

of the

General Meeting

Holiday Inn, Halifax Centre, Halifax, N.S.

October 12, 1985

A general meeting of the Atlantic Provinces Numismatic Association was held on October 12, 1985 in the Cunard-Citadel room of the Holiday Inn, Halifax Centre, Halifax, N.S. commencing at 1:30 p.m. -- attendance 24.

The President, Tim Henderson, presided at the meeting. He welcomed the members to the meeting and established that a quorum was present.

President Tim requested a moment of silence in memory of #620, Gerald B. Newman who died since our last meeting.

President Tim requested Douglas Ferguson come to the front of the room where he presented him with his A.P.N.A. Life Membership Pin.

The Minutes having been printed in "Atlantic Numismatist", it was moved by Glenn Rodger, seconded by Clarey Pelley, that they be approved as printed. Motion carried.

REPORTS

<u>Secretary-Treasurer</u>: The Secretary-Treasurer's report was distributed to members present. There being no errors or omissions, it was moved by Glenn Rodger, seconded by Clark Mullock, that the report be approved. Motion carried.

Editor and Advertising Manager: Our editor, Brian MacKenzie, advised that he was not receiving advertising from members, can you help.

<u>Junior Director</u>: David White presented his report and thanked the Cape Breton Coin Club for their financial assistance to the Junior Program. David requested that amendments put forth by him for changes to the constitution be dealt with at this time:

Item 3 - Subsection I - Paragraphs b & c:

(b) any person of good reputation, who is 21 years of age or over, shall be eligible to apply for Regular Senior Membership if the applicant is sponsored by a member of the Association in good standing.

(c) Any person of good reputation who is under 21 years of age, shall be eligible to apply for Regular Junior Membership if the applicant is sponsored by a Senior Member of the Association in good standing.

Moved by David White, seconded by Sheldon MacDonald that the motion be approved. Motion carried.

Item 3 - Section V

Moved by David White, seconded by Clark Mullock that this section be deleted. Motion carried.

Item 5 - Section VII

Moved by David White, seconded by Sheldon MacDonald that this section be amended to read as follows:

" any Junior, Senior or Life Member in good standing for a year, shall be eligible to hold any elected or appointed office." Motion carried.

Item 5 - Section VII

Under the heading Junior Director, add the following to the constitution:

JUNIOR DIRECTOR that dA' at betaing as d galved setup M and

(a) to represent the junior membership at general and executive meetings and to present the views of individual members.

(b) attempt to visit member clubs of the A.P.N.A.

(c) to set up a proposed Junior Prpgram.

- (d) to encourage research and development in numismatics among juniors.
 - (e) to assist in staffing the A.P.N.A. information desk at conventions.

Moved by David White, seconded by Sheldon MacDonald that this new section be added to the constitution. Motion carried. <u>A.P.N.A. Keeper's Medals</u> - Ian Graham: The situation concerning A.P.N.A. Display Keeper Medals was made reference to during the A.P.N.A. die use debate. Ian Graham, Medals Committee, will have the new uniface medals at the next Spring Convention. These medals will replace the ones currently in use, with the host club paying for the quantity used at their show.

NEW BUSINESS

his report on the convention which touched on media coverage, noted management cooperation, bourse layout, etc., 16 dealers in attendance, competitive displays 25.

President Tim appointed Geoffrey Bell as Chairman of the Nominating Committee and requested he submit his report at the Spring Convention in Sydney, N.S.

President Tim to appoint auditors for the A.P.N.A. Financial Report.

Locations for the following A.P.N.A. Conventions have been approved by the membership:

Spring Convention 1986 - Cape Breton Coin Club, Sydney, N.S.

Fall Convention 1986 - Prince Edward Island Numismatic Association, Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island.

Spring Convention 1987 - Miramichi Coin Club, Newcastle, N.B.

All dates to be announced later in the "Atlantic Numismatist".

Report by Bernie Kline on the use of Official A.P.N.A. Dies. The report centered on the use of the dies for the striking of personalized medals. At present time, the die is owned by the Halifax Coin Club and is held in trust by Pressed Metal Products, Vancouver, B.C., a lively discussion took place.

It was moved by Geoffrey Bell seconded by Bernie Kline, "that members of the A.P.N.A. be given permission to use the A.P.N.A. die by individual members, the dies being held by Pressed Metal Products, Vancouver, B.C., permission must be given in writing by the Executive of the A.P.N.A. for personal use. A.P.N.A. COIN CLUBS are not to be charged a fee for use of the die."

Before voting, President Tim asked for those voting to vote for or against the motion. 13 voted for - 7 against. Motion carried.

As there was no furthur business, The President called for adjournment, moved by Wayne Gillcash, seconded by David White, that the meeting adjourn. Motion carried. Time 2:35 p.m.

The A.P.N.A. Donation Auction commenced at 3:00 p.m. in the Cunard-Citadel Room. Geoffrey Bell was the auctioneer. Proceeds of the auction amounted to \$199.00.

On Friday evening, October 11th, 1985, the traditional wine and cheese party was held in the Cunard-Citadel Room, Holiday Inn, Halifax Centre.

On Saturday, the banquet was held in the Cunard-Citadel Room at 7:00 p.m. Master of Ceremonies for the banquet was Bernie Kline, President of the Halifax Coin Club. Guest speaker for the banquet was Harold Don Allen, who was introduced by Garth Chalmers. Don spoke on "The Voodoo and the Mavericks: Numismatic Byways Explored". President Tim presented him with an A.P.N.A. Speaker's Certificate and Fern Allen presented him with a plaque.

Following the banquet, the display awards were presented by Ian Graham. Judges for the competitive displays were Harley Isenor, Garth Chalmers, Thomas Crossman. Trophies were awarded to first prize winners. Keeper's Medals were awarded to second and third prize winners.

- D The Association shall not be held responsible for errors occuring as a result of hand-written copy. Liability for other errors (within reason) made by the APNA will not exceed the original cost of the advertisement.
- E The Association has the right to introduce any additional requirements or to incorporate any modifications on existing advertisement policies should it be necessary to do so.

2 - CLASSIFIED ADVERTISING:

- A Each member in good standing is entitled to one free 3line classified ad per issue.
- B If the number of desired insertions is not specified with the ad submission, the ad will be published in one issue, but will not be repeated.
- C A classified ad may be repeated in more than one issue, however, if the same ad is to run for more than six issues, the member must request an extension at the time of the sixth insertion; after which, the process may be repeated if desired.
