BANK OF CANADA

OTTAWA, June 23, 1966. Mr. Louis Rasminsky, Governor of the Bank of Canada announced today that it had been decided to issue a special one dollar bank note in 1967, the centennial year of Canada's Confederation.

The centennial symbol will appear on the face of the note at the left hand side. There will be a change of wording on the borders of both sides of the note. The back of the note will feature an engraving of the original Centre Block of the Parliament Buildings which was destroyed by fire in 1916. Otherwise the design of the new bank note will be similar to that of the one dollar bank note of the present issue.

Deliveries of the present one dollar note to chartered banks will be suspended through 1967 and will be replaced by the centennial issue.

An adequate quantity of the new notes will be printed with the serial number 1867 1967 for those who are interested in collecting. Due to the use of a single serial number in this special group there will be no particular advantage to early application for notes from the Bank of Canada. While collectors may send orders to the Bank of Canada, Ottawa, by mail on or after July 1st, 1966 the notes will not be despatched until after December 31st, 1966. Applications should be accompanied by a remittance covering the face value of the notes requested plus 35 cents for postage.

President's Message

QUEEN ELIZABETH \$5 NOTES OF 1954 ISSUE

Approximately 380 million \$5 notes have been issued to date since 1954 consisting of 38 series letters and 41 varieties.

There are six major types and three signature combinations.

- Type I—British American Bank Note Co.—Coyne-Towers signatures "devils head" —C series with 3 series letters. A/C, B/C, C/C, with highest observed serial no. C/C7464862.
- Type 2 British American Bank Note Co. Beattie-Coyne signatures "devils head" C series with 7 series letters C/C, D/C, E/C, F/C, G/C, H/C, I/C with highest observed serial no. I/C 8985674.
- Type 3 British American Bank Note Co. Beattie-Coyne "Plain Head" variety C series with 9 series letters I/C, J/C, K/C, M/C, N/C, O/C, P/C, R/C, lowest no. observed I/C 9053655 and highest no. R/C 0087799.
- Type 4 Canadian Bank Note Co. Beattie-Coyne "plain head" as are all further types C series with 8 series letters R/C, S/C, T/C, U/C, V/C, W/C, X/C, Y/C, with lowest no. observed R/C 1589725 and highest no. observed Y/C 7357401.
- Type 5 Canadian Bank Note Co Beattie-Rasminsky signatures—C series—with 2 series letters only Y/C, Z/C. Lowest no. observed Y/C 8256663.
- Type 6 Canadian Bank Note Co. Beattie-Rasminsky S series with 12 series letters A/S, B/S, C/S, D/S, E/S, F/S, G/S H/S, I/S, J/S, K/S, L/S.

To complete a collection of these 41 varieties now would be a formidable task especially with type I in uncirculated condition — good luck! My thanks again to Albert Peddie and Lindsay McLennan for assistance provided in assembling the above information.

The Eastern Townships Bank

When the American Revolution drove the English Loyalists out of the Thirteen Colonies, many came to settle in what was then known as "Lower Canada". Though predominantly French, it was already the home of a number of disbanded English soldiers and traders in Montreal, Three Rivers and Quebec City.

The establishment of English settlements above the 45th parallel was only a matter of time and it was not long before these were being referred to as the "Eastern Townships". In these surroundings there grew up, between 1785 and 1859, a community of a quarter of a million people possessing a strong feeling of independence and a sense of things in common. However, the time and place demanded a high quality of fortitude and endurance and in making a meager living these pioneers had to rely on barter; in the first seventy-five years of its settlement the Eastern Townships had no banking facilities — they needed none because they had no money.

First move toward establishment of a bank in the Townships came in 1831 when a charter was requested for the Stanstead County Bank. This was refused.

By 1855, with the Townships looking outward toward such events as the Crimean war, the need for a bank had become obvious.

The first move in this direction came with the establishment of an agency by the City Bank of Montreal in Sherbrooke. This agency was chiefly concerned with the collection of deposits and offered little to the community.

Also, it was an outsider. The people of the Townships wanted a bank of their own. As the demand increased, a leader emerged. Colonel Benjamin Pomroy, a businessman from Compton had an interest in unification of Township business and saw a bank as a necessity.

This is the fourth of the series of bank histories written by Mr. Carpenter for publication in the "Current Account", staff magazine of the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce.

Covering the vast rural areas on horseback, he carried the story of a bank to the people. As he did so, he gathered subscriptions for shares in the proposed bank.

When the charter of The Eastern Townships Bank was first applied for, its capital was set at £250,000 in shares of £12-10-0 each. This proved a little too ambitious and by the time subscriptions were accepted, the shares were reduced in number to 8.000 with a par value of \$50.

The first meeting of shareholders was held on June 6, 1859 at the Magog House in Sherbrooke. After the Hon. Hollis Smith had been appointed chairman and J. G. Robertson as secretary a Committee was given the task of nominating the first Board of Directors; this initially consisted of A. A. Adams of Coaticook, H. L. Robinson of Waterloo, J. H. Pope, M.P.P. of Eaton, G. K. Foster of Richmond, Charles Brooks of Lennoxville, B. Pomroy of Compton and R. W. Heneker of Sherbrooke. The Board elected Colonel Pomroy president and Charles Brooks vice-president.

In the task of winning confidence for a new enterprise, The Eastern Townships Bank was most fortunate in the type of men chosen to sit on its Board. All were successful business men and all were natives of the Townships except one. The only outsider was Heneker, an Irishman by birth and an architect by training, who had just come to Canada as Commissioner of the British American Land Company, Participating in local affairs with zeal, he was to become Chancellor of Bishop's



College and the Bank's second president. He held office for twenty-eight years between 1874 and 1902.

Pope, at a later date, was to become a figure of national importance as Minister of Railways and a friend of Sir John A. Macdonald.

The bank commenced operations on September 19, 1859 but was not fortunate with its first two cashiers, as general managers were then known. After a few years the job was entrusted to William Farwell who for a period of half a century served the bank in this capacity, eventually succeeding Henecker as president.

In the opening year, business was carried on at Sherbrooke, Waterloo and Stanstead. At Sherbrooke, where its head office was located, suitable premises were acquired by the purchase of the "Thompson House" at a cost of \$3,500 of which \$2,500 was payable in bank stock.

It was another 14 years before a new building was erected at a cost of \$40,000 — a formidable amount in those days — on a site near the bridge which crosses the Magog River. By December 31 with just over 400 shareholders, but total resources of \$250,000 — though it had only \$4,400 in deposits — the directors thought it advisable to acquaint the public at large with the aims and objectives of the newly formed institution.

That the Bank might have come to an untimely end soon after it started in business was seen in the carelessness of one of its employees who, while enroute from Sherbrooke to the agency at Stanstead, dropped \$4,000 in notes from his pocket;

fortunately the notes were recovered so that the Bank, in its first year of operation, showed a profit to permit the payment of a six per cent dividend.

Though, in the next few years, this Bank played an important part in the economic development of the territory it served, its real success was based on the rapid improvement in general conditions throughout the southern part of Quebec. Much of this was to stem from the construction of the Grand Trunk Railway and other lines that were built in the two decades up to 1875.

The most important factor for The Eastern Townships Bank was that its Cashier and three branch managers knew intimately every person of standing in their respective areas. Through these key officers, the Bank had a close personal relationship with all borrowers. It is doubtful whether any financial institution was ever in closer touch with its customers or whether personality ever loomed larger in transactions entered into by a bank's officers.

Until 1874, in keeping with the times, the record showed a constant and striking increase in circulation, deposits, loans and profits of The Eastern Townships Bank. Between 1871 and 1875 it was necessary to almost quadruple its authorized capital. When the economy of the area slipped, the fortunes of the Bank languished also, but more from the result of world conditions that were to affect Canada as a whole, than from errors of policy or administration on the part of the Bank itself.

Though in 1879 a reduction in its Reserve Fund from \$300,000 to \$100,000 was made to cover likely contingencies, its restoration to former levels four years later was some indication of improved conditions.

The principle that the laborer is worthy of his hire was to be recognized in 1875 by the appropriation of \$3,500 as the remuneration of its directors. Two years earlier it had been decided also that, in future, officers of the Bank would be paid monthly instead of half yearly.

Not until 1895 was the Bank to look outside the Townships for customers. In that year, an office was opened at St. Hyacinthe. Three years later came a far bolder move with the establishment of the first branch outside Quebec Province.

In the next decade, under James Mackinnon who took over after Farwell succeeded to the presidency, the Bank steadily solidified its position and reached out into new areas increasing its representation to over 100 offices. It was consideration of establishment of additional branches in the West that gave rise to acceptance of an offer of amalgamation from The Canadian Bank of Commerce that led to merger on March 1, 1912.

When, forty years later, Dr. C. W. Colby, Ph.D., LL.D. resigned from the board of The Canadian Bank of Commerce, he had served as a bank director for a longer period than any other director of a Canadian bank. In December, 1910, he had been elected to the Board of The Eastern Townships Bank and had continued in the same capacity after its union with The Canadian Bank of Commerce. On December 29, 1958, there retired from the service of the Bank, the last officer originally in the employ of The Eastern Townships Bank; R. J. Montle was one of the 374 officers who became part of the larger institution.

Living in Toronto still, is Lady Banting — widow of Sir Frederick, the codiscoverer of insulin — who, as Miss Henrietta Ball, was a daughter of a onetime manager of The Eastern Townships Bank; her paternal grandfather was Colonel Benjamin Pomroy.

The words "Will pay" slant upward at the left of the centre vignette. Further reference to these types will be simply "Will pay etc," curved or straight.

1893-\$50.00 Date confirmed by the Bank of Canada collection.

1903-\$5.00 June 1st 1903, printed by the American Bank Note Company Ottawa. It is printed in Brown, Red, Green and Black and features, in the centre, a harvesting scene, and in the centre of the reverse are the Arms of the Bank.

1903-\$10.00 Confirmed date from the Bank of Canada Collection.

A. P. Ramussen had, at one time, a "specimen" with punched holes at signature points of this note, it was dated June 1st, 1903, and printed by the A.B.N.Co.

1907-\$5.00 Dated Quebec P.Q. June 1st, 1907, printed by the A.B.N.Co. showing a harvesting scene, The reverse shows the Arms of the Bank.

1907—\$10.00 Confirmed date—Showing Cowboy lassoing cattle. Reverse shows the Arms of the Bank.

1907-\$20.00 Confirmed date.

1912-\$5.00 Dated Winnipeg Man., July 1st, 1912 "Will pay-"curved" Presidents signature to left, countersigned-right. Printed by the A.B.N.Co., Ottawa.

1912—\$5.00 Same as above except "Will pay" is straight.

1912-\$5.00 Same as above except "Will pay" is curved with the word countersigned changed to General Manager at right and below signature.

1912-\$5.00 Overprinted N.W.T. Presume these notes were overprinted for the branch at La Grande Prairie mentioned earlier.

1912-\$5.00 The 1912 issue has also been noted with the printers being the C.B.N.Co. Ottawa.

1912-\$10.00 A.B.N.Co printers "will pay etc." straight signed by the Pres. Lower Left, countersigned Lower right.

1912-\$10.00 A.B.N.Co printers "Will pay etc." straight signed by the Pres. Lower Left but by the General Manager, Lower Right.

1912-\$20.00 Confirmed date.

1912-\$50.00 Confirmed date.

1912-\$100.00 Confirmed date.

1915—\$5.00 This date has been noted but not confirmed.

1921-\$5.00 A.B.N.Co. Confirmed Date.

1921—\$5.00 A.B.N.Co—Confirmed Date overprinted "North West Territories".

1921-\$10.00 Confirmed Date.

1921—\$20.00 Confirmed Date.

1921-\$50.00 Confirmed Date.

1921-\$100.00 Confirmed Date.

1924—\$5.00 This date has been noted but not confirmed.

According to Bank of Canada figures the amount of notes outstanding at Dec. 31st, 1963 was \$26,775.50.

A LISTING OF THE "SMALL SIZE" CHARTERED BANK NOTES ISSUED 1934-1943

For the information and benefit of members of this Society interested in this series, a listing is given below, accompanied by valuations established by reference to the Society's records and to collectors and dealers. The prices are not the last word, as fluctuations are continually taking place, however it is an effort to provide a guide based on rarity and popularity.

Listing as it does, 38 major varieties, for a modest sum a collector can assemble a representative collection. To obtain all in crisp uncirculated condition would however present a challenge, particularly financial, to most. Only the Royal 1943 \$5 is scarce in any condition at the present time. Up to now many collectors have neglected the \$20 denomination due to the relatively high face value. The Commerce and Toronto issues of this denomination are more popular due to their unusual designs.

A number of varieties have not been recognized, nor have signature combinations been listed — it is hoped that at a later date, sufficient information can be assembled to permit a listing including these.

The collector of special numbers, and uncut sheets also has an opportunity to indulge his fancy, but again transactions are so infrequent as to preclude listing. "Market Place" will however publish all information provided on these.
