He also describes a soiree at the Beaver Club, one of the few published accounts of these meetings. The other, by Col. Landmann, though entertaining, is considered highly exaggerated.

13. D., L. Lines written in memory of the death of Daniel Gatcomb, Sidney Bencroft and Charles Otterson who were cast away on Grand Manan, March 17, 1843. Following is a 17 stanza poem describing the plight of the *Mary Jane*, which, under Captain Gatcomb sailed from Yarmouth, got caught in a storm, struck a reef "and sunk her crew". The political funeral of the late Thomas Grimshawe, Esq., wouldbe M.P.P. for West Northumberland, will move from his late residence at the North American Hotel, Cobourg, to the place of interment in the Romish burial ground, on Saturday, 20th inst., at 2 o'clock, p.m., As the circumstances under which Mr. Grimshawe met his political death are such as to awaken the deep commiseration on the part of a feeling public, it is earnestly hoped that all friends will evince their regret for him by a numerous attendance ... The funeral is described: "Band. Dead March, — — — Ethiopian minstrels. Hearse. Drawn by 6 thorough-bred mules from Toronto-driven by Ralph Francis, Esq. ..." and its mourners: "Andrew Jeffrey, Esq., with flag in his right hand — inscription, 'Honesty is the best policy,' — in his left 'Justice to Catholics.'" And: Dry Nurse-Broad Protestant George-in kilts-hose tied with green ribbons, Douay Bible in his hand, singing 'I'll gang na mair to yan toun'." &c. Cobourg, Feb. 19, 1858. 41 lines, 50 x 32 cm. Rebacked with Japanese tissue, few old ink calculations, not affecting text, two small pieces torn from right edge (repaired), but no loss of text. \$1000.00

A remarkably early political satirical broadside, the cause of its circulation of which will be apparent to a student of pre-Confederation political matters in Canada West.

Page three is devoted to Talbot & Co.'s promotion of their Indian Bazaar, claiming: "The proprietors have constantly devoted their time for the last ten years to the collection of the above goods and are now at the head of an establishment whose assortment cannot be surpassed." And: "Where you can spend a pleasant hour examining the immense collection which comprises the richest and most ingenious works of all the different tribes of Indians in the Dominion." The fourth page is a list of paintings in the French Cathedral.



Abiel, Jonathan, and Nathan Winship, as well as Benjamin P. Homer sold a ship called the Albatross to John Jacob Astor in 1816.





Finlay became a wintering partner of the North West Co. in 1792, relinquishing his share in 1805. Wallace appears to have lost seven years, from 1807-1814, stating: "... in 1814 he was a merchant at Beloeil ..."

96. Franchère, Gabriel. {1786-1863} A.D.s. Receipt signed G. Franchère & Co. to R. T. Kendig for \$205.63 in payment of 4 bales of buffalo robes, 31 Oct. 1861. ½ p., 8vo. \$500.00

The famous old Astorian appears to have maintained an interest in the fur trade late in his life as attested by this little document with the slightly shaky signature of Franchère.




97. Frobisher, Joseph. {1740-1810} A.L.s., [Montreal], 16 March 1810, to Louis Chaboillez (notary). Frobisher wishes to transfer a water lot in Sorel to his son Benjamin Joseph (not the North West Company clerk captured by H.B. Co. men during the Selkirk disputes who died attempting to escape) "in order to give him a vote in that borough the coming election ..." He requests Chaboillez to draw up the necessary papers which he will sign the next day. 2p., 8vo. \$650.00

Joseph Frobisher joined with Simon McTavish in 1787 to form the most important alliance of the Montreal fur trade, McTavish, Frobisher & Co. In 1792 he had built Beaver Hall where many of the famous Beaver Club dinners were held. This letter was written just a few months before his death on September 12, 1810.





Peter Jacobs (Pahtahsega) was an Ojibway, probably of the Mississaugas. He became a missionary around 1836, and in 1840 helped James Evans establish a mission station at Norway House. He later was stationed at Fort Frances, leaving in 1850 for Canada and England, returning to the northwest in 1852.

Peter Jones, the Indian missionary, was the son of Augustus Jones, a surveyor, and an Ojibway woman. In 1833 he was ordained a minister of the Wesleyan Methodist Church and served as a missionary among the Ojibways of Upper Canada until his death. He published various works for the Ojibways, including the volume mentioned above. His History of the Ojibway Indians, edited by his wife Eliza (Field) Jones Carey, {1804-1890}, an Englishwoman, was published posthumously in 1861.

Joseph H. Harris {1800-1881} came to Canada from England in 1829 as the first principal of Upper Canada College.

William Warren Baldwin {1775-1844} came from Ireland to Canada in 1798. He was a successful lawyer, doctor, and politician. A substantial D.C.B. entry is to be found in Vol. VII of the series.

106. McBeath, George. {c1740-1812} A.L.s. St. Johns, 26th April 1807, to James Reid, Montreal.

George McBeath was one of the first of the British traders to arrive after the conquest, making his first trading expedition in 1765. He, along with Todd and Blondeau sent canoes to Grand Portage and Lake Winnipeg from Michilimacinae in 1772. A partnership with Simon McTavish was formed in 1776, and he later was one of the original 19 Beaver Club members of 1785. His fur trade career ended in 1792 with the sale of his last share in the North West Company to Alexander MacKenzie. In 1799 McBeath was appointed customs collector for the port of St. Johns, and this letter is associated with that office.

107. MacKenzie, W. L. {1795-1861} A.D.s. York, Oct. 13th 1832. Promissory note of the York Auxiliary Bible Society: Please to pay to Mr. W. L. 

108. Matthews, W. W. A.D., unsigned, Montreal, 23rd March 1818. Advances, engagements, equipment & board in the spring of 1817, to Etienne Charbonneau (a voyageur) by his agreement (contract) of Jan. 8th 1817 for 7 pounds, 7 shilling, 2 pence. Verso endorsed "Etienne Charbonneau. £7.7.2". 1 p., oblong 8vo. \$650.00

Matthews, an Astorian, was Astor's agent in Montreal recruiting voyageurs and performing other duties relating to the fur trade for his employer. For three years, from his arrival in early 1816, till the spring of 1819 "he was engaged in buying skins and procuring Spanish dollars for Astor, having such goods as '6000 Ear boobs Round' manufactured for the Indian trade, and selling, both at Montreal and Albany, such peltries as deer skins and muskrat skins. Mink, otter, beaver, especially red-fox skins, were the furs which he was particularly desired to secure in Montreal. The Spanish dollars were probably for Astor's China trade." Matthews was replaced as Astor's man in Montreal by Gabriel Franchere in 1828. Interesting and scarce financial document for a voyageur's advances in March, prior to his departure in May. The signature is likely a copy by Matthews.

109. Richardson, John. {c1754-1831} A.L.s., Montreal 23d June 1817, to Mrs. Martha Mackintosh, Belleville, Bay of Quinty. Richardson is unable to inform the lady when the suit of P. Grant against her late husband will terminate, but leaves with his partner, John Forsyth, a substitution of her and Mr. Leavin's power of attorney and relative papers. 1 p., 4to, with integral address-leaf bearing Montreal straight line postal marking and rated at one shilling, 2 pence Halifax currency. \$450.00

Richardson was one of the Montreal partners of the XY Co. (1798-1804). In 1806 he was one of the principals in forming the Michilimackinac Company which company amalgamated with John Jacob Astor in 1811. He could easily be regarded as the father of banking in Canada, having attempted, with other fur trade associates, a Canada Bank in 1792. He introduced a bill for the incorporation of a Bank of Lower Canada in 1808, which, however, was unsuccessful. He was later, in 1817, one of the principals in the foundation of Canada's first bank, the Bank of Montreal.



110. Rousseau, Dominique {1755-1825} & Bailly, Joseph {1774-1835} A.D., unsigned. Agreement between Dominique Rousseau and Toussaint Pothier {1771-1845} of Montreal "executed at Michilimackinac in the Territory of Indiana in the County of St. Claire in the United States of America", August 19, 1802, dissolution of the partnership between Rousseau and Joseph Bailly. Bailly was to assume full control of the business and was to pay Rousseau 123, 814 livres, eleven sols for his share. Pothier and Isidore Lacroix bound themselves as security for the payment of the debt with the exception of the sum of 24,000 livres. 3 p. with dated watermark of 1801, folio. A contemporary copy of a rare fur trade agreement. \$1000.00

Rousseau, a silversmith supplying the fur trade, became involved in the fur trade at Michilimackinac in 1798, entering into partnership with Joseph Bailly sometime prior to 1802. The partnership disputed the North West Company's monopoly and successfully sued Duncan McGillivray over the matter. Grace Lee Nute was of the opinion that the North West Company altered its establishment to British territory at Fort William as a result of the Rousseau/Bailly challenge.


It is interesting to note that the first part of the transaction (the sum of 73,200 livres) was payable on the house of McTavish, Frobisher & Co., who virtually acted as bankers of the Montreal fur trade due to their London partnership with McTavish, Fraser & Co. This coinage has been generally overlooked by Canadian numismatists. In 1620 the Earl of Stirling had been granted a charter for an area called "New Scotland", and which encompassed Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, "and the territory lying immediately north of the last named province, and south of the river St. Lawrence." He established a Scotch settlement at Annapolis, N.S. in 1628, but it was removed four years later due to a treaty between Charles I and Louis XIII. Royalties from a copper coinage were

awarded to the Earl for a period of nine years. The coins thus have a secondary interest for Canada.
