

Mr Quinn is a member of the A.P.N.A. and the current treasurer of the Mirimichi Coin Club.


The new store will handle coin and stamp supplies as well as the coins and stamps and new customers are promised very reasonable deals.

THE LOURT ALLISON COMMERCIAL COLLEGE CURRENCY

Who among us has not considered the nostalgic dream of the treasure map, the sunken gallion, or the oaken chest with ourselves playing the lead roll as hero. A rather unrealistic train of thought you will agree, with those of us whose passion is the merchant's token or paper money. However, finds are made on occasion that keeps the door open to our fanciful speculation. One such find fell to my good fortune when I heard of the sale of articles from a bleak Victorian farm house some miles from where I live. The home wasonce the habitation of a prosperous family that had yielded no children in recent generations. A quick reconnaissance of the home revealed several desirable articles, but one odd low cabinet caught my eye with its inlaid doors, which when opened exposed a series of drawers and more doors. The price was set and agreed upon and I was now the owner of goodness-knows-what, and even more important - what would I ever do with it. On moving the cabinet out, I was struck with two surprises, one that the cabinet was crammed with everything from Victorian time tables to bullet molds, none of which on examination was of the slightest interest to the former owner. The second shock came when I was told to take the lower part of the cabinet that I had not seen previously but consistedof drawers and was now being used as a stand for washing dishes. I now had possession of a very old walnut veneer chest on chest which later proved to be Queen Anne, the original drawer pulls being 1695. The fate of the chest is still undecided.

Meanthile, a systematic search of the drawers brought to light a folder with a small hoard of bills. My immediate reaction was to close the folder and after a long breath to open it up slowly to see if they were still there.

Examination of the bills revealed hitherto unknown denominations of The Mount Allison Bank Commercial College. These bills are hardly in the class with most of the Canadian broken bank notes but may of the Canadian Commercial College notes are either unique or very rare and there is a story to be told about them that will be of interest to numismatists.

The Mount Allison Wesleyan Academy was established in Sackville, N. B., in 1843, as a school for boys and in 1854 the Ladies' College opened.

At a meeting of the Board of Regents in Charlottetown, P. E I., on June 27th, 1874, President David Allison expressed his conviction of the desirability of doing a work similar to that done in the Commercial Colleges of the country and intimated that he had providionally enjoined the services of Samuel E. Whiston, Esq. to take charge of such a department at Mount Allison at a salary of nine hundred dollars and a motion of nomination was confirmed. Whiston was described as a teacher of most skilful penmanship and bookkeeping and was the first head of a department that continued for over three-quarters of a century. Thiston's signature is affixed to the bills of the Mount Allison Commercial College as Cashier. His signature is also shown on a five cent College note that may be a part of a series used in Charlottetown. In addition to the Charlottetown branch of Eaton's Actual Business College, established in 1873, there was a branch in Halifax established in May 1867 where J. C. P. Frazee was Principal and a branch in Saint John, N. B., established in February 1867, where A. H. Eaton was Principal and President. It is my opinion that Mr. Samuel E. Whiston was Principal of the Charlottetown branch when hired by the Mount Allison Board of Regents.

On August 13th, 1874, the Commercial Department of Mount Allison was opened along with other branches of the institution for the fall term having been furnished and meeting all the requirements of a first class commercial college. The regular course was to include everything taught in the best commercial colleges, that is, merchandising, railroading, banking, etc.

In this department the student's practical knowledge of bookkeeping was put to the test. Then commencing the first set of "Actual" the student was given \$1,000. in college currency as a capital to invest. The use of cards representing merchandise made the work nearly as practical as though he were in a business establishment keeping books. (The Halifax Business College and Writing Academy, designed to educate young men for business, had an earlier beginning than its Mount Allison counterpart but it is interesting that the students were furnished with a capital of about \$2,000. in college funds consisting of neatly engraved bank notes issued by the College Bank and a quantity of merchandise with which to begin business - buy, sell, barter, ship, buy and sell on commission, discount, etc. etc. J. C. P. Frazee was the Principal and Proprietor.)

The bills were used to the close of the nineteenth century although Samuel Thiston continued as head of the Commercial College at Mount Allison until only 1878. No mention is made of him after this date.

The bills in my collection were issued to a student who entered the Commercial College in the first term of its operation in 1874 and in this way the bills are in very fine condition compared with the usual fair to good run of commercial college notes. The quality of the paper is not as durable as negotiable bills that contributes to the usual undesirable condition. The bills were printed by the St. John and Halifax Lith. Co. in black and are uniface. The vignette at the left of the note is identical to that used on the Westmorland Bank \$1,00 notes only in reverse.

The central vignette showing the campus of Mount Allison University is a likeness of the cite as it was in the third quarter of the nineteenth century. The

original pencil drawing used for this vignette is in the Archives of the University.

These bills were well printed, comparing favourable with some of the bank notes of the period and it is conceivable that they could have passed as genuine notes.

Only one bill was known to the Mount Allison University and it is a poor specimen beautifully framed and hanging in the President's Office. The notes are in the following denominations and range from unique to R 7; \$1.00, \$2.00, \$5.00, \$10.00, \$20.00, \$100.00, and \$500.00.

Requirements at the school were high - just what one would expect from a Wesleyan school of the Victorian era. One postscript to requirements requested the parents not to furnish their sons with fire arms, the use of which was prohibited.

The Mount Allison bills may have an additional series of fractional notes and varieties of the dollar series since the bills were used for many years and must have required at least a second printing.

The use of Commercial College Currency as ateaching aid was an effective means of training young men, many of whom became leaders in the business life of this entire nation.

THE HALIFAX COIN CLUB IS ISSUING AN ATLANTIC PROVINCES NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION MEDAL TO BE SOLD AT THE SPRING RALLY ON MAY 1ST.

THIS MEDAL WILL PROBABLY BE CALLED A MARITIME UNION MEDAL. ONE SIDE OF THE MEDAL WILL FEATURE THE A.P.N.A. CREST SO WELL KNOWN ON PREVIOUS MEDAL ISSUES, AND THE OTHER SIDE WILL FEATURE A MARITIME UNION THEME DESIGNED BY ELIOT FINEBERG.

IN THE CENTER WOULD BE FEATURED THE NOVA SCOTIA - NEW BRUNSWICK SUCCESS TOKEN ADVOCATING UNION MANY YEARS AGO, AND SURROUNDING THIS WOULD BE RECORDED THE MARITIME UNION STUDY CONFERENCE HELD IN HALIFAX, N.S. by Geoffrey Boll.

Farmers Co-operative Stores and Creameries began in Moneton, New Brunswick in 1918 at 576 Main St. where the Canadian Tire Corporation Store is now located. The creamery was first managed by J.Percy Simonds. Succeeding managers have been Harold Falconer, J.H. King, Ben Gallant, Edward Gaudet, Camille Leger, Denis Landry, and J.C. Wallace. On January 1, 1947, the business became part of Co-operative Farm Services and changed it's lacation to Barker St. in the Victory Industrial Centre.

Farmer's Co-operative Creemeries produced ice-cream, butter, bottled milk and cream. The token in question was used for over-the-counter sales of milk and cream. It seems that many more bottles were being brought back to the store than were being sold. Where did these bottles come from? Well, it must be assumed that bottles from other dairies were being redeemed. There were also boys who apparently felt it was acceptable to steel bottles from the creamery and then redeem them for cash (ten cents). One such character was well known to the employees as "Hooker".

To curb this dishonesty, with every purchase of a bottle of milk or cream, a token was given to the customer. To get ten cents for the bottle it was necessary to return the token with the bottle.

The token is aluminum, octogonal in shape, and 25mm. in diameter. On the obverse is inscribed "Farmers / Co-operative / Creamery Co./ Moncton N.B. . On the reverse is "Good for / 10¢ / When / Returned / With Bottle. The token was used from 1918 to 1924 and one of the employees states that a box was kep; under the counter with several hundred tokens in it.

It is interesting to note that milk sold for 10¢ a bottle in those days and cream for 15¢ a bottle. Bottles cost the dealer 6¢ each. When paying 10¢ for the return of a bottle it would seem milk was almost valueless. The Fermer's Co-operative Creamery had no delivery routes and sold approximately fifty quarts of milk and thirty pints of cream a day.

His Excellency further intimated to the Board his opinion of the salutory effects that would result from having a Coinage of Silver and Copper to a certain amount executed at home exclusivly for this Island and of his intention of communicating with His Majesty's Ministers on the subject if it met the approbation of Council - the Coinage to consist of the follwoing species of Coins .

THE REVERSE OF THE BANK OF CANADA \$2. NOTE OF 1954

by Harry Eisenhauer

The picture on the reverse of our present day two dollar bill is a landscape view at Melbourne, Quebec, according to an article printed in the Toronto Telegram a few years ago and others who are familiar with the community. If I were to give all the detail that I know of the poeple who have lived in these homes this account might be too long, but I will try to touch on some interesting points.

The St. Francis River runs from south to north which is from right to left in the picture. It starts at a point north of the Vermont and New Hampshire boundary and after being joined by other rivers, such as the Magog at Sherbrooke and the Massouhippi at Lennoxville as well as other smaller atreams including the Brompton Lake outlet at Melbourne, it continues through Drummondville to Lake St. Pierre in the St. Lawrence River. The river has been used for power at a mill at Windsor Mills and thegreatest is near Drummondville where Southern Canada Power had its largest generator. Southern Canada Power now has been taken over by Quebec Hydro. There are bridges at Sherbrooke, Bromptonville, Windsor Mills, Richmond and Drummondville and Trans-Canada Highway.

The church in the picture is known as St. Andrews and the site is known as Upper Melbourne because it is in the Township of Melbourne, County of Richmond and about one mile south of Mackenzie bridge that connects Melbourne village and the town of Richmond. Settlers to this district came from Scotland in the 1830s and they established the "Kirk".

In October, 1836, the poeple of Melbourne, under the leadership of Mr. Thomas MacPherson, applied to the Presbytery of Quebec for aid to build a church. The letter was refered to the Glasgow Colonial Society but the appeal was ignored. A second appeal, made by Colin Mac-Iver in 1837, to Dr. Cook of the Church of Scotland in Canada was successfull. With the help, and money reised for from local residents, a church was begun in 1840.

On the 15th day of October, 1841, a deed of Donation was registered in the Sherbrooke Registry Office by Daniel Thomas (The Squire) who donated a portion of land for the purpose of erecting a church and manse, the church to be designated by St. Andrew's Church. Hugh Ross began the building in 1841 and it was completed, mostly by volunteer labour the same year.

The small building in the bottom left corner of the picture is a blacksmith shop. The blacksmith's name was Arthur Quinn, who had followed in the trade as his father before him in the same shop.

House No. 1: This building is directly below the church and was occupied continuously for the years between 1920-1960 by the Cogan family. Tom Cogan was a baker and later clerked in a grocery store in Richmond.

House No. 2: The building just above the word "Banque" is a house occupied by Albert Doyle for the last twenty years or so.

Road No. 1: The road passing in front of the blacksmith shop and houses is much steeper than the picture shows. This was Highway 39 but when it was reconstructed, a new road was made about one half further south.

Road No. 2: This road is on the east side of the river and running parrallel with it. This is Highway 22 from Richmond to Sherbrooke.

Farm No. 1: This farm is by road no. 2 at the group of trees at the left of the church steeple. Mr. John Martin, who died a short time ago at the age of ninety-nine, owned this farm for many years. The present owner is Gordon Crock.

Farm No. 2: This is the farm on the west side of the river about half way up the picture and left of the close up elm tree near the right of the scene. This was owned by a Mr. Alexander who was a Jersey cattle breeder.

Farm No 3: This is where the artist stood as he sketched the picture. The house, which is not in the picture, I am told, had a large pine tree growingthrough the roof of the closed in verandah. It has since been cut down.

Yes the reverse of our current two dollar bill is an interesting design.

WE'VE GOT YOUR NULBER

Joseph LeRoux, M. D., author of "The Canadian Coin Cabinet" (1892) sets out ararity list for numismatic items that persists to this day. A similar rarity list for describing coin collectors may also be drawn from the same numbers and their terminology. It is highly improbable that this work ill endure with the eminent doctor's, but it may serve as a moment of humor or challenge.

RI COLLION

A collector or rather an accumulator who has no knowledge of coins, except that he is attracted to them and hoards the odd specimen over a period of years. Attracted by the bright surface, the new design, or the well-worn appearance of an old or mutilated coin. Has warped ideas of their value. Very suspicious.

R2 EASILY OBTAINED

An accumulator stimulated by a collector with a higher rarity number who shows an interest in Rl's fist full of gems. Often made dagerous by having a Blue Book placed in his hands. Specimens are liberated from the bureau drawer are placed tenderly on layersof cotton batting in a small box.

R3 HOT EASILY OBTAINED

Attends first meeting menoeuvred by the strategy of an R5. Easy to impress at this stage by a well conducted programme and friendly atmosphere. Purchases his first coin at a reasonable price. Many lose future of a higher R number at this point if sold a bad bill of goods. R3 is very fragile at this point.

RA OBTAINED WITH DIFFICULTY

An R6 with his B. Unc. charm sells the R3 on membership in the local club and its far reaching benefits. Membership may be followed by a subscription to a numismatic publication even on the same night. Fatherly advice from older R4's and higher rarities ensure direction incollection. A time of growth and experience necessary for further upward circulation. Young R4 may have to be lured away from purchasing anything and everything that is shiny.

R5 RARE

A stable collector who has demonstrated his interest in displaying, participating in club programmes or acting responsibly on committees. Accepts an executive post in the local club. Likely to suffer his first rim nick when criticized, but because of his R5 status is big enough to maintain his rating. Often does some of his best work at this stage of growth by being responsible for a successful medal design or researching some local token or medal. His own collection improves in quality and shows signs of specialization. Reaches out to regional and national memberships for further fellowship.

R6 VERY RARE

Normally looked up to for his knowledge in his area of specialization. Assumes his responsibility as Club President and/or regional executive positions. At this rarity, additional circulation raises the possibility of a bad rub or a dig. An Ró should have a hard shell or plastic holder at this rarity and upwards. Continuedgrowth in his ability to direct, speak, write and correspond with Rl's to 110's. This rarity often underrated.

R7 EXTRE ELY RARE

The R7 elected to the Presidency of regional associations and the executive of national associations has a great voice in the future of the hobby and should exercise every quality of leadership while in the crisp years of his leadership. All care should be taken to keep an ear open to the voices of the R4's and to have our publications speak to them andnot over their obverse. Giving and sharing of one's information and material to assist and encourage all rarities and improve our national archives and museums. Care must be taken not to overgrade or to place oneself in ahigher rarity.

R8 PRECIOUS

Having been elevated to the Presidency of national numismatic associations he hasnot lost his concern for the welfare of the local clubs or his willingness to assist the R3's or M's. Being on display nationally and internationally his image must not become tarnished. His collection matures and enhanced by personal research all being shared with his fellow R numbers.

R9 VERY PRECIOUS

A part president of national and international organizations but continues to serve numismatics in an even more effective way by aiding and assisting the R6's - R8's from his wealth of knowledge and experience. In demand for speaking, judging, and writing. The R9 draws a crowd of admirers wherever displayed. Has acquired an attractive tone.

RIO EXTRE ELY PRECIOUS (ALMOST UNIQUE)

The R10's past contribution to numismatics has become legendary. The very presence of the R10 demands respect. The prina of years only adds to his beauty. Owned by national interests for everyone to enjoy. Will never be lost or forgotten by generations of collectors and numismatists.

Often the most beautiful or interesting coins in our collections have a low rarity number. They are all necessary to complete a series of their mintage. Collectors at every phase of the hobby cycle are essential for completeness. We have a great hoard of leadership hidden away in our organizations undergrading themselves, having a fear of being on display and to our shame sometimes excluded from our set by our failing to accept a new variety.

Remember, others have our number too!

World femous treasure hunter, Alex Storm, in person and a portion of the actual "Le Chameau" treasure recovered by him and his companions in 1965 off the Nova Scotia coast near Louisbourg, will highlight the annual Fall Rally of the Atlantic Provinces Numismatic Association to be hosted by the Halifax Coin Club. The show will take place on Saturday, September 30th, from 10 a.m. to 10 p.m. at the Lord Nelson Hotel in Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada,

The display will include gold louis d'ors bearing various mint marks; silver ocus, some in their natural fused and encrusted condition and some expertly cleaned and restored to reasonably good condition. There will also be a few of the badly decomposed copper coins almost destroyed by the action of the salt sea.

Alex will be available to answer questions from delegates and the general public who are invited to come and discuss his adventures with him and view the other artifacts such as shot, cannon balls and forks and spoons which he will also have exhibited.

The ill-fated ship set sail from Rochfort, France in 1725 for Quebec but floundered on a rock near Louisbourg, Nova Scotia on August 26th of that year and sank with its full cargo aboard. Storm and his associates recovered about 4,500 of the estimated 82,500 coins reported to be on board.

A quantity of the coins from Le Chameau were recently auctioned by a well known firm in New York and received widespread publicity at the time. Because of this, it is expected there will be wide-spread interest in the forthcoming exhibit in Halifax which is being presented with the co-operation of the Nova Scotia Government and the Nova Scotia Museum.

To mark this outstanding event, the Halifax Coin Club is producing a souvenir medallion to commemorate the occasion, depicting "Le Chameau" in full sail. The medal will feature a concave surface to ensure a high relief immage

of the ship. The reverse will depict the usual A.P.N.A. crest, featuring the coats of arms and floral emblems of Canada's four Atlantic Provinces. Designer of the medal is Edward A. Doane, Jr. of Halifax whose winning design was chosen from five submitted in a contest conducted by the Halifax Club recently. Gold medals are available at \$175.00 each. There will be 80 only, numbered, proof finish sets of silver and bronze at \$20.00 per set. Unnumbered bronze medals will be available at \$4.00 each, all postpaid. Medals will be available at the Fall Rally and by mail from the Medal Committee, Halifax Coin Club, 1747 Summer Street, Halifax, Nova Scotia, Canada. All medals will be struck by the Wellings Mint of Rexdale, Ontario, in 1½" size.

Other events to be featured at the show will be the bourse dealers where delegates and visitors may buy, sell, exchange and appraise coins, medals, tokens and paper money, as well as purchase supplies for their hobby. Club members will be encouraged to submit displays of their own for public viewing and the usual trophies will be available for competition including the best of show cup donated by Thistle Coins Limited of Yarmouth, Nova Scotia.

Election of new officers for the A.P.N.A. will also take place at this time during the annual meeting of the association members. The general public is invited to the show and encouraged to participate in the various events. Free numismatic literature will be distributed.

White's Restaurant - Saint John, N. 3. A Saint John, New Brunswick, token series may have the distinction of being the longest set in Canada, twenty in all. While it is long as a series, it is short on information. I have never seen a complete set from 5 cents to 1.00 and I do not know specifically how these tokens were used. however, have some information on the business and would throw out a whallenge to the readers to provide our Editor with the missing facts. FRANK WHITE CATERING CO. LTD., COMFECTIONERY AND RESTAURANT was located at 90 King St., Saint John, between the years 1901 and 1920. The 3-storey building had, on the ground floor, an ice cream and a soda water parlor as well as a general store. The second floor consisted of a restaurant and the third floor consisted of a kitchen and storage area. White's Restaurant and Confectionery had the reputation of being first-class in fact the only first-class restaurant in Saint John in the early 1900's. White's Restaurant also operated a catering service. A branch of the restaurant was located at Rockwood Park and open all year. The tokens are round, aluminum and vary in diameter depending on the denomination. The obverse is unaltered throughout the series - WHITE'S/RESTA RAMT. The reverse carries the value of the token only. The series of twenty is from 5 cents to 1.00. These tokens are rarely seen in New Brunswick and it is likely that the entire hoard has found its way to other parts years ago. The condition of the tokens is often Unc.

The curator of the National Numismatic Collection, Major Sheldon Carroll of the Bank of Canada, Ottawa, said the displays exhibited at the Atlantic Provinces Numismatic Association Spring Rally in Newcastle were "outstanding". The one-day event, held in the Beaverbrook Town Hall Auditorium attracted over 350 coin enthusiasts from Maritime centres. Both Major Carroll and Valentine Pasvolsky of New Jersey, attended the one day meet to mo nduct educational forums and

Interviewed during the rally, Major Carroll said, "This is a first class show by any standard". He commended the Miramichi Coin Club for its efforts and called the club a hard+working, enthusiastic group.

Topping a list of prize winners was Mrs. Alice Holt of CFB Chatham, who captured the Best of Show Award, a Miramichi Coin Club Award for Numismatic Merit, and first prize in foreign coin displays for exhibit of the Cayman Islands 25th anniversary, showing a \$25. coin.

Second place went to Otto Peter of Newcastle for his German Olympic Commemoratives. In third was Bernard Kline of Halifax, who displayed John F. Kennedy half-dollars.

The prize for foreign paper money went to Homer Stennett of Douglastown, who displayed U. S. two dollar bills.

In the field of Canadian Paper Money, Stu Lowerison, Fredericton, took first place with a display showing elements of design and security.

Second place was won by Mrs. Sylvia Eisenhauer of Oromocto for her display, "The Royal Issue". Third place fell to Mark McLaughlin, for a display of broken and obsolete bank notes of Canada.

The two prizes in the miscellaneous catagory went to Todd Hume of CFB Chatham, with a display of "Love Tokens" and Ron Balcom, of Halifax, with a display of Gold Medals, Jewelry, coins, gold dust, gold ore and fool's gold.

A Miramichi Shipbuilding Medallion display won first place for Mrs. Coni Hachey, of Newcastle, in the tokens and medallion displays, while Mrs. Deanna Quinn of Newcastle, captured second place, with a display of the official 1973 presidential inaugural medal.

Roger Robichaud of Loggieville, won third prize with his display of Canada's official medals.

First place in Canadian Decimal Series Awards went to J. C. Mullock of Halifax, for his exhibit of Canadian silver dollars. Robert Savoy of Newcastle took third place with Canadian type large and small cents.

In the Junior classification, Jim Haley of Fredericton won the first award for a display of Newfoundland quarters. Byrne Harper of Fredericton came second with his Westmorland Bank Notes display and Edward Swift of Fredericton placed third with a display of 1973 dollars commemorating Prince Edward Island's entry in confederation.

Highlighting the show were two featured exhibits, one by the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce, showing examples of rare and odd coinage, including Japanese tree money of 1835, Swedish plate money of 1732, stone money used on the island of Yap, wampum, the cowrie shells of China, India and Africa, and whales! teeth used in the Fiji Islands. The other exhibit was displayed by Valentine Pasvolsky, showing examples of what passed for money on the American frontier. This odd assortment included such currency as bear and walrus teeth, shell money, sattler tokens and others. Other rare displays included Massachusetts currency notes engraved by Paul Revere, receipt of delivery of flour for use by General Washington's army encamped at Morristown, N. J. in 1790 and colonial currency from various American states. Commenting on the day's activities display chairman Rich ard Masuda said "It's been great. The public response has been terrific. This is one of the big shows in the Maritimes and this is the first time it has been held in one of the smaller centres.

MINITES OF ABETING - JUNE 2, 1973

Vice-President Gary Holt prosided at the regular semi-annual meeting of the A.P.F.A. held at the Town Hall in Newcastle, E. B. on June 2, 1973. The Vice-President took the chair in place of the President who had to work and was not able to attend the meeting.

The minutes of the last meeting were redd by Bernard Kline, the Secretary-Treasurer and were approved on a notion by Ron Dalcon.

The Vice-President expressed the regrets of the President in not being able to be present for the neeting and also extended a sincere welcome to all those present and expressed the hope that all would enjoy themselves at the relly.

The Vice-President then announced that he had submitted his resignation to the President and Executive Committee which much regret, as he had been looking forward to his term of office in the Association with much interest. His reason for resigning was due to his transfer from Chath maker Base to Comox, J. C. in the near future. The resignation will be effective following the business meeting.

He then read a letter from President Harry Eisenhauer stating that the Executive at this time wishes to appoint Mr. Paul Hilton of Fredericton, M. 3. to fill the office of Vice-President for the balance of the term of office until the next election of officers at the 1974 Spring Rally.

This was discussed by the members present, and the Secretary-Treasurer was asked to rule on the appointment in terms of the Constitution and Dy-Laws of the Association. He assured the members that this was fully in order and that just because a person was appointed Vice-President now, did not automatically mean that they would become President for the next term. This did not rule out any other nominations for the post at election time. Gooff Bell felt that perhaps the members at the meeting should have voted in a Vice-President replacement, but when he was assured that the President and the Executive had this power, he was willing to accept this fact.

A letter was read by the Secretary from the President of the Saint John Coin Club, Mr. I. D. Wilkie, appointing Mr. Donald R. Lohnes as the club's official representative at the meeting and offering his services to the Exceutive of the Association, since they felt that the Saint John club should have some representation on the A.P.R.A. Executive. The Vice-President assured Mr. Lohnes that this letter would be referred to the President and the Executive Committee for further action and assured him that some suitable spot would be found for Mr. Lohnes. He thanked the club for their interest and involvement in the Association and hoped this would continue.

The Vice-President then gave a short report, again stating his sorrow at having to leave Newcastle and his Executive post but assured everyone that he would continue as a member of the Association and would follow its activities with interest.

He then called on the Secretary-Treasurer to give his reports. In the secretary's report, he gave a summary by province and years of membership in the Association with 115 being the present membership total. Up to now, 23 A.P.N.A. Speaker Certificates had been awarded. A slide library was begun with 3 completed sets available to all comber clubs for use at their meetings. Renewed interest was predicted for 1973-74.

The Treasurer's report showed that we had a bank balance at Sept 30th of \$445.62, with receipts of \$534.51 and disbursements of \$421.37, leaving a bank balance at June 2, 1973 of \$558.76.

These reports were approved by a motion from Dick Masuda and seconded by Paul Hilton.

The Editor, Vince Nitchell reported that Dulletins were going out regularly every menth with about 150 copies being sent each menth. On a motion from Vince, secondedby Dick Masuda, the present advertising rates of 25¢ per quarter page, were increased to 50¢ per quarter page. Members were encouraged to place ads in the Dulletin and the payment should be sent to the Secretary-Treasurer along with the copy and the copy will then be forwarded to the Editor for publication. All payments must be made in advance.

Paul Hilton brought a bid from the Fredericton Munismatic Society to host the Fall 1973 Rally cometine in October, possibly on Oct. 20th. The Secretary made it known that the Charlottetown club had put out feelers as to the possibility of hosting it, but no further reply was received. Wallace Moase of Summerside, a member of the Charlottetown club stated that they would not be hosting it. On a motion by Paul Hilton, seconded by Peter MacLean, the Fall 1973 Rally was awarded to the Fredericton club.

Dernic Kline submitted a bid on behalf of the Halifax Coin Club to host the Spring Rally in Halifax, but on motion by Ron Dalcom and accepted by the meeting, this was changed to the Fall 1974 rally. Don Lohnes then rade it known that the Saint John club was interested in hosting the Spring 1974 show, so on this note, they were granted permission to have the Spring show in Saint John and the Halifax Club to host the Fall show.

Paul Hilton said he had been in Boston recently and there was great interest in the show in that region. The meeting was then adjourned by the Vice-President.

The President's Message The high prices being paid for choice and rare numismatic items via public auction of recent months has been the subject of numismatic controversy as to the reliability of these figures. In other words, how much is a given rare coin or banknote worth? The auction under discussion at this time is the recent Milton LeRoy Ritter sale held in Boston by Mayflower Coin Auctions on May 25 and 26. If this sale was any indication of the true value of numismatic worth, then indeed the books and catalogues should he makeritten! Nothing different in my opinion has happened. It is only now that choice and rare numismatic material is finally getting the attention that it has deserved over the years. This can be attributed to a few known factors, the chief culprit of course being inflation. People are having less and less faith in our American dollar and are turning to tangible assets as a hedge against inflation, such as antiques, stamps, gold and silver coins and paper money.

In the case of Canadian Paper Moneyn this field has been a sleeper for years as there was little interest. However, today its a different story. If you had been told a few years back that a 1935 French text \$25 bill in crisp uncirculated condition

have thought it unheard of, as I would have thought. But this has happened. Lot no. 723 in the Milton Ritter sale is described as follows: \$25 1935 (#151) French text, serial number F000004; an absolute crisp uncirculated gem and extremely rare as there was only a total issue of 20,000 notes. Est. value \$525. Price realized \$2400. This would have been an investment of approximately 500% which when you come to think of it, isn't bad at all.

May I bring to your attention other prices realized for paper money in this sale. \$4800 was paid for two notes from the St. Stephen Bank, lot nos. 1139 and 1140, est value \$500. and 600. Prices realized \$2400 and \$2400 respectively. They were the \$2 and \$3 issues of 1886 in crisp uncirculated condition. I still have further reservations. I forsee in the not too distant future that prices for individual rare notes will be in excess of \$5000. Contrary to many collectors beliefs there are notes worth in excess of this amount, and I feel their true potential will be realized should they be offered for sale via public auction. I forgot to mention there were other notes in the Ritter sale which exceeded the \$2000 figure. Gold coins and choice early Canadian and American decimal coinage brought high figures.

What does all this amount to? Very simple, invest your money in tangible assets. Numismatics in Canada has a bright future. I would not suggest however, to go out and pay \$2000 for every rare note you come across, but I do feel these are sleepers

even at \$2000 and the 1935 French text \$25 note with a low number is. After all, there was only a total issue of 20,000 notes and only plates A,B,Cand D to choose from with only a total issue of ten notes per plate under serial number ten. The Bank of Canada's numismatic collection in Ottawa has most of these, so how many are left and how many are in uncirculated condition?

Other sleepers to look for are off beat items such as merchant's and municipal notes. Many of these can be had for only a few dollars, but the interest in this field is increasing, and prices will rise sharply according to supply and demand as more collect - ors enter the field.

The President's Message The 1974 Standard Catalogue of Canadian Coins, Tokens and paper money by James E. Charlton had been officially released at the CFA Convention in Saskatoon. Dealers throughout the country are now well stocked with the new twenty-second edition and interested persons may obtain a copy by contacting the dealer of their choice. It is interesting to note the terrific upswing in prices of numismatic material, particularly those items in the higher grades of condition. The most notable advances are those of Canadian gold and paper money where in some cases, particularly that of paper money, advances are anywhere from fifty to five hundred per cent over the 1973 catalogue prices. At the same time it is interesting to note that some numismatic items have actually decreased in falue, particularly in the lower grades of condition. This bears out one contention in my Collectors are paying strict attention to their style and format of collecting. We are not collecting for the prime purpose of filling holes, but are demanding better quality material when available, which accounts for the high prices being paid for first class material by way of public auction or private negotiation.

I would like to congradulate Mr. Charlton and his panel of contributors for helping to produce this excellent twenty second A fresher approach to the subject, and a revision in prices has been felt long overdue, and this edition will certainly fill a void in the minds of collectors for some time to come. However, I do have personal reservations in regards to some of the listings. I still feel there are notes which in my opinion are rarer than their catalogue prices imply. I refer to the very rare lilac seal notes of 1923 in uncirculated condition, and notes of the Bank of Yarmouth and Commercial Bank of Windsor. However, I do feel when notes of the above are offered for sale, catalogue estimates will once again be left behind. I have just returned from a five week stay in Ottawa at which time I have had the pleasure of meeting with old numismatic friends. Although unsuccessful in making further additions to my collection, I did have the opportunity to visit with Major Sheldon Carroll and view a portion of the Bank of Canada's

the nations capitol. A visit to the Royal Canadian Mint is also a must for collectors visiting Ottawa. Not only will you see the complete operations of the mint, you will have the opportunity to view the mint's exhibit of Canadian Coinage which is situated in the lobby of the front entrance.

Numismatic Collection. This was a rare opportunity indeed, and one in which collectors should take advantage of when visiting

Next door to the mint on Sussex Drive, you will find the National War Museum, where many of the finest of Canadian and foreign War Medals are located on the second floor. Four hours were spent studying the various medals, and although not a medal collector, I learned much.

The APNA Fall Rally which is being hosted by the Fredericton Numismatic Society and scheduled for Saturday, October 13, is in the final planning stages. This show is a must for all collectors in the Atlantic Provinces. Much time and hard work has been devoted by the executive committee in preparing this show. 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Club News

Halifax Coin Club
Don Olmstead reports the August meeting.
The August meeting, while not a landmark in attendance records, was unquestionably a real treat for those in attendance. In addition to a bit of trading and selling taking place between members, the meeting was highlighted with a slide show on a fascinating aspect of Canadian numismatics—Newfoundland Paper Money. The paper money of this province is very beautiful and very scarce. The color slides of the 1888 issue of the Union Bank were exceptional and we all gained a finer appreciation of that era of Canada's banking history.

I have permission from J. R. Becker APNA #127 to present the following article which appeared in the CPMS Journal of July 73:

A Westmorland Bank \$40.00 note.

For many years the attractive notes of the Westmorland Bank of New Brunswick have been actively collected by numismatists. It would be redundant to even summarize the information regarding this bank since the basic facts were so well outlined by Mr. Fred Jewett in the July 1965 (volume 1, no.3) issue of The Canadian Paper Money Society Journal.

Up to now, however, the only known denominations of either the 1854-1859 (Bend of Petiticodiac) or 1861 (Moncton) issues were for \$1.00, \$2.00, \$4.00, \$5.00 and the extremely elusive \$20.00 note.

Recently, while engaged in my favorite pastime of numismatic research, I was fortunate enough to be able to examine a mall group of mid-19th century counterfeit detectors and descriptive registers of genuine bank notes then current. Although each booklet I examined produced new and valuable information for my files, one reference caused me to display more than mild excitement.

In 1859, Gwynne and Day bankers of New York City, issued their "Discriptive Register of Genuine Bank Notes." This contained "accurate, elaborate and plain descriptions of the notes issued by every bank in the United States and Canada." Among the many descriptive listings of all the Canadian banks and their then current bank notes is the following detailed listing of a 40.00 note for the Westmorland Bank at Bend of Petiticodiac: "Upper center, British Coat of Arms, a

female on either side. Right end, word DOLLARS, 10 above, two females standing below. Left end, word FORTY, 10 above, female portrait below.

Upon corresponding with Major Sheldon S. Carroll, curator of the Bank of Canada Mumismatic Collection, he replied:
"I was surprised and much interested to learn of a listing for a \$40.00 note of the Westmorland Bank of New Brunswick. As this listing occured in 1859, at the time that the notes of the first issue of this bank were in circulation, and as a complete description of the note is given, there can be little doubt that it is authentic. I have never seen nor heard of a \$40.00 note of this bank or of any other Canadian bank for that matter. This is a real discovery and it will give us something else to look for."

Hopefully, this new found data will be yet another step toward a better understanding of the history of this bank.

MINUTES OF MEETING - OCTOBER 13, 1973

Vice-President Paul Hilton presides at the regular semi-annual meeting of the A.P.N.A. held at the Lord Beaverbrook Hotel in Fredericton, N.B. on October 15th, 1973. The Vice-President took the chair in place of the President who was not able to attend the meeting due to business engagements with the army.

The minutes of the last meeting in the spring at Newcastle were read by Bernard Kline, Feoretary-Treasurer, and were approved on a motion by Jim Young and seconded by Dick Hasuda.

The Vice-President expressed the regrets of the President in not being able to be present for the meeting, the second he had to miss in a row, due to no fault of his own. He extended a sincere welcome to all those present and expressed the hope that all would enjoy themselves at the rally.

The meeting was quite late in getting started and a long list of items was on the agenda to be discussed. The Vice-President stated that the meeting may have to be split into two sessions, with one being held in the afternoon, in order to accomplish all the items listed.

The Secretary read a letter from the Saint John Coin Club Secreatary stating that at a previous meeting, the club had decided not to host the Spring 1974 show. The meeting was informed that no other club had offered to host the event. The Halifax Coin Club representatives reconfirmed their intention to host the 1974 Fall show. Considerable discussion by various members, particularly from Saint John followed and Jim Young promised to bring the matter up again to the club and see if he could interest enough members to sponsor a show, but made no commitment on behalf of the club at the time. It was felt by some, that the A.P.N.A. had definitely stated that Saint John was going to host the event before they had even discussed it amoung themselves. This misunderstanding was cleared up and the members from that area agreed to see what could be done. It was suggested that perhaps letters be sent out to various clubs asking them to host the event, but no motion was made on this and it was left to the Executive Committee to keep in touch with the Saint John club on the matter for now.

The Financial Statement read by the Treasurer showed a bank balance of \$525.25, down slightly from the June balance of \$558.76. The report was approved on notion of Ron Balcom, seconded by Jim Young.

The Vice-Fresident stated that both he and the President would like to have a meeting of the Executive Committee sometime before the next show in the spring, at some suitable spot for all, possibly in a hotel room in Moncton or Amherst. The dates of November or December were mentioned as possible times, and also the carly spring. Directors and representatives from various clubs would be invited to attend along with the Executive itself. It was felt by many that a lot of items now carried over to rally meetings, when time was limited, could better be discussed and settled at Executive meetings and the results made known at the general meetings Everyone seemed to be in agreement with this policy, and it was left to the Executive to decide the time and place and to contact those concerned.

Ron Balcom gave notice of a motion that all vacant Directorships be filled by the Executive Committee, regardless of how many came from each Province. He would rather see every club have a Director, than necessarily two from each Province. At present, there are no Directors representing Newfoundland and there are no organized clubs on the island. There are only about two or three members in the Association from that Province. Jim Young seconded the motion, but because it involved a change in the Constitution, it was stated that the motion should appear in print in the Newsletter to give all members a chance to comment on it and the matter would have to be considered by the Executive Committee and voted on at a future general meeting, when all those concerned enough would have a chance to be heard either by letter or in person. Mr. Balcom was instructed to submit his motion to the Editor for publication.

A member from the Charlottetown club, Fred Corcoran, said his club had decided not to host the Fall 1975 rally after discussing the possibility for some time before. He questioned such things as to why Frank Rose was there at the Fredericton meeting and wanted to know if the A.P.N.A. was getting anything out of the auction. He was told that Mr. Rose was invited to have the auction at the show by the Fredericton Numismatic Society, host club for the Fall Rally, and it was up to the individual clubs if they wanted to have an auction in any form or other, or none at all. The Vice-President told him that Mr. Rose was delighted to come down and hold the auction and came with his staff entirely at his own expense. In holding the auction, both the A.P.N.A. and the Fredericton Club had gained greatly in getting publicity and prestige throughout the country through the advertising and catalogues which Mr. Rose had produced for the event himself. Mr.Corcoran was told that if the host club wished to make a contribution to the A.P.N.A. from any surplus funds, that was their own prerogative.

The Vice-President announced that the President had stated that he would like to see some sort of a Grading Seminar be held by the A.P.N.A., possibly in Halifax. Most thought this to be a good idea and it was referred to the future Executive Committee meeting to work out the details.

At the afternoon session, the Newsletter came up for discussion and a vote of thanks was extended to Vince Mitchell and all his helpers for the fine job they had done with the limited material submitted to them over the past year or so. A letter went out to members every month since Mr. Mitchell's appointment as Editor. On a motion made by Dick Masuda and seconded by Gary Holt, it was decided that some sort of an award be instituted by the A.P.N.A. to be made for the best article appearing in the Newsletter each year. A number of judges could be obtained from outside the Association to judge the contest. This matter was referred to the Executive Committee for further development.

Bernie Kline was asked to set up a nominating committee for the election of officers to be held at the Spring Show, if one can be arranged. Nomination ballots will be inserted in the Newsletter so all mambers may participate in the possible selection of officers.

The Dale Garland award for outstanding service to the A.P.N.A. during the past year was awarded to Harry Eisenhauer for his hard work in promoting the Association during the past year.

Editor Vince Mitchell reminded members that they can place advertisements in the Newsletters at the rate of .50¢ per quarter page per issue. Material and payment should be sent to the Secretary-Treasurer, Bernie Kline, who will then forward the copy to the Editor for publication. All payments must be made in advance of publication.

The auction, conducted by Frank Rose Enterprises of Toronto, held in conjunction with the rally, was termed a success by Mr. Rose, who said he was pleased with the results and would like to attend some future shows of the Association and stage another auction then. The choice material all went at above estimated prices while some lower grade material went for less than catalogue prices.

Formal judging of the displays was carried out by the judges with Bernie Kline of Halifax as Head Judge; Ray Mabee and Geoff Bell, both of Moneton, as Assistant Judges; Mr. Frank Rowe of St. John's, Nfld., was Guest Judge.

s Message

The Atlantic Provinces Numismatic Association will soon be entering it's minth year since inception, and as the year 1973 ends, it might very well be a good time to look back over the years and assess the advancement made by the association. But before we can make any assessments, I feel we must first pay homage to a numismatist whose dedication and love for the hobby has made it all possible. I refer to the founder of our association, Mr. Fernald Allen. Without his ambition and willingness to organize a numismatic association within the Atlantic Frovinces his dream might never have been a reality. Credit is also due our past presidents and executives of our association whose tasks at times were not always easy, but meaningful and certainly fruitful. I am referring now to the APMA files, and after checking them over I find it is interesting to observe the advances and declines of paid up membership from the founding year of 1965 to the present. Our membership may find this information useful. Our inception year 1965 saw a paid up membership total of 64, 110 in 1966, 128 in 1967, 138 in 1968, 190 in 1969, 207 in 1970, 164 in 1971, 64 in 1972 and 118 during 1973. As you can see, there has been a considerable drop off in membership during the year 1972 and a notable advance in 1970. The advance in 1970 was in my opinion lar ely due to the CNA convention being in Halifax that year, and the decline in 1972 being credited to the discontinuation of the monthly APN'A newsletter. Lack of communication via the newsletter proved disastrous but could not be avoided, as our newsletter editor at the time became ill and had to relinquish his duties in this capacity. This void was filled with the new election of officers at the fall rally in Halifax in September 1972. We have not looked back since then. Not only has there been an increase in membership, but a marked increase in numismatic activity. June 2, 1973 saw the APMA spring rally hosted by the Miramichi Coin Club and the recent fall rally on October 13 by the Fredericton Numismatic Society. Both shows were outstanding and included some of the nations top exhibits and guest speakers including Major Sheldon S. Carroll, curator of the Dank of Canada's numismatic collection, Val Pasvolsky, well known speaker and collector of colonial Indian artifacts from New Jersey, ir. F. J. Rowe from St. John's Nfld., specializing in all aspects of Newfoundland material. Top non-competitive exhibits included an exhibit of rare banknotes supplied by the head office of the Toronto-Dominion Bank's collection, an RCMP counterfeit exhibit, a twelve case non-competitive exhibit of choice Newfoundland material, a collection of cononial Indian artifacts plus many other rare displays entered competitively from members. An APMA educational slide library for the benefit of APMA member clubs was introduced to the association during 1973, but much to our regret, we feel that very few clubs are taking full advantage of this much needed and very worthwhile project. Clubs interexted in obtaining a slide program for their meeting may obtain same by contacting me at P O Box 84, Oromocto, N. B. The programs available at present are; (1) The Coinage of Newfoundland (2) Canadian Silver Dollars (3) Canadian Fractional Currency (4) Canada Five Cent Silver.

I am pleased to announce that the secretary-treasurer advises our bank balance at present is quite healthy indicating a proposed increase in membership is not

necessary at this time.

Onceaggin I should like to stress the importance of numismatic research within our association. Our editor has been requesting articles from members for publication in the newsletter. I'm convinced we have capable people within the association who can do this department justice. Let us hear from you by writing a numismatic article of your choice. Our editor Vince Mitchell will be glad to publish it

Then any of our members within the association have sound suggestions as to how we can improve our organization for the benefit of the membership as a whole, kindly forward your suggestions to your provincial director and he in turn will advise the executive committee. If the suggestions are sound we will most certainly take the necessary action needed to formulate your ideas.

To date, your executive has not received a club proposal to host the 1974 AFTA Spring Pally. The spring rally is available at present to any Atlantic club. Let us hear from those clubs who may be interested. The 1974 Pall Rally has been awarded to the Halifax Coin Club and from all reports received, their committee has been formed and rally plans are now in progress. The Pall Rally show chairman is Don Olmstead and he may be contacted at 20 MacLeod House, & Mandaville Court, Halifax Nova Scotia.

In my closing remarks. I would like to take this opportunity on behalf of the AFR executive to wish you all a very Merry Christmas and a prosperous New Year.

The new signature. Lawson-Bouey are now issued on the \$1.00 bill and 55.00 note dated 1972. Changeover numbers started at CP 4 200,000. A Saint John Coin Club member found a well worn \$1.00 bill with no serial number.

The July issue of Canadian Paper Money Society Journal has a story "The Old Bank' which is about New Brunswick banks, etc. written by L. K. Ingersoll.

The price of gold hit a new high in July at \$127. and silver was 33. per ounce.

I would like to use this forum to express my great irritation over the clear policy of permitting just enough coins to be circulated at face value to whet the public's appetite. Some banks had as few as twenty sets to distribute, woefully inadequate to supply any number of interested customers. Now we are supposed to order the expensive packaged sets and thereby provide the profits for the 1976 Olympic Games. I, for one, don't like being so obviously manipulated and will present a motion at our January meeting requesting that the club officially protest the distribution

system for Olympic Coins. We should be prepared to make our opinions known and hopefully listened to. More on this at the January meeting. The Fall auction was so successful that another auction will be held this February. It has been a good year for our club, I think, the most noticeable development being our tremendous increase in junior membership. Four new members were welcomed and invited to participate in club activities. The January meeting's main business will be the election of officers for the coming year. 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BANK OF ACADIA (1872-1873) by Harry Eisenhauer, CPNS LM 16

A few years following confederation, with all its political distractions, the business affairs of the Queens County, Nova Scotia lumbermen and shipbuilders began to deteriorate rapidly. They refused to recognize the signs of a great slump in North America. However, in the early 1870's they actually founded two banks in Liverpool; The Bank of Acadia and The Bank of Liverpool.

The Bank of Acadia lasted only three months and twenty-six days. It's president, Thomas Roberts Patillo, was one of the town's prominent figures and was the owner of five or six brigantines and barquentines in the West Indies trade. Like the Bank of Liverpool it issued a large number of bank-notes. At the same time the bank made large loans to lumbermen, shipbuilders and shipowners in the District of South Queens, borrowing in turn from the Bank of Nova Scotia at Halifax.

Thomas R. Patillo was born January 27, 1799. He was the son of a hardy Scot who imigrated to Chester from Aberdeen Scotland in the year 1743. In the year 1939, a granddaughter of Thomas Patillo stated that, When the Bank of Acadia failed some people whispered that my grandfather had misappropriated a lot of the Bank's funds. The truth was very different. He recognized the danger of large loans to shipbuilders in those times and warned the bank's directors against it. They ignored him. Early in 1873 they passed a loan to the local firm of Collie and Spencer, whose affairs were known by Mr. Patillo to be shaky. A short time later he staggered home and collapsed in his wife's arms, telling her that the bank would surely fail. He had suffered a heart attack.

The Bank of Acadia failed on March 28, 1873. It reopened for a few days and redeemed a few thousands of its notes. The remaining noteholders with the exception of the government, got nothing. The Dominion government got twenty-five cents on the dollar on several thousand dollars worth of the notes which it held.

Mr. Patillo ended his life in attempts to clear up many of the "unknowns" behind the bank's failure. He died on February 10, 1874

It was hinted that Mr. Stevens, the cashier of the short lived Bank of Acadia was perhaps dishonest in his business dealings. He had come to Liverpool from the eastern seaboard of the United States of America, as had so many settlers in Liverpool. In those days the title 'cashier' really meant 'manager'.

The Bank of Acadia had its offices on the ground floor of a wooden building immediately opposite the present Liverpool Town Hall. It is still standing and occupied by the Liverpool branch of Simpsons-Sears Ltd. (in fact the old Bank of Liverpool and Bank of Acadia buildings are almost side by side.)

A description of the Bank of Acadia four dollar bill is as follows; the obverse bears the name of Bank of Acadia at the top centre and beneath it an engraving of three naked cherubs (one of whom has wings) playing about the seat of an elaborately carved throne which is entwined with grapevines. The winged cherub is passing one of the others a basket containing what appears to be roses. At the feet of these two cherubs lie two masks of goatbearded men. One mask faces left towards a small engraved scene showing a small steam vessel sitting high in the lock of a canal, and above it a railway train drawn by an old fashioned engine with a huge, inverted cone funnel. The other mask faces right towards an engraved scene of the sea showing an old fashioned steamship with a single short funnel set between two masts carrying square sails and with a small trisail on a short mast set well towards the stern. Beneath all this in small letters is the mark of the printers, 'Canada Bank Note Printing Ltd'. Four appears as large letters and again as a figure at each end of the note. The whole note is printed in black except for a large figure 4 between the end 'fours' and the cherubs, and these two fours are in very pale green overprinted near the top by FOUR in large black letters. Also overprinted on these green figures in black script are the words Dollars and beneath this Liverpool and beneath this in black print Nova Scotia and beneath the left-hand green FOUR. On and beneath the right hand green FOUR are black script letters 'To Bearer' and under this 2nd Dec. 1872 and beneath that in black print Nova Scotia. On the left hand side at the bottom the note is signed (in ink) by G. E. Stevens, Cashier. At the lower right hand side it is signed T. R. Patillo, President.

In a narrow black border along the top and bottom of the note appear alternate 4, four, 4, four, etc. in white letters, running from end to end. The reverse side of the note has a large green design with the words Bank of Acadia and below this Nova Scotia, with the letters and figure Four and a large 4 at each end, all in green.

The Bank of Liverpool and the Bank of Acadia operated in Liverpool, Queens County, Mova Scotia, about the same time, the latter being a much smaller institution.

As stated the Bank of Acadia failed on March 28, 1873, first bills dated Dec 2, 1872, so it operated only a period of some three months twenty-six days.

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The following is from F. C. Jewett's January issue of "Paper Money News" WHY LET THE COIN COLLECTORS HAVE ALL THE FUN AND EXPENSE ! In 1967, in connection with Canada's Centennial celebrations, the Bank of Canada issued the \$1 denomination note in a re-designed "Centennial" theme - and put only the centennial dates on some 8,000,000 notes. (I have had a higher figure quated). Most of these are and will continue to be outstanding until everyone's keepsake collection is liquidated. And of course several million of the regularly numbered "Centennial" notes have as yet to be presented for r demption. For 1976, let's have the Olympic Games as the ocassion for a repeat performance, say for the \$1, \$2 and \$5 denominations, with matching numbers the game. The first 10,000 numbers of each denomination could be made available in matched sets to all comers, one set per order at say \$25 each. The next 490,000 numbers of each denomination to be available in minimum quantities of 5 sets of matched notes at \$15 per set. Numbers above 500,000 for each denomination will be available for general circulation, or from the Bank of Canada at face value plus a service charge of \$2 per shipment. The Bank of Canada would pay the Olympic Committee the premium collected on the matched sets in excess of \$2 per set, keeping the \$2 per set for expenses and of course has the float - a thing dear to bankers everywhere. While matched set number 1 should go to the Bank of Canada's Numismatic Collection, serial number 2 might be sold at the Canadian Numismatic Association's 1976 Convention in Ottawa, and number 3 at the American Numismatic Association convention which is being held in New York. To provide the gambling element, which stimulates interest these days, remaining numbers from set 4 might be assigned by lot, from the orders received by a specified date. What do you think of the idea?

Do you know how to properly grade coins? It is a very important aspect of numismany collectors who have not been taught or have learned how to grade coins the right way. Grading is the determining of the condition of a numismatic item in relation to handling or wear.

Below is a short explanation of the Condition of Coins.

Uncirculated (UNC.): This describes a coin that has never been circulated as money and is still in mint condition. A coin with even the slightest sign of wear cannot be classified as Uncirculated.

Extremely Fine (E.F.): This coin shows slight wear probably from handling or contact with other coins. A coin in this condition has an appearance of being in perfect condition.

Very Fine (V.F.): Coins in Very Fine condition shows signs of having been in circulation and the high points on the coin are slightly worn. Coins in VF must have all of the fine line details still showing and must not have any nicks or scratches.

Fine (F): All parts of a Fine coin show considerable wear from circulation. Many parts of the coin, including the outer rim will be rounded or flat. Minor nicks and blemishes are expected, however the overall appearance is still pleasing and all major details still clearly show.

Very Good (V.G.): A very good coin is considerably worn through. Other

details are clear but not sharp.

Good (G): A good coin is so worn that most of the details are flat and many nicks and scratches may be present. Common coins are usually not collected in "Good".

TRY AND COLLECT THE BEST CONDITIONED COIN IN A SERIES THAT YOU CAN AFFORD. Many collectors buy certain coins through the mail since they are not available from local dealers. When you send your money and request an Unc coin, you don't expect to receive anything less in quality; therefore grading is necessary to set up standard pricing structures for collectors to know the market value of each numismatic item. Most pricing guides use the above six grades.

One problem that you may run into is the overgrading of coins by certain dealers

and collectors. This is why you must know how to grade properly. For instance, a dealer is offering a so-called UNC 1922 Canada nickel at the bargain price of \$15.00 (trends at \$30.00). You, the collector, grade the coin and find it is only Extra Fine (which trends at \$6.00). If you had bought the coin as UNC without grading it, you would have lost money. This goes for any numisumatic item that you buy, whether in person or by mail.

One of the best investments you can make concerning the grading of coins is the book "Standard Grading Guideto Canadian Decimal Coins" by James E. Charlton and Robert C. Willey. It describes to the reader how to grade each type of Canadian

coin and is well worth the price.

Coin Grading nowadays is more strict than it was thirty years ago. A "Fine" coin then may have had little wear and be classified as an "Extra Fine" piece today. Splitting of grades is now very popular among numismatists. An example is: the reverse of a certain Canadian large cent may be Fine while the obverse would be graded Very Fine. Thus, the coin would be classified as Fine-Very Fine and the value would be taken as the median between the Fine and Very Fine price. I have seen up to twenty-five different terms in describing a new mint coin: Brilliant Uncirculated, Choice B. U., Gem Unc., Frosty Unc., Toned B. U., to name a few. Coin grading is a fairly detailed subject and I have just outlined briefly a few points. Why don't you read up on this fascinating subject when you have some time. Experience in grading will surely help you the next time you make that big purchase for your collection!

The President's Message

A continued upswing in numismatic activity within the Atlantic Provinces appears evident for 1974. My suspicions were confirmed when word was received whereby a new coin club had been formed. The Association greatly acknowledges the efforts of Ian Wilkie who has been responsible for the recently formed Sussex Coin Club. The founding meeting took place on Monday, January 21 at the Bank of Montreal in Sussex and was attended by approximately twelve interested collectors. The APNA wishes the Sussex Coin Club much success and prosperity in the future.

On January 26 I attended an auction sale held by Charlton Numismatics of Toronto. The sale which was held at Toronto's Hyatt Regency Hotel was well attrided and attracted collectors and dealers from various points of Canada and the United States. Record prices were set in all sessions of the sale and the most notable were advances made in the paper money section where over the last few sales, prices realized, in some cases have been in excess of five hundred per cent over 1974 Charlton catalogue values. Highlighting the sale was a rare note of the Bank of Fredericton in fair condition with an estimated value of \$400. The note sold for \$650. A 1902 Sovereign Bank of Canada note with an estimated value of \$1800. Sold for \$1750. In the Charlton sale of September 73, a 1935-\$2 French text note with an estimated value of \$75, was bid up to a record high of \$390 on the floor.

Perhaps we should be taking a second look at the 1935 and 1937 issue notes. Where we once regarded these as common issues, the past few auctions have revised the thinking of many paper money collectors. In the gold coin catagory we need not discuss the prices while silver is making the head-lines at over four dollars an ounce. So, the prices of good numismatic material continues to climb and will continue to do so as long as our economy remains healthy. I forsee no drastic change in the future as it is only now that choice and rare coins and paper money are finally getting the attention they have deserved over the years.

While in Toronto, I had the pleasure of visiting with Mr. and Mrs. Stewart Taylor. Mr. Taylor is curator of the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce numismatic collection in Toronto and public relations officer for the bank. Mr. Taylor advised that the Commerce collection will be on exhibit at the New Brunswick Museum in Saint John for three months, February to April inclusive. I would like to take this opportunity to recommend the viewing of this exhibit by our membership. I had the pleasure of seeing this exhibit while it was on display at the Nova Scotia Museum in Halifax last October, and can say, its excellent and quite possibly unique, especially in the paper money issues of the Canadian Bank of Commerce and the banks that merged with the Commerce. For those who will not have an opportunity to see the collection in Saint John, Mr. Taylor advises that the exhibit will be in St. Johns, Newfoundland in June in connection with Newfoundland's 25th year of entry into confederation celebrations.

A short time ago I had an opportunity to visit in Prince Edward Island. While there, a lengthy discussion was held with one of our APNA Prince Edward Island directors, Tom Rogers. Many items were discussed in detail and items which we feel will benefit both the APNA and numismatics in general in the Atlantic region. With such capable directors as Richard Montigny and Tom Rogers numi matics on the Island can be assured of continued success.

In the February issue of the Bulletin I made an announcement to call an APNA executive meeting. This meeting will be held at the Wandlyn Motel in Amherst, N. S. at 2 p.m. on Saturday, March 16. It is imperative that all APNA executive members attend this important meeting as there will be many items on the agenda open for discussion. Provincial directors who will not be in attendance are requested to submit reports (written) and forward them to the President or the Secretary-treasurer as soon as possible before the executive meeting date. Formal notice of the meeting will be sent out in writing from the secretary-treasurer.

All plans and details for the CPMS Educational Symposium to be held in Fredericton on May 11 have been finalized. Elsewhere in the bulletin will be found the news release and symposium program.

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Aluminum Cents for the U.S.A.
Just as the price of silver made silver coins uneconomical in both Canada and the U.S., the current use of copper prices have forced the U.S. Mint to convert to aluminum cents sometime this year. There are formalities to be completed, but it appears definite that the 1974 U.S. aluminum cent will appear later this year or at the latest in early 1975. The price of copper has increased from 39¢ per pound in 1959 to over \$1. per pound this year.

OFFICIAL MINUTES OF EXECUTIVE MEETING MARCH 16, 1974

Those present included President, Harry Eisenhauer; Vice-President, Paul Hilton; Secretary-Treasurer, Bernard Kline; Editor, Vince Mitchell; and the following Directors, Don Lohnes, Geoffery Bell; Junior Editor, Steve Oatway; Representatives Frank Pulsifer and David Davidson from the Truro Coin Club also were present. President Harry Eisenhauer presided at the meeting.

The Secretary-Treasurer read the minutes of the last General Meeting held in Fredericton and these were approved on motion from Geof Bell. The Secretary reported that up to the present, 110 persons had renwed their membership for the year 1974 with more expected to come. This compared with 124 paid up members for the previous year.

The President asked for reports from the various members of the Executive as to activities going on in their individual sections of the country. Geof Bell reported that the Moncton Club had been rather dormant for the past while but is now becoming active again with new members comming to the meetings which are being held in various places in the area.

Don Lohnes asked that a famincial statement be published in the Newsletter from time to time as some members of the Saint John club had expressed the thought that we had not seen one for some time. The Treasurer replied that usually these were only published at the termination of each Executives term of office (18 months), but he would see that the bank balance on hand was reported from time to time to the Editor for inclusion in the bulletin. He also mentioned that some of the Saint John club members were also attending meetings of the newly formed Sussex Coin Club.

Bernie Kline reported for the Halifax Coin Club and stated that plans are well underway for the A.P.N.A. Fally Rally to be held in Halifax this Year. A special souvenir "Joseph Howe Bill" will be issued by the Club as a means of raying for the Rally in conjunction with the Joe Howe Festival Committee and the Board of Trade. He also stated that a large number of Junior members are joining the club and replacing some of the senior members who have dropped out during recent months.

Paul Hilton from Fredericton spoke on the C.P.M.S. show to be held there in May with many interesting displays and talks scheduled to be held during the event. He mentioned that he had attended a number of meetings of other coin clubs in the area during the year. Junior members were also a prime concern of this club and they are being helped in every way possible.

Vince Mitchell reported from Newcastle that a special medallion to commemorate the 75th Anniversary of Newcastle has been struck by the town. The Newcastle club will

be producing a float depicting a large revolving silver dollar in the town parade.

Frank Pulsifer from Truro reported that the club is interested in hosting the A.P.N.A. Rally in 1975 when the town of Truro celebrates it's centennial year. There will also be a special medallion struck to commemorate this event but it is not known if it will be an official A.P.N.A. medal or not at this time. Frank asked that all clubs exchange their bulletins with each other and also exchange speakers at club meetings.

A letter was read from Major Ward of Sydney Club regretting that they were unable toattend the meeting, but assured that the club will continue to support the A.P.N.A. A similar letter was also read from Tom Rogers of Charlottetown, in which he said renewed interest was being shown in the club with 20 members turnning out on the average. Another letter from Ian Wilkie of the Sussex Club reported six more new members and that more are expected to join shortly. Membership in the A.P.N.A. is a condition for membership in the Sussex Club.

Steve Oatway also spoke for the Moncton Club and reported as many as 35 members are now turning out for club meetings. He expected to be submitting some articles to the Editor of interest to Junior members for publication.

Vince Mitchell, the Newsletter Editor, reported that the Newsletter has gone cut each month to members and asked for more numismatic articles for publication and also for club bulletins for news of other clubs.

A motion, published previously in the Newsletter, made by Non Balcom to increase the number of Directors from 8 to 10 or a representative from each club was read and discussed at length. Everyone agreed that the idea had some merit. However, it would result in unequal representation from one or two provinces where most of the clubs are located. It was felt that P.E.I. and Nfld. members might not like this. A revision of the constitution would be necessary to change this bylaw. Paul milton suggested that these extra members could be known as Fublic Relations Officers. Don Lohnes asked if they would have voting power. Geoff Bell said to disregard the constitution and change it anyway. He said he was of open mind on the suggestion.

As there were three provinces with no official Directors present, it was decided to drop Mr. Balcom's resolution since he was not here to officially present and discuss it. Don Lohnes said it would automatically be so, since he was not here at the meeting. Mr. Balcom was unable to attend due to illness at the time.

Geoff Bell made a motion to be published in the Newsletter, that the constitution be changed to make the Board of Directors consist of one member from each A.P.N.A. club rather than the present two Directors from each province. The matter to be deferred until the next annual meeting. This was seconded by Paul Hilton and passed.

With the Directors approval, the President appointed Bernie Kline as the Association Curator of the slide library and commentaries. This information to be made available in the Newsletter.

A letter asking for permission for the Truro Club to host the 1975 Spring Rally of the A.P.N.A. was read. A report on the matter was given by Frank Pulsifer. he said they would like to hold the show there, but needed help and assistance. Other members agreed to help out in any way possible. There would also be medallions issued next year to commemorate the centennial of the town. Geoff Bell made the motion that the bid be accepted and Steve Oatway seconded the motion which passed.

The President made a motion to have the annual membership dues in the A.P.N.A. increased from the present \$2 to \$3 per year for individual membership. Club membership of \$5 would remain unchanged. Dues in the O.N.A. and other organizations are at least this amount with todays high cost of living. Geoff Bell asked that a full proposal be brought in at the next general meeting when members could give their opinions on the matter. The matter was then deferred to this meeting.

The 1974 Fall Rally in Halifax was then discussed, but as Ron Balcom, president of the Halifax Club was not present, Bernie Kline stated that to his knowledge, a committee had been set up and the wheels were turning for plans for the show, including the Joe Howe bill described earlier. Not much else information was available on the matter at this time.

Paul Hilton suggested that a Grading Seminar be held, possibly in Halifax in gennection with the Rally. The Halifax Club was asked to consider the matter for inclusion in the Rally plans. Top notch speakers for the event should be readily available. It was felt that everyone had some different ideas on grading and not all agreed on the subject.

A letter from the President of the C.N.A. Louise Graham was read asking for the Association's opinion on having a C.N.A. Director from each of the four Atlantic Provinces reather than the present one Director for all provinces. The consensus of the meeting was that the majority were not in favor of the idea, due to finding the people capable and able to travel, etc. to fullfill the office properly.

Vince Mitchell asked that all clubs send in their new 1974 list of Club Officers, meeting dates, times and places for a Club Directory to be published in the Newsletter.

Mrs. Silvia Eisenhauer of Oromocto, was appointed to a position of Junior Director for the Association. She had previously agreed to take the post. Juniors are growing in all member clubs from the reports given by each and it was felt that someone should be cordinating things on the Junior level. Paul Hilton made the motion to make the appointment official and Geoff Bell seconded the motion which was passed.

The Treasurer reported that club funds on hand as at the time of the meeting were \$535.90 but charges for Letterheads for the Newsletter and Membershop application forms amounting to over \$80. will reduce this balance to near the \$450. mark.

Bernie Kline reminded the meeting that 1975 is the 10th Anniversary of the A.F.Y.A. which was founded on May 8th, 1975. Some sort of suitable event should be held to mark the event. Possibly a special commemorative A.P.N.A. medal and/or a banquet and coin show, or some similar event. The Editor was asked to call for ideas in the Newsletter to get things going to mark this event.

Bernie Kline was asked if the Halifax Club still proposed to go ahead with the Mitchell MacDonald Memorial Trophy idea the club had proposed and passed on some time ago. He replied that as far as he knew, the motion was passed on the Halifax Club minutes and was never resinded, but had not been brought up or discussed for some time. Just after the motion was passed, the then Editor of the Newsletter took very ill and no Newsletters were published for close to a year. Since then, a new Editor has taken over. Mr. Kline said he would approach the Halifax Club on the idea at the next club meeting and have them review the situation and see if they intended to still act on it. The type of award had never been definitely decided upon. This would help to fulfill the request of the Editor that numismatic articles be sent to him for publication.

The President summed up the various topics discussed at the meeting and felt that the meeting had been well worth while despite the fact that only half the executive was able to attend and hoped that similar meetings could be held in the future. He again reminded members of the C.P.M.S. meeting in Fredericton in May and asked that the members remind their clubs of this event which will be a major numismatic event for the Atlantoc Provinces for this year.

On a motion by Geoff Bell, seconded by Vince Mitchell, the meeting adjourned at approximately 5:15 p.m.

The President's Message

The President's Message this month is coming to you from Netaxas Square in beautiful downtown Nicosia, the capital city of Cyprus. This island is the third largest in the Mediterranean, 3572 sq. miles in area. It lies forty miles south of Turkey 300 miles from the Greek islands. 250 miles north of Egypt and 200 miles northwest of Israel. Of its population of 625,000. 80% are Greek and 20% Turks. The Greeks are Christian members of the Eastern Orthodox rite, and have their own autocepalous church, of which the president of the republic, Makarios was archbishop until his recent death on 27th January of this year. The Turks are Muslim. All the wars are old wars, and their age makes them no less better. Muslims and Hindus are fighting old battles in India and Pakistan, Protestants and Catholics in Ireland, Jews and Egyptians are periodically at each others throats. Cyprus, after passing from the hands of the Mycenaeans to the Phoenicians, was ruled by the Ptolemies and the Lusignans, the crusaders and the Genoese and the Venetians and passed into the hands of the Turks in 1571. The British took over in 1878 as part of a deal to provide defensive aid to the Turkish Sultan. When Britain gave the island independance in 1960 she handed Cyprus a constitution that gave veto powers to the Turkish 20% of the population. The Turks vetoed among other pieces of legislation, the income tax laws. Toward Christmas of 1963 President Makarios announced that since the constitution was unworkable, he had decided to abrogate certain sections. Both communities began to oil the guns they had saved from the independence struggles and gighting broke out on December 21st.

In many ways, the Turks after original losses, came, well, out of the 1964 war. Although they did not achieve the partition of the island they asked for, they gained virtually separate government, temporarily at least, and have since 1967 had normal freedom of movement on the island, where Greeks must stay out of Turkish areas. On the other hand they are now incredibly poor. A Greek will point out to you that a Turk can now go into a Greek area to collect his rents, but in many cases Turks have lost landholdings and livelihood. They are supported to the tune of \$20 million per year by the government of Turkey, but that does not go far among 125,000 citizens. Traditionally, they have made their living as farmers and landholders, or as civil servants. Very, very few of those jobs are still open to them. The Turkish areas never did look very prosperous, partly becuase the bourgeois appearances of prosperity meant nothing to them-the Turkish quarter of Nicosia is now flyblown and run-down. The Canadians have been stationed in Nicosia district, in the scorching central plain of the island since 1969. Some of those who are on their second tour of Cyprus preferred the previous posting in the Kyrenia hills, where the Finns are now; it is closer to the sea, cooler in summer. Micosia, however, offers a range of night life from French lessons at the French cultural centre through outdoor cinemas to cabarets, bars and outdoor restaurants. The city is not as old and scrofulour as Lawrence Durrell's Alexandria, but the mixture of two cultures, overlaid on remnants of more antique comquest gives some of its quarters beauty and charm.

During my stay in Cyprus as part of Canada's peace keeping contingent, I was fortunate in establishing a healthy relationship with a number of collectors one of which was a gentleman from Nicosia by the name of Fitikides. Mr. Fitikides is a specialist collector of Cyprus banknotes and operates a coin and stamp business in Nicosia. He has written many articles on world coins and currency, particularly that of Cyprus. Many of these articles have appeared in leading numismatic publications in the U. S. Mr. Fitikides points out that numismatic interest on the island appears greater in someareas than others. Nicosia at one time enjoyed a healthy membership but of late has dropped off considerably. Larnaka, on the other hand, which is situated approximately thirty miles from Nicosia, is very active. During many hours of conversation with Mr. Fitikides, we both found out we had something in common. We both realized

that it was just as difficult to assemble a choice collection of Cyprus banknotes as it was to assemble a Canadian collection. Apparently the first issue of banknotes on the island was issued in 1914. The 1917 issue saw the only release of a ten pound note. There are no known copies of this denomination in existance today. I are told however, that specimen note of this date and denomination does exist, but not in a private collection. 1. The recent paper money issues of Cyprus consist of four distinct issues; 250 & 500 mils, one & five pound notes. Coinage is issued in one, five, twenty-five, fifty and one hundred mil pieces. There are 1000 mils to a Cyprus pound which is equal to \$2.74 Canadian, slightly higher than the English pound. For collectors interested in obtaining uncirculated coins and note issues of Cyprus, I am told there are some 5,000 sets of 1973 uncirculated coin sets available. The set consists of four pieces in a presentation holder with denominations of 5, 25, 50, and 100 mils. The set costs one pound or \$2.74 Canadian. They also have available crisp uncirculated bank note sets (consisting of one each of 5, 1 pound and 500 and 250 mils priced at \$25 a set) The prices include postage (coins by surface mail and bank notes by registered air mail), handling charges and insurance. The preferred method of payment is by banker's draft and payable to: The Central Bank of Cyprus. Their address for information and ordering is P O Box 1087, Nicosia, Cyprus. The country corresponds in both Greek and English.

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Part 1

One Cent

Victoria 1895-1896

The obverse by L. C. Wyon was unusual in two ways. The portrait was taken from the English halfpenny and the lettering very simple with extremely bold type. The reverse was engraved by T. J. Minton, Wyon's assistant, from a design by H. Morehen. The reverse depicts a wreath of pitcher plants and oak leaves surrounding a crown and the date.

Only 10 dates were issued during Queen Victoria's reign, all but two were struck at the Royal Mint in London. These two years coined at the Heaton Mint in Birmingham to relieve the load at the Royal Mint. The Heaton mint-mark is found below the bow of the wreath on the reverse. The motto reads "Victoria D. G. Reg."

Edward VII 1904-1909

diameter 25.53 mm - weight 5.670 gm - composition .950 copper, .040 tin, .010 zinc edge - plain

The obverse was done by G. W. Saulles. He made the portrait strangely large for the coin but the reverse was the same except St. Edward's crown replaced the Imperial State crown. There were only three dates issued during Edward's reign, one struck at the Heaton Mint, better known as "The Mint", Birmingham, the others being struck in London.

The motto reads "Edward VII Dei Gratia Rex Imperator".

George V 1913-1936

diameter 1913-1929, 1936 - 25.53 mm, 1917, 1920 - 25.40 mm

weight 5.670 gm

composition 1913-1920 .950 copper, .040 tin, .010 zinc 1929-1936 .955 copper, .030 tin, .015 zinc

edge - plain

The obverse was designed by Sir E. B. MacKennal and the reverse stayed the same. There were six issues of the large cent in George's reign. Three struck at Ottawa whick put a "C" mint-mark on the reverse below the bow of the wreath, and three were minted at London.

The motto reads "Georgivs V Dei Gra: Rex Et Ind: Imp".

George VI 1938-1947 diameter 19.05 mm weight 3.24 gm composition .955 copper, .030 tin, .015 zinc edge - plain

In 1938 the Newfoundland Government decided to mint cents like Canada in the smaller size. The reverse depicts a pitcher plant which is native to Newfoundland. The designer is unknown. The obverse was taken from a model by Percy Metcalf. There were 7 issues in George VI's reign. Four minted in Ottawa.

Jim's Coin Shop, Newcastle, N. B. was entered and robbed of stock to the estimated value of \$3000. on the weekend of 17th March.

Buy Silver Now and Burn Later

Just about every man and his dog was, is or would like to have been in The Silver Market.

The Financial Post used the above headline to warn newcomers to use caution and find out more about this silver-fever that came so quickly and made even the quiet conservative type silver hungry.

Ask many silver buyers; Was silver up or down in 1969?
How many grains in a Troy oz.?
How many grains in a silver 50ϕ ?
....and blank looks would arrive on their faces.

After a little research here are some facts that anyone could find out with little effort.

Here is a review of market prices of silver over the past seven years. Thore was a fall in price in fid 1968 when an oz. of silver dropped from \$2.60 slowly to a low of \$1.35 in December 1971. Then there was a slow climb from \$1.35 in December 71 to 3.00 in December 73....and then all hell let loose.

The Financial Post reports there is no shortage of commercial silver for industries here in Canada. Silver can not be melted and/or exported to the USA. Where is the silver going? Well Bill buys it from Joe and sells it to Fred who sells it to Jim. Jim sells it to Jack who sells to Charlton who sells it to Investor who keeps it three days and sells it to Investor #2, to #3 and on and on: BUT the man who gets burned is the last one to buy And then down and down and down it falls just like it did on Feb 25 and 26 and 28th. Where does it end? For a brief moment when Investor #1 jumps back in again and when the big loosers try to recover some of their losses by buying low and hoping for another rise in price.

1 troy oz. = 480 grains

A 1966 silver dollar weighs 360 grains: with 800 fineness 800 x 360 = 288 grains of silver or .6 or 6/10 of a troy oz.

To calculate other Canadian coins use:

weight 50¢ 180 grains 25¢ 90 grains 10¢ 36 grains and multiply by % of fineness.

Highlighting his exhibit will include a selection of choice uncirculated Bank of New Brunswick notes and a complete set of uncirculated Bank of Canada 1935 issues in both English and French texts including the very rare \$25 French text note. Displays will be by invitation only and the theme will be Canadian paper money. There will be no judging. Display invitation replies have been coming in as late as yesterday, assuring us of some of the finest paper money exhibits in the Atlantic Provinces.

A further feature will include a CPMS donation auction where material to date has been received from CPMS members across the country. All realized profits will be donated to the Canadian Paper Money Society. Highlighting the auction will be such rare items as a five shilling note from the Central Bank of New Brunswick, whose head office at the time was Fredericton; and an assortment of low serial number issues from the Westmorland Bank of New Brunswick in quite presentable condition. 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Report on the Saint John Coin Collector's Club Spring Show. 27 April

The Georgian Ball Room of the Admiral Beatty Hotel was a busy place from the time the show opened at 10:00 a.m. till it closed at 7:00p.m. The center of the ball-room held the numismatic displays. Coins, medallions and paper money were well displayed. The young numismatists were very much in evidence and even actively assisted in operating a bourse table. The majority of the displays were Junior entries and a Junior won first prize in the paper money catagory. Very impressive and encouraging. I talked to Sylvia Eisenhauer for a short time. She is APNA Co-ordinator for Junior activity and is actively pursuing the goal of a strong Junior organization within the APNA. The dealers were kept busy with a lot of choice material changing hands. Ed.

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Although the dollar as a unit of currency came to the American continent in the form of Spain's peso de 8 reales (the storied piece of eight), the name itself originated with a large silver coin called the Joachimsthaler which made its appearance about 1518 at a Bohemian mint located in the valley (or thal) of St. Joachim. Thalers rapidly gained favour throughout Europe, and the name, modified according to the speech of individual countries, became daaler in Holland, daler in Scandinavia, and dollar in England. The word appears at least twice in Shakespeake's plays.

One of the dollar's European ancestors holds the distinction of being the largest metallic coin known. In 1644, Sweden issued 10 Daler pieces weighing 38.5 pounds. They were rectangular copper slabs measuring 12 x 2 inches. This article appeared in Sussex Coin Club's Shinplaster.

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The Canadian Banknote Co. and the British American Banknote Co. print all of our paper money, on contract from the Bank of Canada. Over the past few months, I have become aware of the fact that both companies have printed the same denomination and signature combinations on at least a few occasions, resulting in a fascinating set of varieties. Information is almost non-existant but observation has shown that for instance, in the case of the 1954 issue \$1 Beattie-Rasminsky notes there are some printed with the name of the "Canadian Bank Note Company" inscription and some with the "British American Bank Note Company" inscription. Asterisk notes are found in each case and the topic is further complicated by the fact that the Canadian Bank Note Co. notes are found in two distinct varieties, one having a much darker shade of green and the serial numbers being of a slightly different type. Surely a number of collectors have noticed this and I would be most interested in seeing any articles on the subject.

The Dr. J. B. Benson Medal

The "Diamond Jubilee" ceremonies of Queen Victoria's ascension to the throne of England led to great celebrations all over the British Empire. Canada was no exception. Almost simultaneously with this great event in the Dominion, the idea of presenting Jubilee medals to school children sprang up in numerous towns and cities. Chatham, New Brunswick was included in this novel innovation.

Henry Birks & Sons was one of several firms who designed and struck several issues to commemorate the anniversary. Actually, it was their initial effort in striking medals. Mayor J. B. Benson of Chatham thought he would like to give as a memento to the school children of Chatham, a medal commemorating the 1897 celebrations.

The June 17th issue of the Miramichi Advance, carried a feature story of the upcoming events to be held Tuesday, June 22nd, 1897. It stated that extensive preparations were being made for the grandest holiday festivities ever witnessed on the Miramichi. There was to be a grand parade of Militia, firemen with apparatus, representatives of societies, farmers, labour organizations and Polymorphions, who were all to parade at ten o'clock on the eventful day. There was to be a flag raising at the public park, a Jubilee oration by the Honourable L. J. Tweedie, a Royal Salute, presentation of medals to 1000 school children, singing of the National Anthem with band accompaniment at noon. The afternoon and evening entertainment was to feature horse and bicycle races, a steamboat procession with twenty-five steamers in line, constant music with three bands, culminating in fireworks at nightfall.

Special mention was made regarding the school medals, namely design, composition, size and weight.

On the much awaited day, the school children paraded at 9:30 a.m. forming opposite the square on Wellington Street. The program in the public square had the usual speeches and music. Speakers were Mayor Benson, Hon L. J. Tweedie and Hon. J. P. Burchill. The school children sang, followed by the flag raising and military salute. The Advance further described the imposing scene: "The bandstand in the centre of the square was occupied by the Mayor,

the High Sheriff, officials of the celebration and leading citizens, and it was estimated that there were about three thousand people present. After the bands had played, the School Trustees distributed to each of public school children present, the Jubilee Medals presented to them by Mayor Benson"

The children must have flowed with the generosity of the Mayor. A Miss Mary Ryan proudly stepped forward and read from a beautifully engrossed sheet of white cardboard that was embellished with a border of gold and various other colours. This piece of art was the labor of the ladies connected with the Convent Schools. It read as follows:

"To His Worship, J. B. Benson, M. D., Mayor of Chatham. May it please your Worship:

We, the pupils of the Chatham schools, desirous of expressing our grateful appreciation to your worship's kindness in presenting us with these mementoes of our loved Queen's Diamond Jubilee, gladly profit by the present favorable occasion to do so. This delicate act on your Worship's part does not surprise us. It is but another manifestation of the same noble qualities which in your professional capacity have won for you the respect and affection of all, and which in the office of public trust and honor in which you have recently been placed, lead you to ever rank yourself on the side of whatever is uplifting and ennobling - the patron of whatever is for thr progress

and enlightenment of our people. And for us, as children of Chatham, there is inspiration in the contemplation of such example. Like ourselves, you have spent the early part of your life and received the rudiments of your education on the banks of the Miramichi. The haunts of your childhood and youth are ours. Let us hope that the ernest purpose and Christian example of your manhood may be ours as well. The medals your Worship has today given, shall ever be treasured by us. They shall be to us not only souvenirs of the sextennial year of the glorious reign of Her Gracious Majesty, Queen Victoria, but likewise reminders of the first year of our Town's Incorporation, and in a special manner, token of the kindness and liberality of our first Mayor."

Naturally the Mayor was flattered and thanked the children. The day concluded with the above mentioned activities.

OBV: Within the English legend, Victoria Queen and Empress is a laureated and crowned bust of Queen Victoria to the left with the date 1837 before and 1897 after. Under the bust is the signature Birks.

REV: Within the English legend, Presented by Dr. J. B. Benson, Mayor of Chatham, N. B. is a full-rigged ship to the left with Ventis Secundis printed under the ship on a ribbon.

Bronze, white metal, silver, Circular, 30, plain edge.

McLachlin reports that it was issued in bronze and white metal but only white metal specimens have been seen by this writer. There were 900 issued, if McLachlin's figures are accurate, as I believe they would be.

The medal must have proved very popular, as Br. Benson instituted a contest in each of the town's schools, where he promised to award presumably a s milar medal in silver to the student with the highest standing in grades seven or eight. The Advance of 2 Sept. 1897 reports one such presentation at the Convent School where a Miss Georgina Clancy was presented with the silver piece. It would seem the silver madal was uniface with the reverse side being identical to the white metal and bronze specimens. The obverse seemed to have been plain as the Clancy medal had inscribed on it; Georgina Clancy

Highest Standing Grade VII, 1897 Grade VII or VIII

The mystery in 1974 is why are the medals so difficult to obtain if 900 were issued. Did those mischievous boys roll them down the street or skip them over the Miramichi? Did the girls have them drilled and made into necklaces?

This writer would appreciate receiving information on any specimens known, particularly in silver or bronze.

The President's Message

Inflation. Everybody talks about it, but nobody seems to do much about it. Financially, we seem to be walking a treadmill, going faster and faster, without getting anywhere. We read that the cost of living has risen about 60% since 1961, but many workers have not received a matching increase in wages. Those with strong union representation or more considerate employers have fared some better, with a few increases actually exceeding the rising costs.

The problem is not what an election and the incoming government will do about inflation, but what we intend to do about our own resources in the face of rising inflation, and a possible depression. Do not discount the possibility of a depression or at least, a major recession within the next few years. There were depressions in 1986, 1893, 1900, 1907, 1914, 1921 and 1929, not to mention several recessions since 1929. Each depression and recession was preceded by a highly inflationary period and

generally, a devaluation of the dollar against international currencies.

Investment in common stocks have not served as a good hedge against inflation, as many will remember from the disaster that followed the 1929 "crash". The returns from mutual investment funds have in most instances, been less than interest on bank savings. Recently, the Canadian Government raised the interest rate on Canada Savings Bonds to 9%. What does this mean to the holder of these bonds? \$100 invested for a period of ten years at 9% compounded annually will provide a return of \$236.73. A consumers price index rise of 60% during that period would result in a purchase value on the investment of \$94.70 and, you have not used that money in any way for the ten year period. Besides, you will receive only paper dollars in return for your bonds, paper that may have little backing by our own government.

In 1959, the International Economic Research Bureau in New York, published a book by William J. Baxter. This book was a follow-up to his many financial and stock predictions in the "Baxter Reports". Entitled "Gold is Going Higher", his book is a study of how the situation of 1959 started, where it was going and, what we could do to protect our future through sound investment. He not only warned of the spiralling inflation, but predicted the rapid increases in gold, silver and other metal values and, the rise in oil stocks and gold coins.

A report in the April 15, 1974 "Coin Investment Market Letter" from Birmingham, Mich. confirms the predictions of W. J. Baxter. The report shows that in the 13 year period from 1961 to 1974 an investment of \$100 in stamps could have yielded \$250. In oil stock, about \$310 and in gold coins \$350. During this period gold bullion has increased

in value from \$35 a troy ounce to \$165 per ounce.

Investment in gold or silver bullion may still be sound, as is indicated by recent predictions of a possible increase to \$300 plus for gold and \$10 plusfor silver during the coming year. Even if prices continue to fluctuate, these are both dolid investments that can only show greater stability in direct relation to the growing instability of the paper dollars and the common stock market.

The prime purpose of this review is to encourage investment in sound, marketable assets, but there is a secondary purpose too. It is also my desire to encourage numismatic study and coin collecting. In order to combine investment with collecting, we should try to acquire coins that will give us pleasure, knowledge and future profit.

Mr. Frank Oraskovic, President of the World Coin Collector's Society has stated this case most clearly in his statement that "...World coins properly selected will return

return greater value in investment and collecting pleasure than any series of U.S. coins!"

Many collectors have been pleasantly surprised to learn that the coins they collected for pleasure had increased in value at a greater rate than other possible investments.

Many investment advisors now recommend that coins become a part of a varied investment portfolio. If it is necessary to consider potential profit from an investment, then,

selective coin collecting is one of the best and safest ways for the small investor to realize his aim.

Success in any investment field requires both study and patience. Just as there are good and poor stocks, high and low-risk debentures and mortgages, varying interest and dividend rates on bonds and bank deposits, there are both good and bad numismatic investments. It is the responsibility of the buyer or investor to study the market and to invest only when he has a sound knowledge of past and possible future performance.

Because there are greatly exaggerated claims of scarcity and rarity in some advertisements. It is particularly important that collectors and investors know before they but. Though it is not my intention to recommend a particular investment advisory group or a specified field of collecting, it would certainly be wise to seek some professional assistance if one's knowledge in the coin field is somewhat limited. The cost of sound investment information could be small compared with possible losses from mor investments.

Whatever the chosen program of investment and collecting, there are still a few words of advice that bear repeating. Invest only what you can afford, not just for today, but in the future. Unless you are sure that you will be able to afford the rare specimens in a field of collecting, it might be better to choose another less costly series. Always purchase the best possible specimen available or that you can afford; the potential profit is greater for the choice items. Deal only with reliable well-known suppliers and keep a complete record of each coin, including date of purchase, price paid, dealer and your own grading. Finally, protect and secure every coin as carefully as you would any other valuable possession.

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The 1955 ARNPRIOR DOLLAR is the most prominent variety of Canadian silver dollars. It has earned a place as one coin which every collector needs to complete his set.

The "Arnprior" dollar got that name because most of the 1955 silver dollars with l_2^1 instead of 3 waterlines happen to go to Arnprior, Ontario. Why? Well, there is not a complete answer, but there is a story to it. The President of Playtex Limited, with its plant in Arnprior, wanted to pay employees a Christmas bonus in silver dollars. The company found itself short by 2000 of the required number and a request to the Mint to supply the extra 2000 was denied. Undaunted, the Playtex Company went to the Minister of Finance and, the appeal being successful, the Mint filled the special order for 2000 dollars on December 10, 1955.

B ecause of the Arnprior variety existing, there is some dispute as to the total number of dollars minted in 1955, but a figure of 270,000 is about right. Of this amount, the educated guess is that approximately 5000 were of the "arnprior" variety. One author suggests that an additional 200 went into proof-like sets. Whatever the arithmetic of the vintage figures we do know that the vast majority went to the town of Arnprior and were apparently well dispersed from there!

LOOKING BACK ...

...at the March 1942 issue of "The Numismatist" (the regular publication of the American Numismatic Association), we find a rather humorous note about the shortage of nickel! Since silver has disappeared and copper is on the way out as metals for coinage, it seems only aluminum or nickel are left. However, back in 1942, the metal in short supply was nickel and the Numismatist suggested that "...there is reason to believe many of the nations will eventually have to substitute copper or silver for their minor coins..." Fat chance of that! It was also suggested that a return to the use of fractional currency might be necessary but the obvious problems prohibited that ever becoming a reality. How times change...

The President's Message

some background information.

Dr. Haxby is internationally known for his extensive writings in the field of Canadian numismatics. He was born in Winnipeg, but has lived most of his life in the United States. He was educated at the University of Oregon and Washington University, St. Louis Missouri where he received his Ph.D. From 1970-72 he was egged in scientific research at La Jolla, California. In the summer of 1972 he moved to Canada and has been employed with a Toronto numismatic firm. Dr. Haxby is best known to collectors in Canada and the United States as co-author of "Coins of Canada", a widely used standard catalogue of Canadian coins, tokens and paper money. In 1969 Dr. Haxby received the Literary Award of the Canadian Numismatic Research Society for his series of articles on Canadian decimal coins. He is a fellow of the Royal Numismatic Society, a member of the Canadian and American numismatic associations, The British Numismatic Society and numerous other numismatic organizations.

I extend to the APNA member ship a cordial welcome to attend this well organized fall Rally in Halifax on September 28. It is not only by numismatic activity of this lature that we can add to our collections, but more important to further our quest

or numismatic knowledge.

Inflation once again has taken its toll resulting in some exceedingly high prices being paid for rare numismatic items by way of public auction. The most recent action sale which can be given, was a sale held by Charlton Numismatics at Toronto's yatt Regency Hotel on June 7 and 8. This sale has broken a number of records. Orthy of note are; 1948 \$1 BU est. value \$600 sold at \$750, 1967 gold sold at \$200, 872 \$1 (Summerside Bank of P.E.I.) WG est. \$2000 sold \$2100, 1906 \$10 (United Empire ank) about fine ext \$3500 sold \$2250, 1910 \$5 (Bank of Vancouver) WG est. \$2000 sold \$3700, 1935 Bank of Canada issue (9 notes all low serial nos.) sold at \$2700.

finally, to put the icing on the cake, so to speak, here is a very latest auction record. A 1948 silver dollar just sold in a Central United States auction for \$1400. A specimen dollar in flawless Gem condition of the same date was recently offered for sale for no less than \$4500. So the spiral continues.

However, I am still of the opinion that nothing unusual has happened. Rare coins and paper money are certainly worthy of their prices realized, much more so because of supply and demand. The rarities are unique as to price and justly so.

If I may look into the crystal ball of the future for a moment, and on the strength of my past experience as a collector specializing in rare Canadian paper money, may I offer a forecast for the future? My advice at this time would be to say to you, "Buy Newfoundland numismatic items while you can, particularly the paper money". There's very little about, and there will be no more. Should a prime specimen of Newfoundland's pre 1900 private note issues reach the auction block, I am of the opinion you may well see a price realized in excess of \$3000. Very little of the history of Newfoundland numismatics has been written, but the specialists in the field know, ask them.

On this note, my message for the month will end. May I extend to you on behalf of our association a happy holiday season, and if possible, do try and attend some of the numismatic events which are being staged throughout Canada and U. S.

during the next few months.

LOOKING BACK...at the last century and the topic of counterfeiting, here is a short story that will interest most everyone. A man named Edwin Johnson was a skilled engraver and a dedicated counterfeiter! Johnson's entire family was involved in his illegal activity and they formed a complete unit for producing counterfeit notes. His two daughters, trained since childhood, forged signatures after hours of practicing a single signature; his sons helped with the printing while learning their father's engraving skill; and Mrs. Johnson was in charge of wholesaling the notes to other criminals who passed them off as legal tender.

The Johnson Family's 1880 scheme produced over one million dollars worth of bogus notes and these were still being used as good money twenty-five years later, in 1905! As is often the case "demon liquor" was Johnson's downfall for he sometimes drank to excess and foolishly passed his bad notes when doing so, until the famed detective, John Wilson, nabbed him and so ended

a colorful episode in Canadian paper money history.

As all numismatic material increases in value, the need to have a collection insured becomes all the more evident. Therefore, the recent announcement of the CNA of a comprehensive insurance plan for members is welcome indeed. The President's Message

collection whether be it coins, tokens, medals or paper money, a capital gains tax is involved. It is probably not clear in the minds of most collectors just what the capital gains tax implies, and to what extent the collector is involved when disposing of a collection.

The following article recently appeared in the September 14 issue of C S A News. the author, Robert Aaron, who is coin columnist for the Toronto Star, is to be commended on a very excellent article and a subject which I feel is of the utmost importance not only to the members of our association, but to collectors everywhere

throughout Canada;

A new ruling by the director of the Technical Interpretations Division of Revenue Canada-Taxation has done much to clarify the income tax position of coin collectors who make capital gains on their coins.

In general, the capital gains tax sections of the Income Tax Act provide that if the proceeds of a sale of a personal asset (including "a coin") exceed \$1000, the individual may deduct from those proceeds either his cost or \$1000, whichever is greater.

In other words, tax is payable only on the excess profit over \$1000. The taxpayer cuts the profit in half, and adds one half to his regular income and pays tax on it at the prevailing rate.

Until recently it had been the general understanding among coin collectors that capital gains tax was payable on half the profit of a coin or collection sold in a taxation year for more than \$1000.

Recently in Toronto a widow negotiating the sale of her late husband's coin collection to a local part time dealer. Just before the transaction was consummated, she thought of the tax consequences and tried to back out of the deal. It was her understanding that since sale of the collection involved profits of well over \$1000 she would have to pay capital gains tax on the total profit minus \$1000.

The new Revenue Canada-Taxation ruling means that the whole collection was tax exempt. The Department now advises that the \$1000 exemption provided for in the Income Tax Act applies to ownership of, or any interest in or right to, each individual coin or each set, but not an entire collection.

A coin collection may consist of a number of individual coins or sets, each one of which has the benefit of the \$1000 exemption.

Departmentalpplicy regarding the disposition of individual coins of a collection that are not part of a set (which will be defined later) may be summarized as follows:

1. Where a number of coins valued at more than \$1000 each are present along with other coins having values of less than \$1000 each, the aggregate, or total. of these latter coins, even if in excess of \$1000, would not be subject to the capital gains tax provisions of the Act.

2. By the same token, where a collection contains no coins valued at more than \$1000 each, but has a total value of more than \$1000, it would not be subject to the capital gains tax provisions of the Act.

Most Canadian coin collections fall in the latter catagory, and are, accordingly.

exempt from capital gains tax on sale.

With respect to a "set" of coins, a similar rule applies - each "set" of coins is treated as one coin (with one \$1000 exemption) for taxation purposes.

What is a set?

The Income Tax Act does not define the word "set" so it therefore takes on its normal meaning, according to Department policy, i.e., a number of coins belonging together and relating to each other, produced and issued simultaneously or over a short period of time ordinarily being disposed of simultaneously.

According to this definition, a set would include a Canadian cased year proof set (such as 1858, 1911, 1937), or a cardboard or polyfilm - enclosed proof like set issued in one year.

A set of silver dollars from 1935 to date in a cardboard folder is probably not a set for tax purposes. Neither is the total accumulation or hoard of miscellaneous Canadian and foreign coins typical of many collections.

A coin collection is not a set for tax purposes.

Would a collection of 28 Olympic coins, whether proof, uncirculated or encapsulated be considered a "set" for tax purposes? Probably not, although each four coin.

set of proof Olympic coins might qualify as a set.

When a set of coins is disposed of in one transaction or in a series of transactions to one person (or a group of persons not dealing at arm's length), the sale of the set is treated as if it were one coin for tax purposes. If total proceeds are less than \$1000, any profit over \$1000 is taxable. If total proceeds are less than \$1000, the sale is tax free regardless of the amount of profit. A special rule applies where a set, e.g., a 1911 cased proof set, is being broken up and sold to different purchasers separately. In this case, the \$1000 limit is apportioned between the parts of the set. The applicable rule is found in section 43 of the Act.

Another special rule applies where a group of people own in partnership a single coin or coin set. This group of people might be, for example, a collector syndicate or the heirs of an estate.

Basically, the rule says that there is only \$1000 limit for each coin or each coin set. The \$1000 limit cannot be obtained more than once where a property is sold in several parts or is owned by a group of people.

What does all this mean to the average collector?

Assuming the average collection contains few if any coins worth \$1000 or more. the Income Tax Act allows the collector to make fairly substantial profits on his collection without paying any tax at all. The tax-free income can be used by the taxpayer to feed his family or to underwrite purchases for the rest of his coin collection.

If however, the collector engages in too much buying and selling of coins, he might be deemed to be carrying on a business in coin dealing, and the entire profits without exemption can be classified as income.

Most of the information contained in this article applies equally to stamps, painting, sculpture, prints, drawings, etchings, jewellery, rare books, manuscripts or folios. Care should be taken, however, in applying the "set" rule outlined above.

Further information can be obtained from local Income Tax offices. Written interpretations of specific sections of the Act may be requested from the Director, Technical Interpretations Division, Revenue Canada-Taxation, 875 Heron Rd., Ottawa, Ont. KLA OL8.

Collectors with specific taxation problems regarding coins or stamps whould seek professional advice.

A. P. N. A. SECRETARY'S REPORT

SEPTEMBER 28, 1974

The past year has been a good one for the A.P.N.A. with the Association well organized and operating under an efficient Executive Committee. Although ne Spring 1974 Rally was held, a special Executive Meeting was held at the Wandlyn Motel in Amherst on March 16th with seven executive members and a number of observers present. As indicated in the minutes of this meeting, many items of importance were covered during the long session.

The Halifax Coin Club is hosting the Fall 1974 Rally with Dr. James Haxby of the Bank of Canada as special guest. A Grading Seminar conducted by Paul Hilton and an official display of counterfiet currency from the R.C.M.P. along with the banquet, are the main highlights.

To mark the Centenary of the Town of Truro, that Club will be hosting the Spring1975 show for the A.P.N.A. Plans are well underway for this event.

Membership in the A.P.N.A., although not as high as in some years past, when the hobby was at it's peak, is growing steadily again with a group of more dedicated members who are genuine collectors as opposed to the hoarders, accumulators and speculators of past years.

As of September 28th, our membership now stands at a total of 128 paid-up members which already exceeds the total of last year for the entire year of 125. Membership by year since the A.P.N.A. was organized is as follows:

1965 - 64; 1966 - 110; 1967 - 128; 1968 - 158; 1969 - 190; 1970 - 208

1971 - 174; 1972 - 115; 1975 - 125; 1974 - 128

The 1974 total breaks down by Province as follows:

N.S. - 50; N.B. - 55; P.E.I. - 7; Nfld. - 2; Que. - 1; Ont. - 7; U.S. - 6

During the year, under the capable direction of our Editor; Vince Mitchell; a Newsletter was published regularly each month containing interesting itels of other club activities and contributed numismatic articles. Members are asked to continue to submit articles for future publication. Advertising in the Nesletter has become very popular during the past year with many members placing ads on a regular basis. This provides a small source of extra income at .50% per quarter page, for the Association, to help with postage, etc. It is hoped that it is also profitable for the advertisers themselves.

A slide library was established during the year due to the efforts of Harry Eisenhauer, the Ontario Numismatic Association and the Canadian Paper Money Society. Titles available are 1) Coinage of Newfoundland; 2) Canadian Silver Dollars; 3) Canadian Fractional Currency; 4) Canadian Five Cent Silver. More will be added as time goes on.

These sets are available on loan free of charge to members and member clubs for a \$1 registration and postage fee only. They have been circulated in whole or in part todate to the Fredericton Numismatic Society; Saint John Coin Club; Mirimachi Coin Club; Halifax Coin Club; and all sets are currently with the Moncton Coin Club for use at their next few meetings after which they will be returned to the Secretary-Treasurer.

There have been a few donations to the Association Library during the past year with contributions from Fern Allen of Thistle Coins and Antiques of Yarmouth and member Stanford Nickerson of Dartmouth. Many thanks to these contributors.

The Association is trying to complete it's Library of C.N.A. early Bulletins and C.N.A. Journals. During the past years, we have received many donations of Journals which helped to fill many gaps and there are only a few issues needed to complete the sets.

Originals or photostat copies of the following C.N.A. Bulletins (the predecessors of the Journals), are needed:

Vol. 1 # 2; Vol. 5 # 1, #5, # 6.

Copies of the later Journals required are as follows:

Vol. 1 # 1; # 2 , # 9, # 10. Vol. 2 # 1, # 2, # 5, # 4, # 5, # 6, # 9

If anyone has any of these issues and would like to donate them to our library, they would be much appreciated. Some gaps were filled from the two donations mentioned above, but we still need these additional issues.

Shortly, we will publish in the Newsletter, a list of duplicate copies of C.N.A. Journals the Association has accumulated on hand during the years and will gladly give these to clubs or members who may need them to help complete their sets of books.

Todate, the A.P.N.A. Speakers' Certificate program has been well received with 58 certificates awarded todate. Names and pertinent information is kept on permanent file by the Association. Some clubs have not as yet partaken of this free service. The P.E.I. club is the latest to request some of the attractive sheets. Member clubs may obtain application forms from the Secretary-Treasurer.

This being election of officers meeting, letters calling for nominations for Executive members from members and clubs were sent out to all paid-up members as of September 25th, asking for written nominations. Three replies were received but more meminations are known to be forthcomming from the floor at election time.

The Dale Garland A.P.N.A. Award of Merit is to be again awarded at this meeting, having been held during the past year by our President, Harry Eisenhauer.

A great upsurge of Junior members at all slub meetings throughout the Atlantic area has been noted during the past year. At the Special Executive meeting in Amherts, Mrs. Sylvia Eisenhauer was appointed as a Director of Junior Activities for the Association. A number of special events for juniors will be held during this Rally. We were pleased to welcome the Canadian Association of Young Numismatists as an official member of our Association during the past year.

Finances have been kept on a sound basis during the year with main expenditures being made for Newsletter supplies and postage, the slide library and general postage and stationery. The Treasurer's Report states a present bank balance of \$ 491.94.

The Secretary-Treasurer wishes to remind the Executive and members that 1975 marks the 10th Anniversary of the founding of the A.P.N.A. on May 8, 1965. Some sort of special recognition should be made to commemorate this fact. Possibly, another in the series of A.P.N.A. medals, financed jointly by the Association and all member clubs, which would not place the financial burden on one particular club alone, as has been the case in the past, would be appropriate. If each club would agree to finance a portion of the expense and sell a portion of the medals themselves, it could be a very successful program. Profits would be distributed to the clubs on a pro-rata basis.

A competition could be held amoung members and clubs for a design for the obverse with the A.P.N.A. crest on the reverse side. No medals have been issued in the series during the past two years due to the high costs of silver and bronze. These prices are now levelling off and by next year should be more reasonable.

We call attention to the special project this year of the Halifax Coin Club in co-operation with the Joseph Howe Festival Committee in producing a souvenir "Howe Half" bill. This bill has been used as a form of advertising for the A.P.N.A. Convention and the proceeds received by the club will help them defray costs of the Fall Rally. Those involved in the project deserve a word of praise for this project.

As the year ends, we look forward to a year of further expansion and continued growth in the Association.

CLUB NEWS

Halifax Coin Club

Don Olmstead got his October newsletter out on its way in time to report the goings on in Halifax of the recent APNA Fall Rally on 28 September. He gave an account of the August meeting which was taken up mostly with the final arrangements for the APNA Rally held on the 28 Sep tember. His News of Members said that Secretary Clark Mullock is recovering from a recent illness and it is hoped to see him active again shortly. We send congratulations to Mrs. Olmstead on the arrival of Don Olmstead's first born son on September 14. Past President Ed Doane is pleased with himself since he lost all that weight.

The executive is pleased to announce the donation to the club library of a substantial number of numismatic books, auction catalogues, etc by Fern Allen, a long-standing club supporter now living in Yarmouth.

Don reports that future issues of his newsletter will carry in greater detail the happenings of the 1974 APNA Fall Rally. Here is a very brief report of the day's highlights: The paid attendance was 333 and this resulted in the bourse area being very busy in the morning while the afternoon and evening sessions were a bit slower. All the dealers reported good business. The displays were good but not as plentiful as had been hoped. Obviously we are going to have to mount a program to encourage club members to display more often in the future.

Don then gave a list of display awards winners in their catagories. The numismatic highlight of the show was the active presence of Dr. James Haxby, Deputy Curator of the Bank of Canada's National Numismatic Collection. Dr. Haxby skillfully led two seminars in the afternoon; one on coins and another on paper money. Both were well-attended. Jim Haxby "performed" again at the evening banquet with an interesting talk on Nova Scotia pre-Confederation Tokens. He has a style of presentation that interests anyone with any curiosity whatsoever in the anecdotes and colorful history of our provinces early numismatic history. In future newsletters Don says he will try to outline some of the major points made by Dr. Haxby in his grading seminars.

The October meeting will be run by the Junior members and every member is especially asked to attend this meeting and support their efforts. Bernie Kline will present a slide show on gold coins and sovereigns of Canada. This promises to most interesting.

Miramichi Coin Club

The September meeting was conducted by vice-president Todd Hume. After the minutes of the last meeting in July were read and approved and other business transacted, the meeting was turned over to Chuck Lamb who talked on the grading of U.S. coins as well as the designs and mottos appearing on U.S. coins. Vince Mitchell followed with an account of the C.N.A. convention in Hamilton.

Those who planned to attend the $\mbox{\sc APNA}$ Fall Rally in Halifax then discussed ways of getting there.

The Provincial Board of Agriculture was established in 1862 for the purpose of encouraging and upgrading the agricultural industry in the Province of New Brunswick. This act of the Legislature stipulated that triennial exhibitions were to be held, embracing "agricultural, horticultural and floral productions, domestic manufactures of all kinds, natural resources of the Province, specimens of the fine arts and new and improved agricultural, mechanical, culinary or sanitary implements or apparatus, raised, produced, manufactured or invented in the Province.*1 In 1871, the Agricultural Act of 1862 was repealed and the Board, composed of one delegate from each county in the Province, was authorized to hold exhibitions wither annually or triennially, restricting, however, these exhibitions to agricultural at a horticultural produce, floral productions and domestic manufactures, and new and improved agricultural implements.

The sixth exhibition sponsored by the Board was held October 7th to 10th, 1873 in Fredericton. The York County Agricultural Society had invited the Board to have the exhibition in the Capital and took great pains to place the grounds and buildings in proper condition at no expense to the Provincial Body. Circumventing the letter of the law somewhat, the Board invited manufacturers and artisans to participate in this exhibition and in an attempt to stimulate more interest, offered successful competitors medals and diplomas in lieu of

money premiums.

Unfortunately, the inducements mentioned above, did not bring the number of exhibitors anticipated. The annual report of the exhibition chairman stated that "if our artisans are not attracted by the offer of medals and diplomas, it must be that the increaring demands upon the productive power of our workshops do not admit of a sufficient intermission for competitive exhibitions.*2

The small issued, has indeed an interesting story. G. E. Hart, writing in The Canadian Antiquarian and Numismatic Journal of 1878*3, states that this medal was issued to commemorate the visit of H.R.H. the Prince of Wales to Canada in 1860. Firstly, the date must be 1870 and secondly, there is no evidence to indicate the medal was cast to commemorate this visit. It is believed by R. W. McLaughlan*4 that the medal was executed and cast in Boston. I don't know where he obtained his information but he could well be correct. The obverse of the medal shows on a field, a well drawn harvest scene, a stack of full grown wheat, a plough, a stump with axe embedded, a cornucopia with contents overflowing, cattle and sheep, with a load of hay being driven from a field. In the distance is a farmhouse separated from the field by fencing and a small rolling hill with two large trees on it. In the background is a railway train passing over a bridge with a full rising sun spreading its light over the total scene. It is reasonably certain that the sketch for this scene was prepared by J.W.Gray, originally from England, moved to the rural college town of Sackville, N. B. in 1847. His hobby was drawing and painting. He later moved to Saint John, where his art work was encouraged to the point that he exhibited at three provincial exhibitions and at the one in 1870, won eight awards for his paintings. In 1869, Gray had been appointed professor of drawing at Mount Allison University in Sackville and anyone knowing the area would soon realize that on the medal studied here could have been inspired by the rural Sackville area. What is most interesting is the fact that he won three medals in the 1873 exhibition in Fredericton, the medal he designed.

The reverse of the medal has the inscription 'Provincial Board of Agriculture' around the edge in a circle with New Brunswick Canada in three lines placed inside several open sheaves of wheat, tied together by a ribbon bow. The medal is bronze, 43mm in diameter and is cast. The workmanship is a bit shoddy as the medal is rough and pitted. I believe the medal to be very rare as research shows that only thirty-six were awarded and Leroux*5 seems justified in giving the piece a R6 label. However, the medal seems to be readily available by

auction, perhaps indicating its unpopularity.

A.P.N.A. Fall Rally Report --- Lord Nelson Hotel, Halifax, 28 September 1974

As it is almost virtually impossible to find an uncirculated note which has not been subjected to counting creases, even notes of modern vintage, we can now ascertain that it is a fact that very few absolutely uncirculated notes exist, if graded by this strict standard.

Dr. Haxby's banquet presentation speech was suitably entitled "Nova Scotia Pre-Confederation Tokens". Although not a collector of this field, I did learn much about this fascinating area of numismatics as did most of the people attending the banquet. This was evidenced by the questions presented to him following his talk.

Displays at the rally were of outstanding quality, all catagories were well represented. The Best of Show Award went to Don Baugild for his excellent Foreign display, Canadian Decimals-Ron Balcom, Canadian Paper Money-Don Olmstead, Tokens-Leger d'Entremont, Medals-Coni Hachey, Junior Display-Ken Smith. The people's Choice award was won by Robert Hingley.

The Dale Garland Award, which is presented annually to the person, who, in the opinion of it's former recipients has contributed most to the advancement of numis—matics in the Atlantic Provinces, was won this year by Vince Mitchell, Newcastle, N. B. Vince has been editor of the APNA Bulletin since the beginning of my term of office in 1972. The Award was presented by Bernie Kline during the presentation of awards at the evening banquet. A WORD ON GRADING

Those that were able to attend the seminars on grading which Dr. Haxby led at the September APNA Rally were impressed with the need to adhere to strict grading standards. We are all well-aware of that human tendency to try to give as much value to our possessions as we dare and this tendency has an insidious effect in our hobby. As coin values rise, the value of a coin in one grade as opposed to another becomes more and more significant. A 1948 silver dollar is worth hundreds of dollars more in Unc than in EF. It requires a great deal of self-discipline and skill to ensure that we do not overgrade our coins and thereby improperly profit at another collector's expense. It helps if you try to grade that coin when you buy or receive it as a gift or part of a purchased collection. Grade it then, not in the midst of or just prior to selling it when you are more likely to want to give it greater value than it warrants.

Next to the need for numismatic research is the need for careful grading. Once we know about a coin or note it is important that it be properly valued lest the hobby be ruined by those who make a practice of profiteering from

the less knowledgeable.

It will hurt at times to downgrade a coin or note you paid too much for. Soon you will be insisting on proper grading in your purchases and this will get the proverbial ball rolling in generating a much-needed movement toward proper grading and evaluation of coins and notes in a period when purchasing values are a threat to individual and hobby-wide integrity.
