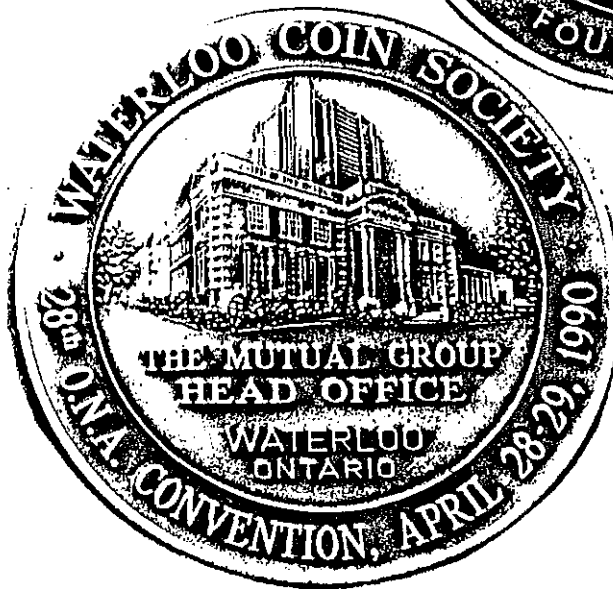
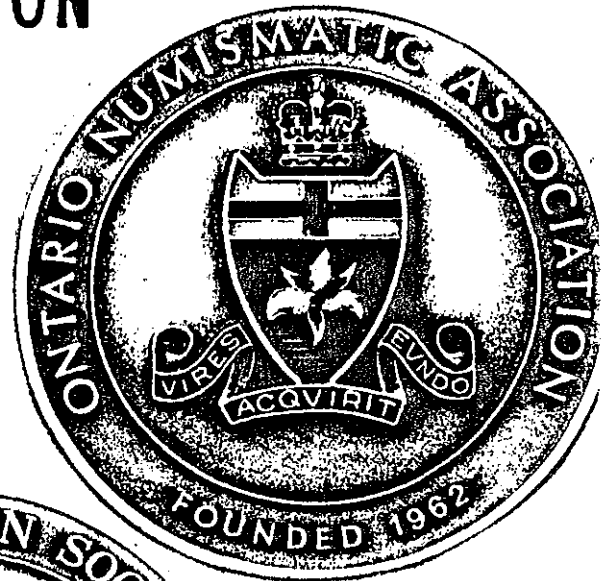



COVER STORY

THE MUTUAL GROUP HEAD OFFICE FEATURED ON 1990 O.N.A. MEDAL

The head office of The Mutual Group, a local landmark and Ontario heritage building, will be featured on the 1990 Ontario Numismatic Association convention medal.

Depicted on the medal is the original head office building which was constructed in 1912, as well as the company's new 19 storey office tower which was completed in 1987. The Mutual Group, of which Mutual Life of Canada is the lead company, is located at King and Union streets.

The original 1912 structure was designed by the Toronto architectural firm of Darling and Pearson for Mutual Life of Canada. The building originally provided office space for the company's 38 employees. On moving day, the General Manager at the time was heard to say, "Gentlemen, we'll never fill it."

Today, more than 2,100 people work at The Mutual Group's head office, and over the years some seven additions have been constructed.

The building is situated on spacious grounds and is approached from the city's main street through wrought iron gates, flanked by large stone posts. Constructed of a buff coloured, iron spot Roman brick, the building is Modern Renaissance in style and is richly modelled in ornamented terra cotta.

The original head office was extended in 1921 and additions were added in 1927, 1939, 1953, 1967, 1976 and 1987.

The new 19 storey tower is the largest commercial building in Waterloo Region and the structure of glass, steel and concrete dominates the skyline.

The new tower was designed in the 1980's for the business world of the 1990's. Raised flooring accommodates the miles of computer wiring that link up the more than 2,000 terminals to the main computer centre. A two storey television studio is used to produce state-of-the-art audio-visual programming, and training and meeting rooms are used for on-going staff development.

Roger Farwell, the building's architect, says the exterior was designed to reflect the company's character. "The pre-cast concrete with one corner taller and more massive, anchors the structure symbolically," he says. "The concrete conveys strength and solidity. The glass curtain wall, though, gives a more accessible open feel to the building. The company is more outward looking today and the building design lightens the company's image without taking away from it's strength of character."

Meshing the designs and styles of the original 1912 building and the

new tower was a priority. Using similar materials and colours linked the different styles. The tower is also designed to look as though it grows from the original complex.

"The simple, clean lines of the tower also serve as an artistic foil to the beautiful ornamentation of the 1912 building," Farwell says. "The effect is complementary, not jarring."

The mutual Group is a broadly based group of financial services companies with roots in life insurance. It's operations extend across Canada and the United States. Mutual Life of Canada was the first Canadian life insurance company organized on a mutual basis whereby the policyholders are the owners of the company.

ONA EXHIBIT RULES & REGULATIONS

1. Competition for exhibitors is open to anyone registered at the Convention.
2. Although security will be provided, including the use of locks on cases, the Convention organizers, the ONA, Hotel staff nor any of its members assume any liability. Although every effort is made to assure the visible presence of security staff and Convention committee members, all exhibitors must assure that locks are secure and locked and otherwise assume responsibility for their exhibit, including any material placed outside display cases.
3. The display material must be the property, or under the control, of the person displaying same.
4. The exhibitors are asked not to attend their exhibits while displays are being judged.
5. All matters relating to the displays shall be determined by the Display Chairman as per guidelines determined by the ONA.
6. The exhibitor is responsible for setting up and removing his/her displays in the time-frame advertised before-hand.
7. The Exhibit Chairman, with the knowledge of the exhibitor, may transfer an exhibit from one category to another before the judging if it appears the exhibitor has entered his exhibit in the improper classification.
8. The judges will submit final points scored for all competitive exhibits to the Exhibit Chairman at the close of the judging.
9. The judges' decision is final as to the results.
10. Material is allowed outside the case, providing the exhibitor assumes full responsibility and the material does not exceed the length of the display and is not higher than 24" above the exhibits table. If an exhibitor advises the Exhibit Chairman, via the Exhibit Application form, prior to the Convention, that wall space is required since the background would require more than 24" of free-standing space, the Exhibit Chairman will advise the applicant whether such wall space is available.
11. Exhibit applications must be received no later than one week before the Convention in order to be guaranteed exhibit space. Latecomers will also be accommodated, but subject to space and display case availability.
12. Display case sizes could change from Convention to Convention. Therefore, all exhibitors who do not provide their own cases are asked to note the exact clear inside measurements of display cases available for their use as detailed on the Exhibit Application form provided by the Convention Committee each year.
13. Whenever judges would like to comment on any exhibit, they will place a Judges Comment sheet under the first case of that exhibit, as a guide to the exhibitor in making up future exhibits. In addition, further verbal comments may be asked for from the judges following the announcement of the exhibit award winners. Judges' names are published in the numismatic press prior to the Convention, or can be obtained from any member of the Convention Committee or the ONA Executive at the Convention. Judges will be available for these discussions following the announcements of the awards.
14. In order to be judged, entries must be in place a) by 11:00 a.m. on first day if 2-day exhibit, or b) by 11:00 a.m. of second day if 3-day exhibit.
15. Exhibits must be left in position until the closing time announced by the Convention Committee. Any deviation from this would present problems re security. However, it is recognized that circumstances could arise that make it imperative for an exhibit to be removed a little before the official closing time, in which case, such early tear-down and removal must be discussed with the Exhibit Chairman prior to the removal of the lock and the opening of the cases. This is only fair and reasonable both from a security point-of-view as well as to the public.

O.N.A. Strikes Gold

The Ontario Numismatic Association has decided to produce a 24 Karat Gold Convention Medal. Complying with a request to allow production of a 1 ounce pure gold Convention Medal, the executive decided to make the Medal available to anyone on a prepaid order basis. The exact cost will be charged on each Medal with a \$25.00 charge for ordering and handling.

Pressed Metal Products, the manufacturer, quoted the cost of striking the medal to be \$700.00 which includes Federal Tax of \$131.00, shipping and minting costs. With the O.N.A. \$25.00 charge, total cost would be \$725.00. Design for this year's issue will feature the Mutual Group Head Office in Waterloo. The beautiful historical building makes a striking impression. The Medal will contain 1 troy ounce of .999 fine gold. Any cost differences will be based upon the final invoice.

When asked for his comments regarding the issue, President of the O.N.A., Ken Wilmot stated that he did not anticipate a rash of orders but knew of two or three people who indicated they would be ordering.

A complete sellout of the silver edition had not been expected, but now, to be sure of getting one, orders will have to be received prior to the Convention. Delivery will be at or after the Convention. NO medals will remain unsold and anyone not placing their order will have to obtain these attractive medals through a secondary market.

Needless to say, we have severed all our relations with the Lakeshore Inn.

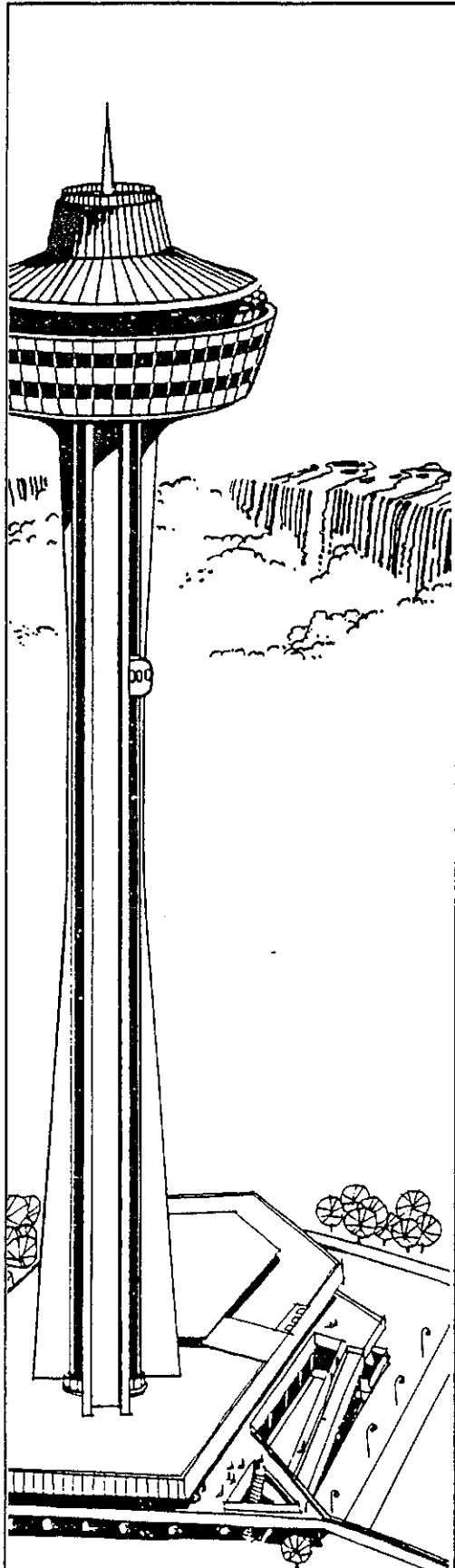

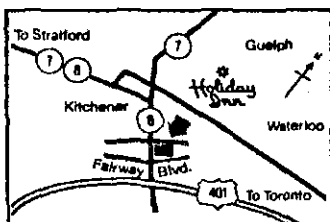
