"On that which was pointed out by the King's Attorney General that divers private parties, observing the increase in rating given to small change, especially liards and doubles, had brought a great quantity of it into this country, that it was to be presumed that by the next vessels, a greater quantity still would be brought, owing to the attraction of the profit on it, moreover that liards pass here at six deniers each and deniers at doubles and (that) lastly, the total ruin of the country would follow with this change remaining at such a rating, if there were not a suitable remedy applied. In order to obviate which, the Council declared that in future, commencing from this day, the said liards shall pass and be used but for three deniers each and the doubles at a denier and that the small deniers shall not be current." had been withdrawn from circulation by the late 1830's, but perhaps old habits died hard, and the old ladies of the Bonsecours Market very likely continued their arbitrary acceptance and rejection of the varia crossing counter; certainly the firm of Devins \& Bolton endorsed their acquiesence of the ancient Canadian coppers in a most interesting and prolific fashion.

138. 1631. ARMANUS IOAN. CARD. DE RICHELIEU. High relief bust of Richelieu, to right. Rev. MENS SIDERA VOLVIT (Creative mind evolved the cosmos.) A cherub rotating a celestial plane with seven stars around the sphere of the earth. In exergue: 1631. Ler. 302. ar. cast by Jean Warin. early, likely contemporary. 51 mm . 56.15 grams. $\quad \$ 3000.00$ This example is earlier than the struck specimen in the Bibliothèque Nationale which shows a much more advanced die flaw between the third and fourth planets. The specimen here is virtually identical with a specimen in lead in the British Museum which had been purchased in 1889 by F Parkes Weber from R. Frentzel. (See Jones, Mark. A Catalogue of the French Medals in the British Museum, Vol. 2. Hampshire, 1988.) Warin had been accused and convicted of counterfeiting. (Mazerolle, F Catalogue de l'Oeuvre de Jean Warin, Piganiol de la Force, Description historique de la ville de Paris, 1765.) It is claimed that the medal was a successful effort to flatter the Cardinal, the suggestion being that the Cardinal's intellect governed the celestial bodies (Jones). The relationship to Canada is negligible. The ill-fated Company of New France, also known as the Company of One Hundred Associates was Richelieu's brainchild, but the first ships sent out in 1627 were captured by the English, and Canada fell to Kirke in 1629. It was only restored, with Acadia, by the treaty of St. Germain-en-Laye in 1632. Restrike specimens of the medal occur in all major Canadian collections, and, if at all accepted, it is the earliest for Canada. No doubt Leroux, and others considered Richelieu's importance in colonial affairs, and the reverse is tantalizingly suggestive of his influence in the New World.

It was reproduced in print form, and it has been said that " $n$ o other engraving has been so widely appreciated or has had such a large sale." (Webster, Clarence. Wolfe and the Artists, Toronto, 1930.) Laurence Brown stated, "It is probable that only thirty examples of each medal were struck in silver, these being awarded to those prizewinners whose names are recorded in the reports of the society." Bigsby arrived in British North America in 1818 as an assistant staff surgeon. The next year he took to studying the geology of Upper and Lower Canada. In the winter of 1819-20 he was appointed to the British party of the international boundary commission as assistant secretary and medical officer as provided for by the terms of the Treaty of Ghent in 1814. The principal surveyor of the party was David Thompson, the famous explorer. When in Montreal, Bigsby met and was entertained by several of the old Nor'westers including William McGillivray and Pierre de Rocheblave. His Notes on the Geography and Geology of Lake Huron, 1823, was probably the first paper published on Canadian geology. Agelacrinites Dicksoni, as implied by the medal, was found in Canada in 1822, so the medal has a very specific relationship to Canada. In 1826 or 27 he returned to England and in 1850 published The Shoe and Canoe, a two volume memoir of his experiences with the boundary commission and other anecdotes of his seven years in Canada.
