The move was made necessary by the exciting renewal of interest in numismatics and the response to the varied programmes offered by the Central Coin Club. An outstanding talk was given by Cale B. Jarvis, F. R. N. W. which created a great deal of interest and resulted in a lively discussion period at the end of his speech.

The Club President, Larry McNeill, conducted a large auction of choice material and was ably assisted by Vince Doran and Bob Shillingsworth executive members. The dealers reported a brisk business particularly in the Canadian Decimal series. Paper money was featured by two of the dealers. Collectors are cordially invited to attend meetings which are held every Monday at 8:00 p.m. Ample free parking is provided and the location easily accessible by public transportation.

OTTAWA COIN CLUB

A joint meeting of the Ottawa Coin Club and Capital City Coin Club was held Monday, December 11, 1967 at the Chateau Laurier Hotel at 8:00 p.m. The minutes of the two clubs last meetings were adopted as read on a motion by Guy Potter, seconded by Hec Dagenais, carried. Major Sheldon Carroll gave a brief history of both clubs and mentioned that the oldest coin club in Ottawa was The Numismatic Society of Ottawa which operated in the 1890's. He then moved that the Ottawa and Capital City Coin Clubs merge under the terms of the ballot that was sent out to members of both clubs, the terms were:

- 1. That the name of the new club should be "City of Ottawa Coin Club"
- 2. That the President of the C. N. A. be requested to allow the new club to retain "Chapter #1" in the C. N. A.
- 3. That the funds and assets of each club be pooled into one treasury.
- 4. That the necessary changes be made in the Constitution.
- 5. That a joint meeting be held Dec. 11, to finalize the union of the clubs. This motion was seconded by Paul Sullivan, carried. Jack Roberts then read a reply to a letter he had sent to Vic Snell the president of the C. N. A. regarding point #2.---- the C. N. A. dropped the club chapters in 1956.

Bernie Lalonde then moved that the present officers of the Capital City Coin Club with the addition of Tom Beatty and John MacPhee as directors take over management of the new club, this motion seconded by John Orach, carried.

Guy Potter moved that all members in the Ottawa Valley who join the new Club before April 1, 1968 will have their C. N. A. dues paid by the club for 1968: if they have

already paid their 1968 C. N. A. dues, the club will then pay their 1969 C. N. A. dues. Life members of the C. N. A. will have their City of Ottawa Coin Club dues paid for two years, this motion was seconded by Tom Sullivan, carried.

H. A. Burton moved that our club fees should be \$3.00 per year, this was seconded by Hec Daganais, carried. Hec Daganais moved that the necessary requipment be purchased to operate the club and to print a monthly bulletin. This purchase is not to exceed \$350.00. This motion was seconded by H. A. Burton, carried. Tom Sullivan moved that a constitution committee be set up to rewrite the constitution, the committee will be Chairman Ed Forrest, John MacPhee, Paul Sullivan. Paul Sullivan moved that Mr. Norval Parker, the Master of the Royal Canadian Mint retain in the new club the Honourary Life Membership he held in the Capital City Coin Club, this motion was seconded by Major Sheldon Carroll, carried.

The next meeting of the City of Ottawa Coin Club will be held January 15, 1968. The meeting closed at 10:00 p. m. Paul Sullivan, Acting Secretary.

Human Faces on Coins

In a collection of coins, you have a unique contemporary portrait gallery of the leaders of the world - its heroes, emperors, kings, queens, dictators, tyrants; some to whom we might give our highest praise; other faces we see might well adorn a chamber of horrors. How elegant are some of the old familiar faces as we see them on their coins? Augustus, the clear cold master of the world; Nero, with his lustful, cruel features, yet withal an artist on his finely struck first brass; the Antonines pass by us in the golden age of Rome, and their grave, kindly faces look out at us, filled with wisdom and the Roman gravitis.

On Roman coins over three hundred different portraits appear, and every one is so individualized in character that the fatures identify them rather than the inscriptions. You may think that when you have acquired a portrait of Cleopatra on a gold or silver Roman coin (and such coins are not uncommon), you would at least acquire a thing of beauty. But you would be disappointed in this. Cleopatra on a coin is anything but a thing of beauty. Her prominent feature is a decidedly hooked nose. It was her other qualities than her physical beauty that were irresistible.

The assasination of Caesar is chronicled on coins in stages, as in a Gazette. First, in a long succession of copper coins, we see him Consul, the Imperator, Dictator for the First, the second, the third time, finally, last and greatest step of all — "Dictator Perpetuo". But now he goes one step too far, and the actual downfall of Caesar we might date from the time, when, by senatorial decree, a silver coin is struck, and in place of the head of Rome, or the Dioscuri (the heavenly twins who appeared like angels of Mons in battle in Rome's direct need) we see on the coins the actual features of Caesar. Before Caesar, the utmost that a Roman dared was to place the face of some illustrious ancestor on his coins; but then in the heroic age of Rome that illustrious ancestor was invariably associated with the brave days of old and the great deeds that were wrought for Rome. For a living mortal man to place his features where God's and national heroes alone had held pride of place, such a thing was ominous for the republic, and fatally ominous for Caesar.

Meanwhile, what had been happening on the other side, in the camp of his enemies, some personal enemies, others perhaps still more to be feared were enemies to a dictatorship? Brutus, significantly enough, had been issuing coins, while the power of Caesar was growing, with Liberty, always Liberty, figuring on them. Liberty becomes a perpetual theme and once Caesar has stumbled across the Rubicon by displaying his living features on a coin, boldly and unashamed, the other leaders accept the challenge, and their heads appear, thrust into public prominence. We then find coins bearing the actual features of Pompey, Brutus, Cassius with "lean and hungry look", Antony, the young Octavius, the future leader of them all, and so the game went on.

WINDOW TAX - This was a tax levied on all home-owners in England, whose houses had six or more windows. It dates from William III, 1695 and it's purpose was to defray the cost of the great recoinage coinage, that was necessary owing to the defacing and clipping of the old hammered coinage. Today one can still see where windows, in many old English homes, have been bricked up, to avoid or lessen the unpopular tax.

Did You Know that:

<u>Wildcat Money</u> - Got its name from the issuance of certificates of legal tender as a bounty for the killing of wolves, panthers and wildcats in Missouri in 1816. Later the term wildcat was used for notes of questionable banks. Wildcat banking ended in 1866.

Redbacks - Were notes of banks organized under the free banking act of 1838. The notes had a large red decorative stamp on the back.

<u>Phantom Banks</u> - Added to the currency problem in Canada in the 19th century by issuing "good" paper money. These "banks" printed beautiful notes on the finest paper and passed them in the U. S. Phantom banks had no offices, no officers, no shareholders or directors and no charter or authority to do business - all they had was "good" bogus bank notes, printed in the U. S., and a profit.

Franklin despised the eagle and bitterly opposed its uses as a device on any U. S. coin. He claimed it was a symbol of laziness and stupidity. He preferred the turkey. The eagle won out and by law must appear on the half dollar. Perhaps this will account for the diminuitive eagle on the Franklin half dollar.

The Royal Canadian Mint in Ottawa is Canada's only mint. Completed in 1907 The Royal Canadian Mint has steadily increased its production from 20 million coins in 1931 to 130 million coins in the first 6 months of 1962. Like its counterparts in the U. S. the mint co-operates with collectors and numismatists all over the world, and although some Canadian coins are the most beautiful ever minted — the Mint Master is a stamp collector.

EX LIBRIS

The following article by F. Bell is taken from the March 1966 issue of Seaby's Coin & Medal Bulletin, and is a reminder that although some collectors deplore the present content of our coinage, it could be a great deal worse.

"Tin, pewter and lead constitute a trio unbeloved by the numismatist. All three are soft and easily marked and all lack the art of growing old gracefully.

Tin has been employed only once in the English coinage. In 1676 there was a sharp fall in the price of Cornish tin and it was in the nature of a relief measure that in 1684 an order was made for a coinage of halfpence and farthings in tin. Farthings alone were struck in the reign of Charles 11 but not without a considerable profit to the crown, for a pound of tin, value eightpence, was at a cost of fourpence converted into coins with a face value of twenty pence. Both farthings and halfpence were struck in the reign of James 11 and William and Mary. The issues were unpopular and lent themselves to wholesale forgery and no more coins were produced after 1692. By that time over £65,000 had been issued and with a profit of at least one third of the amount. In 1693 the copper coinage was resumed and the contractors for this were required to accept in exchange up to \$200 a week of tin coins.

The carliest tin farthing bears on the obverse a bust of Charles 11 and the legend Carolvs A Carolo and on the reverse Britannia. The edge bears the inscription NVANORVA FAMVLVS (the servant of the coinage), and date. In the centre of the coin is a copper plug which was said to minimize the danger of forgery but that this was the actual reason is doubtful as many tin medals of the period are similarly plugged. Certainly it was a most unfortunate feature since the atmospheric oxidation of tin, which is normally negligible is greatly accelerated by contact with the much less electropositive copper (householders who have had a galvanized tank connected to a water supply by copper piping will be aware how serious electrochemical corrosion can be).

In a very short time most of the coins had assumed a sorry appearance and there has been no temptation to repeat the experiment of a tin coinage.

Tin medals are subject to an additional hazard. The compact metal with which everyone is familiar, so-called white tin, becomes unstable below 18 degrees C. and tends to go over to another modification, grey tin, which occupies about 25% greater bulk, and forms a grey powder. Normally the transformation is excessively slow but the velocity is increased by lowering the temperature. In the severe winter of 1867-68 the blocks of tin stored in the customs house at Petrograd disintegrated completely into this grey powder. The "tin plague" is infectious and can be communicated from a stricken article to a sound one. Medals smitten by tin plague are well illustrated in an article on "Die Museumkrankheit" by Ernst Cohen in a journal rarely consulted by numismatists (Zeitschrift fur Physikalische Chemie, 1908, 63, 625).

Reference to "Medallic Illustrations" shows that lead medals have a long history, certainly going back as far as James 1V, 1513 and Henry VIII, 1542. Lead has two attractive qualities - its cheapness and low melting point (325 C.) Both have doubtless determined its use on many occasions. One cannot help but be struck by the fact that many of the most vivid portrait medals of Anne Boleyn, Henry VIII and Edward VI, tend to be without a reverse and to exist as single specimens only. It is tempting to assume that in such cases the "medal" represents a cast from some object not primarily designed as a die. Other lead medals may represent proofs of unfinished dies, or to be intended for use as tokens or advertisements. The cheapness of the metal also allowed for a wide circulation of a medal, such as that of the Seven Bishops, 1688, prepared propaganda purposes. Lead medals exist in both cast and struck forms.

Pewter from the middle ages until the nineteenth century was a tinrich alloy of tin and lead. When lead is added to tin the melting point is depressed from 232 C to a minimum value of 182 C when 375 has been added. This eases the trouble of casting and at the same time lowers the

cost, increases the strength, and diminishes the liability to tinplague. Standard English pewter contained 80% of tin. Dutch medallists were using pewter at an early date. The medals Subservience of France and Spain, 1655, and Michael de Ruyter 1666, were issued in gold, silver, and pewter. The Dutch example was followed by others and Smeltzing used it for some of the medals he made in England, e.g. the opening of the Scottish Parliament, 1685.

Pewter appeared as a coinage metal in the 1rish campaign of the dethroned James 11. In 1690, James issued a pewter crown with an inscribed edge, and also, pewter pennies and halfpence.

Pewter as a medium for the mass production of medals was completely eclipsed by the much better wearing bronze as soon as powerful machines became available for its manipulation. Perhaps, however, some will remember with pleasure the lead medals which were presented in 1911 to almost all school children to mark the coronation of George V.

Page 18 ENGLAND'S SPADE GUINEA

One of the longest reigns in history was that of England's King George 111, who reigned from 1760 to 1820, a period of considerable significance to the student of numismatics.

When George Ill ascended the throne, silver was already in short supply and by 1797, there was such a scarcity that the Bank of England bought up Spanish "pieces of eight". These pieces bore the head of Charles Ill or IV of Spain, but were made official for use in England by countermarking them with the portrait of George Ill.

It has been said in jest, "The Bank to make their Spanish dollar pass, stamped the head of a fool on the head of an ass." Another saying, "The first half pence presents such a face as human beings never wore, putting out something in the likeness of a macaw," was also a reflection on the poor quality of the first half pence issue for George 111, dated 1770.

Gold was also very scarce during the reign of George III, so we see that no two or five guinea pieces were minted. These would not be missed too much though as they were of such high value that they were not circulated much. The guinea was used much more and $1,\frac{1}{2}$ and $\frac{1}{2}$ guinea values were minted for various dates of this reign.

In 1787, the well-known "spade Guinea" was issued. The reverse of this coin, consisting of a spade-shaped crowned shield is considered a work of art and has been most popular with coin collectors in both the British coinage and World Gold coinage fields.

Unfortunately, the counterfeiters also admired this beautiful coin and brought out their own version, in brass. Many of the bright brass imitations were passed for gold.

The odd thing about these counterfeits is that many carry a date of 1701, many years before the beginning of the reign of George 111. It has been explained that the counterfeiters thought they could not be charged with forgery, as they had not made an exact copy. Counterfeiting of gold or silver coins was a serious crime in those days, punishable by death. The severity of the penalty probably accounts for the fact that few counterfeits of most coins of higher values are to be found, plus the fact that all counterfeit coins would be destroyed immediately if discovered by government or mint authorities.

Fielding once said "Make money your God, and it will plague you like the devil". This seemed to be true in the case of George 111. He made a disastrous decision trying to tax the American colonies. The colonies secured their independence on July 4, 1776, which was a great blow to the king. In 1811 he was declared insane and the Prince of Wales was appointed Regent. (A few 2 and 5 guinea pieces were struck but never circulated.

CANADIAN TYPE COINS

Bill English

In order to decide which coins in the Canadian series, or any other series, fall into the category of a type coin, an explanation on the minting process is necessary. Most collectors agree that any change in design from previous strikings should be considered a type.

Once a design for a coin is approved an over-sized plaster model is made from which the master die is finally made. All working dies are made from this master by first using a transfer die, (matrice), to make the working die. Once the design on the master is decided upon it is hardened and from then on all coins produced from that die will be identical. This design will then be considered a type design.

The transfer die is made from soft metal and hardened and then the same process is used on the working die. Since there are two steps to produce the working die from the master many changed have occurred in the copying process which result in changes in design on the actual coin but should not be considered type coin changes.

Coins which most collectors now consider as type would not qualify. The 1947 Maple Leaf design, the 1936 dot, the many variations in date spacing in the 1940-1950, fifty cent series and so on. In each case something has been added to either the transfer or working dies and not to the master die.

Type coins on the other hand are the result of changes in the master die, Changes in monarch: George V1 to Elizabeth 11: change in design: Elizabeth 11 young head, Elizabeth 11, crowned head; 1937 dot five cents; 1913 large and small leaf, ten cents: 1948; legend

on all coins.

All of the above coins are called mullcd coins which is the combination of one or more designs for one side of the coin coupled with a common design on the other side. This combination can occur during one year or may be a change which will occur during a series.

There are also type coins where both obverse and reverse changes were made in the same year. Examples of this are 1891, large cents; 1953, five cents; 1965 silver dollars. The 1891 cent had a changed legend and date size. The 1953 had the no shoulder strap and strap design with changes in legend design as well, and a change of location of date, high and low. 1965 dollars were changed on the obverse both in the design of the queen and the surface of the coin, one coin having a concave design with large beads, the other a flat surface with smaller beads. The shape of the 5 in the date was changed on the reverse.

Other changes that constitute a type coin are well illustrated in the Canadian five cent series, size, small and large: change in metal; silver, nickel, Tombac, chrome plated steel: change in shape, round and twelve-sided.

The type coins used as examples are only a few that come to mind and are used to illustrate how many doubts can be put forth on what constitutes a type coin or not-----

RULES OF THE AVARD OF MEIT

The Committee shall consist of the chairman, appointed by the president of the O.N.A., as well as two other members chosen by the chairman.

The Award of Merit shall be limited to residents of the Province of Ontario, of either sex.

The committee will make its recommendations to the executive, and the Award of Merit shall be made to the person, in the opinion of the executive as a whole, who has contributed the most to the understanding research, writings, and advancement of numismatics in general.

The Award of Merit shall not necessarily be awarded each year, unless someone in Ontario has made a significant contribution to the advancement of numismatics. This award shall not be given more than once to the same individual unless his (or her) second contribution be considerably different from the first.

The request for submissions of eligible names for this award, shall be published in the last issue each year of The Ontario Numismatist.

The final date on which names will be accepted for consideration shall be May 1st. The committee shall then meet and make recommendations and summaries to the executive of the 0.N.A. The chairman shall submit his secret ballot in a sealed envelope to the secretary of the 0.N.A. The decision by secret ballot of the executive and chairman shall then be final and remain confidential.

The secretary shall submit a sealed envelope to the supplier of the medals, so that the recipient's name and year of award may be engraved thereon. A written summary of the achievement of the recipient shall be provided to the secretary for O.N.A. records and a copy to the person making the presentation. 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CANADIAN TYPE COINS

(Continued)

To show a complete type set of coins as the requirements for a display of this nature would be practically impossible for most collectors. Therefore type sets could be made up of one coin of each denomination showing size alone. This would include a large cent, a small cent, a silver five cent piece, a round nickel, a Tombac nickel, a ten cent piece, a twenty cent piece, a twenty-five cent piece, a fifty cent piece, a dollar, five, ten and twenty dollar gold pieces and a Canadian sovereign. 1968 would add a change in size of a fifty cent and dollar coin.

Type sets could be made of all denominations of one monarch, or a type set of Monarchs or a type set of any one denomination. The most popular type set has been the commemorative coins of Canada which until 1967 included a 1951 nickel and the rest silver dollars. This display would now be complete only with the 1967 set of coins included. A collector who has been fortunate enough to collect proof-like sets could make a type set of proof-like coins from 1953 to date.

The 1967 series is an interesting centennial type set of coins. To be complete it should include the twenty dollar gold piece and the silver medallion, even though the medallion is not a coin, it is part of the centennial mint issue of coins.

The diversity of a type set of Canadian coins is such that no one can say exactly which particular coins constitute a type set. Diversity there is, thank goodness, so the collector

may choose a type display to fit his collecting interest and pocket book.

I hope that it is clear that a display of coins can be complete without having all the coins listed as type coins as long as the theme or series or particular specific grouping is complete. A good example of what I am trying to say is illustrated by a display of 1947 maple leaf coins. As I explained I do not believe these coins were produced from a master die and therefore, do not fall into the Canadian type coin listing. On the other hand, as a group of coins they are all related by a common bond of the maple leaf. They could be displayed as a type of coin but not as a Canadian type set. The different sevens in the fifty cent pieces and the dollars, which I believe were punched into the working dies (subject to confirmation from the mint) would eliminate these coins from the Canadian Type Coin category.

The re-engraving and variation in location of date numbers in the Victorian coins and the fifty cent series of the 1940's and the 1926 far, medium and close six, five cent piece also indicate a change on the working die rather than a new master die.

We are including a separate sheet listing the Canadian Type Coins. We invite your suggestions (with reasons) for any changes you feel are necessary. For any member wishing another copy of the list, please send a self-addressed envelope to Bill English, Box 4, Waterloo, Ontario.

On the lighter side of numismatics -- being an excerpt from Seaby's Coin and Medal Bulletin, entitled "Collector's Piece by Oliver Warner.

"When I was a young collector, keen and green, I went to hear a paper given to members of a local Coin and Medal Society. The speaker was elderly and distinguished. He was well known, a antiquarian, gruff, sparing of words, and he had the reputation of being reserved in all his relationships.

His subject that evening was the work of Thomas Simon, an artist, who in the time of Cromwell and Charles 11, produced a series of coins medals and seals which, so the numismatic world agrees, have never been bettered by any engraver in this country. He produced some choice examples from his own cabinets, and after the meeting was over, braving a rebuff, I had the nerve to ask if I could examine one or two of the items more closely.

Something in my enthusiasm must have appealed to V. for, much to my surprise and pleasure, he asked me whether I would like to visit him one day, to see the fuller range of his possessions. We made a firm arrangement, and in due course I went.

This was the first of many meetings which in course of time grew almost into a habit. V. did not thaw on better acquaintance, for a certain dryness was ingrained, but he was invaluable to a student, for he had so much, knew so much, and was always to the point. His home was a treasure store which I grew to know well. There was scarcely a thing in it unfitted for a museum, but the coins were the cream of the cream. Moreover, while V. know a certain amount about several branches of collecting, on coins he spoke ex cathedra. Now and a sin he would sell me a duplicate, always at a fair valuation. Sometimes he even allowed me what was almost a bargain.

V. and his wife were childless. Mrs. V. was a scholar, though her interests did not extend to coins. She would receive me kindly, be present at the single ceremonial glass of sherry or marsala with which V. liked to accompany our discussions and then she would fade away.

As years went by, my visits grew less and then ceased altogether. V. grew older still, infirmity came to him, and he ceased to receive anyone at all. When he died it was only natural to wonder what would become of his collection.

About six months after the funeral I was surprised to receive a note from V.'s widow asking me to call. After an absence of about two years lfound that nothing had changed. Evidently there would be no sale until after Mrs. V.'s demise. Her manner was warmer than before and after the usual greetings and enquiries she led me into the study where V. had kept the coin cabinets. There she offered me a glass of sherry from the cut-glass decanter. As I sipped it I wondered if it had been disturbed apart from dusting since V.'s death.

"You must be wondering, said Mrs. V.
"why I suggested you should call, but
V. used to enjoy your visits so much,
I thought you might like something to
remember him by".

At this sentence my heart gave a bound, perhaps Mrs. V. would offer me an item from the Cromwell cabinet, and if she did, what would I dare suggest? I knew exactly what I wanted most, the excessively rare fifty shilling piece, but that was gold, and was ruled out as altogether too valuable. It would have to be the half-crown of 1656, which a dealer would have described as VF/EF - Yes I sighed to myself, it would have to be the halfcrown.

Mrs. V. turned toward the cabinet, and then she took a cigar box which stood to one side. She placed it in my hands. "There", she said, "I'm sure my husband would have been glad for you to have this little souvenir of your meetings".

I bowed, and was dismissed as kindly as I had been greeted. Perhaps... I thought, but I was wrong. The box was half full of very, very dry cigars, and there was no little surprise of any kind concealed beneath them. Collectors become steeled against mischances, and they soon forget them in the delight of bargain or discovery, but somehow, when I now think of V., it is old tobacco, not Thomas Simon, which first comes to mind."

BRITAIN GOES DECIMAL

On 15th February 1971 Great Britain's currency goes decimal. But already they have begun to make the change. Two coins --- five and ten "new penny" pieces equivalent to an old shilling and florin respectively came into use 23rd April 1968.

All the new series will bear the crowned head of Queen Elizabeth ll facing right on the obverse. This is a new bust by Mr. Christopher Ironside. The reverse designs are quite striking and show that considerable thought was given to the use of the available space.

A thistle surmounted by a crown stands as the reverse device above a large numeral "5" on the five new-pence piece. And the inscription, common to the whole series, is "NEW PENCE". To facilitate changing over, this coin is minted on the same size flange as its equivalent, the one shilling piece.

Similarly, the ten new-pence piece has the numeral "10" at the bottom of the reverse with a crowned lion as the device. It is also struck the same size as its equivalent, the florin. These reverse designs were also by Mr. Ironside.

But Britannia is to be banished from British coinage. Mr. J. H. James, Deputy Master of the Royal Mint, said: We did rather regret we haven't got Britannia, but the lady doesn't sit very well on top of a large numeral.

Perhaps, though, it is just as well. For despite her patriotic associations, Britannia is not quite respectable. She appeared first about 120 AD on coins of Hadrian and Antoninus Pius struck to celebrate their achievements in Britain. But the first use on British coins was 1661 --- The copper coinage of Charles 11. The designer was John Roettier of Antwerp and he used as a model a certain Miss Stewart, the King's mistress. In 1663 Pepys had said that the King had "become besotted with Miss Stewart and will be with her half an hour together kissing her". Later Miss Stewart eloped to become the Duchess of Richmond. In 1895 she was replaced by a portrait of Britannia for which the model was Lady Susan Hicks-Beach, the daughter of the Chancellor of the Exchequer.

In our club we have members who collect and display coins according to their preference and I believe that if they were to become engaged in discussing their preference, each would have information which would be educational to all.

THE CASTING COUNTER

"Sing a song of six pence, a pocket full of rye", begins a familiar nursery rhyme. The second verse tells us, "The king was in his counting house counting out his money." I do not know which king this tale refers to. It is a fact of history, though, that Charles the. Bold of Burgundy was often present in his Chambers des Finances checking his accounts. In the diary of Olivier de la Marche, 1474, we read. "Luy mesme siet au bureau (reckoning-table) a ung bout, jecte et calcule comme les autres; et n'y a difference en eulx en iceluy exercite sinon que le duc jecte de jectoirs d'or, et les autres d'argent."

What, then, are these "jectoirs", or "jettons"? And how were they used?

The term <u>jetton</u> is often misunderstood and misapplied. Numismatic items that are neither medal nor money have all at various times been called jettons. But this is not correct.

Jetton is connected with the French verb "jeter" which, in the 13th century meant "to push". (Only in more recent years has it come to mean "to throw, toss".) Jettons, then, were metal discs used in a system of calculation which consisted of shifting these counters from one position to another on the counting-board.

Charles the Bold had jettons of gold and silver. But far more commonly they were struck in copper, bronze, latten (an alloy of about 60 parts copper, 30 parts zinc and 10 parts lead), brass and, occasionally, lead. They are

almost always round; but in the 18th century there appeared some struck from octagonal flans and fewer from hexagonal flans. In size they ranged from our 1ϕ piece to our 50ϕ piece, the majority being of the larger size. Generally speaking they were thinner than coins, but there was much variation.

However, characteristically jettons are "medal-struck" and struck in low relief. The former shows their close relations with medals. The latter is a practical matter -- in order that they might easily be shifted on the cloth or table.

The terms describing these pieces are as varied as the types. But most common are: "jetton" (English), "jeton" (modern French), "getz" (middle French), "Worpghelt" (casting-coin" in Low German), "recken-pennig" (also German) and "legpennig" ("laid-penny" in Frisian). In England they are commonly called by the misleading name of "abbey-pieces". Without a doubt they were used for casting accounts in religious houses, as elsewhere, but the great majority of those found in England are off the type imported from Nuremburg at the end of the 16th century -- a time when English abbeys no longer existed.

The Totem Pole - a religious and tribal emblem of North American Indians, especially peculiar to the Indians of the coastal regions of British Columbia - was selected to mark the 100th anniversary of the creation of British Columbia as a Grown Colony and of the 1858 gold rush. It seems as if the "potlatch", also called the "celebration" pole would have suited the purpose better because on this pole the central figure concerned gave away all his worldly possessions, and a pole of this kind seems to memorialize the occasion.

News Release from Department of Finance

HEW NICKEL COINIGE

June 3,1968 The Royal Canadian Mint will begin in early August to issue pure nickel coins in place of the present silver alloy coins, it was announced today by the Honourable E. J. Benson, Minister of Finance and President of the Treasury Board. The change was approved by Parliament earlier this year. It will not affect the bronze one-cent coin or nickel fivecent coin, and current coin designs will remain unchanged.

The Minister noted that in recent years Canada has been one of the few countries in the world which continued to issue a silver coinage. Because of growing industrial demand for the metal, silver had become too scarce and costly to be used as coinage.

"I am confident that the public will find the new coins both attractive and durable, " Mr. Benson said. " The suitability of nickel has been shown by its use in our five-cent coin since 1922 and, as Canada is the world's chief source of nickel, its general use in our coinage is most appropriatu.

The Minister recalled that the Government's decision to change to a nickel coinage during the course of 1968 was made and announced well in advance, in December, 1966, in order to provide sufficient time for new coin selector mechanisms, capable of handling both new and old coins concurrently, to be designed, manufactured and installed by the automatic vending machine industry. Suitable new coin selectors now are available from Canadian manufacturers. The new and old coins are expected to circulate side and side.

The Minister said that he has received representations from the automatic vending industry for the payment of compensation for part of the industry's costs of changeovers made necessary by the change in coinage. The Government recognized these costs are a financial burden that is not shared by competing retailers, while on the other hand the Government will make a substantial saving on costs from the change to nickel.

He said that in view of these circumstances, the Government intends to recommend to Parliament the payment, out of the increased Mint seigniorage revenues, of compensation to vending machine operators for part of the costs of purchasing new coin selectors that are required to replace selectors in existing vending machines during the next 12 months.

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THE CASTING COUNTER

Jettons appeared first in France during the reign of Louis 1X (1226-1270). At this time they were connected exclusively with the royal house. In the time of Philip 111, "Le Hardi" (1270-1285), princes of blood and the higher nobility had jettons. Soon the practise was taken up by lesser magnates, corporations, and finally the general public.

Having begun in France, they are best known deriving from that country. Indeed, the ones known in Canada were of French origin. But they were used also in England, Italy, the Low Countries, Germany and Portugal.

In France they died out with the introduction of the decimal system at the Revolution. After that, those issued were used only as counters for play or as medalets or trade advertisements. Their use in England died out towards the end of the 17th century.

Finally, then, how were they used? I have been able to study ten different systems of this "manual arithmetic", each claiming to be the best. They all seem to be variations of a system published by Robert Recorde in 1542.

His counting-board had six horizontal lines representing from the

bottom to the top ones, tens, hundreds, thousands (marked by a star), tenthousands, and hundred thousands. The spaces.

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then, represent fives, fifties, five-hundreds, five thousands, and fifty-thousands. As an example, I have marked on the diagram jettons in the position for 287,966.

To add you lay out jettons for the second number to the right of the centre line. Then one row at a time you shift them to the left, moving counters upward and discarding as needed. Below is an example: 287,966 plus 124,579. The answer, on the board to the right, is 412,545.

It will be noted immediately how similar this is to using Roman numerals. Certain authors claim that these methods of "ocular arithmetic" helped to preserve the use of Roman numerals in the face of the rise of the superior Arabic system which we now use.

Notice, also, how close this is in method to the Chinese form of the abacus. However, it was never quite as fast. In a French-English dictionary of 1530 we read: # Augrym, algorisme. To counte, recken by cyfers of agryme (arithmetic), enchifrer. To cast an accomptes in aulgorisme (arithmetic) with a penne, enchifrer, after the aulgorisme manner, to cast an accomptes with counters (jettons), calculer. To caste an accomptes after the comen maner, with counters, compter par ject. I shall recken it syxe times by aulgorisme (ciphering) or (before) you can caste it ones (once) by counters."

Newfoundland did not order any more large cents in 1886 or 1887, as the number already in circulation proved sufficient for the needs of its people. By 1888, however, a scarcity of cents was again noted and an order was placed in London for 50,000.

In average condition these now bring a premium of \$10.00 each or more

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if they are in extra fine condition.

SIAMESE PORCELAIN TOKENS USED FOR GAMBLING IN LIEU OF COINS By Nathan N. Eglit - World Coins, Sept./64.

The porcelain pieces that, for the first time in numismatic ceramics actually bore designes with set values and symbols of an issuing abthority are the Siamese tokens. These tokens were called "Pee" or "Pi". Quiggin states that ."In 1744 Siamese history records a shortage of cowries, and small red clay seals called prokab were stamped with various designs and issued as substitutes." The majority of these pieces were issued by companies and traders in Bangkok and were issued in denominations of one fourth to one sixty#fourth ofta tical.

The values appeared on the reverses and are generally inscribed in blue. They were legally accepted in circulation until they were declared illegal by decree in 1871.

LeMay states that they were used almost exclusively in the gambling houses as small change and then goes on to quote another source which stated that :"These counters, being used under authority granted in the gambling license or concession, rapidly became a favourite medium of exchange and were found to fill a long-felt want of small money so well that the circulation went much beyond its legal sphere.

"Such a facile field for foreigners was not long to be left unexplored by the enterprising celestial. Gradually a large quantity of imitations was thrown into circulation and in self-defence the gambling "hongs" were compolled to call in and exchange for money their counters, which they continually substituted by new ones of varied colors and shapes. In this way originated the great variety of counters consisting, as far as I can ascertain, of about 890 different kinds".

LeMay further states that "these Pee are still to be found in large quantities in Bangkok, in the stalls of the pawnshops in the Sampeng quarter; and at one time certain enthusiasts used to endeavour to make complete collections of them to the number of about 2,000 sets."

The large circulation of these convenient tokens made them acceptable to the merchants of the district since they were redeemable very easily by the gambling houses where issued. However, to curtail counterfeiting practices these tokens were called in at the first of each year, and after a two-week period of grace were no longer redeemable as new tokens were issued. Since many of the tokens were never redeemed because they were kept as souvenirs or as collector's items, or else were broken or lost, the gambling houses often issued more than they needed in the ordinary course of business. Thus they developed another gimmick to add to their gambling profits.

The Tokens were made by the Chinese porcelain producers, who in their inimitable fashion created a great variety of designs and shapes for this purpose. They took the shapes of fish, butterflies and birds; and were oval and rectangular; had serrated and scalloped edges; and came in many other shapes and different sizes. They were made of the famous white Chinese porcelain, and were inscribed with varied colored designs. On one side would apprear the name of the gaming house and on the other the denomination. The script was Chinese but a few are known with English words.



By the Deputy Master & Comptroler, Royal Mint, London, England.

Britain will decimalize its currency on 15th February 1971 (Decimal Day), making a break from the present system of pounds, shillings and pence which has been in use for over 1,000 years.

The new currency will still be based on the pound, but it will be divided into 100 new pennies, and the term "shilling" will disappear.

The new coins will be:-

Denomination Metal Reverse Design Diameter

φġp Bronze Crowned numeral 1.7145cms

1p Bronze Crowned portcullis 2.032cms.

Bronze Prince of 2p

Wales Feathers 2.591cms

5p Cupro-Crowned 2.3595cms nickel Thistle (same size as shilling)

Crowned 2.85 cms. 10p Cupronickel Lion (same size as florin)

50 p Cupro-(Design to nickel to announced) 3.00 cms.

The 5p and 10p are already in use and are being issued instead of shillings and florins. The 50p will probably be issued in October 1969 when it will replace the ten shilling note. This means that three of the six decimal coins will already be familiar before D Day. The 50p will be in the shape of an "equilateral curve heptagon", which is a recognised geometric figure with the important quality of constant breadth. This will be the first time that a shape of this kind has been used for a coin, and it has been adopted so that it can be clearly distinguished from the 10p.

The obverse design of all the coins is by Mr. Arnold Machin. In accordance with the tradition dating back to the 17th century by which successive Monarchs face in opposite directions, the portrait continues to show The Queen facing to the right. Also in accordance with tradition, Her Majesty is shown in profile; full-faced and three-quarter-face portraits last appeared on the English coinage in the reigns of Henry VIII and Edward VI.

The reverse designs are by Mr. Christopher Ironside, and although new in style, mostly have a long numismatic ancestry. The following is a full description.

Ten new pence

Part of the crest of England.
A lion passant guardant royally crowned. This design may also be described as part of the crest of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.

Five new pence

The badge of Scotland. A thistle royally crowned.

Two new pence

The badge of The Prince of Wales Three ostrich feathers enfiling a coronet of crosses pattee and fleurs de lys with the motto ICH DIEN.

New penny

A portcullis with chains royally crowned, originally a badge of King Henry VII. In modern times it has been particularly associated with the Palace of Westminster and Lisuused extensively as a badge connected with Parliament.

New halfpenny

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The Royal Crown.

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CODE OF ETHICS

OF

THE ONTARIO NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION

Membership in the Ontario Numismatic Association is a privilege extended to those persons and organizations deemed worthy thereof and is not a matter of right. Such membership can be maintained only until the Executive determines that the conduct of a member has been such that, in the best interest of the Association, his membership should be terminated.

For the guidance of its members, this Code of Ethics has been duly adopted by the Executive under the authority vested in it by the by-laws of the Association. A breach thereof by any member reflects, directly or indirectly, upon all other members. Such a breach, therefore, by any member shall be considered conduct prejudicial to the welfare of the Association and cause for action by the Executive.

The by-laws of the Association shall include:

10. Code of Ethics

As a member of the Ontario Numismatic Association a member:

Agrees to support and be governed by the by-laws of the Association and such rules, policies and regulations as may be in force from time to time;

Agrees to conduct himself so as to bring no reproach or discredit to the Association, or impair the prestige of membership therein;

Agrees to base all of his dealings on the highest plane of justice, fairness and morality:

Agrees to neither buy nor sell numismatic items of which the ownership is questionable;

Agrees to conform to the accepted standards of dignified advertising;

Agrees to take immediate steps to correct any error he may make in any transaction;

Agrees not to sell, exhibit, produce or advertise counterfeits, copies, restrikes, and reproductions of any numismatic items if their nature is not clearly indicated by the word "counterfeit," "copy," "restrike" or "reproduction" incused in the metal or printed on the paper thereof, with the exception of items listed in standard catalogues and generally accepted by numismatists and not in any way misrepresented as genuine;

Agrees to represent a numismatic item to be genuine only when, to the best of his knowledge and belief, it is authentic;

Agrees to fulfil all contracts made by him either orally or written, to make prompt payments upon delivery, and to return immediately any item that is not satisfactory;

Agrees to give aid to members in quest for numismatic knowledge.

EX LIBRIS

By Hazel Munro

This month's selection is an excerpt on Gibraltar, taken from F. Fridmore's "The Coins of the British Commonwealth of Nations" donated to the O.N.A. Library by Spink & Son Ltd., England.

GIBRALTAR

Arms:- Azure, between two pillars a castle argent, masoned sable, from the gate a golden Key pendent.

Motto:- Plus Ultra - More Beyond.

The arms published by the Admiralty for use upon the Union Flag by the Governor are:-

Arms:- Gules, a triple towered castle proper, and suspended by a chain from the gateway, a Key.

Motto:- Mantis Insignia Calpe - Seal of Mount Calpe.

Note: The Gibraltar Coat of Arms with the castle with a golden key pendent was granted by the Spanish Queen Isabella (1474-1504).

History:- A crown Colony, naval base and fortress occupying a rocky promontory near the extreme south of Spain. Known in ancient times

as Mount Calpe, it was one of the Pillars of Hercules. The other pillar was Mount Abyla lying across the Straits near Ceuta in Spanish Morocco. Calpe was captured in A.D. 711 by the Moorish leader Tarik ibn Zeyed, who renamed the place Gebel Tarik (The Hill of Tarik). From this name is derived the modern Gibraltar. The Moors were driven out of Spain in 1462. Gibraltar was captured from Spain by Sir George Rooke in 1704 and has remained in British hands ever since.

Coinage and Currency.

The early currency after the acquisition was the Spanish gold doubloon, the silver dollar, and Spanish copper coins. British sterling was a money of account only. In January, 1815, due to the difficulty in making small payments, the Governor recommended to the Secretary of State for the Colonies that the Royal Mint should strike a silver coinage for local use. This coinage was to consist of two denominations, a Two Reals and One Real piece, passing current at 9d and 4d sterling respectively. No action was taken by the Home Authorities to comply with this request.

Owing to currency difficulties in general throughout all British Colonies during the early years of the 19th century, the Home Government attempted to force the Colonies to use the sterling system. In Gibraltar in 1825, British sterling was ordered to be the money of account and the legal tender for payment. Spanish coins were declared current only as the equivalent of sterling money at the rate of 4s.4d. each Spanish dollar.

British copper coins introduced into the Colony by this order resulted in confusion. Due to its size, the British farthing was adopted by the local merchants as the equivalent of a Spanish copper cuarto. The Penny thus passed current at 4 cuartes. 192 cuartos went to the Spanish dollar and at this rate of exchange, 48 pence only were given for a Dollar which by an order in Council was to pass for 4s4d. or 52 pence.

In 1841 an attempt was made to rectify this anomaly. The Governor requested a local copper coinage of English minting denominated in Quarts. A small supply of copper coins was sent out in 1842 consisting of three values: 2 quarts, 1 quart and a $\frac{1}{2}$ quart. No special order was deemed necessary to bring these coins into circulation. They were issued by the Colonial Treasury, when received, without further delay.

From 1848, when Spain first moved towards the adoption of the decimal system, the currency of the Colony was a constant source of trouble. Finally on the 9th of August, 1898, the lawful money of the United Kingdom was declared the sole legal tender for payment.

Private Tokens.

During a shortage of copper coins between the years 1802-1820, private tokens were issued by local merchants. These form a small but very interesting series of local colonial tokens. Like the later regal copper issue of 1842, these tokens were denominated in the Spanish currency as Quarts or Quartos.

Currency.

Spanish until 1825 when British Sterling was declared legal tender with a Spanish equivalent. Spanish coins, together with a local copper coinage introduced in 1842, denominated in Quarts (Spanish Cuarto) remained the currency until 1898 when sterling became the sole tender.

192 Quarts - 1 Spanish milled dollar (4s.4d. sterling)
16 Dollars - 1 Spanish gold doubloon (69s.4d. sterling)

Note:- On 1 Jan. 1843, the Doubloon was rated at 66s. 8d. and the Dollar at 4s. 2d.

AND

BY-LAWS

THE ONTARIO NUMISHATIST is published monthly by the Ontario Numismatic Association. The publication may be obtained with memberships of one of the following categories. Life memberships - \$50.00, regular memberships \$3.00 yearly, Juniors \$2.00 yearly, (up to 18 years of age), Husband and Wife (one journal) - \$5.00 yearly, Club - \$10.00 yearly. Special O.N.A. Sterling Silver Lapel Pins (screw back or pin back) only \$2.50.

Authorized as second class mail by the Post Office Department, Ottawa and for payment of postage in cash.

ONTARIO NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Article 1 - Name

Section 1

The name of the association shall be "The Ontario Numismatic Association," hereinafter referred to as the "Association."

Section 2

(a) The official crest of the Association shall be described as follows: in heraldic terms:

Fess point - Shield. Shield description: On the Dexter, Middle, Sinister, and Honour Point the Cross of Saint George. Cross heraldic coloured red (vertical lines). Fess Point, Nombrill Point, and Middle Base, the Trillium Flower, (Province of Ontario flower). Shield surmounted by the Edward crown. Wreath: Three-quarter wreath in field, dominating the Dexter, Middle, and Sinister Base. Inscription reads: ONTARIO NUMISMATIC ASSOCIATION. Date: The date appears in the open field in the Fess Dexter and Fess Sinister split by shield.

- (b) A copy of the crest as approved shall be included in the by-laws of the Association.
- (c) The motto of the Association shall be: "Vires Acquirit Eundo" and shall be taken to mean "As it grows it gathers strength."

Article 2 - Objects

Section 1

The objects of the Association shall be:

- (a) to advance the study of numismatics along educational, historical, scientific and esthetic lines in all its various branches.
- (b) to encourage popular interest in the study of numismatics and especially to bring those interested in numismatics into closer relationship by the interchange of ideas and discussions of mutual interest.
- (c) to gather and disseminate accurate information bearing upon numismatic subjects.
- (d) to encourage co-operation between all persons and organizations interested in the production, circulation and use, collection, preservation, classification, exhibition, and sale of coins, tokens, medals, and paper money.
- (e) to acquire, own, hold, and dispose of such property for its own use as may be necessary to achieve properly the objects herein set forth.
- (f) to perform such other acts as may be necessary to carry into effect the said objects, provided that such acts do not alter in any way the position of the Association as a non-profit organization.

Article 3 - Members - Eligibility and Privileges

Section 1

The membership of the association shall consist of honorary members, regular members, family members, junior, corporate members, life members, and affiliate members.

Honorary members shall be those persons who, for outstanding services to the association or the science of numismatics, or of distinguished reputation or learning have been nominated in writing by at least three members of the association, recommended by the executive committee and approved by a majority vote at a general meeting on the recommendation of the executive.

Section 3

Any person of good reputation, 18 years of age or over, shall be eligible to apply for regular membership.

Section 4

Any club, society, association, corporation, museum, archives, public library or institution of learning, interested in numismatics and whose officers are of good reputation, shall be eligible to apply for corporate membership.

Section 5

Any honorary or regular member of the association who has been a member in good standing for three years or longer shall be eligible to apply for Life Membership. The membership number given to a life member shall be preceded by the letters "LM."

Section 6

Memberships are not transferable from one person or organization to another.

Section 7

Honorary, regular and life members shall be entitled to all the privileges of the Association, including the right to vote, hold office, and receive the official publications of the association, except such services as outlined in the by-laws, and that honorary members shall not be eligible to hold office unless they were regular or life members at the time that honorary membership was conferred upon them.

Section 8

Corporate members shall be entitled to all the privileges of the association, except that each such organization shall have only one vote, shall not be eligible to hold office, shall not be eligible for life membership and shall receive only one copy of the association's official publication.

Section 9

No member of the executive, elected or appointed, nor a corporation, partnership or proprietorship with which he is associated may be permitted to enter into a financial contract with the association.

Article 4 - Hembers - Application, Admission and Dues

Section 1

Applications to become Regular, Family, Junior, Life or Affiliated Members shall be made in writing on an official application form. Such applications shall, in the case of Regular, Family, Life or Affiliated Members, bear the name and address of the applicant, and in the case of the Junior Member the age at last birthday.

Section 2

Applications to become Corporate Members shall be made in writing on an official application form, signed by two of the applicant's executive officers.

Applications for all memberships, accompanied by one year's membership dues, shall be sent to the Secretary, who shall cause notice of the application to be published in the next issue of the Official Publication of the Association.

Section 4

If no written objection to such application is received by the Secretary by the end of the next succeeding month following publication, the applicant shall be admitted to membership on that date and notice to this effect shall be published in the next succeeding issue of the Official Publication.

Section 5

If written and timely objection to such admission is received by the Secretary, he shall refer the matter to the President, who shall thereupon inform the applicant of the nature of the objection and request an answer thereto not later than one month after the sending of such notice. When this has been received, the President shall forward all the available information to the Executive for consideration and action. The Executive may either accept or reject such application and in either event the President shall notify the Secretary of the decision. If the Executive accepts the application, the applicant shall be admitted and notice thereof shall be published in the Official Publication. If the application be rejected, the applicant shall be so informed by the Secretary and the advance dues shall be returned to the applicant.

Section 6

Honorary Members shall be relieved from the payment of any membership dues.

Section 7

All dues for Members shall be such as may be shown from time to time in the By-Laws of the Association.

Section 8

Applications for Life Membership, if found to be in order, shall be accepted forthwith by the Secretary and notice to such membership shall be published in the next succeeding issue of the Official Publication. The dues for Life Members shall be payable in a lump som at the time of application as a Life Member. After payment of said sum, Life Members shall not be required to pay any additional membership dues during their lifetime.

Article 5 - Members - Resignation, Suspension and Expulsion

Section 1

No member shall be permitted to resign from the Association while he is indebted to it in any manner or while charges are pending against him.

Section 2

Annual dues shall be payable in advance on January 1st of each year. Any member who fails to pay his dues before March 1st. of any year shall be liable to lose his membership, in which case his name shall be dropped from the membership rolls and removed from the mailing list. Any member who has lost his membership for non-payment of dues or who has resigned, may be reinstated upon payment of arrears due at the time of the loss of membership or resignation, provided no charges are pending against him, and in such case, only if the charges are withdrawn or dismissed.

Whenever written charges are brought against any member for conduct prejudicial to the welfare of the Association, such charges shall be signed by the person making them. The identity of the person making such charges shall not be made known, except to the Executive. Such charges, with particulars thereof, shall be filed with the President, who shall thereupon furnish the accused member with a written copy thereof. The accused member shall be afforded a reasonable opportunity to enter a written defense to such charges. The matter shall then be referred to the Executive, which shall study the case. The executive may dismiss such charges, or it may censure, suspend or expel the accused member. It may cause the result of its action to be published in the official publication. Until the final decision of the Executive, the accused member shall continue in good standing.

Section 4

Members in arrears for any cause for more than one calendar year, provided that the arrears are not a result of expulsion from the Association, shall be reinstated on payment of the current year's dues, but will be assigned a new membership number.

Section 5

Any portion of the membership dues, overpaid by the member at the time of his "suspension," "expulsion" or "resignation by request," shall be refunded to that person.

Section 6

In the event of a Life Membership being terminated, other than by death, dues shall be refunded on the basis of the assumption that the Life expectancy of the member was ten years after the date of admission as a Life Member.

Section 7

The conduct of the members shall be guided by the Code of Ethics which shall be included in the By-laws of the Association.

Article 6 - Elected Officers

Section 1

The elected officers of the Association shall be: the President, the First Vice-president, the Second Vice-president, the Secretary, the Treasurer and Regional Directors, and there shall be at least one director from each area. The areas served by the Directors shall be included in the By-laws of the Association.

Section 2

The term of office in an elected President shall be limited to one elected twoyear term, in addition to any period that he may have served as President because of the death, resignation or other inability of the regularly elected President.

Section 3

The duties of the elected officers shall be to conduct the affairs of the Association in accordance with the provisions of the Constitution and of any By-laws cracted thereunder. The duties shall be more specifically detailed in the By-laws of the Association.

Section 4

The governing body of the Association shall be the elected and appointed officers and shall be known as the Executive.

The duties of the Elected officers shall include, but are not limited to the following:

- (a) to appoint officers, biennially or at such other times as the offices may be vacant, to fill the following offices: editor, librarian, advertising manager, historian and such other offices as the Executive may deem advisable. Assistance to these officers may be appointed at the discretion of the Executive.
- (b) to appoint temporary officers to fill any elective office, except President, at any time that the incumbent shall become incapacitated or otherwise unable to discharge the duties of that office.

Section 6

Duties of the Executive shall include, but are not limited to the following:

- (a) to decide on the time and place for holding the general meeting;
- (b) to prescribe the form of official membership applications and official ballots;
- (c) to rule on the admission of applicants against whom objections have been raised;
- (d) to rule on the disposition of formal charges brought against a member of the Association;
- (e) to fix advertising rates for space in the official publication and to set rules and regulations in connection therewith;
- (f) to fix the compensation paid to any officers to whom such compensation is paid;
- (g) to prescribe which elected and appointed officers shall be bonded and to fix the amounts thereof;
- (h) to remove from office any elected or appointed officer who does not or cannot meet the requirements of the office;
- (i) to carry on and direct the affairs of the Association generally.

Article 7 - Officers - Election

Section 1

Any Life or Regular Member who has been in good standing for two years or longer shall be eligible to hold office in the Association.

Section 2

No member shall be eligible for office of President until he has served a full two-year term as an elected officer.

Section 3

Elections shall be held every two years and shall take place prior to the Annual General Meeting.

Section 4

In an election year, the President shall make a call for nominations of elected officers six months prior to the opening of the Annual General Meeting in the Official Publication and at the same time shall appoint an Election Committee, consisting of a Chairman and two members.

All nominations shall be made in writing, signed by two members in good standing and sent to the Chairman of the Election Committee. Each nomination shall be accompanied by a written acceptance from the nominee or a declaration signed by the nominators stating that the nominee has expressed willingness to serve if elected.

Section 6

Mominations shall close four months prior to the opening of the Annual General Meeting.

Section 7

The Chairman of the Election Committee shall cause the names of the nominees to be published three months prior to the opening of the Annual General Meeting in the Official Bublication.

Section 8

The Secretary shall cause the names of all nominees to be printed on the official ballots and shall mail one official ballot to each member in good standing 60 days prior to the opening of the Annual General Meeting, together with an envelope marked "Official Ballot" and an envelope addressed to the Chairman of the Election Committee.

Section 9

The unopened envelopes, containing the marked ballots, shall be taken by the Chairman of the Election Committee to the Annual Convention where they shall be opened on the first day of the Convention, by the Chairman in the presence of at least one other member of the Committee and the ballots counted. In the event of a tie, the matter shall be reported to the President, who shall call for a vote from the floor of the Annual General Meeting to break the tie. The results of the election shall be announced by the Chairman of the Election Committee at the first session of the Annual General Meeting. The ballots shall be held by the Chairman of the Election Committee for at least one year and then may be destroyed on the direction of the President.

Section 10

Any office for which no nominations have been received may be filled by a vote of the elected officers.

Section 11

All elected officers shall assume their duties at the last session of the Annual General Meeting and shall hold office for two years from that time and until their successors have been duly elected and installed.

Section 12

Each officer, at the expiration of his term of office shall within 30 days deliver to his successor all books, papers, money or other property of the Association in his possession. He shall not be relieved from his bond or obligation until this requirement has been fulfilled.

Section 13

No member shall hold office, elected or appointed unless he is a resident of Ontario.

Section 14

The term of office of an elected president shall be limited to one elected two-year term.

No member shall stand for election for more than one office.

Article 8 - Meetings

Section 1

The ultimate authority in Association matters shall be a properly convened General Meeting. This will usually be the Annual General Meeting held at the time of the annual Convention. In cases of extreme importance a Special General Meeting may be called by the President. Notice of such meeting shall be published in the Official Fublication of the Association at least one month prior to such meeting.

Section 2

In the period between General Meetings, the executive shall have full power to act for the Association in accordance with the terms of the Constitution.

Section 3

A quorum at any General Meeting shall be at least five members of the Executive and five other regular or life members, all present in person.

Section 4

The executive shall meet prior to all General Meetings and at such other times called or by the President.

Section 5

A quorum at any Executive meeting shall be five members of the Executive present in person.

Article 9 - Conventions

Section 1

The Association may meet in convention once every year, at such time and place as may be decided upon by the Executive. The time and place thereof shall be announced by the President in at least three issues of the Official Publication prior to said Convention.

Section 2

Applications for the privilege of sponsoring a convention may be made by any Corporate Member or group of Regular Members. Such application shall be sent to the President at least one year in advance and should clearly state what facilities are available in that locality, the number of persons available to work out and handle the details of the convention, and the assurance that proper financial backing can be provided to run such a convention. A tentative programme should accompany the application and preference should be given to the applicant that incorporates in the convention programme the useful exchange of numismatic information through lectures or discussion groups.

Section 3

In the event that no applications are received for the privilege of sponsoring a convention in any particular year, or if the circumstances should warrant it, the convention may be held under the sponsorship of a committee appointed by the President for that purpose.

The privilege of sponsoring a convention will be assigned by the Executive. The sponsoring organization shall assume all responsibility for the successful operation of the convention subject to guidance from the O. N. A. Convention Committee. Any financial arrangements shall be at the discretion of the Executive and the sponsors.

Section 5

The selection of an auctioneer to conduct an auction at an Annual Convention shall be the prerogative of the Executive.

Article 10 - Amendments to the Constitution

Section 1

The Constitution may be altered or amended by a two-thirds majority vote of the members present at any General Meeting. Proposed changes shall be submitted to the Executive in writing at least one hundred and twenty days before such meeting and shall be circulated to all members at least thirty days before the date of such meeting.

BY-LAWS

1. Financial Liability

No officer, committee or member of the Association shall incur any expense in the name of the Association except with the authorization or approval of the Executive.

2. Association Crest

Reproductions of the Association's crest shall be used for no purpose other than official stationery and official publications of the Association, except with the authorization or approval of the Executive. A copy of the official crest shall be attached hereto and identified as By-law 2, Association Crest.

3. Official Publication

The official periodical publication shall be "The Ontario Numismatist" which shall be published monthly, in so far as it is possible to do so. It shall be the Association's official means of communication with its members.

4. Duties of Officers

(a) The President

The President shall have general supervision over all the affairs of the Association. His duties shall include, but not be limited to, the following:

- (i) To preside at all General Meetings of the Association.
- (ii) To call meetings of the Executive and preside thereat.
- (iii) To appoint whatever committees that may be necessary and to remove them at will; and to be a member ex officio of any committee so appointed.
- (iv) To countersign all proper warrants drawn on the Treasurer. He may delegate the First Vice-president to perform all or a designated portion of this function.
 - (v) To require any officer to submit a statement and such other interim reports as he may deem necessary.
- (vi) To appoint at the Annual General Meeting three auditors to audit the financial books of the Association.

(b) First Vice-president

The duties of the First Vice-president shall be:

- (i) To assist the President, upon his request, in the discharge of his duties;
- (ii) To act in the place of the President, in case of his absence or disability;
- (iii) To succeed to the office of President for the remainder of his term, in the event that office becomes vacant.

(c) Second Vice-president

The duties of the Second Vice-president shall be:

(i) To assist the President, upon his request, in the discharge of his duties.

(d) Secretary

The duties of the Secretary shall be:

(i) To act as Secretary at General Meetings and to the Executive, and to keep a true record of all proceedings of the association.

- (ii) To preserve all documents pertaining to his office and such other documents as may be committed to his custody until permission is granted by the executive for their disposal.
- (iii) To deal with correspondence as directed by the President.
- (iv) To prepare a full and final report of all matters pertaining to his office at the end of the Association year and render same at the Annual General Meeting.

(e) Membership Secretary

The duties of the Membership Secretary shall be:

- (i) To receive all applications for membership and, if properly prepared and accompanied by the required advance dues, publish notice of such applications in the official publication;
- (ii) Forward objections to applications to the President
- (iii) Publish information as to new members admitted, as well as changes in address, suspensions, expulsions, resignations and deaths;
- (iv) Make monthly revisions of the membership rolls and the mailing lists of the Official Publication.

(f) Treasurer

The duties of the Treasurer shall be:

- (i) To have charge of all moneys of the Association collected from any source.
- (ii) To pay out such moneys authorized by the Executive or by the President.
- (iii) To invest and reinvest the funds of the Association in accordance with the instructions of the Executive.
- (iv) To prepare financial statements of the Association covering the fiscal year and to submit same at the Annual General Meeting.
- (v) To publish a financial report in the Official Publication of the Association within three months after the Annual General Meeting or as otherwise directed by the Executive.
- (vi) Upon termination of office, to hand over the books and records of the Association in his custody, in good order, to the President.

(g) Editor

The duties of the Editor shall be:

- (i) To be responsible for the publishing of the Official Publication of the Association, under the direction of the President.
- (ii) To obtain suitable material on numismatic subjects and to edit such articles, reports and notices as may be submitted.

(h) Advertising Manager

The duties of the Advertising Manager shall be:

- (i) To solicit, receive and edit advertising for the Official Publication of the Association under the direction of the President and to keep records thereof.
- (ii) To transfer moneys received to the Treasurer monthly.

(i) Librarian

The duties of the Librarian shall be:

- (i) To keep in safe custody and good order all library books and publications which the Association has or may acquire.
- (ii) To compile and keep an accurate catalogue of all material coming into his charge, with the price thereof if acquired by purchase or the name of the donor if acquired by gift.
- (iii) To afford access to such material and loan the same to members in good standing, under rules and regulations approved by the Executive.
 - (iv) To prepare a report of all matters pertaining to his office at the end of the Association year and submit the same at the Annual General Meeting.

(j) <u>Historian</u>

Duties of the Historian shall be:

- (i) To collect and preserve data of historical interest concerning the Association.
- (ii) To act as curator of the coins, tokens, medals and other numismatic items belonging to the Association.

5. Membership Dues

- (a) The membership dues shall be Regular Members \$3.00; Junior Members (up to 18 years of age) \$2.00; Husband and Wife \$5.00; due January 1st of each year.
- (b) The membership dues for corporate members shall be \$10.00 due January 1st of each year.
- (c) The membership dues for Life Membership shall be \$50.00 payable in a lump sum at the time of application for Life Membership. The moneys accruing from Life Membership shall be invested in Trustee Securities and the interest derived therefrom shall be paid into the general funds of the Association.
- (d) When a Life Member becomes deceased, his equity in the Life Membership Fund may be transferred to the Association's general fund at the discretion of the Executive.

6. Association Year

(a) The Association Year for the purposes of conventions, elections and annual reports (except that of the Treasurer) shall be from the time of One Annual Convention until the time of the next annual convention.

7. Fiscal Year

(a) The fiscal year of the Association shall be from January 1st -- December 31st.

S, Head Office

(a) The Head Office of the Association shall be situated in such location as designated by the executive.

9. Directorate Areas

Area 1 - Includes counties of: Essex, Kent, Elgin, Middlesex and Lambton.

Area 2 - Includes counties of: Haldimand, Welland, Lincoln and Wentworth.

Area 3 - Includes counties of: Oxford, Waterloo, Perth and Huron.

Area 4 - Includes counties of: Wellington, Halton and Peel.

Area 5 - Includes counties of: Bruce, Grey, Dufferin, Simcoe, and districts of Muskoka and Parry Sound.

Area 6 - Includes counties of: York and Ontario.

Area 7 - Includes counties of: Durham, Northumberland, Prince Edward, Victoria, Peterborough, Hastings, Lennox and Addington and the District of Haliburton.

Area 8 - Includes counties of: Frontenac, Leeds, Grenville, Dundas, Stormont, Glengarry, Prescott, Russell, Carleton, Lanark and Renfrew.

Area 9 - Includes all Districts and Counties of Northern Ontario and also Manitoulin Island.

Area 10- Includes counties of: Norfolk and Brant.

10. Code of Ethics

As a member of the Ontario Numismatic Association a member:

Agrees to support and be governed by the by-laws of the Association and such rules, policies and regulations as may be in force from time to time;

Agrees to conduct himself so as to bring no reproach or discredit to the Association, or impair the prestige of membership therein;

Agrees to base all of his dealings on the highest plane of justice, fairness and morality;

Agrees to neither buy nor sell numismatic items of which the ownership is questionable;

Agrees to conform to the accepted standards of dignified advertising;

Agrees to take immediate steps to correct any error he may make in any transaction;

igrees not to sell, exhibit, produce or advertise counterfeits, copies, restrikes and reproductions of any numismatic items if their nature is not clearly indicated by the word "counterfeit," "copy," "restrike" or "reproduction" incused in the metal or printed on the paper thereof, with the exception of items listed in standard catalogues and generally accepted by numismatists and not in any way way misrepresented as genuine;

Agrees to represent a numismatic item to be genuine only when, to the best of his knowledge and belief, it is authentic;

Agrees to fulfil all contracts made by him, either orally or written, to make prompt payments upon delivery, and to return immediately any item that is not satisfactory;

Agrees to give aid to members in quest for numismatic knowledge.

11. Where the term "he" is used in the constitution or by-laws it may refer to "he" or "she."

Hobby Lingo by Mrs. N. McInnes.

Do you know a "Fido" when you see it? How about an exonumist or a vecturist? And that Patina is quite a gal!

Fido is a word coined by a Mr. Ed. Wallace. It is formed from the initial letters of the words "freaks, irregulars, defects, oddities" and is now part of the language, according to the 1967 Encyclopedia Brittanica. In the hobby vernacular, a fido is actually a coin containing a mint error. Originally these coins, as well as the people who collected them, were known as "freaks". More recently these coins have been up-graded to the term of "mint to the coins have been up-graded".

A <u>vecturist</u> denotes a collector of transportation tokens (bus, bridge, depot, hotel, parking meters, etc.) and comes from the Latin word vectura meaning "passing money". Of course, a vecturist is also an exonumist. The latter fellow has been around for a long time but under a less complimentary name. They used to be called "junkies" and the material they sought was called junk. The Latin roots of the word are exo (away from) and numis (a coin). Specifically a collector of tokens and medals.

White <u>fatina</u> inspires visions of an attractive female, its only connotation in that direction is that it describes beauty. Literally it means natural colouring acquired by a coin with the passage of time, or chemically, an oxidation produced by certain soils and moisture on a coin. So what's an <u>eagle</u> or a <u>double-eagle</u>? The name evolved naturally in the early days of coinage, undoubtedly from the American bird, whose likeness was first stamped on the \$10. and \$5. gold pieces. An eagle, therefore, is a \$10. gold coin, the double-eagle is the \$20. with half and quarter eagles denoting \$5. and \$2½.

To an exonumist a <u>slug</u> is a metal token or blank that is slipped into a coin operated machine to activate it without spending the proper coin. But to a numismatist, a slug means a \$50. gold piece.

THE STORY OF THE CHRISTMAS SEAL Christmas is the season of happiness, a time for giving and receiving gifts. At this time of year we are approached to give the gift of health along with our Christmas greetings by purchasing and using Christmas Seals.

The world's first Christmas Seal sale was held in Denmark in 1904 and carried Queen Louise's picture on the seal indicating the patronage of King Christian.

Einar Holboell, a Danish postal clerk, was the person to think of raising money with Christmas Seals.

Back in the Christmas of 1903 Mr. Holboell was sorting the holiday mail in a small post office on the outskirts of Copenhagen. It was getting late but he kept on because experience had taught him that the nearer Christmas came the larger the mail, so it was wise to keep ahead of it. As he moved about among the mail bags he passed a window and looked out. What he saw filled his heart with pity. Two ragged little children who looked as if they had no one to look after them were scurrying through the storm.

As he chucked letters and cards into boxes and put the outgoing mail into bags, he thought of the children. There was such a contrast between the goodwill and friendliness represented by the holiday mail and their loneliness, that it haunted him. It seemed sad that the goodwill which brought greetings and gifts across continents and oceans could not somehow be used to help such needy ones as the little waifs who had vanished in the snow.

Suddenly he had an idea. If every letter or parcel carried an extra stamp, in addition to the postage, and the money from such stamps was used for the cure of

sick children, it would help a lot. The more he thought about it, the better the idea seemed.

Next morning it still seemed like a good idea. He told his fellow postmen about it and they were enthusiastic. They worked out how much it would cost, and how the iseals could be distributed. When they had what they felt was a workable scheme they submitted it to the king who gave his hearty approval. The following year the first Christmas Seal sale took place.

It was a huge success. In the first year the Danish people bought more than four million seals and that was just the beginning. The money from these first sales of Christmas Seals was used to build a hospital for tuberculous children.

The cause appealed so much to the people of Denmark that before many Christmas Seal sales had been conducted they were able to have two hospitals for tuberculous children.

Three years later across the Atlantic, a sanatorium for eight patients was about to close for lack of money. In desperation the doctor, Joseph P. Wales, wrote his cousin Emily Bissell and asked her to think of some way to save the hospital. Miss Bissell did think of something - a magazine article about how the Danish people raised money through the sale of Christmas Seals. If the idea worked in Denmark, why wouldn't it work in America.

The first need was to get enough seals printed. Two good friends offered \$20. each and a friendly printer agreed to print the seals at cost and on credit. Next, she enlisted the help of Philadelphia's newspaper, because not only money, but knowledge would help in the fight against TB.

The North American opened up a sale of the stamps on its street floor and on the first day a news-boy, too small to see over the counter, came in, and reaching up with his penny said, "Gimme one. Me sister's got it.

When the campaign closed there was ten times the \$300 needed for the small sanatorium. The following year, 1908, two Canadian cities, Toronto and Hamilton, tried out the same idea to help their tuberculous patients. Other countries also saw the possibilities and it became a lesson in language and folklore to study the Christmas Seals coming into an ordinary post office from the whole wide world.

Because one man had a vision and thousands of others had the good will to follow him, millions of dollars have been raised over the years to help stamp out TB.

WHAT OTHERS WRITE

(By Mr. L. D. Beaver, Coin Chatter)

Each month I have to find something interesting with which to fill a page. Some of you will no doubt feel that I don't know what I'm talking about after you read this, and --I'll have to agree. I start most subjects in the middle and then don't know which way to go. This is no exception. I only hope that I get my point across.

The past few years have seen our teenagers turn into Hippies, Hoppies, Happies and Flower Children, etc. There is no doubt that this is a young peoples' world! I lost contact with their language a few years ago and I'd wager that a good many parents aren't up on their jargon either. Our teenagers should be reached so that they will follow the finer things of life and make for better leaders of to-morrow.

Nowadays, a penny doesn't mean much, but \$1.60 for a silver certificate means an extra soda or gallon of gas for that Honda. Somehow, it must be put across that in a few years that Lincoln cent with the wheat on the reverse will be out of existence. Just ten years ago an Indian-head cent would show up in change. Not so today.

The advanced collectors have their sets, proofs and rare coins so they can sit back and play around with the fad of the time. Interest now lies in Gold Coins and Silver Bars. How many teenagers are interested in saving a bar of silver? How many are willing to save any money?

If the teenager could be made interested in the beauty and history and the coming rarity of the 20th century coins, perhaps his interest could or would go back to the older coins.

Eight or nine months a year the teenager reads books, studies lessons and thinks that he is in prison, so when vacation comes he no longer wants to study. Books are great for reference, but could he see and be told by an individual who is truly interested in collecting, the background of our coinage, perhaps he would be more interested in collecting. Who wants to study about something that they know they can never have or be a part of?

In the eleven years that our club has existed, we have interested over 500 people. How many of the first members are still in the club? How many juniors do we have?

Those who have been interested in collecting all these years should have some knowledge of numismatics. It is the obligation of each and every one of the older collectors should be able to teach a new collector about his own type of collecting or refer him to another collector that specializes in what that teenager is interested in.

Just because the advanced collector has long ago completed his sets of Liberty Standing Quarters or Mercury Dimes, he should not scoff at the new collector and his 20th century coins. He should help make accessible to the junior some of the older coins that are no longer in circulation at a price the junior could afford. Remeber back when you old timers streed collecting the valuable collections that you have to-day were as easy to collect as the Lincoln Memorial set is to-day.

I have heard that some schools have a Numismatic Class. One of the ways to get a Merit Badge in Scouling is coin collecting. Isn't there some way to incorporate those collectors into our club? We need the younger set to keep the work going that you have started.

COMMONWEALTH COINAGE - GUYANA

By C. R. Josset

(From Coins, Medals & Currency, October, 1967)

Guyana attained full independence in 1966, as a member of the British Commonwealth but before this date the country was known as British Guiana, a crown colony of Great Britain.

It is situated on the northern coast of South America between the Orinoco and the Amazon, with the Atlantic Ocean to the north, Surinam on the east and Venezuela on the west, with an area of approximately 83,000 square miles.

It has an estimated population of 650,000 consisting mainly of East Indians and Africans, with about 120,000 mixed races, including whites.

The Spaniards claim to be the first in British Guiana, landing in 1499; but the earliest settlers were English, who landed in 1604, under Capt. Leigh, more settlers following in 1616 and 1627.

In the meantime, the Dutch had also formed a settlement in 1616, as well as the French about the same period.

From that time there was continuous friction between the rival settlers. Lord Willoughby, the sponsor of the Barbados settlement, founded a colony in the present neighbouring state of Surinam in 1633, but this was captured and the English driven out. It was eventually ceded to the Dutch at the Peace of Breda.

After a number of changes and resettlement Britain captured Guiana then in the three separate settlements of Berbice, Demerary and Essequibo from the Dutch in 1803, and it was finally confirmed as a British possession in 1814.

In 1961 British Guiana attained full internal self government and finally, in 1966, became an independent state, renamed Guyana, with a new Assembly and elections by proportional representation.

There is some uncertainty as to which coins first circulated but the Spanish American dollar with a circular hole and a crenated edge was probably the earliest.

The centre of this cut was not quite in the centre of the coin, but slightly lower, leaving enough space for the oval countermark E & D to be made above the hole. It was given a value of five shillings, while the cut out 3 GL piece was believed to have a value of 15 pence, with the counter stamp 3 BTS. The E & D stands for "Essequibo and Demerara" while 3 GL stands for 3 guilders. The 3 BTS is somewhat mysterious and one can only conclude that the silver centre was called "3 bits".

The date when these coins were cut is considered to be between the years 1803 -1809. It is certain, that the Brazilian 6400 reis gold coin of the 1727-1804 issue was circulated about the same time, some of these coins have the counterstamp E D while others have no mark at all.

The first coins officially issued were the result of a decision of the committee for the settlements of Demerara and Essequibo, known as the Committee of Privy Council for Trade, who recommended that £10,000 of silver should be made into token coinage.

The British Government decided to retain the old Dutch currency when issuing a set of coins which is as follows: 16 duits (or pfennigs) equal to 1 stiver; 23 stivers equal to 1 guilder. The guilder was equal to 1sh 1/3d English giving a stiver a value of nearly 7/12ths of a penny. The denominations issued dated 1809 were three, two, one, half and quarter guilders with the bust of George 111.

This issue was followed by the only copper coins issued -- a stiver and half stiver struck in 1813. Three years later, in1816, another issue of guilders came out. No further issues were made until 1832, when a similar issue was made, plu a one eighth guilder, but with the head of William IV. In 1836 the inscription on the reverse was again "British Guiana" being substituted for "United Colony of Demerary and Essequibo" but the three and two guilders were omitted. In 1838, the old Dutch monetary system was abolished and money based on the American dollars and cents, giving the three-guilder piece the same value as the dollar. From this date, no coins were issued until 1891, when a British four penny with the head of Queen Victoria was issued, again with a changed inscription, reading "British Guiana and West Indies". There were no other denominations issued until the recent British Caribbean Territories coinage. The problem of payment for traders during the middle and late 19th century must have caused considerable additional calculations as the English, Spanish, Mexican, South American and United States coins were made legal tender, The fourpenny piece, with its "British Guiana and West Indies" inscription was issued in Edward VII's and George V's reign but from 1917, the inscription was "British Guiana". After George V1 1945 issue, the issue ceased in favour of the British Caribbean Coinage which still continues.
