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

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
Banks, Banking and Bank Notes In Manitoba

The history of banking in Manitoba covers a relatively short period of time. Up until Manitoba joined Confederation in 1870, it was ruled by the Hudson's Bay Company, and the only money in circulation consisted of notes issued by them and a mixture of British and American coinage. When the Hudson's Bay Company relinquished control they redeemed their outstanding notes, and these were to be replaced by Canadian currency.

Because the Riel rebellion had only just recently ended, the government was reluctant to send much money, because of uncertainty whether or not there was still some danger, as they did not want it captured by any remnants of the rebellion. As a result they asked the Hudson's Bay Company to pay the troops that had been sent out, which they did with their own notes.

The HBC notes were all supposed to have been withdrawn in 1870 but I have one example of a one pound note dated 1871. This is likely one of the notes issued to pay the troops. The government did send a supply of one and two dollar notes, but as a precaution they were stamped in Winnipeg with the word "MANITOBA," presumably so they could refuse them if they fell into the wrong hands. These overprinted notes are very rare, with only three ones and two twos known to have survived.

The first Assistant Receiver General for Manitoba was Gilbert McMicken, who was appointed in 1871. He also held the position of Dominion Lands Agent, Dominion Auditor and Manager of the Dominion Government Savings Bank. McMicken was born in Scotland but immigrated to Canada and became involved in politics in Ontario before he moved west in 1871. His son, Alexander McMicken, came with him and after a short stint at the Government Savings Bank he started his own private bank. A few cheques drawn on his bank have survived.

The Dominion Government never issued bank notes payable at Winnipeg such as the ones for Toronto, Montreal,

Halifax, St. John and Victoria, although there were apparently 150 notes of the 1871 \$500 and \$1000 issue printed but none have survived. The finance department did send a supply of the 1878 issue to Winnipeg to be signed by the Assistant Receiver General in Winnipeg but these had the "Payable at Toronto" back. These were signed by Henry Mowatt Drummond, who succeeded Gilbert McMicken in 1878. Drummond obviously did not have access to a proper cutting machine and the notes are poorly cut with scissors.

There were no chartered banks headquartered in Winnipeg in the 1870's although there were several private bankers, the most notable of which was Alloway & Champion. They had several branches in Winnipeg and one in Portage La Prairie, and lasted until 1921 when they were taken over by the Canadian Bank of Commerce. Alloway reportedly made a lot of his money trading in government land scrip. Land scrip entitled the bearer to purchase Crown lands and was issued in various denominations from \$20 to \$500. They were given to Métis to settle land claims and apparently Alloway and others would buy them up for a bottle of whiskey or some other trinket. Hence the recent claims by Métis that they were cheated out of their land.

There were several attempts to start a chartered bank in Winnipeg. The Bank of Manitoba was chartered in 1872 but never got off the ground. Similarly, there was the North Western Bank incorporated in 1882 with Winnipeg as its head office. The following year it moved its head office to Toronto and changed its name to The British Canadian Bank. It never operated but there are proofs of \$5 and \$10 notes so they must have come close. There were three attempts to start a Bank of Winnipeg, one in 1884, and again in 1903 and 1908, and another Manitoba Bank in 1882. None of these ever went into business. Then there was the Colonial Bank of Canada, which was incorporated in 1906 and then tried to change its name to the National Bank of Canada. It tried to raise money from small shareholders in western Canada but it too failed to get off the ground, and gave up in 1907.

The first successful chartered bank in Winnipeg was the Commercial Bank of Manitoba, which grew out of the private bank of McArthur, Boyle and Campbell. They were incorporated in 1885 and had two note issues, one in 1885 and another in 1891. Unfortunately, like many banks at the time, they were heavily invested in real estate and when the market collapsed they were in trouble. They went into receivership in 1893. However, the liquidator was very patient and took almost ten years to wind up the bank's affairs, eventually realizing a decent price

for most of the real estate. As a result, all of the bank's creditors were paid. Virtually all of the notes were redeemed, with less than \$6000 of the bank's notes not accounted for and issued notes are virtually non-existent. I know of only one uncancelled issued note in private hands although there are cancelled notes in the National Currency Collection.

The next bank to have any success was the Northern Bank, which went into business in 1905. It developed a network of branches across the west and was well capitalized. In 1908 it absorbed the struggling Crown Bank of Canada, which was headquartered in Toronto and changed its name to the Northern Crown Bank. Notes issued by the Crown Bank are extremely rare. The CPMS Note Registry reports that there are only six \$5 notes known, all in private hands. The Northern Bank issued bank notes in 1905 but because of the change of name in 1908 these were mostly redeemed and are rare today, with only about \$3,000 shown as still outstanding. Only one \$5 note and one \$10 note are known to be in private hands. They were apparently planning another Northern Bank issue in 1908 as there are models in existence for a new back produced by the American Bank Note Company. In 1908 and again in 1914 notes were issued bearing the Northern Crown name and these, although rare in top condition, turn up from time to time. There are still approximately \$37,000 of their notes outstanding. The Northern Crown Bank was acquired by the Royal Bank of Canada in 1918 and had 111 branches at the time.


The largest bank to be headquartered in Winnipeg was the Union Bank of Canada, which transplanted itself from Quebec City in 1912. It was originally incorporated provincially as The Union Bank of Lower Canada in 1865. It changed its name to the Union Bank of Canada in 1886. According to Bob Graham it was the first chartered bank to open a branch in Alberta, and at its peak it had 329 branches, mostly in western Canada. It was a prolific note issuer and its 1907 and 1912 issues with the farming scene on the \$5 and the cowboys on the \$10 are very popular with collectors. There are a number of signature and printing varieties of each denomination. In 1921 the bank changed the design of their notes to feature bank executives. These proved to be unpopular and they reissued the 1912 notes but bearing the signatures of the new General Manager, J. W. Hamilton, and W. R. Allan as president. These bear the imprint of the Canadian Bank Note Company whereas the previous issue is from the American Bank Note Co. The bank was apparently going to issue them bearing the date 1924 as there is a black and white proof with this date in the National Currency Collection. However, these were never printed as the bank was acquired by the Royal Bank of Canada in 1925 and discussions must have been going on in 1924.

The Union Bank Tower, which was the first steel frame "skyscraper" in western Canada, was turned into the Royal Bank's main branch in Winnipeg. The Royal Bank moved to new headquarters at Portage & Main and the building now houses a portion of Red River Community College.

The last attempt to headquarter a bank in Winnipeg was 1966, when Jimmy Coyne, recently ousted Governor of the Bank of Canada, incorporated The Bank of Western Canada. He was backed by a number of local investors but because of infighting among the directors as to the

direction the bank should take, Coyne resigned, and without him the bank never go off the ground. No one has tried to start a bank in Winnipeg since.

A Puzzling Note From The Bank Of Western Canada

The Bank of Western Canada 1859 \$2 shown here was purchased in the Heritage Auction in September 2012. No fewer than three additions were overprinted or stamped on the note after it was printed.

The most striking overprint is OCT., applied vertically on the face, at the left. I do not recall seeing such an overprint previously. The purpose of overprinting with the abbreviation for a month escapes me completely. But the mystery deepens. There is some very curious work on the T of TWO DOLLARS, which is even more challenging to explain. Finally, there is stamped on the back, a black ornate symbol in the form of the letter "J," just to the right of the OWT protector.

Were all or any of these marks applied for some useful purpose? Any plausible explanation would be very welcome.



Notes Of The Gore Bank

An impressive amount of information on the Gore Bank has already been published in readily accessible sources. A richly detailed history of the bank, well illustrated with images of notes, head office building, portraits of the bank's officers—and the bank's keys and blunderbuss, of all things—can be found in Volume 1 of *The History of the Canadian Bank of Commerce*, by Victor Ross (1920). Ross devotes a total of almost a hundred pages to the Gore Bank, including a brief discussion of the notes and a statistical description of the Gore District in 1836. C. F. E. Carpenter presented an outline of the bank's history in the C. P. M. *Journal* for January 1966. I wrote an article entitled "The Decline of the Gore Bank," which dealt with the bank's painful final years; it was published in the Spring 1992 issue of our *Journal*. My article, "Gleanings from the Gore Bank Note Register," published in the 2001 Annual *Journal*, recorded details of note printing, numbering, signing and ultimate destruction.

About all that remains is to give the collecting community a reasonably clear picture of the availability of Gore Bank notes. It is hoped that this article will supply that need.

Experience will soon convince the interested collector that Gore Bank notes are extremely difficult to acquire. A glance at the listings will reveal that they are quite rare, and a slightly closer look will show that the surviving notes are largely held by institutional collections, making them that much more difficult to obtain. I was fortunate to purchase my small group of notes intact twenty years ago from an accomplished collector and very good friend, who was then in his mid-eighties. I have been unable to add a single note since then.

The surviving notes are recorded below by denomination, subdivided according to whether the date is partially or fully engraved.

The Charlton catalogue listing for a genuine 1852 \$4 in Good is tenuously based on a note in the 1971 CNA Sale. Without an image, it was not possible to rule out that the note might be genuine. Upon reflection, this seems highly unlikely. A notation on the back of the note requested that the Toronto branch redeem the note. The Gore Bank had no Toronto branch, so the reference must have been to the successor bank, the Canadian Bank of Commerce. Had the note been redeemed, it would have been cancelled and destroyed, or else deposited in the bank's archival collection. The fact that it was still available in 1971 enables us reasonably to assume that the note was found to be a counterfeit and returned to the owner, unpaid. The number of this note was not provided in the sale catalogue. It may very well be included among the notes listed in the register of counterfeit \$4 notes, near the end of this article.

Merchants Bank Of Canada Note Register

The Merchants Bank of Canada employed many exquisite designs, and their notes are magnificent to behold.

Lists of surviving notes of the 1900 and 1919 issues have already been published in CPMS Newsletters by Harry Eisenhauer, and have been updated in the 2013 Registry. We shall now fill in the remaining twentieth century issues. It must be understood that the notes of the 1906 issue, and to some extent the 1916 issue, are reasonably plentiful and there are likely to be quite a few more notes to be recorded.

BABN ISSUE OF 1906—1907

The 1906 \$5 and \$10 are the most easily obtainable notes of the Merchants Bank of Canada, but lower grades prevail.

The Foundation financed the publishing costs of Chris Faulkner's book The Holey Dollars and Dumps of Prince Edward Island. An important initiative of the Foundation is the offer of four \$3000 scholarships at four Canadian universities enabling students to study numismatics or related studies. One student at Laval University is doing an archaeological dig at Three Rivers to study early commerce there through the discovery of coins, tokens, etc.
