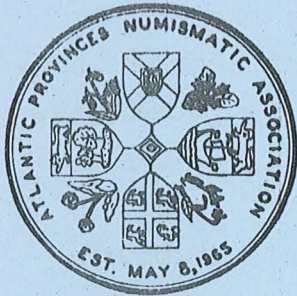

RARE PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND BILLS BROUGHT BACK HOME

Well known collector of Prince Edward Island currency, coins and tokens, Ralph Dickieson, recently was successful in procuring three very rare bills of the Union Bank of Prince Edward Island. These bills were featured in the recent A.N.A. Auction held in Milwaukee, Wisconsin. There Kagin's Numismatic Auctions of San Francisco were consigned to sell, by public and mail bid auction, the Currency Museum Collection of the Canadian Commercial Bank which recently failed.

This sale was billed as the finest public offering since the Walter D. Allen sales (1972-74) and provided a once-in-a-decade opportunity to acquire some of Canada's rarest and finest known banknote specimens.

The three bills Mr. Dickieson purchased are:

- \$1 dated March 1, 1872 serial# 10265/Λ in good condition,
- \$2 dated March 1, 1872 serial# 3542/Λ in very good condition,
- \$20 dated June 1, 1864 serial# 856 in good condition (this bill is believed to be the only surviving \$20 note).

Since purchasing the bills Mr. Dickieson has made an interesting discovery about the history of the \$20 bill. He has learned that it was once involved in a court case. An article in The Examiner of June 27, 1864 (supplied by a friend) gives a full account of a hearing at the Charlottetown Police Court describing how this note had been stolen by a servant, from the office of Charles Palmer the President, forged, and then used to purchase a pair of boots on Tuesday, June 23, 1864 for 18 shillings at W.C. Trowan's Cobbler Shop. The said note with serial# 856 is mentioned as having been presented as evidence at the court hearing.

The Union Bank of P.E.I. was established in Charlottetown in 1860 and was a prosperous banking institution until the gradual ebbing of the Island's ship building industry forced it to merge with the Bank of Nova Scotia on October 1, 1883.

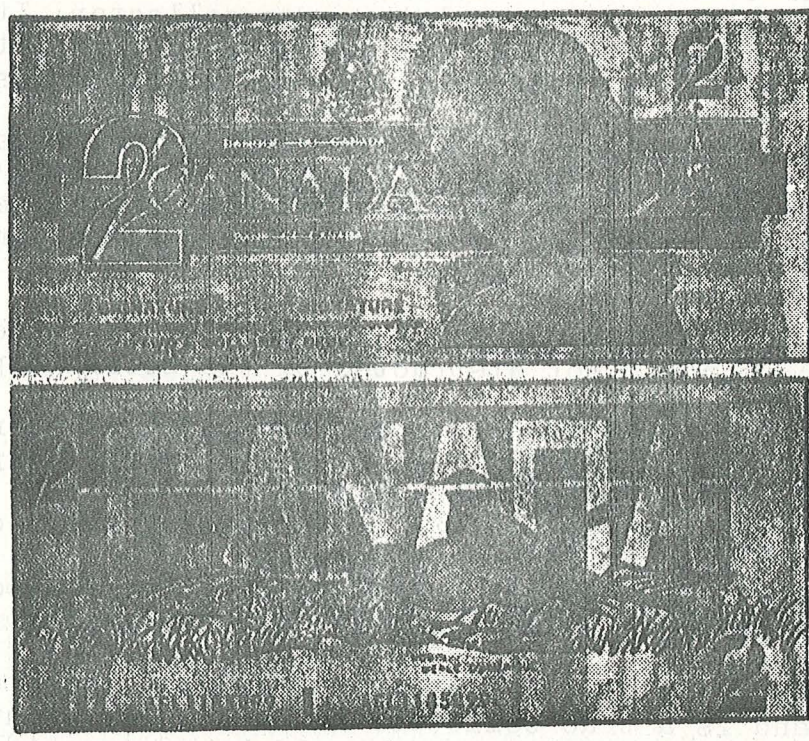
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HOTEL ACCOMMODATIONS FOR CHARLOTTETOWN APNA, OCT. 3-5:

 NEW TWO-DOLLAR BILL FEATURING ROBIN JOINS FLOCK



The Bank of Canada released, in Ottawa, this diagram of changes that will be present on the new two-dollar bill. The new bill, to be put into circulation on September 2, is designed to make life more difficult for counterfeiters and easier for those whose vision is impaired.

DID YOU KNOW:

Coins or bills as mediums of exchange were very scarce in early Charlottetown. Two merchants who attempted to remedy this were Wm. FitzPatrick and James Millner, each man producing specie that suited his trade. FitzPatrick, a shoemaker and tavern keeper, advertised in the Prince Edward Island Times of 26 March, 1836, that he proposed to issue and circulate a quantity of leather notes. James Millner, who owned 26 Great George Street, produced metal tokens as benefitted a tinsmith. This "sheaf of wheat" token is very rare.

BIRD'S I VIEW by J. CLARK MULLOCK

A member of a Coin Club has usually been sorted, graded and classified as a Hoarder, a speculator or a collector. It now appears that these three categories could be sub-divided into ultra-modern classifications which are relative to the new upcoming designs of the Canadian Bank Notes.

With an acknowledgement to Mr. Robert Aaron, whose article appeared in a recent issue of Canadian Coin News, I would like to pass the contents of it on to all members of our organization, as I feel it would be interesting to conduct a self-grading session, and see in which category you would place yourself.

THE WIDE-EYED COIN OGLER; spends most of its time examining coins and currency and is not distracted by the social aspects of the hobby. He often makes purchases.

THE WATTLED OVERGRADER; either overgrades or overprices his coins.

THE CRETINOUS OVERPRICER; is a cousin of the overgrader and both are very dangerous and should be avoided.

THE LARGE-BEAKED GROUSE; is the Scrouge of the meetings, as he is constantly complaining about something.

THE PUFF-BILLED PUBLICITY SEEKER; will try for positions of authority for purely personal reasons and not for the furthering of the benefits of Numismatics.

THE SNOWY COIN OWL; has been in the hobby for a considerable number of years and is a true collector and a student of numismatics. However this species is quite rare and should be approached with caution and reverence and will readily devote time and effort to teaching young collectors.

THE BABBLING BLUE JAY, the OLD WORLD ORIOLE or the CRESTED CARDINAL; will never be found at meetings which are held during the baseball season.

THE COMMON FLAMINGO will not attend a meeting on Friday evening during episodes of Miami Vice.

THE BOAT BILL THRUSH will not attend meetings and will avoid other collectors during the navigation season.

THE STICKY-FEATHERED BORROWER; attends some meetings but always forgets his catalogue, magnifying glass and current price list. This bird can become very annoying and should be discouraged from attending future meetings.

THE COIN HUNTING OSTRICH avoids coin club meetings and spends its time looking for buried coins. This species is not interested in any coin struck in the last 2000 years.

THE MEL FISHER BIRD is a distant cousin of the Ostrich and looks under water for old coins.

THE CRESTED MOCKING BIRD never develops its own collecting habits, but copies others and follows the latest hobby fads. If Newfoundland coins are "In" this year, the mocking bird will buy as many as he can. However, if some other Coin or Trade Dollar comes "In" the following year, The Mocking Bird will dump his Newfoundland collection in a flash.

THE THICK SKINNED WARBLER will expound on any subject, whether or not he has any knowledge thereof.

THE WELL HEELED BROADBILL is the one for which no item is too expensive, as long as he gets what he wants for his collection. However, this bird is in danger of extinction as it has become the target of anyone trying to dump an overpriced coin.

THE CRESTED SNOB SWILLER will not associate with anyone whose collection is not as impressive as his own, who didn't graduate from the same institution of learning, or who doesn't drink the same brand of premium Scotch. This bird should be avoided at all costs.

I sincerely hope that we will not find any of the above mentioned "BIRDS" at any of our future meetings.

Personally I like the Belted Kingfisher and am looking forward to the Robin and his, as yet unborn, Canadian Cousins.

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Ferry token to be minted

The City of Dartmouth has approved the minting of a new ferry token and the installation of six new turnstiles in the Halifax and Dartmouth ferry terminal buildings at a total cost of \$66,000.

The changes are scheduled to coincide with the March, 1987, opening of the new ferry terminal building in Woodside, which will have an improved turnstile.

The units to be installed in the Woodside ferry terminal building are made of stainless steel and have a computerized token-acceptance system.

"They are much more sturdy

and reliable than our current token turnstiles," a report by city clerk/treasurer Bruce Smith states.

"The turnstiles currently used in Halifax and Dartmouth terminals require extensive maintenance and their reliability can be documented by daily problems."

Mr. Smith's recommendation that the city introduce a new ferry token along with the new turnstiles was also approved.

"The ferry token in current use is made of aluminum, easily damaged by our turnstiles, and because of its soft composition its useful life is somewhat limited," Mr. Smith's report says.

The new token will be specifi-

cally designed for the new turnstiles and will be made of "much more durable material and provide a much longer useful life," the report adds.

Money for the new turnstiles and the new coin minting will come from the ferry service operating fund.

Purchase and installation of the turnstiles — three for the Halifax terminal and three for the Dartmouth terminal — will cost roughly \$50,000, while the minting and initial inventory of 100,000 tokens is expected to cost about \$16,000.

The final cost quotes will be presented to council for approval before the awarding of contracts.

Prince Edward Island

New Glasgow, P.E.I. Lobster Suppers have issued their second in a series of trade dollars. The obverse is the same as the 1985 version which shows the front of the New Glasgow Recreation Centre where the Lobster Suppers are held each day. Only the date has been changed. The reverse features the Brig "Pakeha". The Pakeha " a Maori word for European settlers ", was constructed in 1863 at New Glasgow by shipbuilder, Robert Orr Jr.. This vessel was a coppered bottomed, copper fastened Brig of 173 tons, 91ft long, 22.8ft wide, and had a depth of 11.7ft. It was constructed to transport several families, the Bagnalls, the Darrachs, and others from New Glasgow to New Zealand.

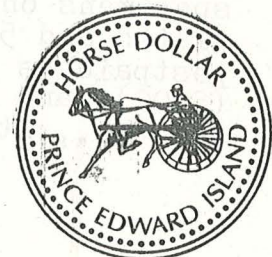
The Greater Summerside Chamber of Commerce's 1986 trade dollar commemorates the 100th year of the operation of the Summerside Raceway, its speciality is harness racing. The reverse side shows the horse "Black Pilot", who won a special match race on opening day, July 1, 1886, at the Raceway. The driver is shown seated in his high wheel sulky, behind the horse. Wayne Wright of Summerside designed the reverse. The obverse side shows the logo of the Greater Summerside Chamber of Commerce.

The Sherritt Mint struck 10,000 specimens on 33mm NBS blanks, 100 were gold-plated, and 100 more were rhodium-plated. NBS specimens cost \$2.50 postpaid. Orders should be sent to the Greater Summerside Chamber of Commerce, 267 Water St., Summerside, P.E.I., Canada, C1N 1B5.

Newfoundland

The town of Labrador City celebrated its 25th anniversary this year with an issue of trade dollars, valid at participating merchants in the town until June 30th, 1986. The obverse side shows a triangle superimposed on a square. The reverse side features the town's crest showing a caribou standing on its hind legs on either side of a shield of arms with an owl perched on top. Labrador City is situated in the very southwestern corner of the Labrador portion of Newfoundland, very close to Quebec. The mining of iron is the town's main source of employment.

Sherritt Mint struck 6,000 specimens on 33mm NBS blanks. Specimens are available at \$1.90 postpaid from Jim Quinn, Box 291, Newcastle, New Brunswick, E1V 3M4.



Nova Scotia

The 1986 trade dollar issued by the Cape Breton Tourist Association marks the 50th anniversary of Cape Breton Highlands National Park. A view of the park along a highway with mountains on either side is shown on the obverse side. MacPuffin, a bird of the puffin family with a cromock under his wing and a bonnet on his head is featured on the reverse side.

Sherritt Mint struck 25,000 specimens on 33mm NBS blanks and a small quantity of silver specimens. Specimens are available postpaid as follows: NBS (\$1.50) and silver in a case (\$31.00) from the Cape Breton Tourist Association, 20 Keltic Drive, Sydney River, N.S., B1S 1P5.

The Yarmouth Chamber of Commerce has released a 1986 trade dollar for their town. The piece commemorates the 225th anniversary of Yarmouth and shows the sailing ship "Pompey Dick" at Town Point on the obverse side. The reverse design is the same as that used last year.

Johnson Matthey Ltd. of Toronto struck 10,000 pieces on 33mm nickel-silver blanks. They are available postpaid at \$1.50 from the Yarmouth Chamber of Commerce, Box 176, Yarmouth, N.S., B5A 4B2.

Sam Slick, the Clockmaker, a fictitious character created by Judge Thomas Chandler Haliburton in 1836, is depicted on the obverse side of the 1986 Windsor trade dollar. Judge Haliburton was a gifted humorist who wrote about this character in the 1830's to stir up the people of Nova Scotia to become more energetic and alert and do something about their depressed economy. The Judge's home in Windsor is now a provincial museum. Windsor celebrates Sam Slick days each summer for a week during August. The town's crest is featured on the reverse side. Roland Meuse of Windsor designed the piece. Sherritt Mint struck 5,000 specimens on 33mm NBS blanks.

Specimens are available at \$1.50 postpaid from Eva Mumford, Victoria Street, Windsor, N.S., BON 2T0. The trade dollar is sponsored by the West Hants Historical Society and proceeds will go to the museum in Windsor.

The Caribou, C.N. Marine's new passenger ferry boat which entered into service this May from North Sydney to Newfoundland, is featured on the obverse side of the 1986 North Sydney trade dollar. The Town's coat of arms is shown on the reverse side. The Caribou is North America's largest passenger vessel, at 587ft in length. It was built at a cost of \$121 million by Versatile Davie Inc., of Lauzon, P. Q. It was christened by Governor-General Jeanne Sauve on Sept. 7, 1985. The name "Caribou" comes from an earlier vessel which served the same route from 1925 to 1942, when it was sunk by a torpedo from a German U-Boat. 137 of 238 people aboard lost their lives.

The issue of trade dollars is being sponsored by the North Sydney Business Improvement District Commission. Sherritt Mint struck 4,500 specimens on 33mm NBS blanks. In addition 250 gold-plated, 250 bronze-plated and 51 pure silver specimens were produced. They are available postpaid as follows: NBS (1.50), Gold-plated (8.25), bronze-plated (5.00), and cased silver (36.00). Orders may be sent to North Sydney B.I.D.C., Attn. Paul Perry, P.O. New Brunswick

A seal from the St. Andrews aquarium is featured on the reverse side of their \$2.00 municipal trade token, sponsored by the St. Andrews' Chamber of Commerce Inc. The Aquarium has been one of the major attractions for the past decade in the town. St. Andrews' town crest is shown on the obverse side. Fred Purton, who assists in caring for the seals, designed the seal side of the 1986 token.

Sherritt Mint struck 5,000 specimens on 33mm NBS blanks. They are available at \$2.50 postpaid from St. Andrews Chamber of Commerce Inc., P.O. Box 89, St. Andrews-By-The-Sea, N.B., E0G 2X0.

Centennial Bridge, built in 1967 to connect Chatham and Newcastle, is featured on the obverse side of their 1986 trade dollar, which is valid in both towns. As in all past issues the pioneer design is featured on the reverse side. It shows a lumberman with an axe on his shoulder, a cabin, and in the background an early 19th century sailing ship. The trade dollar is sponsored by the Miramichi Chamber of Commerce.

The Lombardo Mint struck 5,000 specimens on 38mm nickel-plated blanks and 60 specimens in pure silver. Nickel-plated specimens are available at \$2.00 postpaid from Jim Quinn, Box 291, Newcastle, N.B., E1V 3M4.

Trinty Church, the church of the Loyalists is featured on the obverse side of the 1986 St. John \$2.00 municipal trade token issued by Loyalist Days Inc. The crest of the city of St. John is shown on the reverse side.

The Sherritt Mint struck the issue on 33mm NBS blanks and gold-plated a small quantity. Pure silver specimens were also struck. Postpaid prices are as follows: NBS (\$2.50) and gold-plated (\$10.50) from Loyalist Days Inc., 24 Sydney St., Saint John, N.B., E2L 2L3. It is possible that a few of their pure silver specimens are still available at \$35.00 plus postage.

The newly formed Campbellton Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring their town's 1986 trade dollar. The bilingual trade dollar shows the inscription "POWER&PRIDE" and "FORCE ET FIERCE" in the central part of the obverse side. The Campbellton crest is featured on the reverse side.

Sherritt Mint struck 10,000 specimens on 33mm NBS blanks. The Chamber is unable to fill mail orders and has requested Jim Quinn, Box 291, Newcastle, N.B., E1V 3M4 to do this. Jim will send the 1986 trade dollar at \$1.90 postpaid.
