The issue of narrow and wide milling, particularly in the case of the brass pieces, (C67-68) is debatable. The milling device had become worn, and some strongly struck pieces exhibit a weak milling on edge. I found it difficult to establish differences with any certainty. This, as well as the W. Smythe and Kenvin \& Murphy tokens have long been accorded the status of transportation tokens. It is based, no doubt, on the expressions "Good for one ride" and "Pass one" which occurs on the pieces and which were likely produced by the same maunufacturer. The Smythe and Kerwin \& Murphy tokens were first listed in McColl (1903) but no claim was made that they represented any form of transportation. It has also been stated that they may have been used as tickets for rides on merry-go-rounds, a suggestion which seems plausible. A search through Montreal and Quebec directories has failed to locate W. Smythe or Kervin \& Murphy, a failure which suggests to me that the tokens may well relate in some way to one of the fairs passing through the province from time to time. D. F. Reaume (only one listing of this surname) was located in Montreal from 1887-1889 as the agent (manager) for the Brantford, Ontario firm of J.O. Wisner Son \& Co., manufacturers of agricultural implements. It is unlikely that the tokens relate to that venture but may perhaps relate to his involvement as an itinerant operator of a roundabout at a slightly later date.

The only other specimen known to me was the one offered by the New Netherlands Coin Co. in its sale of Dec. 3, 1968 (plated, part of lot 114). The lot contained, as well, a specimen of Br: 955, but the \$105. achieved was due mainly to the unpublished so-called Newfoundland token which I purchased. John Ford the cataloguer of that famous sale commented: "We have not been able to locate the uniface 'St. John's' token in any major Canadian sale of the last three-quarters of a century nor have we been able to place it in any recorded collection of Canadiana. However, the feeling remains with us that we have seen it before, probably in some obscure sale catalogue." It was quite an experience to attend that sale, the quality of the cataloging being superseded only by the faimess in grading which was often understated.

The medal was offered for sale by A. Hoffruing of Montreal, a dealer in fancy goods who attempted to capitalize on the event with the production of medals for sale in white metal, copper, silver, and gold. Selling price of the medals was $\$ 1$ for those in white metal, $\$ 3$ for bronze, $\$ 10$ for silver, and $\$ 100$ for gold specimens. Few medals could have been struck in silver or gold (I've seen neither) though one in gold was reportedly presented to the Queen. Hoffinung apparently designed the medal himself and had it struck by one of the Birmingham mamufacturers. It was highly praised by McLachlan though he felt that there was "too much attempted on this medal. Fewer subjects would not have diminished its beauty, while more noom would have been given for amplifying its prominent features."

McLachlan claims that silver medals were awarded annually from 1878, making no mention of the much commoner copper medals. In talking of the precursor of this medal, that of the Westem Church, he states: "Probably this is the first time that a purely Canadian work of medallic art has been issued." (C.A.\&N.J., July 1876). Though written as early as 1876 this is yet a curious comment bearing in mind the medals of Grothe, Amault, Belling, Morrison, Ellis, etc. Perhaps, in his opinion, the medals of these other artists failed as works of art.

Eager to monopolize the market of souvenir material of the Montreal Winter Carnival, M. E. Lymburner produced quantities of medalets for sale to attendants and participants. Recognizing that a numismatic community avidly sought after varieties, he produced a group of mules from resurected dies of preceding issues which had been struck in white
metal, and, in more limited quantities, copper. With about seven dies he suceeded in producing 25 or 30 varieties, each of which may exist in the two metals mentioned. The medals are of primitive workmanship, but considering the quantity of varieties manufactured must have met with some success. No doubt they sold for a nominal sum.

Sir John Stratheam Hendrie was bom in Hamilton in 1857. He became a railway contractor, promoting the Hamilton Bridge Works Company of which he was its general manager for several years. He became involved in politics in 1902 and was appointed Lieutenant Governor in 1914, a position he held till 1919. He was knighted in 1915 and was also famous for his racing stable which produced a winner at the King's Plate in 1910. He died in 1923.
