1985 Auctions - in addition to the March T.I.C.F. Medal collectors take note - we have just taken delivery of one of Canada's most important collections of LeRoux and other medals, for auction at the March T.I.C.F. This should be a highlight of the numismatic decade for all serious collectors of these under-rated rarities!

#### FEATURE ARTICLE

#### THE LONGEST-LIVED COIN TYPES OF ALL TIME

The three illustrated bronze "cash" coins of China are noteworthy, not only because of their age or scarcity, but because these types were cast without basic change for over a century each - which makes them the most long-lived style of coins in the world,

The stated weights of the first two do not represent their true weights, even before erosion by time and usage. This is because of reduction in their size and weight to affect production cost savings (similar to Canada's one-cent reduction in 1982). Earlier issues of the same type were larger. Standards of weight and currency varied with time and locality. One Liang of currency was generally equivalent to one Tael of weight (approximately one and a half ounces, Avoirdupois). Later, a string of 1000 cash (or somewhat less) was equal to one Liang. The Chu was the smallest weight unit, initially equal to 100 millet seeds, and later equal to one twentyfourth of a Liang. These inconsistencies in standards were never fully resolved until well after the collapse of the Chinese empire.

The PAN LIANG was issued during the Ch'in and Han dynasties from Ca. 255 B.C. until 118 B.C. (over 100 years). They marked the complete transition from the user of implement money (spades, knives, etc.) of the earlier Chou dynasty.

The WU CHU in turn replaced the Pan Liang, which were ordered to be recalled and melted down. Except for an Interregnum period from A.D. 9-23, plus some periods of reversion to barter, and a few short term experiments with other legends, these coins were the stable currency from 118 B.C. until A.D. 619 (over 700 years!). They spanned several dynasties and are difficult to attribute to any one. It is reported that there was genuine sorrow expressed when they were finally discontinued.

The KAI YUAN coins were inaugurated at the start of the T'ang dynasty in A.D. 619, and were the basic coins in use until the Epoch of the Five Dynasties in A.D. 907 (almost 300 years). These new coins bore four symbols unrelated to a meaningless statement of weight. The upper and lower characters gave the reign title of the emperor, and the right and left ones introduced the compound word for "currency" (literally: "circulating treasure"). These latter two were retained, with some infrequent variations such as "heavy treasure" for large denominations, and "original treasure" for first issues of an emperor or dynasty, until the end of the Empire in 1911 (almost 1300 years!).

These coins have similar qualities to the three Chinese imperishables - one's virtue, TE'; meritorious achievement, KÜNG'; and one's teachings, YEN'. May you be adequately endowed with each.

#### CANADIAN HISTORICAL MEDAL PRICE GUIDE AVAILABLE

The long-awaited first edition of the <u>Price Guide to Canadian Medals</u> by Paul Nadin-Davis was published in Ottawa, <u>Canada on October 1st</u>. <u>Based</u> on the work of Dr. Jos. LeRoux, the noted Canadian numismatist who authored the standard catalog of Canadian medals around the turn of the century, the book is the first comprehensive attempt at a price guide for this extensive series.

Dr LeRoux's basic work, "The Canadian Coin Cabinet", has been the standard reference on Canadian medals ever since publication in the 1890s. It encompasses every type of medal issued in Canada from early Indian Chief medals to the prolific commemorative issues of the late 1800s. A supplement was issued a few years later containing many new issues, which unfortunately were only listed with brief descriptions.

The LeRoux work was reprinted in Winnipeg in 1964, and again in Ottawa by Nadin-Davis Numismatics/Douglas Robins in 1983. The reprint was a huge success, with many hundreds of copies selling immediately. The need

remained for a price guide.

In addition, the original work says nothing of metals in which the

various medals were issued.

Dr. Nadin-Davis's new edition contains detailed listings of metals in which the various medals are known to exist, along with pricing for the most common grade in which each medal is found. Extensive additional notes detail varieties, mulings, etc., based on a survey of several major collections of Canadian medals.

Of necessity there are several blanks in the new work, as examples of some medals were simply not located or there were no reported sales available to assist in pricing. Blanks have been left in the appropriate places for users to add new information as it becomes available.

The new price guide will be extremely useful as a checklist, for it contains integrated listings of all medals in LeRoux's original work and

medals in the supplement.

To many Canadians auction is a preferred method of acquisition of coins for their collections and stocks. Understanding the basic theory of a properly-conducted auction, it is easy to see why this is the case. In an auction setting, the auctioneer presents each piece or "lot", and calls for bids from the "floor", i.e. the persons attending. When the first bid is received, often at a level of approximately half the "estimate", other bids are called for in raises of approximately 10% to 20%. Eventually, when the highest bid has been obtained, the auctioneer will either say "sold" or bang a gavel on his table. A legally binding contract has then been made by the bidder to buy, and by the auctioneer to sell, the lot in question.

The advantages of auction are many. First, because of the competitive situation, it is a true market indicator. With many willing buyers of coins present, the buyer is assured that he is buying his pieces at a slight premium over what others would pay - rather than paying much too much for an item, which he might do through inexperience in negotiating a direct sale. In addition, the auction setting itself can be extremely enjoyable - lots can be viewed in comfort beforehand,, and auctioneers themselves are frequently great

entertainers, putting a great deal of humour into their presentations.

A common variation on the basic auction in Canada is the provision of facilities for "mail bidders". Mail bidders are allowed to mail in bids to the auction company on the basis of written descriptions in the catalog. Usually, an advance of 10% over the second-highest mail bid received will be the starting bid at the sale, The auctioneer will then bid on behalf of the highest mail bidder himself, against floor bidders, up to the limit of that floor bidder. In our auctions, we practise a slight variation of this theme: this is the case where the highest mail bid is over estimate, but where the highest bid is below estimate, it is used as the starting bid. In fact I feel that many auction companies do this as a matter of course, even though in their terms of sale they indicate that they have a policy of reducing all mail bids to a percentage over the second highest.

All of the above assumes a properly and legally conducted auction. It goes without saying that in any business there are a few unscrupulous persons, and this applies equally to auction houses. One practice occasionally seen, though outlawed in most major cities, is the placing of "shills" on the floor of the auction to bid against other buyers in order to artificially raise the prices. These "shills" are not bona fide buyers but simply agents of

the auctioneer. Fortunately, this practice is rarely seen in Canada.

#### HOW TO PARTICIPATE

If you have never participated in an auction but would like to try your hand, the following description of how to participate may be helpful. The first step is to obtain a catalogue, either by mail or at the place where the viewing is to be held, and look carefully through it, marking the lots in which you are interested. You should also read the "terms of sale" thoroughly at this time and make sure that you understand them all. Pay particular attention to the terms relating to guarantees of authenticity (typically auction companies guarantee authenticity of coins to floor bidders for a limited time only, though a few give no guarantee whatsoever, and it is up to the buyer to be sure before bidding!), terms of payment (prior arrangements are often needed to pay other than by cash), and to mention of any premium (some companies charge a "premium" of 10% or so to the buyer. Sales tax may be payable in some provinces, and you may want to take this into account before calculating your bids.

At the viewing of the auction, usually several employees of the auctioneer will be available to help you. Ask for the lots you wish to see one or two at a time, and examine them carefully, making appropriate notes in your catalog. You will usually find the assistants very helpful at this time, but don't make unreasonable demands. And, if they are very busy or you are now known to them, do not expect them to leave you with a whole box or series of coins. Generally they will be forbidden to do this by the auction company.

Having viewed, it's time to decide approximately what you intend to bid for the coins you want. Then, "register" for the auction. In North America this usually involves getting a "bidder number", and signing a card with your name and address agreeing to the terms of sale as published in the auction catalog. This numbered card will be shown whenever you buy a lot at the sale, and the number will be used to prepare a single invoice for all your

lots, which can be paid for and picked up together at the end of the auction.

Overseas, there are some interesting variations on this practice. In the older English auctions, bidders still participate by name. Thus if I buy lots at a London sale everyone in the room will hear my name called for each lot I buy. Spinks use the name "Goddard" to represent all mail bidders! In Japan, each lot has to be paid for in cash as you buy it! This results in a very large amount of paper money changing hands very rapidly, and a veritable army of collectors scurrying around the floor with lots!

Now it's time for the auction. Armed with your catalog and bidder number, you can go and find a seat in the auction room, and wait for the auctioneer to start the auction. Now it's simple - wait for the lots you want to be called in numerical order, and show your card when you wish to raise the bidding. Try not to be too emotional at this point - bid carefully, make sure you pay attention so that you are bidding on the right lots, and be

mindful of your budgetary limits. Don't spend more than you can pay!

Just to shatter one myth - many people think that merely by moving an eyelid or wrinkling one's nose in an auction room you might buy something. In fact, there's a very funny English beer commercial in which a man is gesturing to a pretty girl across the auction room, trying to ask her to go out for a drink, and ends up buying a nine-foot tall stuffed polar bear! In fact this is really not the case - the auctioneer will generally ask if he's unsure whether a person is bidding, and there are many small movements in a room full of people, which generally his eyes are accustomed to ignore. But do try to ignore sudden movements which might distract the attention of the auctioneer - we have had people in our sales blowing gum-bubbles and bursting them during bidding, stretching at inappropriate moments with a great show of hands and tonsils, shouting to friends outside the auction room, and so on. Such actions not only cause difficulties for the auctioneer but are also very inconsiderate to other bidders, who will be trying hard to concentrate on their bidding.

MAIL BIDDING

Many of the considerations for mail bidders are similar to those for floor bidders, except that the opportunity to view is replaced by the printed catalog, and there is no need to be physically present for bids to be entered. Budgetary constraints should be borne in mind, and one should bid in each case the maximum that one is prepared to pay for each lot. It's a good idea to work on the assumption that the lot might be sold at precisely that price to you, though if your bids are strong there is a chance of a reduction in your favour.

Mail bidders should always pay particular attention to any term of sale relating to minimum bids. In our sales, for example, we state quite clearly that the minimum mail bid is 50% of estimate. Auction after auction we get bid sheets with many bids well below this level, and we find this not only frustrating but also rather insulting. Why on earth would we say that we are not interested in bids below half if we did not mean it? These bids are very time-consuming to remove, and a complete waste of time on the part of the bidders who send them in. Needless to say, even if there is no published minimum, it is also rather fruitless to send in ridiculous bids. We have on many occasions received bids below 50% of the melt value of world gold coins, bids of a tenth or so of estimate on rare key date coins, and other non-sensical offers! These are referred to in the trade as "garbage bids", a reference to the round basket in which they are filed. The name is an appropriate one, and sending in ridiculous bids is a sure way to get your name taken off the mailing list of the auctioneer. I world counsel against annoying the auction house in this way as in the future you may really want something and be prepared to pay a sensible price for it, but find the auctioneer rather unwilling to deal with you!

#### GOOD LUCK!

I hope this brief explanation has been helpful to those of you who might want to participate in auctions but haven't felt confident enough yet! There are several fine auctions held in Canada each year, including ours at the Toronto International Coin Fair in March and November, the C.N.A. and O.N.A. Sales, and a number of auctions associated with other major commercial shows. In the current market there is great potential for gaining bargains at many of these sales, and your participation will always be welcome! Good luck and good hunting!

#### CHINA - SUNG DYNASTY - Cash Set

#### Notes:

- 1. This is the former manner of writing China, i.e., CHUNG KUÓ 中区, "middle country", the centre of the world.
- 2. The SUNG dynasty 宋紀, lasted for 167 years from A.D. 960 1127. It was ruled by nine emperors, with coinage bearing 30 regnal titles.
- The reference numbers are those from "Chinese Currency" by Frederik Schjöth (1929, reprinted 1965, etc.)
- 4. The emperors' dynastic titles are only shown for reference. They do not appear on the coins, in documents, nor on the official seal. All but the last emperor are represented in this set: he reigned for less than a year, so his coins are scarce.
- 5. The regnal title NIN HAO 年號 , is the two-character official name for all or some part of an emperor's reign. This title appears on the coinage.
- Top, Btm (Bottom), Rt (Right) and Lt (Left) refer to the positions of the four characters on the sides of the central square hole in the Chinese cash.
- 7. The A.D. dates refer to the year of adoption of the NIEN HAO by the emperor.
- There were three basic script systems used on SNG dynasty cash coins: Ortho(dox) or conventional, Seal or formal script, and Grass or handwritten.
- There are two arrangements of the four characters on the cash coins. This
  one is to be read Top, Btm, Rt, Lt. Thus the top and bottom characters
  are the NI EN HAO.
- This is the other arrangement which is to be read Top, Rt, Btm, Lt; i.e. clockwise. The top and right characters are the NION HAO.
- 11. The remaining two characters are YUAN PAO 元 賀, "original currency".
- 12. The remaining two characters are T'UNG PAO 通資 , "circulating currency".
- 13. The original attributor used different dates from those listed here.
