purchased by a private Ontario collector. The Cranston group of tokens, and those manufactured by the firm for other merchants is a reasonably extensive group and an important part of this collection, numbering over 100 in the four different metals (al., brass, copper, g.s.). McColl gives very limited mintages of these, but these figures are doubtful, likely overestimated. The aluminum pieces are frequently as rare, in some cases more so than their heavier metal counterparts. In my opinion, no more were struck of the aluminum pieces due to that metal being costly due to its relatively recent introduction. The Cranston manufactured series is an attractive one, most of the pieces occurring in uncirculated condition, even having a proof appearance in some cases.

This was formerly the collection of John Cheramy who had collected the series over a period of twenty years. Some of the pieces are ex H. Gibbs and Jim Curto, having been acquired by those collectors in the 1930's and 40's. A listing of the individual items is available for serious inquiries.

RARE FRENCH REGIME TREASURY NOTE

194. So-called "Ordonnance" for 24 livres, dated 1756, signed by [Francois] Bigot, Intendant of New France. Printed and manuscript note issued at Quebec, the 9th Jan., 1756. 12x9.5cm. v.g., a few tears and holes, but has been expertly (archivally) rebacked with Japanese tissue. Illustrated. \$7500.00

The notion of printed notes is first outlined in a letter, probably to the Minister and Secretary of State, Lord Maurepas, from intendant Bigot dated Oct. 25, 1748. In it he expresses concern over the counterfeiting of the manuscript treasury notes, and suggests that printed notes would be a remedy to the problem. The first notes arrived only in October, 1752, but for an amount far deficient to that requested (16,000, as opposed to the desired amount of 60,000). Treasury notes were issued every year from 1753 to 1759, with the possible exception of 1755. They were issued in seven denominations of which the lowest was 20 sols, and the highest 96 livres. The signer of the notes is far better known than the notes themselves. His first North American appointment was as financial commissary at Ile Royale in 1739. He assumed the position of intendant of New France in 1748, remaining till the conquest when he returned to France in disgrace. Imprisoned in the Bastille for two years, he was banished from France on Oct. 10th, 1763. He had been accused of fraud, essentially by today's standards, a major conflict of interest, having been associated in many private enterprises, most of which derived profits from the fur trade. Modern historians have been kinder to Bigot, stating that "the Bourbon administration was in general founded upon venality, patronage, and corruption of the kind he was accused of, because Bourbon judicial procedures were notoriously unfair to the accused, and because the government need scapegoats for the loss of Canada and excuses for defaulting on debts to ease its own perilous financial situation."

The last example of a treasury note sold was at the firm of Stack's, New York city, on Dec. 12, 1999. That note was issued two months after the taking of Quebec, and was issued at Montreal, (Quebec deleted in ms.) Dec. 4, 1759. The note was in finer condition than the present specimen, described as "fine. hole tape repaired on back, two pinholes, many notarial marks." The price realized was U.S. \$12, 075.00.

AN UNUSTED BETTS MUUNG

196. Treaty of Peace signed at Versailles, 1783. Possibly unique silver medal depicting Peace standing with an olive branch in her right hand, and a horn of plenty in her left, resting her left foot on the prow of

a galley. Around: PAX FRANCIAM INTER ET ANGLIAM (Peace between France and England); in exergue, on two lines: VERSAILLIS/MDCCLXXIII, Engraver's name in exergue, at left: DUVIV(IER). The verso represents S. Michel with raised sword over a supine devil, enclosed by the collar of the Order of St. Michel. Around: REGIUS STE. MICHAELIS ORDO; under, MDCCXXIX. This numismatic anachronism bears a date difference of fifty-four years between the issuance of the Order of St. Michel medal and the date of the one commemorating the treaty of Versailles. It is a mule, or piece-de-caprice, and I have been unable to make any historical association which may have justified the combination of these two reverses. The Order of St. Michel was instituted under the reign of Louis XI, in 1469. There were three inductees the year the medal was struck, but those individuals have no obvious relationship to America. A possible, though unlikely connection may be that the date 1729 signifies the year of the Treaty of Seville in which Great Britain, France and Spain ceased hostilities. Therein were several implications relating to America. By the Treaty of Versailles the independence of the United States was recognized, and the boundary between Canada and the United States was defined. 41mm. Betts (rev.) 611. lovely medal, a.u. Included is an unpublished article by Michael Oppenheim, entitled "An unlisted Betts muling." \$1250.00

This medal belonged to Victor Morin, and had been inherited by a family member who sold it, along with other medals relating to America at a Montreal auction in 1995. The group of medals had been acquired by Morin at the famous Senter Sale, held in New York in 1933. In March 1994 this, and the aforesaid medals were offered for sale by Stacks', New York.
