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

CALGARY NUMISMATIC SOCIETY ISSUES \$3 SCRIP

The Calgary Numismatic Society, host of this year's very successful and enjoyable CNA Convention, has issued a \$3 note good for "cash or merchandise" with the CNS, with expiry date 31 Dec. 1995. The notes were on sale at face value at the convention.

The notes were printed on good quality paper by BABN, whose imprint they bear, and measure about 16 x 7 cm. The lathework on the face is engraved. The face design features the Calgary skyline, observed from across the Bow River. The back has a lovely vignette of a steam train coming through the mountains, with oil wells and dinosaurs at the left and right respectively.

The notes are signed by Earl J. Salterio and Stanley H. Clute, president and vice president of the CNS. The notes are printed in blue, with lettering and CNS crest in burgundy. Serial numbers are red.

The changeover numbers for the new signatures on Bank of Canada notes are now available for some denominations.



A SUPERB PAIR OF PROMISSORY NOTES

The first promissory note illustrated below, dated 26 July 1855, was payable at the Commercial Bank of the Midland District, Kingston. The second, dated March 24th 1857, was payable at the Commercial Bank of Canada, Kingston. The change in the bank's name went into effect in 1856. Both items are from the Port Hope branch, and both are denominated in pounds (currency).

Member **Jim Smith** advises that he has a \$5 1954 modified portrait (Beattie-Rasminsky) with number *L/S0175877. This is a significant advance over the highest number listed in the 8th edition *Charlton Standard Catalogue of Government Paper Money*, page 222, which is *L/S0167954.

This discovery puts the estimated number printed of 24,000 in doubt.

The face value of the notes listed is \$64, an insignificant amount considering that the total value of the Commercial Bank of Canada notes outstanding is \$9,133. No doubt, the outstanding figures of the Commercial Bank of the Midland District are included in that figure. However, I should be greatly surprised if this accounted for more than another \$125 of the total amount outstanding.

CNA CONVENTION ROUNDUP

Paper Money Exhibits

Category B: Canadian Paper Money

1st Ron Greene. Ron's exhibit was entitled, "In Search of a New Design: the Royal Bank \$10 1913". This exhibit was composed of approval proofs, colour trials etc., original correspondence, and finally the issued note.

2nd Walter Allan. The origin of another bank note vignette, Prince Albert (later King Edward VII) as a child wearing a sailor suit, was examined, in this exhibit. A copy of the original Winterhalter painting, the die proof vignette, and two notes bearing the vignette were shown.

3rd Andy McKaig. This exhibit explained in detail how the Calgary Numismatic Society \$3 note, issued at the convention, was made.

Category E: Non-Canadian Paper Money

1st Walter Allan. Notes and cheques printed by the National Bank Note Company were shown, together with matching die proof vignettes.

3rd Jim Betton. "Canada's gift to the silver screen" was the title of this exhibit, which related to actress Mary Pickford. The connection to paper money was made through a scrip item.

Non-Competitive Exhibits

The Bank of Canada displayed thirty-nine recently acquired notes, in five cases. Many of these were the only examples known.

BIRTH OF THE COMMERCIAL BANK OF THE MIDLAND DISTRICT

We observe by the Kingston Chronicle that a Meeting has been held there for the purpose of establishing a Bank in the Midland District. The following gentlemen were appointed a Committee to draw up rules and regulations:—J. Marks, G. W. Yarker, F. A. Harper, G. Mackenzie, T. Kirkpatrick, J. G. Parker, A. Truax, J. Mowat and G. F. Corbett, Esquires. A Correspondent at Kingston informs us that it is proposed that there shall be 4000 shares of £25 each, 1000 of which shall be taken up by gentlemen at the head of the lake, where a Branch is to be established. It is said that 1000 have been subscribed for in Kingston already.

CHARLTON PRESS ANNOUNCES THIRD EDITION OF BANK NOTES CATA-LOGUE

The following press release has been received from The Charlton Press:

The Charlton Standard Catalogue of Canadian Bank Notes is now on the drawing boards. A complete revision is planned for the third edition. This 450-plus-page reference on the charter bank notes of Canada will require weeks to update. Over 8,000 prices must be reviewed and revised, new information added and, of course, errors and omissions corrected from the second edition.

The projected release date for the third edition is January 1996.

In view of the enormous amount of data and time involved in compiling the book, The Charlton Press has divided the editorial responsibilities as follows: Technical Editor-Walter Allan, Canada's foremost paper money expert, will be in charge of the additions, deletions and corrections to the book.

Pricing Editors-Nick Gerbinski and Ian Laing, two of Canada's leading dealers in Canadian bank notes, will try to make sense of over 8,000 prices, so that the third edition will accurately reflect the charter bank note activity in the hobby.

A deadline of 1 September was given for receipt of suggestions, information and prices for the catalogue News of the preparation of this new edition will no doubt be welcomed by chartered bank note enthusiasts.

A BANK LEGAL IN CIRCULATION

As is well known, large denomination Dominion notes known as "bank legals", were issued by the Finance Department for use by banks only, for settlement of balances with other banks, purchase of legal tender notes from Assistant Receiver General's offices, and statutory bank reserves.

In 1915 some bank in Vancouver inadvertently let a \$1000 bank legal, number 4525, into circulation. About 15 September of that year, when the city comptroller's office was inundated with tax payers settling their property taxes, the cashier accepted the bank legal referred to. It was presumed that some bank in the city had paid in the note which it should have retained.

The Bank of British North America refused the note, quite properly, referring to the inscription, "Legal Tender Note for use by Banks only". The city comptroller, G. F. Baldwin, appealed to the manager of the Vancouver Clearing House, who in turn was unable to discover which bank had issued the note.

Finally Baldwin appealed directly to the Deputy Minister of Finance, T. C. Boville. "Will you please inform me", he wrote, "whether the Note can be cashed and what steps are necessary to bring it about." Boville, who usually liked to be as sticky as possible where bureaucratic prerogative was involved, was almost accomodating. He was probably motivated by a wish to resolve the matter quickly and quietly, to avoid adverse publicity and embarrassment.

Boville advised, "If you will consult with Mr. D. B. McConnan, Assistant Receiver General at Victoria, he will redeem the note for you on your giving an understanding to be responsible in case any loss should arise in the future as a result of this note having been issued in the manner indicated."

NEW \$20 VARIETY APPEARS

Bank of Canada \$20 notes bearing the signatures of Bonin and Thiessen are now in circulation. The only prefix reported to date is AIZ, indicating that these notes were printed by the British American Bank Note Company.

A rather surprising feature of this new variety is that the letter I in the prefix is of the serif type. The BABN \$20's of the 1991 issue seen previously had all been of the plain I type.

Time will tell whether the Bonin-Thiessen replacement \$20's will also have serif I's.

JIM CHARLTON REMEMBERS...

It was probably in 1957 or 1958 when Jim Charlton was contacted by an officer in the head office of one of Canada's largest banks. A large amount of old bank notes had come in, and they were to be shipped to the Bank of Canada for destruction. Knowing Jim and his interest in numismatics, the banker offered to let him pick out any notes he wanted from the hoard.

The notes had been the property of an elderly man in Selkirk, Ontario (south of Hamilton). Judging by the breadth and magnitude of the accumulation, one could conclude that he must have been hoarding paper money over a period of decades. Upon his death, his relatives rushed to the bank with the notes to see if they were still redeemable (the paper money collector's nightmare) and cashed them in. In due course the notes ended up in the Toronto head office.

The hoard came to about \$10,000 altogether, and Jim selected about a third of that amount. This was a very large amount of money to spend all at once in those times, so he obtained a bank loan to finance the purchase, using his life insurance policy as collateral. The hobby of paper money collecting was in its infancy then, many notes sold only marginally above face value, and there was no guarantee of a large profit on the transaction.

No record now exists of all the notes that Jim rescued for future paper money enthusiasts that day. However he auctioned part of them off (over 250 notes, as "consignment S") at the CNA convention in Regina in 1959, and from the catalogue of the sale we can appreciate how important the hoard was. A few of them can be positively identified from the photographs in the catalogue. Additional notes from the group were sold at auction and at Jim's store until his retirement in 1969.

The hoard included large quantities of Dominion notes, including many \$1 notes form 1898 to 1923, and \$2 notes from 1897 to 1923. A few of these graded AU or UNC. One outstanding note was a 1900 \$4 note, 000002/C, in UNC. There were a few Newfoundland cash notes, including a \$5 1908 with just a trace of a centre crease on the back! Among the selection of Bank of Canada notes were \$50 1935, both English and French, in

EF, English \$20 1935, large seal in UNC and small seal in AU, and lower grade \$25's in both English and French formats. The \$1 and \$2 notes of 1935 were present in quantity.

The chartered bank notes were truly amazing. I will record only the highlights, but the list will not be brief. Where possible, the notes will be identified by serial number.



I know for sure that I have one at least in my collectionits serial number is on the list above.

THE STAMP TAX ON CHEQUES: 1915-1953

Part 3: The Use of Meters in Payment of the Tax.

Excise tax meters were introduced in 1932. During the twenty-plus years in which they were used several different designs of impressions appeared. The first impressions consisted of a square "stamp" mark accompanied on the left by a circular mark containing the name of the user (or other identifier) and a date. Later impressions partially or entirely omitted this circular mark. The "stamp" mark was amended or modified several times during the lifetime of the tax.

Standard postal meters were not permitted to be used in payment of the tax until December 10th, 1949. Meter impressions used in payment of the tax are almost always found on company cheques and drafts.




Figure 5: A March 30th, 1944, sight-draft bearing a 6¢ excise meter impression in payment of the tax on documents over \$100.




Figure 6: A December 31st, 1952, cheque bearing 2¢ and 4¢ postal meter impressions in payment of the 6¢ tax on documents over \$100.

TEDDY BEARS AND BULLDOGS

A way back in 1994 our *Newsletter* Editor was hard pressed to extract copy from his dilatory clientele. As any good editor must, he proceeded to fill the pages with his own copy. The article was on Co-op Patronage Coupons, a subject dear to my heart but one which I thought might be below the dignity of the Canadian Paper Money Society.

In any case I thought it might take a a bit of unused space in the *Newsletter* if I filled out the article since the headquarters of the old Co-op and their petroleum products is now in Guelph - a fine old city known for its agricultural odours and attachments.

The United Co-operatives of Ontario date from about 1915. The Co-op was and is a major supplier in rural Ontario of fertilizer, feed, seed, farm hardware, home care products, petroleum and grain handling services.

In Wellington County the sale of gasoline began at Guelph about 1952, at Mount Forest in 1955 and at Drayton in 1971. The patronage coupons for these stores have been covered in the *Canadian Token*.

The Co-op always had financial problems and in March 1993 the United Co-operatives of Ontario were restructured and reorganized with Growmark as their American ownership. They also have a joint venture with Sunoco Ltd. for the sale of petroleum products and the new ethanol fuel products.

An advertising "gimmick" to promote gasoline sales was the introduction in 1991 of the "Co-bear" and "Bulldog". A new series of patronage coupons was printed and distributed through each of the 36 Co-op gas bars in Ontario. The backs of these coupons state they are redeemable at "any Co-op location in Ontario". All Co-op gasoline coupons, including the new series, were withdrawn upon the sale of the company effective 30 September 1993.

The backs of the coupons contain serial numbers which may have 5, 6, 7 or 10 digits and in several sizes of type font. The issuing location was also printed on the back. This is the list which was in the previous Newsletter and to which I now add.

ASSOCIATED SOCIETIES SAVINGS BANK OF HAMILTON

A small item related to the founding of this organization was inserted in the last issue, on page 46. Member Ross Irwin has furnished some additional information taken from a philatelic publication:

In the earlier reference (BNA Topics: September 1955), L. W. Sharpe, QC, writes,

"This was a 'penny' bank. Depositors bought stamps to the value of their deposits and these were stuck in their pass books. Presumably, when money was withdrawn, stamps to the value of the withdrawal were cancelled in the book.

The bank's premises were on James Street, near Barton Street, a desirable location, which is perhaps one of the reasons why this bank was absorbed by the Bank of Hamilton. It is also believed that the savings bank was not in too healthy a financial condition at that time, which is another reason for the Bank of Hamilton taking it over.

The Bank of Hamilton was itself absorbed by the Canadian Bank of Commerce many years ago, so it is probable that the Associated Societies Savings Bank flourished at about the turn of the century, if as late as that. I suppose its stamps should be considered as savings stamps, like our government wartime issues.

The second piece also comes from *BNA Topics*: July-August 1960. Ed Richardson recorded, "In our collection we have four varieties:

1¢ yellow

5¢ dark blue

1¢ pale purple

25¢ rose

These four varieties are all that are known to BNAPser Charles Armstrong who kindly loaned me his notes on these.

... I was able to obtain a 'Savings Card' of this organization, together with a number of these savings stamps attached, and subsequently cancelled. These cards hold only 18 stamps (6x3). When cancelled they were struck with a large handstamp covering a horizontal row of six. This has a frame and 'CANCEL' arranged so that one letter comes on each stamp in the row. This explains the large letters found on each of those in my collection. The card is dated on the reverse Sept. 1893-this being the first clue we have had as to their date of use."

Ross also published a brief article on this subject in the Oct. 1986 CPM Journal, page 117. It is illustrated with a 25ϕ stamp.

Material from this savings bank was sold in Jeffrey Hoare Auctions, sales #10 and #12. Perhaps interested collectors may be able to obtain some of the stamps and, with luck, the cards, from stamp dealers.

Universal Dollars

Introduction

In April 1990 I took several days off to accompany a friend to Prince Rupert on the B.C. Ferries. It is a very pleasant and restful drive up Vancouver Island and then twenty hours or so from Port Hardy to Prince Rupert on the ship. The trip also gave me the opportunity to get into the Prince Rupert City and Regional Archives to do a little research. After I had finished everything that I could think to do in the Archives, and having several hours still to kill before heading back to Victoria, I visited the Museum and then wandered about town. As I passed the Universal Stores I noticed a poster featuring scrip. I went in and was able to speak to Barbara Sweetnam, the Credit/Office Manager from whom I received a bit of information and several pieces of the current scrip. A subsequent letter¹, an interview with the founder's son, Doug Payne², and checking a few directories furnished enough information to produce this short article.

The Universal Stores

John Joseph Payne was born in 1887 in Tyrrellspass, County Westmeath, Ireland, a small town due west of Dublin in the middle of the country. He apprenticed in the drapery trade at Drogheda where he met his wife-to-be, Susan Mary Deacon. He served with the R.A.F. during the First World War, in a non-flying position. After Payne was released from the forces in 1920 he married his fiancée and moved to Vancouver. There he was able to secure work with David Spencer Ltd. By 1925 he was a clerk at A.I. Stoddart Ltd., a dry goods and department store at 2301 Granville. The next year, 1926, he was listed as the manager of the store, but then went out on his own, operating a small dry goods store in the Hasting Street Arcade at 138 West Hastings St. He was struggling in this store when he met James D. Fraser, who earlier had been burned out of his Williams Lake store, Fraser & Mackenzie, and then had tried Shawnigan Lake. Between the two they managed to scrape up some money and inventory and in 1927 purchased the dry goods business of the Rupert Table Supply Co. and Universal Trading located at 700 West 3rd Avenue (at 6th St.) in Prince Rupert. J.C. Cavigan retained the Rupert Table Supply Co., which was a grocery store moving it to 3rd Avenue and 3rd St.

The two partners called their store Fraser & Payne, setting aside the Universal Trading Co. name for a while. J.D. Fraser died in 1933 and his son Gordon carried on his half interest in the business. John Payne and his wife had two children, Doug and Betty. Doug started working for the company in 1938. He served in the Navy from 1942 until 1945, and Gordon Fraser was in for a bit longer time.

After the men returned from the war the firm expanded. In 1947 they opened a new store four blocks up 3rd Avenue, intending to close down the old place. They sent Doug to the old

store to hold a clearance sale. But business went on so well they decided to keep it open, and resurrected the Universal name. About this time they also opened a branch of Fraser & Payne in Terrace. Soon the Universal Store was doing better than Fraser & Payne. J.J. Payne retired in 1958 and moved to Victoria where he passed away in 1963.

By 1964 the company had purchased the Universal building. Some time not long after there was a fishermen's strike in the Prince Rupert area. Fraser was strongly against the strike and Payne supported it. Unfortunately, this led to a parting of the ways for the partners; Fraser carried on with Fraser & Payne, and Payne carried on with the Universal Store.

The early 1970's saw the company expand. They opened Jeans North within the Universal, then opened more Jeans North stores at Terrace (1973), Kitimat (1974), Rupert Square Mall in Prince Rupert (1976) and Smithers in 1979. The original Universal Store was renovated and doubled in size in 1975 which was the year that Doug sold out to his sons, Jack and Robert (Bob), and retired to Victoria. About three or four years later Jack bought out Bob who left the firm to concentrate on managing the family's other interests, such as the Empress Hotel, and more recent motel and hotel acquisitions.


Jack opened two Workwear World franchise operations in Prince Rupert and Terrace in 1981, but later changed them over to Universal Workwear stores which are now in Smithers, Terrace and Prince Rupert. Another name, The Cotton Company, is also used for special lines within the stores. The scrip which we will describe below is valid within all the stores.


In 1982 the company introduced their Universal Dollars. The scrip is expiry dated and given out as a discount. It can be used on any subsequent purchase. After the expiry dates the redeemed scrip is normally destroyed so only a few of the earlier issues were available. The 1990 dated set consisted of a 5¢, 10¢, 25¢, \$1 and \$5. The scrip is still being used.


The scrip is printed in black on green paper. The serial numbers are printed in red, as are the expiry dates and a denomination over-print on those issues from 1987 through 1989 which have been seen. The 1990 issue is somewhat more finely executed. The expiry date of the \$5 of 1987 was misprinted as 1978.

IN THE MARKETPLACE

Jeffrey Hoare Auctions Inc. Sale #50, 24 June 1995

This sale offered over 200 lots of Canadian paper money. Dominion notes were relatively few in number but of high quality, and most sold well. A novelty in this portion was the upper right corner of a 1901 \$5000 bank legal, which fetched \$180 against a \$200 estimate. This is probably as much as one could expect ever to obtain of an issued bank legal.

A good run of Bank of Canada notes resulted in high prices for some nice 1935 notes, while later issues generally sold below estimate. The sale featured no fewer than three of the rare \$5 1979 test notes. There was an unusually rich array of "solid" numbered notes, about fifty notes in all, most of them selling for over \$100 each.

There were fewer chartered bank notes in the sale than usual, and these, together with a selection of proof and specimen notes, achieved the customary mixed results. A rare Banque de St. Hyacinthe note highlighted this section of the sale.

Prices realized do not include commission or taxes.
