

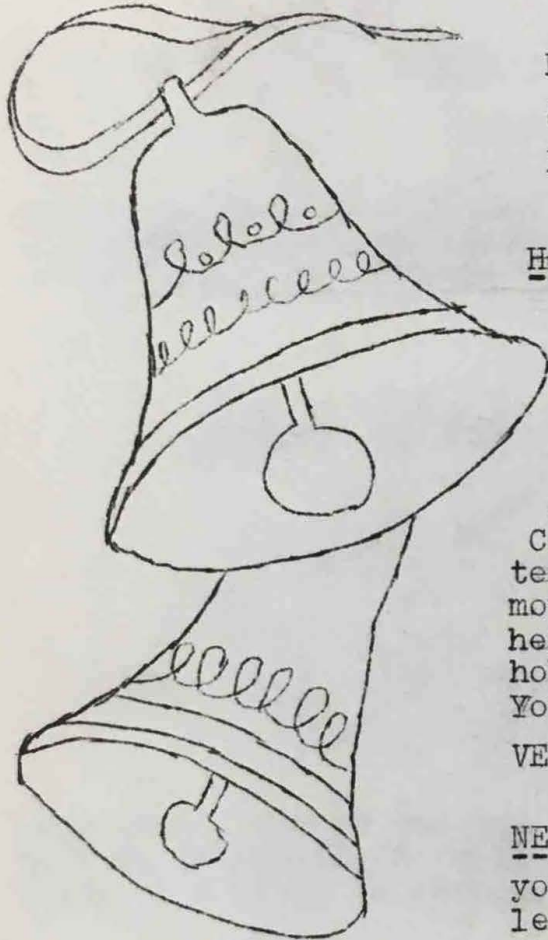

DOLLAR VARIETIES

David Carson has drawn our attention to varieties in the Canadian 1968 dollar coins.

He cites three of the most important and are found on the reverse side of the coins.

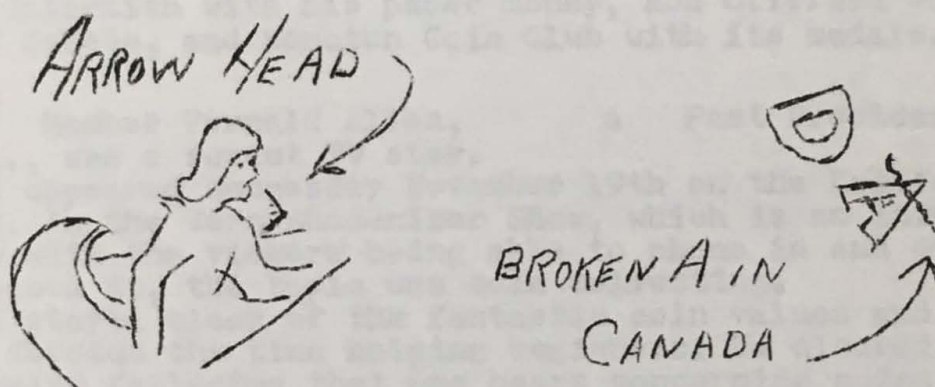
The three varieties are

1. Arrow-head
2. Broken A
3. Arrow-head & Broken A

The arrowhead is a small V or arrowhead mark that appears just ahead of the rear Indian in the canoe, approximately at neck level.

The Broken A is a die-break mark across the top of the last A in Canada.

There are Arrow-head dollar varieties, Broken A dollar varieties, and dollars with both of these defects on them, making 3 varieties and evidently the variety with both defects is the scarcer.



David has a few of the 3rd variety, with the both defects on them, that he is willing to sell to variety collectors, at \$4.95 each. Write to - David L. Carson, 94 West St., Moncton, New Brunswick.

SILVER COINS

The Saint John Evening Times-Globe quotes Albert Galbraith of Moncton, N.B. as stating that the values of Canadian silver coins will double within the next three years.

PER CAPIA

It certainly takes a lot of coins to keep our affluent society going. With all the coin operated machines in use today it is necessary to carry an assortment of coins if you leave the house. Parking meters, bridge fares, cigarets, gum, cigarets, lunch, shoe shines, you name it, there are a thousand demands on your coins. According to the 1967 Canadian Mint Report there is a \$17.51 per capita of coins in circulation.

This compares with a 1905 per capita of \$1.85 of coins.

Seems like coins were not used at all in 1905.

HALIFAX COIN CLUB

The Halifax Coin Club observed its 10th Anniversary at the meeting held on Wednesday evening December 4th, in the Lord Nelson Hotel in Halifax.

Special wooden tokens commemorating the event were presented to all visitors and members who attended the celebrations.

Miss Una Thomson, J.A. Bowman and A. Mitchel MacDonald, three of the original charter members were present.

A telegram from the club's only Honorary Life Member was read to the members, Mrs Lorraine Cato of Vancouver, B.C., a former Secretary of the club expressed disappointment at not being able to attend the birthday meeting and says that both she and her husband Bob miss the Halifax Coin Club meetings.

A letter was also read from Charter Member A.C. MacDonald who had just returned from the hospital and was still not able to come out to the meeting. Mr MacDonald hopes to be at the next meeting.

The Lord Nelson Hotel gave the club a box of chocolates which were used as a door prize and the lucky winner was L.A. D'Entremont.

The announced guest speaker at this 10th Anniversary Meeting was Niels Jannash. It was fitting that the club's first President A. Mitchel MacDonald should be at the head table on this anniversary and it was he that introduced Neils Jannash.

Mr. Jannash is the Director of the Maritime Museum on Citadel Hill in Halifax, and has held this position for the last nine years. He came from Germany in 1953, after sailing around the world in a four master. Neils loves ships and sailing and is presently doing research on the siling expeditions around the Canadian Arctic and other historical projects.

Few poeple realize the problems, hardships and sufferings that are sometimes endured by persons winning a certain medal. Mr Jannash said that many times in the past he had seen displays of medals and had thought they were attractime and artistic but did not realize their true importance until he undertook his research into the Polar Expeditions.

Mr Jannash chose to speak to the club about the Arctic Medal, given to all officers and men who took part in the Arctic expeditions between 1818 and 1855. He spoke specifically about the expedition in which the British Admiralty Ship Investigator took part.

The ships in this expedition left England in January 1850 and did not return until October 1854, only one month short of four years of hardship and privation in close quarter aboard ships only about 120 ft long and crowded with about 65 men on each ship.

Twenty-six expeditions have set out looking for the North-West Passage around North America and nine ships had to be abandoned in the ice, including the Investigator.

The crew of the Investigator was forced to split up and board two other ships in the expedition. They were credited with finding the North-West Passage even though they didn't pass completly through by sail, but were forced to go part of the way on foot and meet the other ships coming from the other direction. The expedition had consisted of ships trying to meet in the passage by entering from both the east and west of North America at the same time.

The crew of the Investigator were each awarded 10,000 Pounds and in 1857 were presented with the Arctic Medal by the Queen. The Arctic Medal was issued in two designs, both suspended by a ribbon.

At first circular medals were issued but later the design was changed to an octagonal design, both having on them sailing vessels

bound in the Arctic ice. Neils had both books on the medals and the medals as well to show the audience.

After the talk, Elliott Fineberg, the club Vice-President, presented Mr. Jannash with a medal and thanked him on behalf of the club for his fine talk. The medal presented was in keeping with Mr. Jannash's interests, it was a John Cabot Discovery Medal, with a ship on it.

The white Elaphant Auction was a complete success. Fernald Allen brought down the gavel on books, antiques, Christmas gifts, as well many numismatic items.

Everyone enjoyed the special lunch that was served, lots to go around, some was left over.

The door prize, a Maritime Medalic Enterprises 60th Anniversary Canadian Mint Medal was won by Cecil Dickinson.

WOODEN TOKEN A new wooden token has just been issued.

This wooden 10¢, printed in red ink was made by Nelson Boltz for the Halifax Coin Club to give out at the 10th Anniversary Meeting at the Lord Nelson Hotel on December 4th.

These tokens are 25 M.M. (1 inch) in diameter and 6 MM ($\frac{1}{4}$ inch) thick.

One side has on it the familiar "Kingfisher" in the middle, surrounded by the legend "Halifax Coin Club".

The other side has a large "10" in the middle and the word "Cents" beneath it. Around this is the legend "Tenth Anniversary Dec. 1968"

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STOLEN CHEQUES

Halifax City Police have warned local merchants to be on the look-out cheques stolen in Toronto and being passed in Halifax. Seventeen of these stolen cheques have been cashed in Halifax several days after they were stolen from firms in Toronto. Over 500 were stolen and are drawn on the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce and have Canadian Comstock of Canada Ltd., or Market Maid Corporation of Canada Ltd. written across the top.

Serial numbers range from 89001 to 89500 and are issued for amounts varying from \$87. to \$127. They are buff in color and are made payable to Joseph L. MacDonald and other false names. The persons passing the cheques have complete false identification to match the cheques, and the signing officers names are present on the cheques but police warn that they are not redeemable as they are stolen and canceled.

AN INTERESTING OVERSTRIKE

It has often been stated that one man's junk may well be another man's jewel. This statement was proven correct last fall while I was examining a rather unexciting assortment of Canadian tokens. In my search, my attention was drawn to one particular token. What caught my eye was a strange assortment of lines and letters peering out from under the readily recognizeable features of a VICTORIA NOBISEST Wellington token (Ch # 218).

I immediately purchased the piece much to the amazement of the dealer who informed me that he has not sold a Canadian token to anyone in the last six months. (the Canadiana token series seems to be lacking in popularity here in the States).

Upon further examination of the token at my leisure, the lines on the reverse soon became clearly identifiable as portions of a ships rigging and sails. On the obverse the letters OKEN were boldly emblazened on the lower portion of Brittannia's gown.

After carefully matching the visible clues it soon was evident that the Victoria Nobisest token had been overstruck on a Trade and Navigation half-penny token (Ch # 201).

Many possibilities as to how this overstriking occurred can be suggested. One distinct possibility, not to be overlooked, is that since both of these tokens were struck during the 1812 to 1814 period, this overstrike could indicate that both tokens were struck by the same firm.

Though initially inexpensive, many hours of enjoyment and friendly discussion with friends have resulted since placing this interesting item in my collection.

ROBBERY

Member Wallace Moase of Summerside, Prince Edward Island reports that his store, Moase Jewellery Stores, suffered a seven thousand dollar robbery on November 26th.

Lucite desk sets with coins in them, rolls of P.E.I. cents, rolls of nickels, a large assortment of medals, and a large assortment of school rings were among the loot stolen.

Some of the medals included - Ezron series, Big Nickel, Kennedy, Big Cent, 20 Dollar Gold Medallion, Pearson Medal, Churchill medal, Prime Ministers Medals, Provincial Series Medals, P.E.I. Medals, Nancy, Chryslers Farm, Stoney Creek, Old Fort Henery, Battle of York, City of Sudbury, Heads and Tails Flips, Confederation Medals, Charlottetown Centennial, in silver gold and bronze. Most of the medals and rings were in multiple lots up to two dozen.

This material would probably only appear in dealers circles, and dealers are asked to be on the look-out and report to the R.C.M.P.

P.E.I. NUM. ASSOC. The Annual Meeting of the Prince Edward Island Numismatic Association was held on Monday, January 20th at the Royal Canadian Legion, Charlottetown. The minutes of the last meeting were read by the Secretary, Richard Montigny, and were adopted as read. The minutes of the last Annual Meeting were also read. A Treasurer's Report was given by the Secretary-Treasurer, Richard Montigny, showing a favorable bank balance of \$60. as of January 1. The President's Report read by Club President, T.N. Rogers, recorded a very active year with nine meetings being held. The report also recorded the loss of two very active members, two by death and one by transfer. Harley Ings gave the report of the Nominating Committee which recommended that the present slate of Officers be returned for another year. No further nominations were forthcoming so the motion carried and the present officers were declared elected. It was noted by the President that the idea of issuing a medal for last year was not carried out and suggested that it be done this year. It was suggested by Mr. Moase and Mr. Oliver that a meeting should be held in Summerside and Alberton sometime soon in order to attract and accomodate the many airmen stationed in the area that are known to collect coins. The first in a series of subject designated swap and trade sessions was tried. The subject of the evening, large and small cents was a great success and enjoyed by all.

HALIFAX COIN CLUB The regular meeting of the Halifax Coin Club was held on Wednesday evening, February 5th at 8pm in the Lord Nelson Hotel, Halifax. Club President, Elliot Fineberg gave a rundown on progress to date on both the 1969 Spring Rally of the APNA and the 1970 CNA convention, both to be hosted by the Halifax Coin Club. A three page detailed Combined Treasurer's Report and Auditor's Report for 1968 was handed out to members, and the President stated that a Library List will be mailed to members and reminded them of the benefits of a library and recommended that the members make use of the fine books owned by the club. A combined trading session and bourse night, with free bourse tables was a great success. Dealers reported brisk sales. (cont.)

The number of and quality of displays was up tremendously, and certainly presented a difficult task for the judges. Ed Paquette won the display prize of a Thistle Coins \$5. Certificate for his fine display of the Empress of India Medals. This was the second month in a row that Nelson Boltz was awarded the attendance prize which he again relinquished in favor of another member, which was then awarded to A.C. MacDonald. The prize was a WELLINGS 60th Anniversary Canadian Mint Medal.

BLUENOSE It seems strange that in so many instances that local works of art, writings and historical artifacts are ignored by local interests, collectors and even governments, until it is too late. Many times it is not until these items have left the local scene or even the country, that some-one says "that item should not have been allowed to leave here, the government should restore it".

Nova Scotian interests, and specifically the Government of Nova Scotia certainly missed the boat in acquiring the bell of the original Schooner Bluenose.

Printed below is a letter sent to the Atlantic Advocate, published in Fredericton, New Brunswick by the University Press.

Bell of the Bluenose

Sir:

Now that Captain Walters is gone, the public should know the whereabouts of the bell of the Bluenose.

Some years ago the Executive of the Maritime Provinces Association, Edmonton, tried to secure a ship's bell for the Association. The then very active Secretary, J.V. Dodds wrote Captain Walters if he could secure one. Captain Walters had just previously offered the Bluenose to the Government of Nova Scotia at a price, but no action taken, so Captain Walters shipped the bell to Mr. Dodds, and it was to become, and it remains the property of the Maritime Provinces Association of Edmonton.

Mr. Dodds and the then Association President, J.H. Brown had the bell mounted on an oaken stand.

The bell, a valued relic, is always on display at our Annual Banquet, in Edmonton.

IN MEMORIAM

IT IS WITH DEEP REGRET THAT WE NOTE THE PASSING AWAY OF ONE OF NOVA SCOTIA'S BEST KNOWN NUMISMATISTS. DR. C. A. HERBIN HAD RETIRED FROM PRACTICE AT ARICHAT, NOVA SCOTIA, AND WAS ENJOYING A WELL DESERVED REST AND LIVING AT KENTVILLE, N. S. HE WAS A MEMBER OF THE

HALIFAX COIN CLUB, A DIRECTOR OF THE A.P.N.A., A MEMBER OF THE C.N.A., AND THE FOUNDER OF THE CANADIAN NUMISMATIC VARIETY COLLECTORS ASSOCIATION.

DR. C. A. HERBIN, FOUNDER OF THE CANADIAN NUMISMATIC VARIETY COLLECTORS ASSOCIATION, DIED ON APRIL 1 AT HIS HOME IN KENTVILLE, NOVA SCOTIA.

BORN IN AUGUET, CAPE BRETON, DR. HERBIN HAD ATTENDED ARICHAT HIGH SCHOOL. IN 1919 HE RECEIVED HIS BA FROM ST. ANNE'S COLLEGE, AND IN 1925 WAS AWARDED A DEGREE IN MEDICINE FROM DALHOUSIE UNIVERSITY.

DR. HERBIN PRACTICED IN ST. PETERS, LOCKEPORT AND ARICHAT, CAPE BRETON, BEFORE HIS RETIREMENT LAST YEAR, WHEN HE MOVED TO KENTVILLE, N. S. HE HAD BEEN A MAJOR WITH THE CANADIAN MEDICAL CORPS UNTIL 1946, AND WAS A MEMBER OF THE PETIT DE GRAT, ROYAL CANADIAN LEGION.

HE WAS CONSIDERED AN AUTHORITY ON THE HISTORY OF NOVA SCOTIA AND CAPE BRETON, AND AN OUTSTANDING NUMISMATIST. HE FOUNDED THE CNVCA IN MARCH, 1965, AND WAS THE FIRST EDITOR OF THE ERVAR DIGEST, THE ASSOCIATION'S OFFICIAL MONTHLY PUBLICATION, UNTIL HE WAS COMPELLED BY FAILING HEALTH TO GIVE UP THIS RESPONSIBILITY.

DR. HERBIN DONATED THE FOUNDERS TROPHY AWARDED AT THE ANNUAL CNVCA CONVENTIONS, AND CONTRIBUTED NUMEROUS NUMISMATIC PAPERS ON ERRORS AND VARIETIES IN CANADIAN COINAGE. HE HELD A LIFE MEMBERSHIP IN CNVCA.

DR. HERBIN WAS VERY ACTIVE IN THE VARIETY FIELD AND HAD AN EXTENSIVE COLLECTION OF VARIETIES, AND HE ALWAYS HAD MANY OF THESE TO SHOW FRIENDS WHEN HE ATTENDED THE A.P.N.A. RALLIES.

HALIFAX COIN CLUB - THE LAST MEETING OF THE HALIFAX COIN CLUB WAS HELD IN THE "CELLARS" OF KEITH HALL IN HOLLIS ST., HALIFAX, ON THE EVENING OF MONDAY, JUNE 2ND.

DESPITE THE FACT THAT MOST MEMBERS ONLY RECEIVED THEIR NEWS-LETTERS ON THE DAY OF THE MEETING, AND SOME A FEW DAYS LATER, THERE WAS QUITE A TURNOUT, DUE TO THE PERSONAL CONTACT OF MANY MEMBERS AND TO THE PUBLISHING OF OUR MEETING IN THE NEWSPAPER.

THE ADVANCE NOTICE OF MEETINGS IN THE CLASSIFIED SECTION OF THE HALIFAX NEWSPAPER CERTAINLY PAYS OFF, ESPECIALLY THIS TIME.

CLUB PRESIDENT, ELLIOT FINEBERG CHAIRED THE MEETING, FIRST WELCOMING ALL THE GUESTS PRESENT AND THE INTRODUCING OF THE SPEAKER FOR THE EVENING.

THE SPEAKER, MR. LYNDON MARTIN, B.S.C., M.A., IS THE DIRECTOR OF THE NOVA SCOTIA MUSEUM, AND IS A RECOGNIZED AUTHOR OF MUSEUM TYPE BOOKS AND ARTICLES. MR. MARTIN WAS RECENTLY ELECTED TO THE COUNCIL OF CANADIAN MUSEUMS.

THE TALK WAS ABOUT THE NOVA SCOTIA MUSEUM, ITS FOUNDING, DEVELOPMENT AND MAINLY ABOUT THE NEW MUSEUM BEING BUILT ON BELL ROAD IN HALIFAX, WHICH WILL CONSOLIDATE SOME WIDELY SEPARATED SECTIONS OF THE MUSEUM INTO ONE BUILDING.

THE N. S. MUSEUM BEGAN IN 1831 AND WAS SITUATED IN THE OLD POST OFFICE ON HOLLIS ST. WHICH NOW CONTAINS THE R.C.M.P. HEADQUARTERS FOR HALIFAX.

THE NEW MUSEUM WILL HAVE MUCH MORE SPACE AND WILL BE ABLE TO BETTER DISPLAY THE OVER 400,000 OBJECTS THAT IT POSSESSES, MOST OF WHICH HAVE NEVER BEEN SEEN BY THE PUBLIC TO DATE.

INCORPORATION OF THE N. S. MUSEUM TOOK PLACE IN OCTOBER OF 1868, AND IN OCTOBER 1968, EXACTLY 100 YEARS LATER CONSTRUCTION BEGAN ON ITS NEW BUILDING.

CONSTRUCTION WILL BE FINISHED BY OCTOBER 1969 BUT IT WILL TAKE UNTIL OCTOBER 1970 BEFORE ALL THE EXHIBITS ARE BUILT AND OPENED TO THE PUBLIC.

THE BASEMENT LEVEL WILL CONTAIN THE STORAGE, PREPARATION SHOPS AND THE EDUCATIONAL SECTION.

IN THE EDUCATIONAL SECTION THERE WILL BE CLASSROOMS FOR LECTURES, CLUB MEETING ROOMS, AND AN AUDITORIUM.

EDUCATIONAL CLUBS WILL HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY (FREE) TO USE THE FACILITIES FOR THEIR REGULAR MONTHLY MEETINGS, AUDIAL VISUAL EQUIPMENT, GESTETNERS, ETC. AND BE PROVIDED WITH CUPBOARD SPACE FOR THEIR OWN BOOKS AND EQUIPMENT.

THE HALIFAX COIN CLUB HAS BEEN OFFERED THESE FACILITIES AND WILL PROBABLY BE MEETING THERE SOMETIME AFTER OCTOBER.

THE MAIN FLOOR WILL BE DEVOTED TO PUBLIC DISPLAYS, ONE SECTION WILL BE OF A PERMANENT NATURE AND WILL ILLUSTRATE THE STORY OF MAN AND HIS ENVIRONMENT IN NOVA SCOTIA. THIS WILL START WITH THE GEOLOGICAL ASPECT OF MAN'S FIRST APPEARANCE IN NOVA SCOTIA AT DEBERT AND WILL FOLLOW RIGHT DOWN TO THE PRESENT AND EMBRACE THE EARLY INDIANS, FARMING, FISHING, SHIP BUILDING, AND THE BUILDING AND DEVELOPMENT OF HALIFAX.

THE OTHER SECTION WILL BE OF TEMPORARY DISPLAYS AND MANY WILL BE CHANGED CHANGED EACH MONTH. THIS SECTION WILL DRAW VISITORS REPETITELY IN ORDER TO SEE THE MANY OBJECTS THAT CANNOT BE SEEN AND USED ALL AT ONE TIME.

THE MUSEUM HAS A WIDE AND LARGE NUMISMATIC SECTION, EMBRACING, TOKENS, COINS, MEDALS, PAPER MONEY, BOOKS, DIES, AND PRINTING PLATES USED IN PRINTING EARLY PAPER CURRENCY.

COIN COLLECTORS ARE PROMISED SOME VERY INTERESTING AND EDUCATIONAL FEATURES IN THE MANY DISPLAYS PLANNED.

NEW TOKEN

A new copper-nickel, quarter size token is being used by two hotels in Moncton, New Brunswick.

The tokens are used to raise a gate to let people out of the parking lot at the hotels. This system of parking involves one meter with only one gate and is being used by the Downtowner Motel and the Brunswick Hotel both owned by one interest.

The token is issued free to patrons of the motel and hotel in order to provide them with parking facilities.

They seem very concerned in being able to hang onto these tokens, and the only way they are available is to patronize their establishments, and then substitute a quarter in its place.

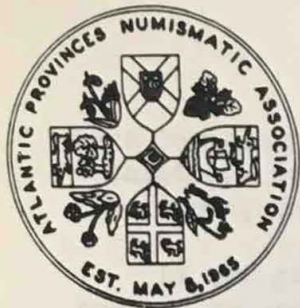

SPEAKER

A.P.N.A. member, Major Sheldon Carroll of Ottawa, Ontario, was one of the speakers on an Educational Forum sponsored by the organization of International Numismatists held in conjunction with the American Numismatic Association Convention at the Sheraton Hotel, Philadelphia, Pa., on August 13th.

Maurice Gould of Sepulveda, California, also an A.P.N.A. member, is the President of OIN and served as Moderator on the Forum.

SURVEY

Ray Mabee, President of the Moncton Coin Club passed out questionnaires to A.P.N.A. members at the A.P.N.A. Spring Rally held in Halifax in May of this year. Following is the results, or thoughts that Ray has arrived at in studying the questionnaires that were returned to him.

A. P. N. A. QUESTIONNAIRE

I would like to share with you the thoughts, advice, and facts as I have drawn them together from the questionnaire handed out at the A.P.N.A. Rally in Halifax. First of all, the remarks are the result of an accumulation of over 550 years' experience and from collectors all over the Maritimes. It is interesting to see certain attitudes crystalizing and very encouraging to see trends that I believe are in the right direction.

Canadian decimal coinage is still the favourite among collectors with 60% claiming interest in all or part of this series. I was surprised to see a marked trend toward tokens, a previously neglected area, with approximately 20% of the members collecting in this field.

The remaining twenty percent was about equally divided in this order; American series, medals, foreign, paper money, mint sets, crowns, transportation tokens, and Newfoundland. Some areas are still wide open, the field is yours.

When asked why you collect, most answered simply - a hobby. Others

were perhaps more specific when they expressed personal satisfaction, relaxation, desire for fellowship, interest in history, security of investment, and desire for preservation of material and research.

It was gratifying to see that from this sampling of collectors only one was collecting to make a dollar. A few years ago, most clubs had a larger attendance at meetings but a large percentage were interested in a fast buck. I believe today we have more people that are serious about their area of collecting than ever before. Those reading this that are dealers might be well advised to cater to the trend and advertise in this issue coins, reference books, and other collectors' supplies. A real contribution could be made here by dealers who want to provide a service to the individual. Many areas have no place that is an outlet for supplies and further, for many collectors, this publication is the only numismatic literature they receive.

Programmes require a great deal of thought and rightly so. It is the concern of the executive of each club I presume to give a well rounded series of programmes that cater to the greatest number in the club. The interests of the minority are important too since we can often learn from them and gain a wider knowledge. A genuine interest in the less popular fields of numismatics makes for a better spirit among collectors; it makes them feel more a part of the group. While our members expressed it in different ways, it adds up to the fact that they appreciate an educational programme.

Prepared talks on a series of coins or specific pieces, cleaning and grading coins, slides, experiences in collecting were all mentioned as profitable and interesting programme topics.

It was interesting to note that the commercial aspects of collecting were not preferred over the educational. Displays should be mentioned here as an important part of effective programming.

What can the A.P.N.A. do to advance numismatics? Most of our members see the A.P.N.A. only as a means of communication through the bulletin. The bulletin has a potential that will only be as effective as our members contribute and make use of it. It can hardly be expected for one hard-working guy in Halifax to do it all as has been the case in the past years.

Several have stated that they want to see advertising, want lists, and selling lists. Well go ahead! The opportunity is open. Just pay the modest fee.

Other members see the A.P.N.A. as a potential pressure group that could influence Ottawa for commemorative coinage and as one member put it to get "a decent Canadian dollar". Education, encouragement of research, club relations are a few more of the rolls we can play in the A.P.N.A. to reach the potential of which we are capable.

If you have collected seriously for even a few years, you are in a position to offer valuable advice to the new collector. Some have offered excellent advice - let's analyze it.

1. Collect the finest specimens your means will allow.

THE MEETING WAS HELD IN CONJUNCTION WITH THE A.P.N.A. FALL RALLY & COIN SHOW BEING STAGED IN MONCTON'S BRUNSWICK HOTEL.

SECRETARY-TREASURER BERNARD G. KLINE OF HALIFAX, N.S., CHAIRED THE MEETING PRIOR TO THE ELECTION OF NEW OFFICERS TO SERVE FOR THE NEXT 18 MONTHS, IN THE ABSENCE OF FORMER PRESIDENT JOHN W. STEPHENS OF DARTMOUTH, N.S. WHO WAS ILL. THE POSITION OF VICE-PRESIDENT HAS NOT BEEN FILLED SINCE THE LAST ELECTION.

OTHER OFFICERS ELECTED WERE: VICE-PRESIDENT: WENDALL ROGERS, ST. ELEANORS, P.E.I.; SECRETARY-TREASURER: BERNARD G. KLINE OF HALIFAX, N.S.; NEWSLETTER EDITOR: NELSON C. BOLTZ OF SPRYFIELD, N.S.; NOVA SCOTIA DIRECTORS: MRS. DOROTHY R. RICKARD OF HALIFAX, N.S.; MAJOR ROY R. WARD OF SYDNEY, N.S.; NEW BRUNSWICK DIRECTORS: GEOFFERY G. BELL OF MONCTON; VINCENT MITCHELL OF NEWCASTLE, N.B.; P.E.I. DIRECTORS: RICHARD W. MONTIGNY OF CHARLOTTETOWN; EARL K. KENNEDY OF CHARLOTTETOWN; NEWFOUNDLAND DIRECTORS: ROBERT D. DAWE OF ST. JOHN'S; GORDON W. TILLEY OF KELLIGREWS, NFLD.

MEMBERS WERE ENCOURAGED TO DO MORE NUMISMATIC RESEARCH, ESPECIALLY IN CONNECTION WITH ATLANTIC PROVINCES COINS, TOKENS, MEDALS AND PAPER MONEY, BY GEOFFERY BELL, WHO STATED THAT HE IS FINDING THE HOBBY A GREAT DEAL MORE INTERESTING SINCE HE PERSONALLY BEGAN A PROGRAM OF THIS NATURE. AS A FOLLOW UP TO THIS, BERNIE KLINE SUGGESTED THAT MORE MEMBERS SUBMIT NUMISMATIC ARTICLES FOR PUBLICATION IN THE ASSOCIATION NEWSLETTER. MEMBERS MAY BECOME INTERESTED IN OTHER BRANCHES OF NUMISMATICS AFTER READING OF SOMEONE ELSE'S EXPERIENCES IN A CERTAIN FIELD. THE EXECUTIVE WILL INVESTIGATE THE POSSIBILITY OF THE A.P.N.A. AWARDING SPECIAL CERTIFICATES TO MEMBERS IN RECOGNITION FOR WORK DONE ON NUMISMATIC RESEARCH WHICH IS PRESENTED EITHER IN THE NEWSLETTER OR AT ONE OF THE SEMI-ANNUAL SHOWS.

MEMBERS WERE TOLD THAT PHOTOGRAPHY IS PLAYING AN EVER INCREASING ROLE IN THE SCIENCE OF NUMISMATICS. MANY MEMBERS ARE PHOTOGRAPHING THEIR CHOICE COINS, MEDALS, ETC., SOME IN BLACK AND WHITE PRINTS AND ALSO IN COLOR SLIDES.

THE SECRETARY-TREASURER REPORTED THAT THE ASSOCIATION HAS INCREASED ITS PAID-UP MEMBERSHIP FROM 135 LAST YEAR TO A NEW ALL-TIME HIGH OF 183, INCLUDING 9 MEMBER COIN CLUBS IN THE ATLANTIC PROVINCES. WHILE THE MAJORITY OF MEMBERS RESIDE IN THE FOUR PROVINCES, THE ASSOCIATION HAS A NUMBER OF MEMBERS IN QUEBEC AND ONTARIO WITH OTHERS IN SUCH FAR AWAY PLACES AS BRITISH COLUMBIA, PENNSYLVANIA, CALIFORNIA, AND EVEN FRANCE.

THE ASSOCIATION OPERATED WITH A SMALL PROFIT DURING THE PAST 18 MONTHS FISCAL PERIOD, DESPITE THE SHARP INCREASE IN POSTAGE COSTS. IT WAS DECIDED TO LEAVE THE DUES AT \$1.00 FOR THE PRESENT, BUT MEMBERS ARE ASKED WHEN SUBMITTING THEIR 1970 DUES TO INCLUDE A LITTLE EXTRA FOR POSTAGE AND IF REMITTING BY CHEQUE, TO INCLUDE THE BANK EXCHANGE CHARGE.

THE SPRING 1970 RALLY AND COIN SHOW WILL BE HOSTED BY THE SAINT JOHN COIN CLUB AT THE ADMIRAL BEATTY HOTEL IN SAINT JOHN, NEW BRUNSWICK NEXT MAY.

MISS MCGRAA STATES THAT SHE IS VERY PROUD OF HER COLLECTION OF CANADIAN COINS AND PAPER MONEY AND IS INTERESTED IN LEARNING MORE ABOUT THESE ITEMS. SHE FIRST HEARD ABOUT OUR ASSOCIATION THROUGH HER GOOD FRIEND AND MEMBER, ROBERT CROWELL OF EAST LAWRENCETOWN, WHO SENT HER COPIES OF THE A.P.N.A. NEWSLETTERS. MISS MCGRAA IS ALSO INTERESTED IN HEARING MORE ABOUT THE A.P.N.A. MEDAL SERIES WHICH WAS STARTED SEVERAL YEARS AGO.

GUEST SPEAKER - THE GUEST SPEAKER AT THE A.P.N.A. FALL RALLY IN MONCTON WAS MAJOR SHELDON CARROL. BELOW IS A COPY OF THE TALK THAT HE GAVE:

NEW BRUNSWICK CURRENCY

BY MAJOR SHELDON S. CARROLL, CURATOR, NUMISMATIC COLLECTION, BANK OF CANADA, OTTAWA.

NUMISMATISTS OF NEW BRUNSWICK ARE VERY FORTUNATE IN THAT IT IS POSSIBLE TO ASSEMBLE A FAIRLY LARGE AND INTERESTING COLLECTION OF COINS,

TOKENS AND PAPER MONEY WITHOUT LOOKING BEYOND THE BOUNDARIES OF THEIR OWN PROVINCE. THE NUMISMATIC HISTORY OF NEW BRUNSWICK COVERS A PERIOD OF OVER 150 YEARS AND INCLUDES A WIDE AND VARIED RANGE OF NUMISMATIC MATERIAL. NEW BRUNSWICK WAS ESTABLISHED IN 1785 WHEN IT WAS SEPARATED FROM NOVA SCOTIA OF WHICH IT HAD PREVIOUSLY FORMED A PART. AT FIRST THE POPULATION WAS SMALL AND THERE WAS NOT A GREAT NEED FOR COINS BEYOND WHAT COULD BE MET BY FRENCH, BRITISH, AMERICAN AND SPANISH-AMERICAN COINS OBTAINED IN TRADE.

BY THE EARLY 1840'S POPULATION AND TRADE HAD INCREASED SO THAT THERE DEVELOPED A CONSIDERABLE DEMAND FOR A LOCAL CURRENCY. FINALLY IN 1843 NEW BRUNSWICK RECEIVED THE RIGHT TO ISSUE COPPER COINS. AN ISSUE OF 480,000 HALFPENNIES AND 480,000 PENNIES WAS STRUCK IN ENGLAND AND PUT INTO CIRCULATION THAT YEAR. IN ORDER TO SHOW THAT THEY WERE NOT OFFICIAL COINS ISSUED BY THE BRITISH CROWN THEY BORE THE WORDS PENNY TOKEN OR HALFPENNY TOKEN. AFTER THESE SEMI-OFFICIAL COINS HAD ALREADY BEEN PUT INTO CIRCULATION THE COLONIAL OFFICE DISAPPROVED OF THE DESIGN BECAUSE THE OBERSE SHOWED A DIADEMED HEAD OF QUEEN VICTORIA WHICH HAD NOT BEFORE BEEN USED ON COINAGE. HOWEVER, THE DISAPPROVAL DID NOT EXTEND TO WITHDRAWING THE COINS AND THEY WERE ALLOWED TO REMAIN IN CIRCULATION.

THIS SUPPLY OF COPPER COINS APPEARS TO HAVE BEEN SUFFICIENT TO MEET THE NEEDS OF THE COLONY FOR APPROXIMATELY 10 YEARS. IN 1854 ANOTHER QUANTITY OF 480,000 HALFPENNIES AND 480,000 PENNIES WAS STRUCK AND RELEASED. THE NEW ISSUED SHOWED QUEEN VICTORIA WITH HER HAIR BOUND WITH TWO BANDS OR RIBBONS AND THE WORDING ON THE REVERSE OF THE COINS WAS CHANGED TO READ ONE PENNY CURRENCY OR HALF PENNY CURRENCY. BOTH ISSUES HAD AS THEIR MAIN REVERSE FEATURE A FRIGATE RIDING AT ANCHOR. THESE FRIGATE PENNIES AND HALFPENNIES, AS THEY ARE FREQUENTLY CALLED, ARE CONSIDERED TO BE AMONG THE MOST HANDSOME AND ATTRACTIVE OF BRITISH COLONIAL COINS. MANY DIES MUST HAVE BEEN USED IN THE PRODUCTION OF THESE SEMI-OFFICIAL COINS AS A LARGE NUMBER OF DIES VARIETIES EXISTS. DR. E. G. COURTEAU IN HIS "COINS AND TOKENS OF NEW BRUNSWICK," PUBLISHED IN 1923, DESCRIBED 18 VARIETIES OF THE 1843 HALFPENNIES, 9 VARIETIES OF THE 1843 PENNIES, 12 VARIETIES OF THE 1854 HALFPENNIES AND 11 VARIETIES OF THE 1854 PENNIES, MAKING A TOTAL OF 50 VARIETIES.

BECAUSE THE PENNIES AND HALFPENNIES OF 1843 AND 1854 WENT A LONG WAY TOWARDS MEETING THE NEED FOR SMALL CHANGE IN NEW BRUNSWICK THERE WAS NOT THE SAME COMPULSION FOR MERCHANTS TO ISSUE PRIVATE TOKENS AS WAS THE CASE IN NOVA SCOTIA AND UPPER AND LOWER CANADA. ONLY TWO PIECES FALL INTO THIS CATEGORY. THEY ARE THE SAINT JOHN, NEW BRUNSWICK, HALFPENNY TOKEN WHICH, ACCORDING TO ITS REVERSE LEGEND WAS ISSUED "FOR PUBLIC ACCOMMODATION" AND THE VERY RARE TOKEN ISSUED BY F. McDERMOTT OF KING ST., SAINT JOHN, NEW BRUNSWICK, WHO STYLED HIMSELF AS "IMPORTER OF ENGLISH, FRENCH AND GERMAN FANCY GOODS."

ONE MATTER THAT GREATLY COMPLICATED BUSINESS AND COMMERCE IN NEW BRUNSWICK IN THE EARLY DAYS WAS THE PROBLEM OF MONIES OF ACCOUNT. TRADE WITH ENGLAND WAS CARRIED ON IN POUNDS, SHILLINGS AND PENCE WHILE TRADE WITH THE NEW ENGLAND STATES WAS CARRIED ON IN DOLLARS AND CENTS. IN 1852 AN ACT WAS PASSED PERMITTING ACCOUNTS TO BE IN DOLLARS AND CENTS ALTHOUGH THE UNIT OF ACCOUNT WAS STILL FIXED AS THE POUND STERLING. THIS CONFUSING SITUATION WAS PARTLY REMEDIED IN 1860 WHEN ANOTHER ACT WAS PASSED REQUIRING ACCOUNTS TO BE KEPT IN DOLLARS AND CENTS BUT PERMITTING A SECOND COLUMN FOR STERLING VALUES. OTHER PROVISIONS OF THIS ACT ARE OF PARTICULAR INTEREST TO US BECAUSE THIS ACT ALSO AUTHORIZED THE ISSUE OF SILVER AND COPPER COINS. THE LOCAL

LEGISLATURE DECIDED TO ISSUE DECIMAL COINS SIMILAR TO THOSE WHICH HAVE BEEN PRODUCED JUST TWO YEARS EARLIER IN 1858 FOR THE PROVINCE OF CANADA. THE ORDER FOR THE COINS WAS PLACED IN 1860, THE ORDER TO CONSIST OF 1,000,000 BRONZE CENTS, 100,000 SILVER 5¢ PIECES, 150,000 10¢ PIECES AND 150,000 20¢ PIECES. BECAUSE OF OTHER ORDERS THE ROYAL MINT WAS ABLE TO PRODUCE ONLY THE BRONZE CENTS IN 1861. ALTHOUGH NONE HAD BEEN ORDERED, 222,800 HALF CENT PIECES DATED 1861 WERE ALSO PRODUCED AND SHIPPED TO NEW BRUNSWICK. IT HAS NEVER BEEN POSSIBLE TO DETERMINE EXACTLY HOW THIS MISTAKE OCCURRED BUT IT IS BELIEVED THAT CONFUSION AROSE AT THE ROYAL MINT OVER THE FACT THAT CENTS AND HALF CENTS WERE ALSO BEING STRUCK IN THAT YEAR FOR NOVA SCOTIA. NONE OF THESE UNWANTED HALF CENTS WERE OFFICIALLY ISSUED BUT IN SOME MANNER SOME PIECES DID ESCAPE INTO CIRCULATION. THEY ARE QUITE SCARCE TODAY PARTICULARLY IN CHOICE CONDITION.

THE SILVER COINS IN THE DENOMINATIONS OF 5¢, 10¢, AND 20¢ WERE NOT PRODUCED AND ISSUED UNTIL 1862. THE FACE VALUE OF THE BRONZE COINS OF 1861 AND THE SILVER COINS OF 1862 AMOUNTED TO \$60,000. IT IS INTERESTING TO NOTE THAT THE TOTAL COST TO THE GOVERNMENT OF NEW BRUNSWICK FOR THE PURCHASE OF THE BRONZE METAL, THE SILVER BULLION, THE COINAGE EXPENSES INCLUDING PRODUCTION OF DIES AND PACKING EXPENSES TOTALLED A LITTLE OVER £10,500 WHICH LEFT THE GOVERNMENT A PROFIT OF ROUGHLY \$7,500 WHICH IS NOT VERY GREAT CONSIDERING THAT OTHER EXPENSES WOULD BE INCURRED IN SHIPPING CHARGES AND COSTS INVOLVED IN GETTING THE COINS INTO CIRCULATION. THESE COINS WERE DESIGNED BY THE FAMOUS BRITISH MINT ENGRAVER LEONARD CHARLES WYON. THE REVERSE OF THE SILVER PIECES SHOWS A WREATH OF MAPLE LEAVES WHICH ARE LARGER THAN THOSE APPEARING ON THE 1858 SILVER COINAGE OF THE PROVINCE OF CANADA. THIS WAS A DESIGN THAT HAD BEEN CONSIDERED FOR THE COINS OF THE PROVINCE OF CANADA IN 1858 BUT WAS REJECTED.

CORRESPONDENCE IN THE ARCHIVES OF THE ROYAL MINT SHOWS THAT THE 1858 SILVER COINAGE WAS NOT POPULAR IN THE PROVINCE OF CANADA AND THE LONDON OFFICIALS EVEN WENT SO FAR AS TO TRY TO DISSUADE NEW BRUNSWICK FROM INTRODUCING A SIMILAR ISSUE OF SILVER COINS. IT WOULD APPEAR THAT THE ADVICE WAS ILL-FOUNDED AS BY 1864 NEW BRUNSWICK FOUND A NEED FOR A REPEAT ORDER OF THE SAME SIZE AS THE FIRST ORDER WITH THE EXCEPTION THAT THE NUMBER OF 10¢ PIECES WAS REDUCED FROM 150,000 TO 100,000. THESE ISSUED OF 1861, 1862 AND 1864 WERE SUFFICIENT TO SUPPLY THE NEEDS OF NEW BRUNSWICK UNTIL THE DOMINION OF CANADA COINS WERE INTRODUCED IN 1870.

THE NEED FOR CURRENCY IN THE EARLY DAYS OF NEW BRUNSWICK WENT BEYOND THE NEED FOR SMALL CHANGE WHICH, AS WE HAVE JUST SEEN, HAD ALREADY BEEN MET BY THE ISSUE OF TOKENS AND LATER DECIMAL COINS. AT A VERY EARLY STAGE THE MERCHANTS IN THE LARGER CENTRES SAW A NEED FOR PAPER MONEY AND BANKING FACILITIES. DETERMINED ACTION WAS TAKEN AND THIS BORE FRUIT IN 1820 WHEN THE BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK WAS CHARTERED AND OPENED FOR BUSINESS. NEW BRUNSWICKERS MAY WELL BE PROUD OF THE BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK AS IT WAS THE FIRST CHARTERED BANK IN CANADA. IT IS TRUE THAT SEVERAL OTHER BANKS HAD OPENED IN UPPER AND LOWER CANADA A FEW YEARS PRIOR TO THIS BUT THEY HAD BEGUN BUSINESS WITHOUT A CHARTER. FOR EXAMPLE THE BANK OF MONTREAL WHICH HAD OPENED FOR BUSINESS IN 1817 UNDER THE NAME OF THE MONTREAL BANK, DID NOT RECEIVE ITS CHARTER UNTIL 1822. IT IS THE OLDEST CHARTERED BANK STILL DOING BUSINESS IN CANADA BUT THE FIRST CHARTER TO BE GRANTED TO A CANADIAN BANK WAS THAT OF THE BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK. THIS BANK BECAME A STRONG AND SUCCESSFUL BANK AND CONTINUED UNTIL 1913 WHEN IT WAS ABSORBED BY THE BANK OF NOVA SCOTIA.

FIVE YEARS LATER THE CHARLOTTE COUNTY BANK OPENED FOR BUSINESS IN ST. ANDREWS. NINE YEARS PASSED BEFORE ANOTHER BANK OPENED IN NEW BRUNSWICK. 1834 WAS A VERY GOOD YEAR FOR LAUNCHING BANKS IN THIS PROVINCE AS IN THAT YEAR THE WESTMORLAND COUNTY BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK OPENED AT BEND OF PETITCODIAC (BETTER KNOWN TODAY AS MONCTON), THE CENTRAL BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK OPENED AT FREDERICTON AND THE COMMERCIAL BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK OPENED AT SAINT JOHN. IN 1836 TWO MORE BANKS BEGAN BUSINESS, THE ST. STEPHEN'S BANK AT ST. STEPHEN AND THE CITY BANK OF ST. JOHN AT SAINT JOHN. THE FOLLOWING YEAR SAW THE OPENING OF THE BANK OF FREDERICTON AT FREDERICTON. THE LAST TWO BANKS HAD A VERY SHORT HISTORY. THE CITY BANK OF ST. JOHN MERGED WITH THE BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK IN 1839. THE BANK OF FREDERICTON AFTER AN INGLOURIOUS HISTORY OF LESS THAN TWO YEARS FAILED IN 1838. DURING THE 1840'S AND 1850'S THERE WAS NO CHANGE IN THE ROSTER OF BANKS IN NEW BRUNSWICK BUT THE 1860'S BROUGHT DISASTER TO FOUR BANKS, ALL OF WHICH WERE FORCED TO CLOSE THEIR DOORS. THE CHARLOTTE COUNTY BANK CLOSED IN 1865, THE WESTMORLAND COUNTY BANK AND THE CENTRAL BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK BOTH CLOSED IN 1862 AND THE COMMERCIAL BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK CLOSED IN 1868. IT IS TO THE CREDIT OF ALL FOUR OF THESE BANKS THAT THEIR NOTES WERE REDEEMED AT FACE VALUE FOR A SHORT PERIOD OF TIME. THIS IS THE MAIN REASON WHY THE NOTES OF THESE BANKS, WITH THE EXCEPTION OF THOSE OF THE WESTMORLAND COUNTY BANK, ARE SO VERY SCARCE TODAY.

ALTHOUGH THE 1860'S BROUGHT MISFORTUNE TO FOUR OF THE BANKS OF NEW BRUNSWICK THERE WERE STILL OPTIMISTS IN THE PROVINCE. THE PEOPLES BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK WAS CHARTERED AT FREDERICTON IN 1864 AND THE MARITIME BANK OF THE DOMINION OF CANADA OPENED AT SAINT JOHN IN 1872. THE PEOPLES BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK CARRIED ON SUCCESSFULLY FOR OVER FORTY YEARS AND WAS ABSORBED IN 1907 BY THE BANK OF MONTREAL. THE MARITIME BANK WHICH WAS THE LAST BANK TO BE FOUNDED IN NEW BRUNSWICK WAS LESS SUCCESSFUL AND HAD TO CEASE OPERATIONS IN 1887. AGAIN, TO ITS CREDIT, ITS NOTES WERE REDEEMED AT FACE VALUE FOR A PERIOD OF TIME.

ALTHOUGH NEW BRUNSWICK HAD A RELATIVELY SMALL POPULATION DURING THE NINETEENTH CENTURY, THERE WAS SUFFICIENT TRADE AND COMMERCE TO JUSTIFY THE FOUNDING OF 10 BANKS. DURING THE 20-YEAR PERIOD FROM 1817 TO 1837, OF THE 26 BANKS FOUNDED IN CANADA 8 WERE FOUNDED IN NEW BRUNSWICK, OR ALMOST ONE THIRD OF THE CANADIAN BANKS. MOST OF THE NEW BRUNSWICK BANKS HAD THEIR HEAD OFFICES IN SAINT JOHN AND FREDERICTON WHICH WERE THE MAIN CENTRES OF COMMERCE. SAINT JOHN HAD 4 AND FREDERICTON HAD 3. SAINT ANDREWS, MONCTON AND ST. STEPHEN HAD 1 EACH. MANY EXAMPLES OF THE NOTES OF THESE TEN NEW BRUNSWICK BANKS CAN BE FOUND IN THE NATIONAL NUMISMATIC COLLECTION OF THE BANK OF CANADA.

NEW BRUNSWICK HAS PRODUCED MANY BUSINESS MEN WHO FOUNDED BANKS BUT THERE HAVE ALSO BEEN A CONSIDERABLE NUMBER OF PEOPLE IN NEW BRUNSWICK WHO WANTED TO FOUND BANKS. IN ADDITION TO THE 10 BANKS WHICH ACTUALLY OPERATED, CHARTERS WERE GRANTED TO 9 OTHER BANKS WHICH NEVER OPERATED. THESE WERE THE SHEDIAC BANK INCORPORATED AT SHEDIAC IN 1856, THE MIRAMICHI BANK INCORPORATED AT CHATHAM IN 1857, THE WOODSTOCK BANK INCORPORATED AT WOODSTOCK IN 1865, THE ALBERT BANK INCORPORATED IN ALBERT COUNTY IN 1866, THE NORTHERN BANK INCORPORATED AT CHATHAM IN 1866, THE EASTERN BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK INCORPORATED IN WESTMORLAND COUNTY IN 1867, THE MERCHANTS BANK OF NEW BRUNSWICK INCORPORATED AT SAINT JOHN IN 1867, THE BANK OF SAINT JOHN INCORPORATED AT SAINT JOHN IN 1872 AND FINALLY THE EASTERN BANK OF CANADA INCORPORATED AT SAINT JOHN AS LATE AS 1928.

THE HISTORY OF THE NEW BRUNSWICK BANKS DOES NOT TELL THE WHOLE STORY OF PAPER MONEY IN THIS PROVINCE. A NUMBER OF MERCHANTS ALSO ISSUED PAPER MONEY WHICH CIRCULATED AS FAR AS THEY WERE KNOWN. NOT A GREAT DEAL IS KNOWN ABOUT MOST OF THESE EARLY MERCHANTS AND EVEN LESS IS KNOWN ABOUT THEIR NOTE ISSUES. WITH ONE EXCEPTION, THEIR NOTES ARE EITHER VERY RARE OR UNIQUE. PROBABLY BEST KNOWN ARE THE 5 SHILLING AND 10 SHILLING NOTES WHICH WERE ISSUED BY BENJAMIN SMITH IN SAINT JOHN IN 1835. A HOARD OF THESE NOTES CAME TO LIGHT A FEW YEARS AGO AND AS A RESULT THEY ARE IN QUITE GOOD SUPPLY AMONG PAPER MONEY COLLECTORS. IN 1839 GEO. F. WILLIAMS AND J. M. & C. CONNELL OR CORNELL ISSUED NOTES FOR 2 SHILLINGS 6 PENCE AT WOODSTOCK IN 1839. THE TOBIQUE MILL COMPANY ISSUED NOTES FOR \$4 OR 20 SHILLINGS AT FREDERICTON IN THE 1840'S. UNSIGNED AND UNDATED NOTES EXIST IN THE DENOMINATIONS OF \$1 AND \$10 WHICH WERE INTENDED FOR ISSUE SOMETIME IN THE 1800'S BY SOMEONE AT WELSHPOOL IN THE ISLAND OF CAMPOBELLO. PAPER TOKENS IN THE FORM OF ROUND DISCS OF CARDBOARD IN THE DENOMINATION OF \$2 WERE ISSUED AT POKEMOUCHE AND SIMILAR TOKENS IN THE DENOMINATIONS OF 5¢, \$1.00 AND \$5.00 ARE KNOWN TO HAVE BEEN USED IN SHEDIAC. EXAMPLES OF ALL THESE MERCHANTS NOTES ARE IN THE BANK OF CANADA'S NUMISMATIC COLLECTION.

I THINK THAT YOU WILL AGREE WITH ME THAT THIS SHORT NUMISMATIC HISTORY OF NEW BRUNSWICK BEARS OUT MY CONTENTION THAT THERE IS MUCH NATIVE NUMISMATIC MATERIAL TO BE COLLECTED BY THE NUMISMATISTS OF NEW BRUNSWICK. I HAVE NOT TRIED TO TOUCH ON THE FIELD OF MEDALS OR THE MORE MODERN MERCHANTS TOKENS, TRANSPORTATION TOKENS, WOODEN NICKELS, ETC., ETC. THERE IS A GREAT VARIETY OF NUMISMATIC MATERIAL TO BE COLLECTED AND MUCH THAT IS STILL UNKNOWN. IT IS ALWAYS A GREAT THRILL FOR A COLLECTOR TO OBTAIN A PIECE THAT HE KNOWS TO BE RARE BUT IT IS AN EVEN GREATER THRILL TO DISCOVER A PIECE THAT WAS PREVIOUSLY UNKNOWN. MUCH OF THE HISTORY OF MANY NEW BRUNSWICK ITEMS IS VERY SKETCHY. THIS IS PARTICULARLY TRUE OF MERCHANTS TOKENS AND MERCHANTS NOTES AND THE PEOPLE WHO ISSUED THEM. IT IS BECAUSE THERE IS ALWAYS MORE TO COLLECT AND MORE TO LEARN THAT MAKES NUMISMATICS SUCH A FASCINATING HOBBY.

HICKEY IS ALSO TO BE ASKED TO COMMENT ON SUCH AN UNDERTAKING. MR. MOASE SUGGESTED THAT THE CLUB WRITE MR. BENSON AGAIN NEXT YEAR TO LET HIM KNOW WE ARE STILL ANXIOUS TO HAVE A 1973 COMMEMORATIVE DOLLAR.

A FINANCIAL STATEMENT BY THE TREASURER, RICHARD MONTIGNY, SHOWED A BANK BALANCE OF \$65.93 WITH A BILL OUTSTANDING. MR. A LETTER WAS RECEIVED BY MR. ROGERS DURING THE MEETING FROM CAPT. J. B. HARTFORD OF STRATFORD, ONTARIO REQUESTING A LIFE MEMBERSHIP IN THE P.E.I. NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION. HIS MEMBERSHIP DUES WERE RECEIVED BY THE CLUB; HE WILL BE LM#1. AN ADVERTISEMENT IS TO BE PUT IN THE LOCAL PAPER BEFORE NEXT MEETING ENCOURAGING NEW MEMBERS. MR. DOANE MOVED THAT ALL NEW PAID UP MEMBERS RECEIVE A 1968 PL DOLLAR AT THE NOVEMBER MEETING. MR. P.E.I. Numismatic Association

The regular monthly meeting of the Prince Edward Island Numismatic Association was held on Monday, November 17th at the Royal Canadian Legion, Charlottetown. There were 11 members and six guests present.

The meeting opened at 7:35 with a welcome to Hon. T. E. Hickey, Provincial Treasurer, and other guests to the meeting by T.N. Rogers, Club President. The minutes of the October meeting were read by the Secretary, Richard W. Montigny, and were adopted as read.

In business arising from the minutes the matter of increasing club dues by \$1.00 for automatic membership to the A.P.N.A. was discussed. It was moved by Mr. Harley Ings and seconded by Mr. Tim Henderson that club dues be increased by \$1.00 for membership in the A.P.N.A. Motion carried. He is to be asked for his comments regarding the correct procedure to cause this to come into being. A copy is to be forwarded to

the Master of the Mint, and the Provincial Treasurer.

Mr. Rogers welcomed five new members to the club. They each received a nickel dollar.

On a British American Bank Note the seven is curved while on a Canadian Bank Note the seven is straight. With a one, on the Canadian Bank Note it is sloped on the very end and on the British American Note it comes straight to the very end.

Truro Coin Club

Club president Ray Peppard acted as chairman of the meeting which proved both interesting and enlightening to the members.

Don Allen gave a very interesting talk on the New Canadian bank notes which will be coming off the presses in a short time, this being the first changes since the first appearance of Queen Elizabeth II notes which appeared in 1954. The \$1., \$2., \$5., \$10., \$20., \$50., \$100. bills all had the effigy of the queen thereon but the new series will be changed somewhat.

The \$1., \$2., and \$20. will have the portrait of the queen thereon, a new mature likeness of her majesty. The picture of Sir John A. MacDonald on the \$10.00; Wilfred Laurier will adorn the \$5.00 bank note; W. Lyon MacKenzie King the \$50.00; Sir Robert L. Borden on the \$100.00 bank note.

A question and answer period followed the talk and proved interesting as well.

The club president gave a short talk on the Daniel Cock Communion Token. The Reverend Cock was the first Presbyterian minister CALLED to Canada and Truro prides itself in the fact that the presbyterian congregation on September 13, 1770 called Mr. Cock. Mr. Cock, along with his family arrived in Truro in 1772 and he brought with him some communion tokens and the dies from which the tokens were struck. Mr. Peppard displayed one of these tokens, about 3/4 inch across, blank on the reverse but the obverse having two rings. Between the rings is the inscription "Truro, Nova Scotia, 1772" and in the centre of the token is Mr. (Minister) D. (Daniel) C. (Cock.)

The speaker gave a brief outline of Communion or Sacramental Tokens and showed a sketch of the First Meeting House in Truro, erected in 1969, excerpts from "Nova Scotia Sketches 1949" by the Late Frank A. Doane, Truro.

The president presented an A.N.A. award to Don Allen for his talk to the club on Paper Money which he gave at the November meeting.

A film on the Canadian Mint did not arrive on time to be viewed at the meeting. A set of slides, curious money of the World is expected to be on hand for showing at the Annual Meeting in February.

Some discussion ensued regarding a club insigna, crest or whatever and members were asked to bring in rough sketches to the February meeting.

Service Medal

Roy Mabey has discovered what he feels to be, the first published article on the North-West Territory Service Medal.

The following article was on page 202 of "The Graphic", a London England weekly Tabloid newspaper dated February 20, 1886.

"War Medal-North West Territory, Canada"

Official notice was given in September last that the Canadian Government had been advised by the Imperial Government of Her Majesty the Queen's intention to award medals to the Canadian Troops (numbering somewhat less than 6,000 men) engaged in suppressing rebellion in the North-West Territories of Canada.

Should the North-West Mounted Police be considered by the Government (as it is anticipated they will be) entitled to the medal, this number will be increased about seven per cent. The Home authorities at that time only awaited from the Canadian Government the design from the obverse side to complete a die for a medal, which will be shortly issued from the Royal Mint, where the work has been executed.

One side of this medal is similar to the "Egypt" medal; on the other, encircling the words and date, "North-West, 1885, Canada" is displayed a wreath of maple leaf, which is also introduced into the coinage, and in the arms of Canada. The ribbon is red and blue.

Miniature copies of the Service medal may be obtained from Messrs. E. And E. Emanuel, of 3. The Hard, Portsea, whom we have to thank for the design and particulars we have published.

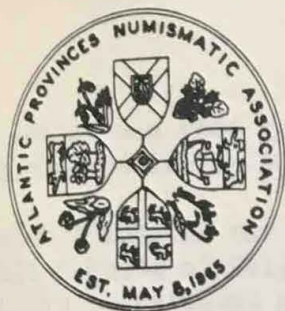

NEW LIGHT ON AN OLD TOKEN

By K. Roy Mabee

MacLaughlin in his historic work of 1886 describes the coins and medals of New Brunswick as few in Number and almost devoid of historical interest. This is true if we keep in mind the time that he was writing and the incompleteness of some of the research. There is at least one consolation that dispels this stigma. We have been fortunate that so many coins and medals of New Brunswick have been the work of the Wyons, who were masters at the art of design and die-making.

We have been brought to a standstill by the traditional works of Breton, Le-Roux, McLaughlin, etc., whose works have continued relatively unchanged to the basis of our present day standard catalogues, or should I say static catalogues. I don't mean to discredit the old masters, but I am sure that if they were living today they would be expanding their material to include previously unlisted pieces, and to shed new light on known items. The great numismatists of the last century did not always have access to the archives and other reference material that is available today. To borrow a title from an article written by Sheldon Carroll, and published in the C. N.A. Journal several years ago: "The Old masters Can be Wrong."

The numismatists who did the research on the McDermott token of Saint John, N. B., have left us with a vagueness and an uncertainty as to its history. McLaughlin states that the token was struck in the United States between 1850 - 1860. A search of the Saint John newspapers for the years 1853, 1854, 1855, and 1856, failed to reveal any advertisement relating to his business. The first business directory of Saint John now available, that of 1857, did not list McDermott, nor did the 1863 directory, or subsequent directories.

According to the Register of Voters, etc. City of Saint John 1785 - 1862, Francis McDermott, Painter, was registered as a Freeman of that city in 1836. Avery's Almanack of 1845 carried the following advertisement:-

LOOKING GLASS AND PICTURE FRAME
MANUFACTURER
GERMAIN STREET
ST. JOHN, N. B.
WHERE MAY BE HAD, AT WHOLESALE AND RETAIL,
LOOKING GLASSES
AND PICTURE FRAMES
IN GREAT VARIETY
WINDOR CORNICES,
AND POLES
CONVEX AND PLAIN MIRRORS
LOOKING GLASS PLATES
PICTURE & WINDOW GLASS

ENGRAVINGS
PRINTS & & &

The only inconsistency between the advertisement and the token is the address. The almanac shown a Germain Street address while the token records it as King Street.

Further investigation revealed an advertisement for July 26, 1842, and one for May 4, 1843, relating to silver plating as found in The New Brunswick Courier. McDermott did not advertise in the 1846 almanac.

We have now established the firm to be in business from July 26, 1842, to the time of the printing in Avery's Almanack in 1845, a period of approximately two and one-half years. It is unlikely that the firm was in business much longer than this, yet it would be long enough to move from King Street to Germain Street. At what period during these years was the token struck? I would suggest prior to 1845 with the change in address as the only clue. From the above evidence I believe that the date should be at least ten years earlier than the suggested date of 1855 as stated in Charleton.

My copy of the McDermott token came from a collection that had been established at least 60 years ago and has been assessed as the finest copy in existence by a prominent numismatist; however, it does not resemble the copies in the Bank of Canada Museum in either colour, surface, nor does it have a clean-cut rim.

The envelope in which the token was originally purchased marked "McDermott" shows George A. Lowe, 47 Adelaide Street East, Toronto, as the dealer. My study has not included research into the dates that this firm was in operation, however, I would welcome information on it.

It is the first account of a variety of this token that I have heard of, or is it as some would suggest, a counterfeit? If it is a counterfeit, it was done a long time ago. Since this token is very rare, is it conceivable that the others are the counterfeits and the copy in my possession is the real thing?

Some of my collector "friends" are amused that I would acquire such a specimen and be pleased to regard it as highly as I do. In the meantime, I'm in the market for the variety.

Who Us, an A. P. N. A. Show?

By Geoff Bell

Recently, your President asked me if I could jot down a few ideas regarding the organization of an A. P. N. A. Show. Firstly, it is not nearly the responsibility and problem that many people believe. I have attempted to list suggestions in chronological order.

1. Obtain a hall or room at least six months in advance at a central, well known location, with good parking facilities. Make certain your room is large enough for bourse, display education and auction areas. Cost: varies according to local conditions.
2. As soon as you decide to have a show, invite the various banks, Bank of Canada, Trust Companies, etc. - to have displays at your shows. (i.e. Bank of Canada collection, Bank of Nova Scotia Gold Display.) What wonderful publicity this can give your show.
3. A good month in advance begin your publicity program. You should design posters, large, bright, and attractive. Place in store windows and prominent places three weeks before the show. Prepare your paid publicity for the local newspapers. Get your mayor to declare the week previous to the show "coin week." Send in announcements of the show to Coin, Stamp, Antique News, Coin World, Numismatic News, C. N. A. Journal, and the A.P.N.A. Newsletter. Approach your local T. V. and radio stations for full publicity beginning at least one week before the show. It doesn't hurt to write local and out-of-town dealers informing them about the show. Cost: approximately \$50.00.
4. Purchase tickets and other items required at the door. Cost: under five dollars.
5. Arrange to have tight security precautions, preferably R.C.M.P. or local police on duty all during the show. Cost here will be less than fifty dollars, a good investment.
6. Prepare your education display materials a week before the show begins. On the day of the show arrangements should be ready to -
 1. Have hall set up two hours before doors open (i.e. tables, display area, etc.)
 2. Have man in charge of displays to greet displayers, ticket them, and to obtain cases for them. (Your club should own 10-20 cases.)
 3. Have a bourse chairman - collect dues for tables early in the day.
 4. Have someone in charge of the education section of your show.
 5. Have someone to meet reporters, photographers, etc.
 6. Have security chairman outline duties to policemen on duty.
 7. Have coffee and donuts for dealers and visitors.

The following suggestions should also be considered -

1. Get an extra large room, have ash-trays, lights and chairs for bourse dealers.
2. Treat the dealers well. Offer them cases, coffee and donuts, etc.
3. Keep admissions at door down to 25¢ and children under 12 allow in free.
4. Have your display section organized well. Appoint qualified judges (this is greatest weakness of most shows.)
5. Have good prizes for display winners. (i.e. coins, medals, etc.)
6. Education section - have numismatic books on display, keep films and filmstrips going all day.
7. Don't try to make a large amount of money. The Moncton Coin Club attempt to split even although we generally make from \$15. - \$50. a show.
8. Publicity is the key to a good show. Do this well and the rest will fall into place.
9. Don't have an auction unless it is well organized with interesting and good quality material. Hold it in a separate room.
10. Get as many members as possible of your club involved. Six can do it but we don't want talk of cliques.

I have probably omitted something, but it is my hope that your club will find this article helpful in planning your next show.

Truro Coin Club

The January meeting of the Truro Coin Club was held at the home of the secretary, Harry Forbes.

Ray Peppard, president, introduced Don Allen who gave a talk on the new Canadian bank notes which will be issued in the near future. The change of appearance is the first since Queen Elizabeth first appeared on the notes in 1954.

New Canadian bank notes portraying, on different denominations, four Canadian prime ministers, the Queen, built on distinctly Canadian traditions in bank note port-taiture and could represent a higher degree of security in Canadian paper money, Harold Don Allen, past president of the International Bank Note Society and associate editor of the Canadian Paper Money Journal, said in his talk.

Following the talk on notes, a question and answer period was held.

Allen accepted an educational award from Peppard, through the cooperation of the American Numismatic Association for his talk on Paper Money, which he gave at an earlier meeting.

Peppard gave a talk on the Daniel Cock Communion Token. The Rev. Cock was the first Presbyterian minister to be called in Canada and Truro prides itself in the fact that the Presbyterian congregation on September 13, 1770, called Rev. Cock, along

with his family. They arrived in 1772 and he brought some communion tokens with him and the dies from which they were struck.

Peppard displayed one of the tokens, about 3/4 inch across, blank on the reverse but the obverse had two rings. Between the rings was the inscription "Truro, Nova Scotia, 1772, and in the center, "Mr. D.C."

Peppard then gave a brief outline of Communion or Sacrament tokens and showed sketch of the first meeting house in Truro, from Frank A. Doane's book, "Nova Scotia Sketches."

RESEARCH IS FASCINATING

BY GEOFF BELL

RECENTLY, AT THE C. N. A. SHOW IN TORONTO, I HAD THE GOOD FORTUNE TO ACQUIRE A SILVER MONCTON MEDAL. ON THE OBTVERSE WAS PRINTED "MARITIME AGRICULTURAL AND INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITION, MONCTON, N. B., 1889." PRINTED ON THE REVERSE WAS "PRESENTED TO C. H. DUNLAP FOR MEERSCHAUM AND BRIER PIPES." BEING A MONCTON MEDAL, I FELT THE COMPULSION TO FIND SOMETHING OUT ABOUT THE MEDAL.

IT SEEMED TO ME, THE LOGICAL PLACE TO LOOK WOULD BE THE MICROFILM FILES OF THE MONCTON TIMES AND TRANSCRIPT. THESE FILES PROVED TO BE THE BEGINNING OF A FASCINATING STORY. IN THE DAILY TRANSCRIPT OF MONDAY, SEPT. 2, 1889, THERE APPEARED AN ADVERTISEMENT CONCERNING THE EXHIBITION WHICH WAS TO BE HELD ON SEPT. 17, 18, 19, AND 20TH. GOLD, SILVER, AND BRONZE MEDALS WERE TO BE OFFERED FOR PRIZES AS WELL AS DIPLOMAS IN ALL DEPARTMENTS. THERE WAS TO BE A HUGE LIVESTOCK SHOW WITH NUMEROUS ENTRIES FROM P.E.I. AND N. S. ALSO INCLUDED WOULD BE A SPLENDID DISPLAY FROM THE N.B. GOVERNMENT.

THE INDUSTRIAL DEPARTMENT WOULD CONTAIN 20,000 SQ. FT. OF FLOOR SPACE. EACH EVENING WOULD SEE AMUSEMENTS PROVIDED AND AN IMPORTANT FEATURE ADVERTISED WAS THAT THE EXHIBITION BUILDING WAS TO BE LIGHTED WITH ELECTRIC LIGHT.

THERE WERE MANY INDUSTRIAL EXHIBITS, AMONG THEM LOGGIE & CO. OF LOGGIEVILLE AND C. M. LEGERE OF MEMRAMCOOK, WHO, INTERESTINGLY ENOUGH, HAD ISSUED TOKENS OF THEIR OWN AROUND THIS TIME. IN THE SEPT. 14TH ISSUE OF THE TRANSCRIPT, IN WHICH THE EXHIBITION IS WRITTEN UP, THE FOLLOWING STATEMENT IS FOUND, "DR. C. H. DUNLOP IS AT PRESENT, ERECTING IN THE FLOOR COUNTER, COLUMN, AND PEDESTAL FOR THE ACCOMMODATION OF HIS VALUABLE AND INTERESTING EXHIBIT OF CURIOSITIES - A WHOLE MUSEUM IN THEMSELVES." IN THE SEPT. 17TH ISSUE, THIS STATEMENT IS FOUND. "IN FRONT OF THE MAIN ENTRANCE, THE FIRST OBJECT TO ATTRACT ATTENTION IS THE LARGE COLUMN AND COUNTER ERECTED BY DR. DUNLOP FOR THE DISPLAYING OF HIS SPLENDID CURIOSITIES." "HERE MAY BE SEEN LARGE ASSORTMENTS OF MINERALS AND SEA SHELLS, WEAPONS USED BY AFRICAN NATIVES, PIECES OF STONE FROM FAMOUS ENGLISH CASTLES AND ABBEYS, A SWORD USED IN THE NAVAL BATTLE BETWEEN THE CHESAPEAKE AND THE SHANNON IN 1814 AND OTHERS EQUALLY AS RARE AND VALUABLE."

SEVERAL SILVER MEDALS WERE WON AT THE EXHIBITION AND A FEW BRONZE. I CAN FIND NO MENTION OF ANYONE WINNING A GOLD MEDAL. THE FIRST PRIZE SILVER MEDAL FOR THE BEST EXHIBIT OF BOOTS AND SHOES WENT TO L. HIGGINS & CO. OF MONCTON. THE RECORD FOUNDRY AND MACHINE CO. OF MONCTON WON THE FIRST PRIZE SILVER MEDAL FOR ITS COLLECTION OF TINWARE AND STOVES.

IN THE SEPT. 23RD EDITION OF THE TRANSCRIPT, "THE FOLLOWING SPECIAL AWARDS HAVE BEEN RECOMMENDED BY THE JUDGES, ON THE CONDITION, HOWEVER, THAT THE MONEY PRIZES, MEDALS, ETC. HERE MENTIONED SHALL ONLY BE PAID IN CASE THE EXHIBITION PROVES A SURE FINANCIAL SUCCESS.

1. "DR. DUNLOP, EXHIBIT OF CURIOSITIES, SPECIAL HONOURABLE MENTION WITH MEDALS."
2. "MACFARLANE, THOMPSON AND ANDERSON, FREDERICTON, FOR MOWING MACHINES, HONOURABLE MENTION AND BRONZE MEDAL."
3. "F. C. BLACK, AMHERST, HEREFORD HERD, SILVER MEDAL."
4. "JOSIAH WOOD, SACKVILLE, DURHAM HERD, SILVER MEDAL."
5. " E. PAGE AND SONS, AMHERST, HOLSTEIN HERD, BRONZE MEDAL."

IT WOULD SEEM THEN THAT THE EXHIBITION WAS A FINANCIAL SUCCESS BECAUSE DR. DUNLOP RECEIVED HIS MEDAL.

WHAT I FIND INTERESTING THOUGH IS THAT THE MEDAL STATES MEERSCHAUM AND BRIER PIPES, AND THESE ARE NEVER MENTIONED IN THE NEWSPAPER WRITEUPS.

BUT WHAT MAKES THE MEDAL EVEN MORE FASCINATING, IS THE FACT THAT APPARENTLY THE JUDGES HAD SECOND THOUGHTS CONCERNING THE AWARDING OF THIS MEDAL TO DR. DUNLOP. IN THE SEPTEMBER 24TH TRANSCRIPTS OF 1889 APPEARED THE FOLLOWING STATEMENT:

"A MEETING OF THE POLYMORPHIANS WAS CALLED FOR MONDAY EVENING, BUT IT IS SAID THE OFFICERS WHO CALLED THE MEETING DID NOT SHOW UP AND A POSTPONEMENT WAS NECESSARY. IT IS UNDERSTOOD THE BOYS INTEND TAKING SOME ACTION WITH REFERENCE TO THE JUDGE'S AWARD, GIVING FIRST PRIZE TO DR. DUNLOP, WHICH, IT IS GENERALLY ADMITTED, IS VERY UNFAIR."

THUS, I NOW OWN A MEDAL THAT MIGHT NOT HAVE BEEN AWARDED HAD THE EXHIBITION NOT BEEN A FINANCIAL SUCCESS, A MEDAL THAT MADE ITS WAY TO TORONTO, AND A MEDAL THAT PERHAPS WAS NOT DESERVED, YET WAS AWARDED. YES, NUMISMATIC RESEARCH CAN PROVE TO BE MOST FASCINATING.

A. MITCHEL MACDONALD

THE WHOLE NUMISMATIC WORLD SUFFERED A GREAT LOSS IN THE DEATH OF A. MITCHEL MACDONALD OF ARMDALE, NOVA SCOTIA ON MARCH 21ST, 1970.

MITCHEL WAS AN ACKNOWLEDGED AUTHORITY ON NOVA SCOTIAN HISTORY PARTICULARLY RELATING TO ITS CURRENCY TOKENS, MEDALS AND OTHER PERTINENT NUMISMATIC ITEMS.

BOTH THE CANADIAN NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION, AND THE HALIFAX COIN CLUB CAN ATTRIBUTE MUCH OF THEIR GROWTH AND SUCCESS TO MITCHEL MACDONALD.

DURING THE EARLY YEARS OF THE C.N.A., MITCHEL WAS THE ONLY COLLECTOR FROM NOVA SCOTIA THAT TOOK AN ACTIVE PART AND ATTENDED ALL THE CONVENTIONS, EVENTUALLY BECOMING THE MARITIMES DIRECTOR AND IN 1965-67 SERVING AS PRESIDENT OF THE C.N.A.

MITCHEL TOOK GREAT PRIDE IN HIS COLLECTING, NUMISMATIC RESEARCH AND WRITING, AS WELL AS LEADING OUT IN MANY COLLECTOR ORGANIZATIONS. IN DECEMBER 1958 HE HELPED ORGANIZE THE HALIFAX COIN CLUB AND SERVED AS ITS FIRST PRESIDENT DURING 1959. HIS WISDOM AND DIRECTION WAS INSTRUMENTAL IN GUIDING THE HALIFAX COIN CLUB TO BE ONE OF THE MOST ACTIVE AND KNOWN CLUBS IN NORTH AMERICA. THE CLUB HAS RECOGNIZED THIS BY NAMING HIM HONORARY PRESIDENT OF THE HALIFAX COIN CLUB.

ALTHOUGH MITCHEL WAS NOT AN OFFICER OF THE ATLANTIC PROVINCES NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION, HE WAS HIGHLY INSTRUMENTAL IN ITS FORMATION AND HELPED CONSIDERABLY IN ITS GROWTH.

MITCHEL WAS NOT CONTENT WITH FILLING HOLES IN COIN BOARDS, BUT DID CONSIDERABLE RESEARCH AND WRITING, AND WAS A FELLOW IN THE CANADIAN NUMISMATIC RESEARCH SOCIETY. HE WAS ALSO A MEMBER OF THE AMERICAN NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION, CANADIAN PAPER MONEY SOCIETY, CANADIAN NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION, ATLANTIC PROVINCES NUMISMATIC ASS'N., HALIFAX COIN CLUB, AND THE NEW ENGLAND NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION.

HE WAS TO BE FOUND AT ALL THE MAJOR COIN SHOWS AND CONVENTIONS AND TRAVELLED EXTENSIVELY ACROSS CANADA AND THE U.S.A. COLLECTORS ACROSS NORTH AMERICA TODAY MOURN A GREAT FRIEND AS WELL AS A NUMISMATIST, HIS FRIENDLY CHARM WON HIM FRIENDS WHEREVER HE TRAVELLED, AND HE WILL NEVER BE FORGOTTEN.

A PERSON'S NUMISMATIC KNOWLEDGE WAS GREATLY ENHANCED AS ONE WORKED WITH MITCHEL AND YOUR FRIENDSHIP DEEPENED AS WELL.

WE - AND NUMISMATICS SHALL MISS MITCHEL.

AT A RECENT MEETING I PREPARED A HANDOUT IN THE FORM OF A QUESTIONNAIRE DEALING MAINLY WITH PROGRAMMES AND PROJECTS ENTITLED PRO BONO CLUBLICO, ROUGHLY INTERPRETED MEANING, "FOR THE GOOD OF THE CLUB." SOME OF THE SILENT MEMBERS OF THE CLUB OFTEN WILL COME OUT OF THEIR SHELL AND WRITE SOME VERY CANDID OBSERVATIONS. IN FACT, SOME OF THEIR SUGGESTIONS ARE SO GOOD THAT ONE IS INCLINED TO THINK, "I WISH I'D SAID THAT."

NOW IF TWO HEADS ARE BETTER THAN ONE THEN ALL THE NUMISMATIC HEADS ACROSS CANADA ARE MUCH BETTER. I CAN THINK OF NO MORE EFFECTIVE WAY TO OBTAIN MATERIAL FOR CLUB PROGRAMMES THAN TO READ THE CLUB NEWS IN THE C.N.A. BULLETIN; SO OBVIOUS, AND YET, I MUST CONFESS, AN ALTOGETHER NEGLECTED AREA FOR MY PART.

AS I READ ISSUE AFTER ISSUE I TABULATED SOME INFORMATION AND STILL OTHER TRENDS MADE AN IMPRESSION ON MY MENTAL SCRATCH PAD. HERE ARE SOME OF THOSE OBSERVATIONS FOR WHAT THEY ARE WORTH:-

1. SEVERAL CLUBS ACROSS CANADA IN A FEW SHORT YEARS HAVE FLOURISHED AND QUICKLY DISAPPEARED. COULD THIS BE IN PART DUE TO POOR PROGRAMMES?
2. CLUBS WITH THE MOST VARIED AND IMAGINATIVE PROGRAMMES APPEAR TO BE THE MOST HEALTHY.
3. CYCLES IN PROGRAMMES. SOME EVENTS NO LONGER APPEAR IN THEIR BULLETINS. I WOULD SUGGEST A WORTHY ACTIVITY CAN BECOME A BORE WHEN USED TOO OFTEN.

4. SOME GOOD PROGRAMME TOPICS ARE NEVER ATTEMPTED BY MANY CLUBS BECAUSE THEY REQUIRE PLANNING AND PREPARATION.
5. SEVERAL CLUBS HAVE NO PREPARED PROGRAMME; WHAT YOU MIGHT CALL "A HAPPENING." THESE GROUPS ARE CANDIDATES FOR THE OBITUARY COLUMN AS THEY BECOME DISENCHANTED ABOUT THE HOBBY WITHOUT THE CHALLENGE AND INSPIRATION FROM A GOOD SPEAKER AND THE SOCIABILITY OF A CUP OF COFFEE.
6. ATTENDANCE AT MEETINGS IS DOWN IN MANY AREAS FROM WHAT IT WAS A FEW YEARS AGO. WE HAVE, I BELIEVE, MOVED INTO A PURER FORM OF NUMISMATICS SINCE WE HAVE BEEN STRIPPED OF THE ROLL AND BAG SPECULATOR WHO TOLERATED AN EDUCATIONAL PROGRAMME AT MEETINGS WITH THE MOTIVE OF BEING FILLED IN ON TRENDS AND HAVING AN OPPORTUNITY TO UNLOAD HIS HARDWARE AT A SIZABLE PROFIT.

NATIONAL COIN WEEK TO BE HELD APRIL 19 TO 25 AND IT WAS SUGGESTED WE HOLD OUR COIN SHOW ON APRIL 25, AT THE COLCHESTER-EAST HANTS REGIONAL LIBRARY IN TRURO. MEMBERS WERE URGED TO PLAN DISPLAYS TO BE EXHIBITED IN LOCAL SHOP WINDOWS DURING THE NCW OBSERVANCE.

PUBLIC RELATIONS - FOURTH CENTURY A.D. - BY PAUL DOIRON

THE COINS OF ANCIENT ROME SERVED NOT ONLY AS CURRENCY, BUT ALSO AS A MEANS OF PROPAGANDA FOR THE RULERS OF THE EMPIRE. ONE EXAMPLE OF THIS IS A COIN TYPE OFTEN FOUND IN COLLECTIONS, A BRONZE CENTENIONALIS OF CONSTANTIUS II, WHO REIGNED IN THE YEARS 337 TO 361 A.D.

THE OBERSE OF A SPECIMEN IN MY COLLECTION PORTRAYS THE EMPEROR, AND ALTHOUGH THE STYLE OF THE PORTRAIT LACKS THE REALISM OF EARLIER CENTURIES, WE SEE A YOUNG MAN WITH A PURPOSEFUL GAZE, A LOOK OF DETERMINATION. THE INSCRIPTION, IN ABBREVIATED LATIN, TRANSLATES "OUR LORD CONSTANTIUS PIUS FELIX AUGUSTUS." THE REVERSE DESIGN SHOWS A WARRIOR, PRESUMABLY THE EMPEROR, SPEARING A FALLEN BARBARIAN. BELOW IS THE MINT-MARK OF ALEXANDRIA, EGYPT. AROUND THE SCENE IS THE INSCRIPTION MEANING "IN RESTORATION OF THE HAPPY TIMES."

WE KNOW THAT THIS PERIOD WAS ANYTHING BUT HAPPY FOR THE EMPIRE, THEN UNDER ATTACK BY BARBARIAN ARMIES, WHO WERE TO CAPTURE ROME ITSELF IN A CENTURY OR SO.

THE COIN'S MESSAGE MAKES ONE WONDER IF ITS FOURTH CENTURY OWNER TOOK IT TO HEART, OR BITTERLY SCOFFED AT THIS BIT OF IMPERIAL OPTIMISM. WE CAN BE SURE, HOWEVER, THAT WHATEVER THE CITIZEN'S OPINION OF THIS MEDIUM OF PUBLIC RELATIONS, HE WAS NOT LIKELY TO DISCARD IT.

THE TERCENTENARY COMMITTEE WAS FORMED TO LOOK AFTER THE MANY EVENTS WHICH WERE TO TAKE PLACE.

ONE OF THE ITEMS WHICH WAS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THIS COMMITTEE WAS THE STRIKING OF A SUITABLE MEDAL TO MARK THIS EVENT.

THE MEDAL WAS DESIGNED WITH THE FRONT SIDE HAVING THE PICTURE OF THE TWO MEN, SHOWING THEIR FACES FROM A SIDE VIEW AND YEARS 1604-1904 AS WELL AS THEIR NAMES.

P. W. ELLIS WAS THE COMPANY SELECTED TO PRODUCE THE MEDAL AND THE ORDER WAS PLACED BY R.H. GREEN & SON, DR., 122 GERMAIN STREET, FOR THE COMMITTEE.

ISAAC ERB TOKEN

Recently, I obtained an interesting St. John token that I did not have in my collection. It is made of aluminum and 24 m.m. in diameter. One side has the printing "Isaac Erb & Son /Photographer/ 15/ Charlotte St./ St. John, N.B." The other side has the printing "Good For / 50¢/ in part payment /of 1 dozen/ of our / \$3.00 / Photographs."

Isaac Erb was born in King's County, N.B. and went to St. John in 1877. According to writeups of the man before the turn of the century, he did a large business and was a very popular photographer. Reports indicate he was in every way a thorough master of his business. Mr. Erb began his business in 1877 with a Mr. Cameron at 13 Charlotte St. Mr. Erb's son, John Erb, took over the business from his father upon the latter's death in 1924 and ran it until his death in February, 1939. The business was then purchased by Mr. Lew Wilson and operated under the Erb name for eight months. It was then changed to the Wilson Studio. The Wilson Studio has since moved to 162 Union Street in St. John.

As was stated above, the Erb Studio was located at 13 Charlotte St. until 1907, when the business was moved to 15 Charlotte St. This information would indicate the token was used between 1907 and 1939, probably around 1910.

It would be interesting to find out if any other tokens were used by the business. Any person with additional information might contact the author of this article.

Second Miramichi Coin Show Souvenir Wooden Takens

Souvenir wooden takens were produced for use at the Second Miramichi Coin Show. These takens were produced in birch and bird's eye maple. The tokens were redeemable for 25¢ at the show.

The tokens are of two types printed in three colours. Description of the tokens is as follows:

Total issue of these tokens is 100 in each type. Type 1 shows the old crest which was superseded at the time of the show. Types 2a and 2b use the new crest.

The Miramichi Shipbuilding Medallion

The 1970 Miramichi Coin Club Shipbuilding Medallion was struck to commemorate the era of wooden shipbuilding on the Miramichi River. In view of the importance of shipbuilding in the development of the Atlantic Provinces and in particular New Brunswick, it seems appropriate to honor this great era.

The obverse of the medallion shows a three-quarter view of a barque in full sail representing the great ships which were born on the river. Wording on the Obverse is "Shipbuilding / Miramichi / New Brunswick, Canada / 1773-1919". The dates record the known period of shipbuilding.

The reverse of the medallion pictures the Miramichi Coin Club crest with a leaping Atlantic Salmon and the words "Miramichi / Coin Club / Salmo Salar". *Salmo Salar* is the scientific name for the Atlantic Salmon.

The medallions were struck in 24 kt. gold, 999 fine antiqued silver, and antiqued bronze. The medallion is edge serial-numbered in all three metals. Mintage figures are: 24 kt. gold - 6 pieces numbered 1 - 6; antiqued silver - 100 pieces numbered 1 - 100; antiqued bronze - 400 pieces numbered 1 - 400.

Artwork for the medallions was done by Richard Howe, the noted Miramichi artist. Historical information was supplied by Dr. Louise Manny, noted New Brunswick historian. The medallions were struck by the Lombardo Mint.

Price of the medallions is \$3.00 for bronze and \$10.00 for Silver available with printed historical brochure from the Miramichi Coin Club, P.O. Box 107, Newcastle, N.B.

The Newcastle Medallion by T.R. Masuda

Since 1965, the Town of Newcastle, N.B. has issued bronze souvenir key-chain medallions to visiting dignitaries. The medallions are intended to be a lasting memento of their visit to Newcastle and are distributed by the Town Council for that purpose.

The medallion is struck in bronze and pierced for suspension from a key-chain. The size is 29mm. The obverse features the Crest of the town consisting of a bull moose moving to the left with grass, water and trees in the field. Encircling all are the words "TOWN OF NEWCASTLE / MIRAMICHI N.B. The reverse bears the inscription "Final / Resting Place / Of/ Lord Beaverbrook".

The initial order of 500 pieces was ordered from Lackie Manufacturing Company, Toronto, Ontario and is invoiced April 1965. When the supply was exhausted, a second order of 500 pieces was ordered from C. Lamond, Montreal, Quebec and is invoiced February 1968. The second order is similar to the first but shows minor differences as new dies were prepared.

Referring to the initial order as the A variety and the second order as the B variety we compare them as follows:

A.P.N.A. SPRING RALLY - THE ATLANTIC NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION SPRING SHOW WAS HELD AT THE ADMIRAL BEATTY MOTOR HOTEL IN THE HEART OF SAINT JOHN ON SATURDAY, MAY 2. THE ALL-DAY EVENT WAS SPONSORED BY THE SAINT JOHN COIN COLLECTORS CLUB AND A GOOD TIME WAS HAD BY ALL. AT LEAST 300 PEOPLE, MANY FROM ALL OVER THE MARITIME PROVINCES AND THE NORTH-EASTERN STATES, ATTENDED. A SPECIAL FEATURE OF THE SHOW WAS THE CANADIAN DECIMAL SERIES COMPLETE INCLUDING THE RARE 1921 HALF DOLLAR. THIS COLLECTION WAS DISPLAYED BY MONCTON COIN COLLECTOR ALBERT GALBRAITH, WHO SAID HE HAD JUST ADDED THE SCARCE HALF TO HIS COLLECTION. MR. GALBRAITH ALSO DISPLAYED A BEAUTIFUL COLLECTION OF

BANK NOTES PORTRAYING CANADA'S NUMISMATIC HISTORY FROM BEFORE CONFEDERATION UP UNTIL THE LATE 1940's. TEN DEALERS FROM VARIOUS CENTRES IN NEW BRUNSWICK AND NOVA SCOTIA SET UP BOURSE TABLES AND ALL REPORTED A GOOD DAY.

IN THE EARLY AFTERNOON, THE SPRING MEETING OF THE APNA WAS HELD IN A SEPARATE ROOM. AMENDMENTS WERE MADE TO THE NEW CONSTITUTION AND PLANS WERE INITIATED FOR A FALL SHOW TO BE HELD IN MONCTON, N. B. TALK DRIFTED TO THE CANADIAN NUMISMATIC CONVENTION TO BE HELD IN HALIFAX IN AUGUST, SPONSORED BY THE HALIFAX COIN CLUB. FOLLOWING THIS ABOUT FORTY PEOPLE SPENT A VERY INFORMATIVE HOUR WHEN GEOFFREY BELL AND RAY MABEE, BOTH COLLECTORS FROM MONCTON, GAVE A TALK ACCOMPANIED BY SLIDES ON SCHOLASTIC MEDALS AND TOKENS OF THE MARITIME PROVINCES.

ANOTHER OF THE HIGHLIGHTS OF THE SHOW WAS A WELL-ATTENDED AUCTION, CONSISTING OF MATERIAL DONATED BY APNA MEMBERS. OVER \$136.00 WAS REALIZED. FERN ALLEN OF THISTLE COINS IN HALIFAX WAS THE AUCTIONEER AND THE PROCEEDS WERE TURNED OVER TO THE SECRETARY-TREASURER OF THE APNA, BERNARD KLINE, BY THE SECRETARY OF THE SAINT JOHN CLUB, MRS. MURIEL LOHNES. THIS MONEY SHOULD GREATLY HELP THE ASSOCIATION IN ITS ENDEAVOURS.

AFTER SUPPER THE MOMENT EVERYONE HAD BEEN WAITING FOR ARRIVED WHEN THE WINNING TICKET FOR THE 1948 SILVER DOLLAR WAS DRAWN FROM A LARGE BOX. THE LUCKY PERSON WAS DAVID WHITTAKER OF SAINT JOHN, WHO, HAVING LITTLE INTEREST IN COLLECTING COINS HIMSELF HAD BOUGHT A TICKET TO HELP OUT OUR CLUB.

A SHORT WHILE LATER, RAY MABEE, PRESIDENT OF THE APNA, PRESENTED THE TROPHIES AND PRIZES FOR THE BEST DISPLAYS. THE COVETED "BEST OF SHOW AWARD" WAS WON BY TOM CRAIG, A MEMBER OF THE SAINT JOHN CLUB, FOR HIS COMPLETE COLLECTION OF CANADIAN SHINPLASTERS AND QUEEN ELIZABETH II ONE DOLLAR BILLS. RUNNER-UP WAS STEPHEN OATWAY, A JUNIOR COLLECTOR FROM MONCTON. THE "BEST OF MEDALS" AWARD WAS PRESENTED TO CHARLES HOWARD AND THE BEST TOKENS AWARD TO ARNOLD FAIRBROTHER, BOTH OF THE SAINT JOHN CLUB. THE BEST DECIMAL COINAGE DISPLAY WENT TO J. CLARK MULLOCK OF HALIFAX FOR HIS DISPLAY "THE GODLESS YEAR." THE BEST PAPER MONEY AWARD WENT TO TOM CRAIG AND THE BEST MISCELLANEOUS TO DONALD LOHNES FOR HIS CHINESE SWORD MONEY. STEPHEN OATWAY WON THE PRIZE FOR THE BEST JUNIOR DISPLAY.

TO COMMEMORATE THIS OCCASION MEDALS WERE STRUCK AND THESE WERE ON SALE DURING THE SHOW. ONE SIDE PORTRAYED THE MARCO POLO, A SAILING SHIP BUILT IN SAINT JOHN IN 1851. THIS REMINDS US OF THE CITY'S MERCANTILE PAST WHEN SAINT JOHN SHIPS' WERE WELL-KNOWN IN PORTS ALL OVER THE WORLD. THE OTHER SIDE BEARS THE CREST OF THE APNA. TWO-HUNDRED WERE STRUCK IN .999 SILVER AND THREE-HUNDRED IN ANTIQUED BRONZE. THERE ARE STILL A FEW REMAINING UNSOLD AND THESE CAN BE HAD FOR SENDING \$3.00 FOR THE BRONZE OR \$10.00 FOR THE SILVER TO THE TREASURER OF THE SAINT JOHN COIN COLLECTORS CLUB:

PEOPLE WHO CAME TO THE SHOW WERE ALSO TREATED TO A BEAUTIFUL DISPLAY OF ANTIQUE BOTTLES BY MEMBERS OF THE SAINT JOHN BOTTLE CLUB WHO ANSWERED ANY QUESTIONS CONCERNING BOTTLES THAT ANYONE HAD.

THE UPPER CANADA PRESERVED MEDAL

THE UPPER CANADA PRESERVED MEDAL IS ONE OF THE MOST BEAUTIFUL MEDALS OF A HISTORIC SIGNIFICANCE TO EVER EMERGE FROM CANADA.

IT IRONICALLY ENOUGH WAS STRUCK TO COMMEMORATE THE SUCCESSFUL REPULSION OF UNITED STATES FORCES FROM CANADIAN SOIL DURING THE WAR OF 1812-1815. IT IS DIFFICULT FOR MANY TO BELIEVE THAT THE PEACEFUL BORDER BETWEEN OUR TWO FRIENDLY COUNTRIES WAS A BLOODY BATTLEGROUND WHERE BRAVE MEN FROM BOTH SIDES BLEED AND DIED FOR A CAUSE THEY CONSIDERED JUST.

SHORTLY AFTER THE WAR OF 1812, A SOCIETY CALLED "THE LOYAL AND PATRIOTIC SOCIETY OF UPPER CANADA" SET ASIDE A SUM OF 1000 POUNDS, TO ORDER A MEDAL TO BE STRUCK FOR DISTRIBUTION TO INDIVIDUALS THAT HAD PERFORMED MERITORIOUSLY DURING THE WAR AGAINST THE UNITED STATES. THE DIES WERE PREPARED BY THOMAS WYON, A FAMOUS BRITISH ENGRAVER, AND THE MEDALS WERE RECEIVED IN 1817. ACCORDING TO THE SOCIETIES REPORT OF 1817, THERE WAS MUCH DIFFICULTY IN MAKING A SELECTION FROM THE MANY WHO HAD PERFORMED COURAGEOUSLY IN THE CONFLICT. THE SOCIETY FELT THAT A GREAT NUMBER MORE MEDALS WOULD BE REQUIRED TO MAKE AN EQUITABLE DISTRIBUTION TO ALL DESERVING APPLICANTS, SO THE 1000 MEDALS THAT HAD BEEN STRUCK WERE PLACED IN THE VAULTS OF THE BANK OF UPPER CANADA AT YORK (TORONTO), UNTIL A DECISION COULD BE MADE FOR THEIR FINAL DISPOSITION. THIS DECISION WAS REACHED IN 1820 WHEN A RESOLUTION WAS PASSED WHICH IN SUBSTANCE STATED: THAT SINCE THE MEDALS COULD NOT BE DISTRIBUTED TO FULFILL THEIR ORIGINAL PURPOSE, THEY SHOULD BE SOLD FOR BULLION AND THE PROCEEDS USED FOR THE ORIGINAL PURPOSE OF REWARDS FOR MERITORIOUS SERVICE. DESPITE THE RESOLUTION, THE SOCIETY DID NOT MEET AGAIN FOR TWENTY YEARS. IN 1840 THE SURVIVING MEMBERS OF THE SOCIETY WERE CALLED TOGETHER AND RESOLVED TO, WITHOUT DELAY, DISPOSE OF THE MEDALS. THEY WERE DEFACED, SO THAT THEY WOULD NOT FALL INTO THE HANDS OF COLLECTORS, AND WERE SOLD FOR THEIR BULLION VALUE. ONE ORIGINAL MEDAL SURVIVED HOWEVER, AND IS DISPLAYED IN THE ROYAL MINT COLLECTION IN LONDON, ENGLAND.

THE MEDAL SHOWS ON THE OBERSE A PANORAMIC VIEW OF THE NIAGARA RIVER WITH THE BRITISH LION AND CANADIAN BEAVER GUARDING THE CANADIAN BORDER FROM THE AMERICAN EAGLE. THIS IS SYMBOLIC OF THE HOSTILITIES BETWEEN THE TWO NATIONS DURING THE WAR. ON THE REVERSE ARE THE WORDS "FOR MERIT" ENCIRCLED BY A WREATH AND "PRESENTED BY A GRATEFUL COUNTRY" SURROUNDING THE WREATH.

AFTER THE ORIGINAL DISPOSAL OF THE MEDALS FOR THEIR BULLION VALUE A SMALL NUMBER WERE RESTRUCK WITH THE ORIGINAL DIES AT A LATER DATE. IT IS REPORTED THAT FIFTY MEDALS WERE RESTRUCK IN SILVER AND NUMBERED ON THE EDGE. THE SPECIMEN IN THE AUTHORS COLLECTION IS NUMBER 8. THERE WAS ALSO A SMALL BUT UNDETERMINED NUMBER OF MEDALS THAT WERE RESTRUCK IN BRONZE, BUT UNNUMBERED. AT THE PRESENT TIME, THERE IS MUCH YET TO BE DISCOVERED CONCERNING THE COMPLETE STORY BEHIND THIS MEDAL AND ITS SUBSEQUENT RESTRIKING. WHATEVER REASONS SURROUND THIS LATER ISSUE, THE COLLECTING FRATERNITY OWES A DEBT OF GRATITUDE TO THE INDIVIDUAL OR INDIVIDUALS RESPONSIBLE AS WE HAVE BENEFITED IMMEASURABLY BY EVEN THIS SMALL NUMBER OF SPECIMENS AVAILABLE TO US TODAY. SINCE ONLY ONE ORIGINAL MEDAL EXISTS, THE RESTRIKES HOLD THE SAME STATUS AS THE ORIGINALS WOULD HAVE.

THURSDAY, APRIL 23.

REPRESENTATIVE AREAS WHERE MUCH REMAINS TO BE LEARNED. SUMMARY REMARKS ON THE STATE OF PRESENT-DAY NUMISMATICS.

MEDAL MANIA

BY RAY MABEE

MEDALLION SALES ARE SPIRALING UPWARD, ANOTHER COMMERCIAL PHENOMENON; AS UNIQUE AND CATCHING AS THE ROLL AND BAG SPECULATION OF A FEW SEASONS BACK. MANY MADE A KILLING ON MINT SETS AND BAGS OF SILVER DOLLARS WHILE OTHERS LOST THEIR BUSINESS OR LOST ALL INTEREST IN COLLECTING WHEN STUCK WITH A GLUT OF OVERPRICED STATIC MATERIAL.

HISTORY HAS A WAY OF REPEATING ITSELF WITHOUT THE CONTEMPORARY COLLECTOR TAKING HEED. IT MAY WELL BE THAT WE ARE APPROACHING THE ELEVENTH HOUR OF THE MEDAL MANIA. MY FEAR IS NOT THAT DEALERS WILL BECOME BANKRUPT, AS WAS THE CASE IN THE PREVIOUS SPLURGE, BUT RATHER THE POTENTIAL LOSS TO THE HOBBY OF NEW COLLECTORS WHO ARE BUYING TOO MUCH TOO FAST.

MUCH OF THE MEDALLIC MATERIAL AVAILABLE TODAY WILL HAVE LESS VALUE AS AN INVESTMENT AFTER A HUNDRED AND SEVENTY YEARS THAN THE SLEEPING 19TH CENTURY ENGLISH TRADES TOKENS THAT CREATED A SIMILAR FLURRY OF INTEREST AMONG COLLECTORS A CENTURY AND A HALF AGO.

WHAT HAS MADE THE MEDALLION INDUSTRY A SUCCESS STORY? SEVERAL REASONS I WOULD SUGGEST:

1. THE HIGH PRICE OF CHOICE MATERIAL OF THE DECIMAL SERIES.
2. THE ATTRACTIVE DISPLAY CASES DESIGNED TO HOLD THE MEDALLIONS.
3. THE FACT THAT PEOPLE GET INVOLVED IN A CONTINUING SERIES.
4. THE SUBJECTS CHOSEN APPEAL TO PEOPLE WHO NEVER COLLECTED BEFORE.
5. IF IT'S SILVER, IT'S GOT TO BE A GOOD INVESTMENT.
6. THE UNPRECEDENTED VOLUME AND QUALITY OF ADVERTISING.
7. THE "LIMITED" NUMBER STRUCK.
8. THE CHOICE OF MATERIALS AND FINISH.

THE ABOVE POINTS OF SUCCESS ARE PARTICULARLY DIRECTED TO THE LARGE DIE MAKING FIRMS WHO SPONSOR THEIR OWN MEDALLION SERIES OR OTHER LARGE CORPORATIONS THAT ARE DOING THINGS UP IN A BIG WAY.

MANY CLUBS HAVE ALSO ENJOYED THE SATISFACTION OF A SUCCESSFUL PROJECT THAT HAS PUT THE CLUB ON ITS FEET FINANCIALLY, BUT ON THE OTHER HAND THERE MAY BE MANY ORGANIZATIONS THAT ARE SITTING ON A POT FULL OF MEDALLIONS THAT REMAIN UNSOLD.

I BELIEVE THAT WE ARE ABOUT TO SEE MANY MEDALLION PROJECTS FALL SHORT OF THEIR OBJECTIVES IF PRESENT TRENDS CONTINUE. FOR THIS REASON I WOULD LIKE TO PRESENT A WORD OF CAUTION TO THOSE OF YOU WHO MAY BE INTERESTED IN SUCH A PROJECT.

1. FIRST OF ALL, THE COMMITTEE MUST DO THEIR HOMEWORK AND GET THE OPINIONS OF OTHERS INCLUDING THE CLUB MEMBERS.
2. TOO MANY MEDALLIONS ARE BEING STRUCK WITHOUT A LOGICAL ANNIVERSARY OR SUBJECT THAT WOULD CREATE A DESIRE ON THE PART OF COLLECTORS AND OTHER INTERESTED PARTIES TO POSSESS A COPY.
3. GET THE CLUB MEMBERS INVOLVED BY SEVERAL UNDERWRITING OR TAKING THE RESPONSIBILITY OF SELLING A BLOCK OR PERCENTAGE OF THE MEDALLIONS.
4. THE SUBJECT SHOULD APPEAL TO COLLECTORS IN OTHER FIELDS OF COLLECTING IF POSSIBLE AND THE DESIGN SHOULD BE GIVEN PRIORITY AND MAJOR DETAILS NOT LEFT TO THE DISCRETION OF THE FIRM CUTTING THE DIES.
5. THE COST OF DIES, THE NUMBER MINTED, THE COST OF PROMOTION, AND POSTAGE ALL MUST BE CAREFULLY DETERMINED IN ORDER TO PROJECT A POTENTIAL PROFIT.
6. CONSIDERATION SHOULD BE GIVEN TO THE FIRM CREATING THE DIES. THERE IS A WIDE RANGE IN THE QUALITY OF DIE ENGRAVING AND DISCRIMINATING COLLECTORS PASS OVER THE POORLY DESIGNED AND POORLY EXECUTED MEDALLIONS SINCE THERE IS SO MUCH TO CHOOSE FROM IN OUR COIN PAPER ADVERTISEMENTS AND COIN SHOWS.

THE FOREGOING GUIDELINES ARE BASIC PREREQUISITES TO A SUCCESSFUL BLAST OFF FOR YOUR PROJECT. IF YOU GET OVER THE INITIAL HURDLES SMOOTHLY, DON'T BECOME COMPLACENT BECAUSE THE STRUGGLE HAS JUST BEGUN. HAVING BEEN ACTIVELY INVOLVED WITH FOUR MEDALLIONS, I HAVE EXPERIENCED THE DELIGHT OF HIGHLY SUCCESSFUL PROJECTS IN THE PAST AND EQUALLY AS FRUSTRATING A PROJECT CURRENTLY. THE FRUSTRATION HAS REACHED THE POINT THAT SOME OF US HAVE SERIOUSLY CONCLUDED THAT THIS IS OUR LAST. I BELIEVE THIS SITUATION HAS DEVELOPED BECAUSE THE VARIOUS MINTS ARE GIVING PRIORITY TO THEIR OWN MEDALLIONS (MOON SERIES, ETC.) AND TO THE FACT THAT THERE IS SO MUCH WORK AND TOO FEW ENGRAVERS SO THAT THE SMALL ORDERS FROM CLUBS GET PUSHED ASIDE.

FOLLOWING ARE A FEW OF THE TRIALS THAT CAN BUILD UP TO A BEAUTIFUL CASE OF FRUSTRATION.

1. COSTLY LONG DISTANCE CALLS WHEN THE DELIVERY DATE IS NOT HONORED.
2. MATERIAL SENT TO THE FIRM FOR ADDED DETAIL OFTEN DAMAGED AND LOST WHILE IN THEIR HANDS; EXAMPLE OLD PHOTOGRAPHS, COINS, STAMPS, ETC.
3. REPEATED AND UNWARRENTED DELAYS EVEN AFTER FLOWERY PROMISES.
4. LOST VALUE OF ADVERTISING AND SPECIAL NEWSLETTERS WHEN MATERIAL FAILS TO ARRIVE AS THE MONTHS PASS BY.
5. FAILURE TO COMPLY WITH FINISH REQUESTED AND NUMBERS ORDERED.
6. UNIMAGINATIVE DESIGN AND SHALLOW STRIKE.
7. FAILURE OF THE FIRM TO ANSWER LETTERS REQUESTING PROGRESS REPORTS, ETC.
8. KILLING EFFECT ON THE CLUB MEMBERS WHEN CONTINUOUS DELAYS ARE REPORTED.
9. EXTRA LETTERS WRITTEN TO PEOPLE WHO HAVE ORDERED MEDALS AND NOT RECEIVED THEIR ORDERS.
10. UNPAID BILLS FOR BROCHURES, POSTAGE, AND TELEPHONE CALLS THAT CANNOT BE PAID WHEN THERE IS NOTHING TO SELL.
11. MEDALS ON THE MARKET THAT YOU KNOW WERE ORDERED AFTER YOUR ORDER WAS PLACED.

ALL THIS AND MUCH MUCH MORE HAS BEEN MY EXPERIENCE WITH FIRMS THAT EXPRESS THEIR INTENTION TO "PUT ALL THEIR EFFORT BEHIND YOUR PROJECT."

THIS IS A STRANGE WAY FOR A CHAIRMAN OF A COMMITTEE AWAITING MEDALLIONS TO TALK, HOWEVER, I BELIEVE THAT YOU SHOULD BE CAUTIONED IF YOU PLAN A MEDAL AND I BELIEVE THAT FIRMS GUILTY OF POOR BUSINESS PRACTICES SHOULD BE REBUKED.

THE UPWARD SPIRAL OF SUCCESS COULD EASILY BE REVERSED.

HALIFAX COIN CLUB

THE LAST MEETING OF THE HALIFAX COIN CLUB WAS HELD ON WEDNESDAY EVENING, JUNE 3RD AT THE NOVA SCOTIA MUSEUM ON SUMMER ST., IN HALIFAX. BERNIE KLINE, CLUB PRESIDENT CHAIRED THE MEETING AND EXTENDED A WARM WELCOME TO THE MEMBERS AND MANY VISITORS.

THE ATTENDANCE PRIZE, A WELLINGS 60TH ANNIVERSARY CANADA MINT MEDAL WAS WON BY SIDNEY SPENCER.

THE 'DON ALLEN' PERSONAL TOKENS OF 1963-64 THROUGH 1969-70

WHEN I DECIDED SIX YEARS AGO THAT IT WOULD BE INTERESTING AND PERHAPS APPROPRIATE, IN A TRADITION OF CANADIAN NUMISMATICS, TO HAVE STRUCK A NUMISMATIST'S 'CARD', OR PERSONAL TOKEN, FOR PRESENTATION AT NUMISMATIC TALKS OR TO FELLOW-COLLECTORS THAT I MET, I DID NOT ANTICIPATE THE INTEREST THAT WAS TO DEVELOP WITHIN CERTAIN GROUPS, IN THE STUDY AND COLLECTING OF THIS TYPE OF MATERIAL. IN RECOGNITION OF THIS INTEREST AND OF THE REQUESTS FOR INFORMATION WHICH, FROM TIME TO TIME I STILL RECEIVE, IT WOULD SEEM JUDICIOUS TO RECORD CERTAIN PARTICULARS WHILE THEY ARE RELATIVELY FRESH IN MY MIND. SINCE THE MOST RECENT LOT OF SUCH TOKENS CARRIES PROMINENTLY AN ATLANTIC PROVINCES ADDRESS, THE A.P.N.A. NEWSLETTER WOULD SEEM TO BE THE MOST SUITABLE MEDIUM IN WHICH TO SET DOWN THE INFORMATION.

SUCH METALLIC 'CARDS' HAVE, OF COURSE, A SIGNIFICANT TRADITION IN CANADIAN AND UNITED STATES NUMISMATICS. I PRIZE SUCH A TOKEN GIVEN TO ME IN MONTREAL BY FRED BOWMAN WHEN I STILL WAS A RELATIVELY NEW CONVERT TO SERIOUS NUMISMATICS. THE MOST SURPRISING PHENOMENON HAS BEEN THE MULTIPLICATION OF SUCH ISSUES, OVER THE LAST FIVE YEARS, WITHIN THE RANKS OF THAT SPLENDID FRATERNAL GROUP OF TRANSIT TOKEN ENTHUSIASTS, THE AMERICAN VECTURIST ASSOCIATION. LITERALLY HUNDREDS OF PERSONAL TOKENS, OFTEN IN PLASTIC, HAVE BEEN PRODUCED, TRADED-- AND CATALOGUED AND PRESERVED BY THAT ASSOCIATION. I LIKE TO FEEL THAT MY INITIAL STRIKINGS CONTRIBUTED TO WHAT I CONSIDER AN ESTABLISHED AND MOST AGREEABLE TRADITION.

THE FACT THAT I HAVE BEEN ABLE TO GIVE OUT MY TOKENS BY THE HUNDREDS TO NUMISMATIC AUDIENCES AND COLLECTOR FRIENDS IN CANADA AND THE UNITED STATES STEMS FROM A FACT OF TOKEN ECONOMICS THAT YOU TOO, MAY FIND HARD TO BELIEVE. APART FROM DIES, 100 TOKENS, INDIVIDUALLY STRUCK AT 40 CENTS EACH, WOULD COST \$40; 1,000 TOKENS, MASS-PRODUCED ON A "TOKEN PRESS," WOULD BE \$30. I HAVE NEVER BEEN SHORT OF TOKENS! (ONE HUNDRED RED BRONZE AND ONE THOUSAND "WHITE METAL" NICKEL SILVER WERE PRODUCED, AND I NOW PLAN TO PLACE THE OBERSE DIE, NO LONGER APPROPRIATE, IN THE A.N.A. MUSEUM.) IN ALL, INCLUDING TOKEN ISSUES WITH WHICH I WAS CONNECTED BUT WHICH I DO NOT TRULY REGARD AS MINE, NINETEEN VARIETIES NOW CAN BE IDENTIFIED. THESE FALL IN FOUR CATEGORIES, BUT ONLY EIGHT TOKENS (DENOTED BY AN ASTERISK IN THE NUMBERING) DO I CONSIDER TO HAVE BEEN NUMISMATIC "CARDS" INTENDED FOR DISTRIBUTION TO COLLECTORS. THE FOUR CATEGORIES:

1. PERSONAL TOKENS IN METAL. CARRYING A SIGNATURE AND "GREETINGS TO VECTURISTS," WITH A REVERSE INSCRIPTION IN INTENDED LIKENESS OF A PARKING TOKEN, "CHIBOUGAMAU ... STOP BY & PARK," THESE 25-CENT SIZE PIECES WERE STRUCK IN RED BRONZE AND WHITE METAL BY CANADIAN ARTISTIC DIES, SHERBROOKE, FROM DIES ENGRAVED TO MY SPECIFICATIONS BY ORAZIO LOMBARDO (I SPONSORED MR. LOMBARDO'S MEMBERSHIP IN ANA AND AVA.) SUBSEQUENTLY COUNTERSTAMPED "ARVIDA" DURING MY RESIDENCE IN ARVIDA, QUEBEC (1965-1968) AND/OR "NJ/68" DURING MY STAY IN PISCATAWAY, NEW JERSEY (1968-1969).

II. CHIBOUGAMAU "MULING" PRESENTATION PIECES. METAL TOKENS MULING THE SIGNATURE OBVERSE WITH A CHIBOUGAMAU WINTER CARNIVAL DIE DEPICTING A MINE HEADFRAME. THE HEADFRAME DIE WAS BY LOMBARDO TO A DESIGN BY T. W. JANKOVICH OF THE CHIBOUGAMAU COIN CLUB, AND 25 "MULINGS" WERE PRODUCED, ON A SHARED-COST BASIS, FOR MEMBERS OF THAT CLUB, AS FOLLOWS: STERLING SILVER (11), RED BRONZE (4), BRASS (4), ALUMINUM (4), AND PURE GOLD (2).

III. SAGUENAY VALLEY CAFETERIA TOKENS. A SMALLER METAL TOKEN, TETRAFOIL (FOUR BUMPS), HOLED, WAS DESIGNED BY ME FOR USE IN CONNECTION WITH SCHOOL CAFETERIA OPERATIONS. DIES WERE BY LOMBARDO, AND REGULAR ISSUES (ALL DATED 1966) WERE IN ALUMINUM (FULL MEAL) AND RED BRONZE (MILK, SOUP, DESSERT). TRIAL PIECES OR PATTERNS WERE INCIDENTALLY PRODUCED IN BRASS AND IN LEAD (UNHOLED).

IV. PERSONAL TOKENS IN PLASTIC (RETURN TO CANADA). AN OCTAFOIL (EIGHT BUMPS) PIECE IN WHITE PLASTIC WAS PRODUCED IN THE UNITED STATES PRIOR TO MY RETURN TO CANADA IN AUGUST, 1969. THE OBVERSE READS, IN BLACK LETTERING, "DON ALLEN --TO CANADA 1969"; THE REVERSE, "STOP BY & PARK--TRURO, N.S. --(L.441)," THE ALLUSION BEING TO AN AVA MEMBERSHIP NUMBER. TWO HUNDRED PIECES WERE PRODUCED.

EUROPEAN NUMISMATICS

A short time ago I had the opportunity and privilege to visit one of Europe's historic Numismatic Museums located in the City of Mons, Belgium. The information contained in this article is the result of extensive research which I have recorded,

enabling the collector of European to observe some of the material which exists in these collections which are always on public display. My sincere thanks to M. Marcel Hoc, honorary chief of the Royal Library, for his assistance in making this article possible.

The Numismatic collection of Mons is composed of nearly 18,000 pieces, and is, according to M. Marcel Hoc, honorary chief of the Royal Library, one of the most beautiful and interesting of all Belgium.

Since 1945, it has been constantly built up, and at present is housed in twenty-two frames and twenty-two show windows.

The frames contain about 2,500 bronze medallions, among which exists a very interesting series of French medallions ranging from Henry IV until the end of the second Empire as well as those relating to the local and regional Military events of the reign of Louis XIV.

Medallions also include those of independant Belgium, central and western Europe, Great Britain and Spain, as well as religious and Masonic Medallions. Also included are those minted around 1820 with the "Coat of Arms" of men and famous events in most countries of Europe.

The eight centre windows contain more than 2,500 pieces of paper currency, medallions and coins of all eras, from gaelic to contemporary, including the Republic of the Roman Empire, a collection of federal Belgian currency, as well as monies from Saxony and the many States that make up Germany and Austria. A special mention goes to the monies of the Papal States, all parts of Italy, Russia, Denmark, Sweden, England, Switzerland, etc.

Let us mention briefly the beautiful coins from the Spanish and Austrian lowlands, the United provinces of Holland, as well as the bronze coins from ancient Egypt, the near-East and Sicily.

To give you an idea of the riches contained in this museum, the Eastern Roman Empire alone is represented by nearly 1,400 pieces, 1,000 in bronze and 400 in silver, bearing the "Coat of Arms" of more than sixty Emperors and Empresses. Finally, there are two frames containing specimens of paper money.

Each piece has been cleaned, identified, classified and placed in a window or frame set in blue velvet for silver, and yellow velvet for bronze.

A small window is reserved for all the different types of weights used in the past to weigh these coins.

A considerable amount of time is required for this exhibit, and at present more than 12,500 items of Paper money, medallions, silver and bronze coins are exposed permanently.

IT IS A MOST BEAUTIFUL 1½" DIAMETER MEDAL, AND IS NOW OPEN FOR ANNUAL COMPETITION, TO BE GIVEN TO THE PERSON CONSIDERED TO HAVE DONE MOST FOR CANADIAN NUMISMATICS DURING THE YEAR.

THE EXHIBITS CHAIRMAN, NELSON BOLTZ, AWARDED DISPLAY AWARDS (MEDALS) AND TROPHIES TO ALL THE WINNING EXHIBITORS, AND MEDALS TO THE EDUCATIONAL SPEAKERS, DISPLAY JUDGES, AND A NUMBER OF DISTINGUISHED GUESTS.

THE MEDAL WAS STRUCK IN BRONZE AND SILVER FOR GENERAL SALE. BRONZE \$3. AND SILVER \$11. POST-PAID. THE 32-PAGE CONVENTION PROGRAM WAS TASTEFULLY AND WELL PREPARED, AND CONTAINED IMPORTANT, INTERESTING NUMISMATIC ARTICLES WRITTEN BY SHELDON S. CARROLL, ALEC STORM AND NELSON C. BOLTZ. ALL AGREED GENERAL CHAIRMAN ELLIOT FINEBERG AND HIS COMMITTEE DESERVE THE HIGHEST COMMENDATION FOR A MOST SUCCESSFUL CONVENTION.

A NUMBER OF THE "GOOD FOR ONE DRINK" TOKENS ARE STILL AVAILABLE FOR SALE AT \$1. EACH POSTPAID.

THE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION

THE REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING OF THE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION WAS HELD ON APRIL 20 AT THE ROYAL CANADIAN LEGION, CHARLOTTETOWN.

THE MINUTES OF THE MARCH MEETING WERE READ BY THE SECRETARY, RICHARD W. MONTINGY AND WERE ADOPTED. IT WAS MENTIONED THAT TOM HENDERSON, A CLUB MEMBER, HAD BEEN TRANSFERRED TO FLORENCEVILLE, N.B.

HE HAD MENTIONED TO OTHER CLUB MEMBERS THAT THE ROYAL TRUST HAD IN ITS POSSESSION A \$10.00 GOLD PIECE. IT BELONGS TO AN ESTATE AND THEY MAY BE INTERESTED IN HAVING IT AUCTIONED OFF. MEMBERS EXPRESSED AN INTEREST IN GIVING ITS SERVICES FOR DISPOSING OF THE COIN.

THE MEDALLION BEING GIVEN OUT BY SHELL OIL WERE DISCUSSED. SOME ARE HARDER TO GET THAN OTHERS.

IT WAS NOTED THAT THE A.P.N.A. SPRING RALLY WILL BE HELD ON MAY 2ND IN ST. JOHN, N. B. ALSO, THE TWO DAY COIN AND STAMP SHOW TO BE HELD IN MONCTON, N.B. WAS DISCUSSED.

THERE WAS DISCUSSION ON HOW MUCH SHOULD BE PAID FOR A ROLL OF ISLAND TREE CENTS. TWENTY-FIVE DOLLARS WAS CONSIDERED A FAIR PRICE.

TOM ROGERS PASSED AROUND AN 1883 RACKATEER NICKEL WHICH WAS GOLD PLATED AND AFTER PASSED OFF AS A \$5.00 GOLD PIECE.

GEORGE CANTELO READ AN ARTICLE FROM COIN WORLD RELATING TO BENSEN'S WHITE PAPER. IT WAS A LETTER FROM DONALD FLECK OF ONA TO BENSEN AND HIS ANSWER ON THE CAPITAL GAIN AND VALUATION OF A COIN COLLECTION.

A LETTER IS TO BE DRAFTED AND BROUGHT TO THE NEXT MEETING FOR RATIFICATION ON THE WHITE PAPER (CAPITAL GAINS).

SOME COINS WERE PASSED AROUND FOR VIEWING BY OTHERS PRESENT.

AN AUCTION WAS HELD WHICH WAS FOLLOWED BY GENERAL NUMISMATIC DISCUSSION.

THE HALIFAX-DARTMOUTH BRIDGE TOKENS

(NEW VARIETIES) BY NELSON C. BOLTZ, FCNRS, NLG

IN 1753, A JEALOUS INDIAN, CHIEF CEUREHAVOS PRONOUNCED A CURSE, AND IN RHYME HE SAID, "THREE TIMES BRIDGE SHALL FALL, LIKE A DYING BREATH, IN A STORM, IN SILENCE, AND IN DEATH."

HE PREDICTED THAT THREE BRIDGES WOULD BE BUILT ACROSS THE HALIFAX-DARTMOUTH HARBOUR AND THEY WOULD ALL FALL.

THE FIRST DID FALL "IN A STORM" ON SEPTEMBER 7, 1891 AND THE SECOND FELL "IN SILENCE" IN 1893.

EVIDENTLY THE CURSE HAS HAD ITS FULFILLMENT IN THE DEATHS AND ACCIDENTS THAT HAPPENED TO AND ON THE THIRD BRIDGE, AND SO THE ANGUS L. MACDONALD BRIDGE (THE THIRD BRIDGE) HAS NOT HAD TO SUFFER A COMPLETE FALL.

NOT ONLY HAS THE THIRD BRIDGE SURVIVED BUT NOW A FOURTH, THE A. MURRAY MACKAY BRIDGE SPANS THE GREAT HALIFAX HARBOUR.

THE NEW 1,400 FOOT SPAN IS LOCATED ONE AND A HALF MILES NORTH OF THE ANGUS L. MACDONALD BRIDGE AND WAS OFFICIALLY OPENED TO TRAFFIC ON JULY 10TH, 1970. THE DESIGN OF THE NEW FOUR LANE A. MURRAY MACKAY BRIDGE HAS NEVER BEEN USED BEFORE ON A SUSPENSION BRIDGE IN NORTH AMERICA.

THE ENGINEERING COMPANY, PRATLEY AND DORTON, DESIGNERS OF BOTH THE BRIDGES THAT PRESENTLY SPAN THE HARBOUR, ARE PROUD OF THE CONTRAST IN DESIGN BETWEEN THE TWO BRIDGES AND MOTORISTS HAVE AN EXCELLENT VIEW OF THE OTHER BRIDGE AS THEY TRAVEL ACROSS EITHER ONE OF THEM.

THE ELEVEN TYPES OF TOKENS AND FARE STRUCTURE USED FOR YEARS ON THE ANGUS L. MACDONALD BRIDGE IS ALSO BEING USED ON THE NEW A. MURRAY MACKAY BRIDGE. EARLY THIS YEAR THE HALIFAX DARTMOUTH BRIDGE COMMISSION HAD SOUGHT PERMISSION FROM THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION TO RAISE THE FARE STRUCTURE TO PERMIT EASIER FINANCING OF THE NEW BRIDGE AND ALSO A CONTEMPLATED THIRD BRIDGE TO CROSS THE HARBOUR.

AS A RESULT THE PUBLIC BEGAN PURCHASING AND HOARDING TOKENS IN ANTICIPATION OF THE PROJECTED RATE INCREASE.

IT WOULD NOT HAVE DONE THE HOARDERS ANY GOOD HOWEVER, AS THE BRIDGE MANAGEMENT WAS PLANNING A NEW ISSUE OF TOKENS TO BE USED ON BOTH BRIDGES TO FIT IN WITH THE NEW FARE STRUCTURE AND THE PRESENT TOKENS WERE TO BE RETIRED.

THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION REFUSED PERMISSION TO RAISE THE FARES AND SO THE LIFE OF THE PRESENT TOKENS WAS SPARED.

PERMISSION WAS GRANTED THE BRIDGE COMMISSION TO AGAIN SEEK THE FARE INCREASE IN THE SPRING OF 1971, AND WHO KNOWS, WE MAY YET SEE THE NEW TOKENS ISSUED AT THAT TIME.

A TOTAL OF 354,000 TOKENS IN ELEVEN TYPES WERE ORDERED AND FIRST BROUGHT INTO USE EARLY IN 1963.

ENQUIRIES HAD OFTEN BEEN MADE THROUGH THE YEARS TO FIND OUT WHETHER ADDITIONAL STRIKINGS HAD BEEN MADE, AND THE ANSWER WAS ALWAYS GIVEN THAT THERE WERE NOT ANY CHANGES SINCE THE ORIGINAL ISSUE.

EARLY THIS YEAR THE AUTHOR'S KEEN NUMISMATIC EYE DETECTED A VARIETY IN ONE OF THE TOKENS THAT HIS COMPANY USES IN ITS BUSINESS.

FURTHER INVESTIGATION HAS BROUGHT TO LIGHT THAT THREE OF THE ELEVEN TYPES HAVE BEEN RESTRUCK RESULTING IN THREE NEW DISTINCT VARIETIES.

EARLY IN 1968 THERE OCCURRED A SHORTAGE OF THE TRUCK 1, TRUCK 3, AND TRUCK 5 BRONZE TYPES AND IT WAS DECIDED TO REORDER THESE TOKENS.

THE ORIGINAL TOKENS HAD BEEN STRUCK BY BARNARD STAMP AND STENCIL CO. OF HAMILTON, ONTARIO BUT THE BRIDGE MANAGEMENT HAD DISCOVERED THAT THERE WERE A NUMBER OF TOKEN MANUFACTURERS AND SO A CHEAPER PRICE WAS SOUGHT.

AS A RESULT THE NEW TOKENS WERE STRUCK WITH ENTIRELY NEW DIES BY ROUSSEAU METAL INC. OF ST. JEAN, PORT JOLI, QUEBEC.

THERE IS QUITE AN APPARENT DIFFERENCE IN THE LETTERING AND NUMBER SIZES, STYLES AND SPACING, AND THERE IS A BIG DIFFERENCE IN THE CLARITY OF STRIKING. THE FIELD SURFACE OF THE NEW ISSUE IS VERY ROUGH AND THE LEDGENDS ARE VERY BLURRED, RESULTING IN PHOTOGRAPHS THAT WOULD GIVE ONE THE IMPRESSION THAT THE LENSE WAS OUT OF FOCUS.

BELOW IS COMPARATIVE DATA OF BOTH THE ORIGINAL BARNARD STAMP ISSUES AND THE ROUSSEAU METAL ISSUES IN THE THREE TYPES.

IT WILL BE NOTED THAT A TOTAL OF 70,000 NEW TOKENS WERE ISSUED MAKING A GRAND TOTAL OF ALL TOKENS ISSUED TO DATE 424,000.

THE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION

THE REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING OF THE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION WAS HELD ON MAY 25, AT THE ROYAL CANADIAN LEGION, CHARLOTTETOWN. THERE WERE SIX MEMBERS PRESENT.

IN THE ABSENCE OF THE PRESIDENT, GEORGE CANTELO, THE MEETING WAS CHAIRED BY PAST PRESIDENT THOMAS ROGERS.

THE MEETING OPENED WITH THE READING OF THE MINUTES OF THE APRIL MEETING. THEY WERE ADOPTED AS READ.

IN BUSINESS ARISING FROM THE MINUTES, THERE HAS BEEN NO WORD FROM ART LARGE AT THE ROYAL TRUST CONCERNING THE GOLD PIECE. ALSO THE LETTER TO MR. BENSEN WAS NOT READY.

THERE WAS COMMENT THAT NOTICES SHOULD BE SENT OUT SOONER THAN THEY PRESENTLY ARE.

SOME MEMBERS PRESENT WONDERED HOW THE MONCTON AND ST. JOHN SHOWS TURNED OUT.

ON THE IDEA OF A POST OFFICE BOX FOR THE CLUB IT WAS GENERALLY AGREED THAT IT WASN'T NECESSARY AS EVERYTHING GOES TO THE SECRETARY'S RESIDENCE.

THE COINAGE FOR 1970 IS AT SOME BANKS IN .50¢ AND \$1.00 IT WAS NOTED. ALSO SOME MEMBERS NOTED HAVING RECEIVED THEIR MINT SETS.

TOM ROGERS PASSED AROUND A HUGE BLACK MEDALLION OF THE WORLD COLUMBIAN EXPOSITION HELD IN CHICAGO IN THE 1890's.

IT WAS DECIDED TO HAVE A JUNE MEETING AND THERE IS TALK OF A PAPER MONEY AUTHORITY BEING ON THE ISLAND SOMETIME DURING THE SUMMER AND MEMBERS EXPRESSED DESIRE TO HEAR AND MEET WITH HIM IF POSSIBLE.

A.P.N.A. FALL RALLY

JACK VEFFER, PRESIDENT OF THE CANADIAN PAPER MONEY SOCIETY ONCE STATED IN AN ARTICLE BY MR. FRANK RASKY, "MY ADVICE TO INVESTORS WHO WANT A HEDGE AGAINST INFLATION IS SIMPLE - THE BEST WAY TO MAKE NEW MONEY IS TO COLLECT OLD MONEY." IN OTHER WORDS PUT MONEY INTO IRREPLACEABLE TANGIBLE OBJECTS. HOW TRUE THAT HAS PROVED AND, PARTICULARLY IN THE PAPER MONEY WORLD, AS PEOPLE ARE BEGINNING TO REALIZE THERE ARE NOT SO MANY OF THE BEAUTIFUL OLD NOTES OF THE WORLD ABOUT.

TODAY THOSE COLORFUL, MAGNIFICENTLY DESIGNED NINETEENTH CENTURY CANADIAN BILLS, PRESENT AN OPPORTUNITY TO MAKE UP A PICTORIAL HISTORY OF THE DEVELOPMENT OF CANADA, AND, AT THE SAME TIME CAN FORM AN INVESTMENT FOR THE FUTURE.

ALREADY MANY OF THEM ARE HARD TO GET, AND I CAN PROMISE YOU THAT THEY ARE GOING TO BE VERY MUCH HARDER TO GET IN THE NEAR FUTURE. MOST ARE UNDER-CATALOGUED. CATALOGUE PRICES ARE DEPENDENT ON SUPPLY AND DEMAND. TO GIVE AN EXAMPLE OF THE ABOVE MENTIONED STATEMENT, IT WAS JUST FOUR MONTHS AGO WHEN I WAS FORTUNATE TO PURCHASE A DOMINION OF CANADA ONE DOLLAR NOTE DATED JULY 1ST, 1870, IN CRISP UNCIRCULATED CONDITION. TO THE BEST OF MY KNOWLEDGE, VERY FEW EXIST IN THIS CONDITION. A TORONTO DEALER WHO HAS BEEN IN BUSINESS FOR A NUMBER OF YEARS, SAID, WHEN I SHOWED THE NOTE TO HIM, IT WAS THE FINEST SPECIMEN HE HAD EVER SEEN. ANOTHER LUCKY FIND RESULTED IN THE PURCHASE OF THE VERY RARE LILAC SEAL VARIETY, BEARING SIGNATURES AND DATE, MCCAVOUR AND SAUNDERS JULY 2ND 1923, ALSO IN CRISP UNCIRCULATED CONDITION. ONLY THREE ARE KNOWN TO EXIST IN THIS STATE OF PRESERVATION, AND ARE PRESENTLY OWNED BY THREE PROMINENT PAPER MONEY COLLECTORS.

THE DEMAND FOR PAPER MONEY IS INCREASING, AND, WITH THE HIGH STANDARDS OF LIVING AND THUS MORE MONEY TO SPEND ON HOBBIES, WE CAN EXPECT A SNOWBALL REACTION FOR RARITIES. SUPPLY IS AN INTERESTING ASPECT. THE AVAILABILITY OF PERHAPS MOST OF THE CHARTERED BANK NOTES OF CANADA AND THE BROKEN BANKS IS UNKNOWN. BUT TAKE A LOOK AT THE POPULATION OF CANADA IN THOSE PIONEERING DAYS - MAKE REDUCTIONS FOR THE AREA IN WHICH A PARTICULAR NOTE SERVED; ALLOW FOR DESTRUCTION FROM FAIR WEAR AND TEAR, AND FOR DESTRUCTION BY BANKRUPTCY OR ABSORPTION BY ANOTHER BANK. IT IS UNLIKELY THAT ANY OF THESE BANKS HAVE LEFT THEIR WARES FOR FUTURE GENERATIONS IN ANY GREAT QUANTITY.

CANADA IN PARTICULAR IS LIKELY TO SHOW RAPID INCREASE TRENDS. THIS IS BECAUSE, UNTIL IN FACT THE NINETEEN SIXTIES, THE PAPER MONEY OF CANADA WAS STUDIED BY ONLY A HANDFUL OF MEN AND ARTICLES AND INFORMATION ON THE HISTORY OF THE NOTES IS ONLY BEGINNING TO SEEP THROUGH TO THE WORLD OF COLLECTORS. SO MY ADVICE FOR A NEWCOMER TO THE PAPER MONEY WORLD IS TO HAVE A GO AT THE CANADIAN NOTES WHILE YOU CAN, WITH THE FORECAST THAT IF YOU LEAVE IT EVEN ANOTHER THREE YEARS YOU MAY NOT BE ABLE TO BECAUSE OF SCARCITY!

SAINT JOHN COIN CLUB

MR. HARRY EISENHOWER, PAPER MONEY SPECIALIST, WAS THE GUEST SPEAKER FOR THE EVENING. HIS TALK COMMENCED WITH THE FIRST NOTES ISSUED IN NEW BRUNSWICK. A LOT OF PEOPLE IN ATTENDANCE DID NOT REALIZE THAT SMALL "SCRIPES" EXISTED IN THE MID 1850's.

THE BANK OF CANADA NOTES OF EARLIER YEARS FROM 1866 TO THE PRESENT DAY BANK NOTES WERE DISCUSSED IN GREAT DETAIL. ONE PARTICULAR NOTE THAT WAS DISPLAYED WAS VERY UNIQUE. IT WAS A \$100, 1954 ISSUE WITH ALL THREE'S. SINCE THERE IS ONLY ONE SUFFIX THAT APPEARS ON THE \$100 NOTE, THIS NOTE IS UNIQUE.

A QUESTION AND ANSWER PERIOD WAS HELD AFTER THE TALK, WITH A GREAT NUMBER OF QUESTIONS FROM THOSE IN ATTENDANCE.

MR. EISENHOWER CONCLUDED WITH HIS TALK BY STATING THAT THE REST OF CANADA'S NEW BANK NOTES ARE TO BE RELEASED SHORTLY THIS FALL.

THE PRESIDENT OF THE CLUB, JAMES YOUNG, THANKED MR. EISENHOWER FOR HIS TALK ON PAPER MONEY WHICH WAS FOLLOWED BY A WARM ROUND OF APPLAUSE.

AN AUCTION WAS HELD WITH DONATED MATERIAL TO THE CLUB BY THE MEMBERS AND \$30 WAS TURNED OVER TO THE TREASURER OF THE CLUB.

THE NUMBER OF TOKENS EARNED VARIES ACCORDING TO THE DIFFICULTY AND COMPLEXITY OF A TASK. IN CAMPBELLTON MOST TASKS HAVE A REWARD OF FROM 5 TO 30 TOKENS. FOLLOWING IS A LIST OF SOME TASKS WITH THEIR REWARDS:

- 1) GET UP IN THE MORNING, GET WASHED, DRESSED, MAKE BED - 5 TOKENS
- 2) SWEEP DAY ROOM - 15 TOKENS
- 3) WASH DISHES - 15 TOKENS
- 4) PREPARE LUNCH FOR TWO WARDS - 30 TOKENS
- 5) SWEEP DORM - 20 TOKENS
- 6) DUST TOP OF LOCKERS - 15 TOKENS
- 7) WASH BATHROOM - 15 TOKENS
- 8) WASH DOORS - 15 TOKENS
- 9) WASH WINDOWS - 25 TOKENS

WITH THESE TOKENS, PATIENTS MUST PAY FOR MEALS, CANTEEN, PRIVILEGE CARD (TO GO TO TOWN), PRIVILEGE TO GO TO MOVIES, CIGARETTES, CANDY, CLOTHING, ETC. PATIENTS HAVE NUMEROUS OPPORTUNITIES TO SPEND THEIR TOKENS, HENCE THEY ARE HIGHLY MOTIVATED TO EARN THEM.

THE MISADVENTURES OF A NOVA SCOTIAN COUNTERFEITER

- BY J. RICHARD BECKER (A.P.N.A. # 127)

IT WAS DURING THE FINAL HOT DAYS OF AUGUST IN 1862 THAT A STOUT, FIFTYISH MAN KNOWN AS GEORGE LEISER WALKED INTO FRENCH'S PRINT SHOP ON WASHINGTON STREET IN BOSTON, MASSACHUSETTS, AND BRAZENLY DISPLAYED A BRONZE PLATE FROM WHICH HE WISHED TO HAVE PRINTED, IN QUANTITY, NOVA SCOTIAN 1 POUND PROVINCIAL TREASURY NOTES (DECEMBER 31ST, 1853 ISSUE). DURING THEIR CONVERSATION HE CAUTIONED THE PROPRIETOR TO KEEP QUIET ABOUT THIS SMALL VENTURE. AN APPOINTMENT WAS MADE FOR THE ACTUAL PRINTING TO BE DONE ON SEPTEMBER 2ND, AND WHILE LEISER WENT MERRILY ON HIS WAY, NO DOUBT MENTALLY SPENDING HIS ILL-GOTTEN GAINS, MR. FRENCH NOTIFIED THE LOCAL POLICE OF THE PROPOSITION WITH WHICH HE HAD BEEN CONFRONTED. ON THE FOLLOWING EVENTFUL TUESDAY, WHEN LEISER REAPPEARED TO SUPERVISE HIS LITTLE PRINTING VENTURE, ONE OF THE FIRST "EMPLOYEES" THAT HE ENCOUNTERED WAS LIEUTENANT MOSES SARGENT OF THE BOSTON DETECTIVE FORCE WHO HAD ASSUMED THE ROLL OF AN EMPLOYEE FOR THE DAY. AFTER THE PLATE HAD BEEN MOUNTED AND SEVERAL IMPRESSIONS HAD BEEN PRINTED, THE LIEUTENANT MADE AN ATTEMPT TO FORMALLY ARREST LEISER. ALTHOUGH SOME CONTEMPORARY NEWSPAPER ACCOUNTS DESCRIBED LEISER AS BEING HEAVY SET AND DUMPY, HE PROVED TO BE QUITE A MATCH FOR THE POLICE DETECTIVE AND WAS ABLE TO DRAW A KNIFE ON THE OFFICER. IT WAS ONLY AFTER A FIERCE STRUGGLE THAT THE KNIFE WAS REMOVED, WHEREUPON HE THEN PULLED A PISTOL OUT OF HIS BAG OF TRICKS AND ONCE MORE ATTEMPTED TO ASSAULT THE OFFICER. AGAIN, IT WAS ONLY AFTER A FIERCE STRUGGLE AND WITH THE ASSISTANCE OF SOME CURIOUS ONLOOKERS (PEOPLE SEEM TO BE LESS COMPLACENT IN THOSE DAYS) AND THE ADDED ASSISTANCE OF ANOTHER OFFICER FROM A NEARBY POLICE STATION THAT THE NOW DESPERATE LEISER WAS AGAIN DISARMED, HANDCUFFED AND REMOVED TO THE STATION WHERE HE WAS FORMALLY BOOKED. AFTER HIS BOOKING AND UPON THE REMOVAL OF THE SHACKLES, THE NOW RATHER EXPECTED OCCURRED WHEN LEISER AGAIN ATTACKED THE OFFICERS WITH HIS BARE HANDS. WITH THE PRISONER NOW IN CUSTODY, IT SOON BECAME EVIDENT TO THE BOSTON POLICE THAT THEY HAD A BIGGER PROBLEM THAN THEY HAD ORIGINALLY BARGAINED FOR AS THERE SOON APPEARED ONE BIG FLAW IN THEIR CASE AGAINST LEISER. IT SEEMED THAT THERE WAS NO LAW ON THE BOOKS BY WHICH HE COULD SPECIFICALLY BE BROUGHT TO TRIAL FOR THE COUNTERFEITING OF A FOREIGN TREASURY NOTE. SINCE LEISER COULD NOT BE HELD INDEFINITELY, EVEN ON THE ASSAULT CHARGES, DETECTIVE SARGENT PAID AN IMMEDIATE VISIT TO THE UNITED STATES ATTORNEY AND WITH HIM CONTACTED THE BRITISH CONSULATE OF BOSTON THAT VERY SAME DAY. THEY EXPLAINED TO THE CONSUL GENERAL THE GRAVITY OF THE SITUATION. SINCE THE PRISONER COULD BE HELD FOR ONLY ONE WEEK, THE CONSUL IMMEDIATELY WROTE TO THE LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR OF NOVA SCOTIA DESCRIBING THE SITUATION, INCLUDING SEVERAL SPECIMENS OF THE FORGED NOTE, AND ASKING HIS ADVICE ON THE MATTER. ON THE 6TH THE NOVA SCOTIAN GOVERNMENT NOTIFIED A MR. E. M. McDONALD THAT HE WAS TO TRAVEL TO BOSTON AND WITH THE HELP OF THE BRITISH CONSUL AND AMERICAN DISTRICT ATTORNEY USED EVERY MEANS TO BRING LEISER TO TRIAL AND CONVICTION. MR. McDONALD ARRIVED IN BOSTON ON THE 9TH OF SEPTEMBER AND IMMEDIATELY CONTACTED THE CONSUL GENERAL AND DETECTIVE SARGENT, BOTH OF WHOM FILLED HIM IN ON ALL THE IMPORTANT FACTS OF THE CASE, WHICH WERE DESCRIBED AS FOLLOWS: LEISER HAD BEEN EMPLOYED FOR SOME TIME AT THE CHARLESTOWN NAVY YARDS AS A BLACKSMITH, AND ALTHOUGH HE WAS WELL ACQUAINTED IN YARMOUTH AND HALIFAX, NOVA SCOTIA, HE HAD LIVED IN BOSTON FOR THE LAST

NINETEEN YEARS. HE RESIDED AT PRESENT IN A ROOMING HOUSE IN CHARLES-TOWN. UPON SEARCHING HIS QUARTERS SEVERAL OTHER COUNTERFEITING IMPLEMENTS AND NOTES HAD BEEN FOUND, ALONG WITH MATERIAL USED TO AGE THE APPEARANCE OF THESE NOTES. SHEETS OF PAPER UPON WHICH HE HAD PRACTICED IMITATIONS OF THE NOTE SIGNATURE WERE ALSO FOUND AND HAD BEEN SEIZED AS EVIDENCE. IT HAD NOT BEEN DISCOVERED WHO HAD ENGRAVED THE PLATE OR WHETHER LEISER HAD ANY ACCOMPLICES. IT HAD BEEN DECIDED THAT LEISER COULD NOT BE BROUGHT TO TRIAL ON COUNTERFEITING CHARGES BUT THAT HE MIGHT BE BROUGHT TO TRIAL UNDER THE COMMON LAW FOR AN ATTEMPT TO DEFRAUD. LEISER WAS TO BE TRIED DURING THE OCTOBER SITTING OF THE MASSACHUSETTS SUPERIOR COURT OF BOSTON, BUT SINCE THE ARRESTING OFFICER WAS UNABLE TO ATTEND, THE PRISONER WAS HELD OVER FOR THE DECEMBER TERM. WHEN HE WAS FINALLY TRIED, THE ORIGINAL INDICTMENT "FOR ATTEMPT TO COMMIT AN OVERT ACT PROHIBITED BY LAW, TO WIT, TO COUNTERFEIT," ETC., WAS USED AGAINST HIM, AND ON THIS CHARGE, HE WAS CONVICTED AND SENTENCED TO ONE YEAR IN THE PENITENTIARY, THIS BEING THE SEVEREST PENALTY ALLOWED UNDER THE LAW AT THIS TIME. IT WAS NOTED THAT THE PRINTING PLATE WHICH WAS RETAINED FOR EVIDENCE HAD FINALLY BEEN DESTROYED.

ON SEPTEMBER 6TH THE ATTEMPTED COUNTERFEITING OF PROVINCIAL NOTES WAS FIRST REPORTED IN THE HALIFAX MORNING CHRONICLE, AND SEVERAL DAYS LATER A DESCRIPTION OF THE COUNTERFEIT NOTE WAS POSTED BY THE PROVINCIAL SECRETARY. THIS COMPARISON WAS MADE POSSIBLE THROUGH THE EXAMINATION OF THE COUNTERFEIT NOTES THAT HAD BEEN SENT WITH THE FIRST CORRESPONDENCE ON SEPTEMBER 2ND AND WERE DESCRIBED AS FOLLOWS:

"THE LION AND UNICORN IN THE FORMER (ORIGINAL) ARE RAMPANT (STANDING UP), IN THE LATTER (COUNTERFEIT) CROUCHANT (LYING DOWN)." THE COUNTERFEIT BILLS COULD ALSO BE IDENTIFIED "BY THE ABSENCE OF THE SMALL LION IN THE UPPER PART OF THE SHIELD."

IT CAN BE SAFELY ASSUMED THAT THE ONLY COUNTERFEIT NOTES OF THIS ISSUE TO REACH NOVA SCOTIA WERE THOSE IN THE HANDS OF THE RECEIVER GENERAL.

IN A LETTER DATED 7 FEBRUARY 1863, MR. McDONALD CONTACTED THE NOVA SCOTIAN GOVERNMENT, AND NOTING MR. SARGENT'S DEVOTION TO DUTY AND THE GREAT PERSONAL RISK THAT HE HAD TAKEN, MADE A VERY GENEROUS OBSERVATION.

"I WOULD BEG LEAVE TO CALL TO YOUR ATTENTION THE VALUABLE SERVICES RENDERED BY THIS GENTLEMAN IN ARRESTING LEISER, AND IN THE SUBSEQUENT PROCEEDINGS. IN EFFECTING THE ARREST, HE RAN A VERY GREAT RISK IN PERSONAL INJURY, THE CRIMINAL BEING ARMED, AND MAKING A DESPERATE RESISTANCE. WHEN I SAW MR. SARGENT IN SEPTEMBER, HE CARRIED ON HIS PERSON UNMISTAKABLE EVIDENCE OF THE SHARP CONFLICT HE HAD HAD WITH THE PRISONER. HAD THE COUNTERFEIT BEEN UPON ANY OF THE MASSACHUSETTS' BANKS, HE WOULD HAVE BEEN REWARDED FOR THE ARREST. AS IT IS CUSTOMARY IN THIS PROVINCE TO GIVE REWARDS FOR THE APPREHENSION OF CRIMINALS, THERE WOULD SEEM TO BE NO IRREGULARITY IN REWARDING MR. SARGENT. IN MASSACHUSETTS THERE IS A LAW IN RELATION TO REWARDS FOR SERVICE OF THIS KIND, AUTHORIZING THE PAYMENT OF FIFTY DOLLARS FOR THE CONVICTION OF ANY PERSON PASSING A COUNTERFEIT BILL, AND TWO HUNDRED AND FIFTY DOLLARS FOR THE SEIZURE

OF THE PLATE FROM WHICH THE COUNTERFEIT NOTE HAS BEEN PRINTED. THE APPREHENSION AND CONVICTION OF LEISER IS A CASE THAT WOULD SEEM TO JUSTIFY THE PAYMENT OF A REASONABLE REWARD, AND CONSIDERING THE GREAT PERSONAL RISK INCURRED BY OFFICER SARGENT IN MAKING THE ARREST AND THE IMPORTANCE OF THE SERVICE HE HAS RENDERED IN PREVENTING THE PROBABLE ISSUE OF A LARGE AMOUNT OF COUNTERFEIT TREASURY NOTES, I WOULD SUGGEST THAT THE GOVERNMENT OF NOVA SCOTIA SHOULD CONSIDER THE PROPRIETY OF GIVING HIM A REWARD EQUAL IN AMOUNT TO THAT WHICH HE WOULD HAVE RECEIVED FROM THE GOVERNMENT OF HIS OWN STATE HAD THE COUNTERFEIT BEEN UPON ANY OF THE BANKS OF MASSACHUSETTS."

IT DOES NOT SEEM, HOWEVER, THAT THE PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT OF NOVA SCOTIA TOOK THE SAME BENEVOLENT ATTITUDE TOWARDS MR. SARGENT. UPON CHECKING THE PROVINCIAL TREASURY PAYMENT RECORDS FOR SIMILAR SERVICES RENDERED, MR. SARGENT'S NAME DOES NOT APPEAR. IT APPEARS THAT THE ONLY LASTING TRIBUTE AND RECOGNITION GIVEN TO MR. SARGENT BY NOVA SCOTIA WAS THE INCLUSION OF THE COMMENDATORY LETTER OF FEBRUARY 7TH ALONG WITH THE OTHER RELATIVE CORRESPONDENCE IN THE APPENDIX TO THE JOURNALS OF THE LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL OF NOVA SCOTIA FOR 1863.

TO A COLLECTOR OF CANADIAN CURRENCY, THE ACQUISITION OF ANY NOVA SCOTIAN PROVINCIAL TREASURY NOTE WOULD BE A FEATHER IN HIS NUMISMATIC CAP. HOW FORTUNATE INDEED WOULD BE THE INDIVIDUAL WHO COULD LAY HIS HANDS UPON AN ORIGINAL LEISER NOTE, IF INDEED ANY HAVE SOMEHOW MIRACULOUSLY SURVIVED THROUGH THE YEARS. WITH THESE THOUGHTS IN MIND, MAY WE ALL DILIGENTLY SEARCH FOR THIS POT OF GOLD AT THE END OF OUR NUMISMATIC RAINBOW. HAPPY HUNTING.

LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR'S MEDALS FOR HIGH SCHOOL ENTRANCEEXAMINATIONS OF NEW BRUNSWICK

IN 1903 HIS HONOUR LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR SNOWBALL WAS PLEASED TO OFFER THIRTEEN SILVER MEDALS TO BE COMPETED FOR BY THE PUPILS OF THE EIGHTH GRADE AT THE HIGH SCHOOL ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS IN JUNE OF EACH YEAR, DURING HIS TERM OF OFFICE.

THE FOLLOWING ARE THE CONDITIONS AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING THESE COMPETITIVE EXAMINATIONS:

1. NONE BUT REGULAR PUPILS OF GRADE VIII ARE ELIGIBLE FOR COMPETITION.
2. THE EXAMINATIONS WILL BE HELD IN ACCORDANCE WITH THE PROVISIONS OF REGULATION 46 AT THE SEVERAL GRAMMAR SCHOOLS, AND AT SUCH OF THE SUPERIOR SCHOOLS AS SHALL MAKE APPLICATION TO THE CHIEF SUPERINTENDENT NOT LATER THAN THE FIRST DAY OF JUNE.
3. ONE MEDAL WILL BE COMPETED FOR BY THE PUPILS OF EACH COUNTY, EXCEPT THAT FOR THE PURPOSES OF THIS COMPETITION MADAWASKA AND VICTORIA WILL BE RECKONED AS ONE COUNTY, AND SUNBURY AND QUEENS AS ONE COUNTY.

(OVER)

4. THE MEDAL WILL BE AWARDED TO THE PUPIL MAKING THE HIGHEST AGGREGATE MARKS IN EACH CASE, PROVIDED THAT NO CANDIDATE FALLING BELOW THE SECOND DIVISION SHALL BE ENTITLED TO A MEDAL. THE PAPERS OF THE CANDIDATES AWARDED THE HIGHEST MARKS BY THE LOCAL EXAMINERS SHALL BE SUBMITTED FOR A FINAL EXAMINATION TO SPECIAL EXAMINERS APPOINTED BY THE BOARD OF EDUCATION WHOSE DECISION SHALL DETERMINE THE AWARD.

5. THESE MEDALS ARE TO BE PUBLICLY PRESENTED TO THEIR RESPECTIVE WINNERS EITHER AT THE RE-OPENING OF THE SCHOOLS IN AUGUST OR SEPTEMBER, OR AT A LATER DATE, AS DETERMINED BY THE LOCAL SCHOOL BOARDS. IT IS INTENDED THAT THE MEDALS SHALL BE WORN BY THE WINNERS AT ALL SCHOOL EXAMINATIONS, FESTIVALS AND ANNIVERSARIES. 1.

THE EXAMINATIONS COVER THE WORK OF GRADES 1 TO VIII, INCLUSIVE, OR THE COMMON SCHOOL GRADES. THOSE WHO SUCCESSFULLY PASS THESE EXAMINATIONS RECEIVE A CERTIFICATE WHICH IS INTENDED TO SERVE A TWO-FOLD PURPOSE; FOR PUPILS WHO DO NOT INTEND TO CONTINUE LONGER AT SCHOOL IT SERVES AS A DIPLOMA GIVEN UNDER THE AUTHORITY OF THE EDUCATION DEPARTMENT, TESTIFYING THAT THE HOLDER HAS COMPLETED SATISFACTORILY THE COURSE OF STUDIES OF THE COMMON SCHOOLS; FOR PUPILS WHO INTEND TO CONTINUE THEIR STUDIES, IT SERVES AS A CERTIFICATE OF ADMITTANCE TO THE HIGH SCHOOL CLASSES. 2.

THE AWARDS FOR HIGH SCHOOL ENTRANCE SAW FEW CHANGES IN ITS ADMINISTRATION FROM ITS INCEPTION BY HIS HONOUR LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR JABEZ BUNTING SNOWBALL IN 1903. THE ORIGINAL OFFER OF THIRTEEN MEDALS FIRST PRESENTED IN 1904 WAS LATER INCREASED TO FOURTEEN IN 1910 WHEN SUNBURY AND QUEENS COUNTY WERE EACH GIVEN A MEDAL, AND LATER IN 1917 WHEN SUFFICIENT APPLICANTS FOR HIGH SCHOOL ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS WARRANTED AN ADDITIONAL MEDAL FOR MADAWASKA AND VICTORIA COUNTIES. FROM 1917 UNTIL THE FINAL PRESENTATION OF MEDALS IN 1939 AT THE OUTBREAK OF WORLD WAR II, FIFTEEN MEDALS WERE GIVEN EACH YEAR. DURING THE 37 YEARS A TOTAL OF 535 MEDALS WERE AWARDED.

FROM 1904 TO 1939, THERE WERE EIGHT LIEUTENANT GOVERNORS, EACH WITH HIS OWN MEDAL PATTERN. A PURELY ACADEMIC SEARCH OF THE "ANNUAL REPORT OF THE SCHOOLS OF NEW BRUNSWICK" WOULD INDICATE ONLY SEVEN LIEUTENANT GOVERNORS DURING THIS SAME PERIOD, HOWEVER, WHAT THE ANNUAL REPORTS DO NOT RECORD IS LIEUTENANT GOVERNOR GILBERT W. GANONG'S TERM OF OFFICE. HE SERVED FOR ONLY FOUR MONTHS; ADEQUATE TIME TO DESIGN AND DELIVER THE MEDALLIONS. THE LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR'S MEDAL FOR 1917 IS THEN THE RAREST IN THE SERIES OF EIGHT MEDALS HAVING A MINTAGE OF ONLY 15. OF THE THREE MEDAL TYPES THAT I HAVE BEEN ABLE TO LIBERATE, I AM PLEASED TO HAVE ONE OF THE GANONG MEDALS.

WHILE THE MEDAL HAD A REAL MEASURE OF PRESTIGE AMONG THE STUDENTS, IT HAD A VERY POOR RATIO BETWEEN COMPETITORS FROM THE VARIOUS COUNTIES. AS FEW AS A DOZEN COMPETITORS AT ONE EXTREME TO OVER SIX HUNDRED ON THE OTHER. FOR INSTANCE, ALBERT COUNTY WHICH IS MAINLY RURAL ON OCCASION HAD AS FEW AS TWELVE COMPETITORS, WHEREAS SAINT JOHN COUNTY WHICH INCLUDES THE CITY OF SAINT JOHN HAD UPWARDS OF SIX HUNDRED COMPETING.

NEARLY THREE THOUSAND STUDENTS IN THE PROVINCE WROTE THE HIGH SCHOOL ENTRANCE EXAMINATIONS IN THE LATTER YEARS OF THE COMPETITION TO A LOW OF 904 IN 1904. THE FAILURE RATE ON THE EXAMINATIONS RANGED FROM $1\frac{1}{2}\%$ TO A HIGH OF 22%. THIS WIDE RANGE DOES NOT SPEAK WELL OF EXTERNAL EXAMINATIONS. FULLY 70% OF THE MEDALS WERE AWARDED TO GIRLS.

THESE MEDALS ARE VERY ILLUSIVE TO COLLECTORS, BEING VIRTUALLY UNKNOWN TO OTHERS. IT IS UNDERSTANDABLE THAT THESE MEDALS HAVE A STRONG SENTIMENTAL ATTACHMENT TO THE OWNERS. ONE MAN CHOSE TO RETAIN HIS MEDAL WITH THE COMMENT, "IT IS A REMINDER TO ME OF ONE THING THAT I DID WELL IN LIFE. FOR ONE VICTORY, I'VE HAD A THOUSAND FAILURES."

IT IS A CONCERN TO ME THAT THERE IS NOT A COMPLETE SERIES OF THESE MEDALS FOR DISPLAY PURPOSES AT THE LEGISLATURE IN FREDERICTON, NEW BRUNSWICK. ONE OF MY OBJECTIVES IS TO SEE THAT SUCH A DISPLAY IS DEVELOPED.

ALL THE MEDALS ARE SILVER AND HAVE A BAR AND THREE LINKS WITH THE NAME OF THE COUNTY ENGRAVED ON THE BAR. THE ONE EXCEPTION TO THIS IS THE LAST MEDAL SPONSORED BY LIEUTENANT-GOVERNOR MURRAY MACLAREN HAVING NO BAR. THE MEDALS RANGE IN DIAMETER FROM $1\frac{1}{4}$ " FOR THE FIRST TO 2" FOR THE LAST IN THE SERIES OF EIGHT DISTINCT PATTERNS. THE REVERSE DIE HAS THE SAME PATTERN IF NOT THE SAME DIE ON FOUR MEDALS. MANY OF THE MEDALS WERE THE WORK OF HENRY BIRKS & SON.

THE S. V. SKILLEN TOKEN OF ST. MARTINS

ANYONE WHO COLLECTS LOCAL TOKENS KNOWS THAT THE ACQUISITION OF A SPECIMEN IS ONLY HALF THE FUN. THE OTHER HALF IS DEVOTED TO FINDING OUT SOMETHING ABOUT THE HISTORY OF THE TOKEN. THIS SUMMER, A FRIEND AND I SPENT A FULL DAY IN ST. MARTINS RESEARCHING THE S. V. SKILLEN TOKEN. THIS TOKEN IS MADE OF ALUMINIUM, OCTAGONAL IN SHAPE, AND 29 MM. IN DIAMETER. ON THE OBERSE IS THE INSCRIPTION S. V. SKILLEN GENERAL DEALER ST. MARTINS, N.B. AND ON THE REVERSE GOOD FOR 5¢ IN MERCHANDISE.

ST. MARTINS IN THE LATE NINETEENTH CENTURY WAS INDEED A PROSPEROUS TOWN AS EVIDENCED BY THE MANY FINE HOMES THAT STILL CAN BE SEEN THERE TODAY. THIS COMMUNITY IS 40 MILES FROM ST. JOHN ON THE BAY OF FUNDY AND WAS A GREAT SHIPBUILDING CENTRE. AT ONE TIME, THERE WERE FOURTEEN SHIPYARDS IN ST. MARTINS.

THE S. V. SKILLEN STORE WAS STARTED BY ANDREW SKILLEN WHO BUILT AND OPERATED IT IN CONJUNCTION WITH A TAILOR SHOP. WHEN HE RETIRED AROUND 1890 VAUGHAN SKILLEN TOOK OVER THE STORE. S. V. SKILLEN OPERATED THE STORE UNTIL 1920 OR 1921 WHEN HE SOLD IT. HE SOON WAS FORCED TO BUY IT BACK AND RESOLD IT AGAIN IN 1922.

THE S. V. SKILLEN TOKEN WAS ISSUED ONLY IN THE 5¢ DENOMINATION. IT WAS USED ABOUT 1907 UNTIL 1916. IF ONE WERE TO EXPLAIN WHY THE FIRM USED THIS TOKEN, AN UNDERSTANDING OF THE TIMES MUST BE HAD. IN THOSE DAYS ONE DIDN'T HANDLE MUCH CASH. FARMERS BROUGHT BUTTER, EGGS, ETC., WHICH WAS CREDITED TO THEIR ACCOUNT, AND PURCHASED MERCHANDISE WHICH WAS DEBITED. IF THE DEBITS GOT TOO BIG, A LOAD OF WOOD, HAY, FARM PRODUCE, OR WHAT HAVE YOU WAS BROUGHT. THIS WAS FINE EXCEPT THAT THE STOREKEEPER HAD TO PAY THE WHOLESALER IN CASH. THE ISSUING OF THE TOKENS WAS SIMPLY A 5% DISCOUNT FOR CASH. THE PURPOSE OF COURSE, WAS TO TRY AND INCREASE THE CASH FLOW.

OF COURSE, WHEN INTERVIEWING LOCAL CITIZENS, AMUSING COMMENTS ARE ALWAYS MADE. I ASKED ONE ELDERLY LADY WHAT DENOMINATION THE SKILLEN PIECES WERE ISSUED IN AND SHE QUICKLY REPLIED, "PRESBYTERIAN, OF COURSE." ONE OTHER LADY STATED THAT ONE DAY, WHEN A VERY YOUNG GIRL, HER MOTHER SENT HER TO THE SKILLEN STORE FOR A LOAF OF BREAD. AS SHE ARRIVED AT THE STORE, A MILE OR SO FROM HOME, SHE SPOTTED A SKILLEN TOKEN ON THE GROUND IN FRONT OF THE STORE. SHE WAS SO EXCITED SHE RAN HOME TO SHOW HER MOTHER THE TOKEN. HER MOTHER PROMPTLY SENT HER DAUGHTER BACK THE MILE TO THE STORE TO GET THE LOAF OF BREAD.

THIS PARTICULAR TOKEN SEEMS TO BE A DIFFICULT ONE TO COME BY AS THE AUTHOR KNOWS OF NO OTHER SPECIMENS. IT IS POSSIBLE ONE OF THE RELATIVES OF S. V. SKILLEN HAS A FEW PIECES IN HIS POSSESSION.

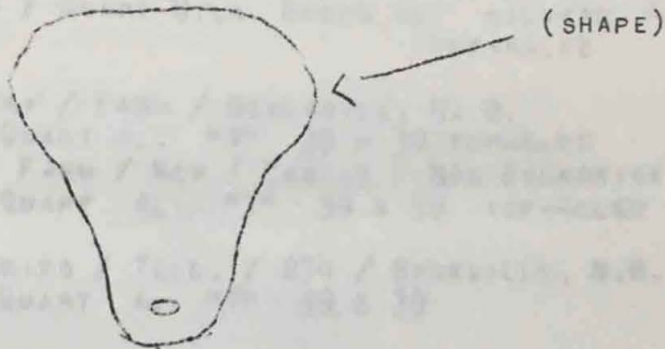
